Kentucky's Chief Justice pushed for an early start to a law that could penalize a campaign opponent of his wife, a family court judge seeking re-election.

Justice Joseph Lambert, of Mt. Vernon sent a letter to Gov. Ernie Fletcher last month asking that a law prohibiting retired judges who return to the bench from collecting both pay and their pension be put into effect this year.

The General Assembly delayed the start date of the "antidouble dipping" provision of this year's judicial budget until 2007 so it wouldn't apply to three retired judges running for office in November.

Fletcher, though, used a lineitem veto to delete the language delaying the start date for the law. The result was the retired judges running for office, including former District Judge Walter Maguire — who is running against Debra Lambert would have their salary cut so their combined paycheck and pension don't exceed the salary if they won the position.

Maguire, who retired in June 2005 after 23 years on the district bench, said that would mean he would be paid about \$30,000, once his pension is deducted from the \$121,344 family court judgeship. Maguire said he still intends to run, but said the chief justice had "misused the power of his position for the obvious purpose of discouraging somebody from running against his wife."

Debra Lambert is family court judge for Rockcastle, Pulaski and Lincoln counties. She did not return phone calls seeking comment. Chief Justice Lambert denied that his wife's situation prompted the letter to Fletcher. Instead, Lambert said, he had a duty as top administrator for the courts to address the issue and "absolutely" noulan't nave recused nimself.

Two lawyers versed in state constitutional law said Fletcher's use of the line-item veto to strike down a start date for a law was unusual.

Such vetoes are generally used to delete specific spending items, said Mark Guilfoyle, who served as general counsel to Brereton Jones when he was governor.

Lexington lawyer Scott White, who researched the issue as assistant deputy attorney general for a 2003 opinion, said Fletcher acted improperly. "You can't amend the law by fiddling with a budget bill," he said. "You can only veto the money."

Along Horse Lick Creek

Forest Service gets 477 acres from Nature Conservancy

Last Friday, the U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service, took possession of 477 acres of land along Horse Lick Creek in Rockcastle and Jackson Counties. Horse Lick Creek is a tributary to the Middle Fork of the Rockcastle River. The land will be administered by the London Ranger District of the Daniel Boone National Forest.

The Nature Conservancy (TNC) purchased the property, known as the (Jones) Durham Tract in April 2005 with special funding made available through a partnership agreement among the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, the Federal Highway Administration and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service. This special funding is focused on sites where a high level of conservation benefit or protection can be attained. In this particular project, the purchase and subsequent conservation of the Durham Tract will offset, or mitigate the impact to aquatic

habitats of road development or reconstruction projects in the upper Cumberland River watershed in southeast Kentucky.

"The taxpayers of Kentucky saved nearly \$350,000 in mitigation costs by participating in this partnership with The Nature Conservancy, Forest Service, Fish and Wildlife Service and Federal Highway Administration. These funds will likely be used to implement other priority road projects across the state," said David Waldner, Director of the Transportation Cabinet's Division of Environmental Analysis in Frankfort.

Jose' Sepulveda, Division Administrator for the Federal Highway Administration, added "This is not a typical project for us, but it's one that definitely provides many important benefits for the highway program in Kentucky and for conservation of Kentucky's important ecological resources."

The transfer of this portion of the Durham tract is part of an ongoing effort to consolidate public land ownership in biologically significant areas. Since 1990, the Daniel Boone National Forest has acquired over 5,300 acres from The Nature Conservancy. Of the acquired tracts, over 3,100 acres occur in the Horse Lick Creek and Rockcastle River area. All of the acquired parcels provide habitat for several threatened and endangered species. The Durham Tract is contiguous to existing national forest system lands on the Daniel Boone National Forest.

Horse Lick Creek represents about 10% of the total 400,000acre Rockcastle River water-

Don't Take the Kids Away!

In what was characterized as a rebuke to recent so-called "quick trigger" adoptions involving the Cabinet for Family Services, the Kentucky Court of Appeals this week reaffirmed the serious nature of proceedings designed to terminate parents' rights to their children. In

months, numerous decisions by the Cabinet and lower courts relating to fast tracked adoptions have come

The problem is simple enough. When does a parent's misconduct rise to such a level that the state is justified in permanently taking a child away and placing the child for adop-

One would hope that in only the most egregious instances would the government intrude into such a private area as parenting. Yet society's attitudes about this issue are sometimes surprising. Otherwise staunch advocates who rebel against the thought of the government involving itself in personal matters frequently espouse the opposite view when presented with bad parenting.

The unanimous decision of the Kentucky Court of Appeals affirmed the serious nature of governmental intrusion into

these types of personal issues. In vacating a lower court's decision to terminate parental rights, the three judge appeals court determined that the state's evidence of medical and education neglect fell woefully short of the appropriate standard to be applied.

In Kentucky, most terminations of parental rights are voluntary. Commonly, parents divorce and upon one spouse remarrying, the new stepparent desires to adopt. Before that adoption can occur, the other parent must agree to terminate his or her own parental rights. Sadly, many do—usually, but not always--to avoid paying child support.

These terminations of parental rights ("TPR") usually pose only logistical problems.

Involuntary terminations of parental rights are far more serious. A circuit court may involuntary terminate parental rights where the child is abused or neglected, or where the par-






World War II Army veteran. He worked at Phillips Recording Co. as an electroplater and was a member of Freedom Missionary Baptist Church.

Guidelines for Elmwood Cemetery

(REVISED 2004)

The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation is a non-profit organization formed several years ago by concerned citizens to provide perpetual care for loved ones who have deceased. The corporation is governed by a board of directors who care for the cemetery through funding received from private individuals and the interest received from the investment of these funds. Officer's and directors receive no salary or compensation for their participation on this board.

The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation Board of Directors attempts to accommodate the wishes of each family which is buried in the Elmwood Cemetery. To do this there MUST be standards by which the grounds can be maintained and kept in a dignified manner. Some of these guidelines were utilized prior to the perpetual care formation, some stipulated in the deed conditions of private developers, and others by motion and vote of the board of directors.

- The following are guidelines that the board has operated since the formation of the perpetual care: Mowing of the grass, tree trimming, and general maintenance repairs are done by private
- Mowing of the grass will be done, as needed, due to precipitation and financial funds available. Removal of flowers from new grave sites is done when approprite, during the grass mowing season, prior to mowing.
- The cemetery is "cleaned" of fresh and/or artificial arrangements, not attached to a monument, two (2) weeks after Memorial Day.
- Any arrangement off a grave stone due to wind is to be replaced. If the correct stone is unable to be ascertained then the nearest stone to the arrangement is to receive the replacement.
- Only arrangements deemed needing replacement are to be removed and under NO condition are these arrangements to be resold.
- At NO TIME has the cemetery board advocated the removal of an arrangement that is on or attached to any grave stone. Only those arrangements deemed needing replaced or which hinder
- the normal mowing or trimming are to be removed. Barriers, fences, cables, etc. surrounding a grave site are prohibited as these impede the use of lawn mowers necessary for the upkeep of the cemetery. This regulation is stipulated in the deeds of many of the grave sites in portions of the Elmwood Cemetery.
- The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Board will not be responsible for the correct opening and closing of grave sites.
- Graves are seeded at appropriate times throughout the year and graves which have sunk will be filled when necessary.
- The planting of flowers or shrubs around monuments or grave sites is discouraged as these impede the mowing and trimming around the stone markers and may be damaged during regular mowing
- The raking of leaves, removal of debris and obstructions which impede the care/maintenance and flow of traffic will be done as necessary.
- The only flag pole permitted within the Elmwood Cemetery grounds will be on a site designated for

We're writing this to express our frustration and resentment regarding last weeks comments by fiscal court members referring to the purchase of a van for the coroner, Bill Dowell.

First, do the magistrates realize that part of the coroner's duties is detecting and investigating a death not clearly resulting from natural causes? Part of that detection involves obtaining an autopsy which involves transportation of the body approximately 160 miles round trip to and from Frankfort, not only does he provide transportation to and from Frankfort, he also provides transportation of human remains from residences to one of the three funeral homes within the county. For the past 40 years, he has supplied his own transportation for these services. We're sure there are many families, law enforcement and attorneys grateful for the information resulting from the services the corner performs, such as the aforementioned and others not mentioned here.

The magistrates must remember that before any decision regarding provision to benefits the coroner receives for services that he is on call 24 hours a day, seven days a weeks, all holidays, and any kind of weather. He has served Rockcastle County tirelessly for more than 40 years. He has had to leave his family for coroner calls, deal with intense grief and sadness, plus at times, the ghastly, mangled, decomposed stench of dead bodies. He does all this for meager pay and benefits and no one, except for one person, has chosen to take this job in the last 38 years.

We might also add that before the last raise he received approximately 10-15 years ago, he was at that time making less than the dogcatcher. He has also provided transportation and office space for the entire time he has been in office and has asked very little of the county during his terms.

Secondly, where will the local Government Economic Assistance funds go, if not for reasonable purchases such as this? Are there any projects earmarked for this money, or is it just sitting, waiting for the next road to be fixed come general election time to ensure the votes will come?

To the magistrates: it is time to think outside the box, use the money the county has where it is needed, especially if it's going to improve services and provide for the needs of the county! It's time to get out of the mindset of getting something for nothing!

We would like to add, in closing, that we are biased concerning this issue, but have per-



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

ent has been convicted of a criminal charge relating to the physical or sexual abuse of that child. In addition, the court must also find by clear and convincing evidence that one or more other special circumstances exist. A non-exhaustive list includes: the child has been abandoned for not less than 90 days; the parent has allowed the infliction of serious physical injury by other than accidental means; has continuously failed to provide essential care and protection for the child for not less than six months; the parent has allowed them to be sexually exploited; the parent has repeatedly failed or is incapable of providing essential food, shelter, clothing, medical care or education,; or the child has been in foster care for an extended period. TPR must also always be in the best interests

of the child. What's important to remember is that poverty is not ever a reason to consider TPR. Parents may well not be able to afford to appropriately clothe, shelter or care for their children due to financial hardship, and children might well be better off in someone else's (read more financially secure) home. But, unless I missed something, we still live in a land where effort counts for everything. Any parent who tries to provide for their children ought not ever to have to worry about the state knocking on the door except to offer assistance.

Every judge that I know takes these issues seriously. An involuntary TPR can be a gutwrenching decision. It should never be anything less.

vidual who was inebriated, he would say he was as "high as a Georgia pine." And when it got hot outside, he said it is as "hot as a \$2 pistol." I remember my dad talking about our small town as being "dead as four o'clock." A man who might have been considered too old to be fathering a child, but whose wife was nonetheless in the family way, would be described as having "snow on the roof —

but fire in the furnace." One year when I was coaching football, the superintendent told us to be careful not to use profanity in front of the players. This was extremely hard for the head coach. One night we went into the dressing room at half time a couple of touchdowns behind a team that we were supposed to defeat. He was ranting and raving about our performance, hitting his palm with his fist. Finally, his frustration with trying to contain himself having peaked, he

exclaimed, "Crappedy-dap! You got to play harder." The whole team almost fell out of their seats laughing.

Being raised in a small southern town that used these kinds of expressions caused me to develop a list of my own. If I identify something that is very good, to me it is "finer than a frog's hair;" or if something is hard, then it is "tougher than a pine knot." Sometimes, if I am extremely busy, I say that I am "busier than a one-armed paper hanger." If I can't do something that someone asks me to do, I say it's "too wet to plow." One of my most common phrases is that something is "harder than a buck's horn.'

One of the most memorable colorful speakers was Adolph Rupp. Even though we might not always agree with his slant on topics, we could not help but be entertained by his use of terminology and phrases. Rupp could never remember his players' names. He often referred to one of my friends on his team as the "Mt. Sterling clown."

These expressions add spice to our language and help us to retain a connection to our cultural roots. How boring it would be just to use proper wording to explain how we think. The most interesting individuals accent their conversation by using colorful language and descriptions to help us to understand their true meaning. Frankly, I prefer it that way. Or, better yet (to borrow an expression that we must have inherited from our British roots), that's my "cup of tea"

fisherman. He didn't weigh much more than a hundred pounds, soaking-wet, but he never wet a line without catching a fish. Fishing was a passion for him and it rubbed off on me. The absolute best times of my life have to do with following Uncle Jim around and begging him to take me to river.

He taught me to catch soft crawdads and grampus in the river shoals---how to shine a carbide light on the back yard grass and snatch some night crawlers, or dig red worms out of the manure behind the chicken coop.

I was maybe 6 years old when Uncle Jim and Aunt Alpha lived there above Whitesburg at Pine Mountain Junction right beside the river. Just down below their house, perhaps half a mile, was a long stretch of water on the river that was aptly called "The Long Hole"

Hole" Out of this hole of water, Uncle Jim caught the biggest fish I had ever seen up close and personal. I didn't see him catch it but I saw the fish because he kept it in a spring-fed pool behind his house for several weeks. A small mouth bass that was easily 24 inches long and probably weighed 5 pounds or so. Probably a record for the Kentucky River. When the fiver began to cool that fall, he took the bass out of the spring in a wash tub and let it back loose in the river.

A few years later, Uncle Jim and Aunt Alpha were living right on the river at UZ and I must have been in 8th grade. It was summer time and I thought the closest place to Heaven was the two weeks that my parents let me spend with them every summer.

It was an excuse for Uncle Jim to go fishing every day and we walked miles up and down the river. We caught lots of redeye and keeper bass and Aunt Alpha fried them every

the river and there is a huge hole of water, I was walking behind Uncle Jim and he nudged me back with his elbow.

neral. Such an occasion is a sad experience, but when one is taken at an early age right out of the blue, it leaves the family and friends left behind with a horrible, horrible, loss and a long list of questions. Why did it have to happen? Why now? Why him? Why...?

The very sights and sounds of a wake or funeral sink into your heart and brain, and cause your heart to break with sadness. Heartbroken parents were forced to face something they had never anticipated. They had to endure the trial of surviving their own child. What parent would even want to imagine such and ordeal? A grieving widow silently wept as she stroked the white, crisp shirt of her husband just above his nowsilent heart. She stood and would occasionally hold his hand reminiscent of when they were dating. A son and daughter's mind is full of past memories knowing that is all that remains of their father; those precious, precious, memories. Their grief is almost more than what they can bare, as this is probably the worst trial they have had to face. 

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RCHS girls' track team wins sixth regional title

The RCHS girls' track and field team won the Class 2A Region IV Championship this past Saturday at Eastern Kentucky University. They defeated West Jessamine by a final score of 155 to 92, a margin of 63 points. Casey County finished third and Lexington Catholic, which featured newcomer basketball state champions Nikki Davis and Brianna Green, finished fourth. This was the third regional title in a row for the RCHS girls, as well as their sixth regional championship in the last seven years. They have been either regional champions or runners-up for am impressive run of nine straight seasons.

RCHS qualified eleven girls for the Class 2A State Championships in twelve different events. Regional competition began last Wednesday at Madison Southern High School with preliminary competition in most events. Several finals were contested in field event competition. The top two competitors in each event automatically qualify for state, along with four at-large positions representing the next four best times in the state that are not in the top two in the region.

The RCHS girls' 3200-meter relay team got the afternoon off to a good start. The team of seniors Jessi Asher, Kayla Hayes, along with seventh grader Sara Hammond and fifth grader Michaela Hunter, ran an impressive race. The team finished third overall with a time of 10:47.82 and qualified for the state championships.

Freshman Sarah McKinney and seventh grader Jessica Asher ran preliminaries of the 100 and 300-meter hurdles on Wednesday. The duo had no trouble qualifying for the finals on Saturday, with Sarah posting the fastest qualifying time.

Seventh grader Dustin Smith competed for the RCHS boys' team in both the 100 and 300meter hurdles. In the 100's, Dustin ran one of his best races ever and finished with an excellent time of 21.49 seconds. In the 300's, Dustin had one of his best races of the year. He finished with a time of 52.99, one of his best this year.

Sophomore Morgan Thacker and freshman Katy Mattingly blazed their way through the 100-meter dash, easily qualifying for the finals with wins in

both of their heats. Junior Josh Blair took on the task of competing in the all of the sprint events including the 100, 200, and 400-meter dashes. In the 100, Josh ran a great race and finished with an impressive time of 12.69 seconds. In the 200, Josh was equally impressive, finishing in 25.98 seconds. In the 400, Josh blazed his way to a great time of 1:00.17. Despite his tremendous effort, Josh narrowly missed qualifying for the finals in his events.

Morgan, along with eighth grader Samantha Smith, also competed early Wednesday afternoon in the finals of the long jump competition. Both girls were impressive in the first round and each had a great series of jumps, easily qualifying them for the finals and another three attempts. Morgan came through with one of her best performances of the season, winning the regional title in the event with an awesome leap of 17'2.5". Samantha also had probably her best series of jumps ever. She finished an impressive third overall with an incredible leap of 14'8.75" and just missed state qualification in

Senior Jessica Norton, sophomore Tiffany Smith, and eighth grader Katy Howard competed in the throwing events for RCHS. Jessica and Tiffany both performed very well in the shot put competition. Jessica threw an impressive 26' and placed fifth overall, while Tiffany placed seventh with a superb effort of 25'8". In the discus competition, Katy had a great series of throws and finished 10th overall with a throw of 65'3". Tiffany also performed well and placed 14th overall with an effort of 48'11".

On the boys' side, RCHS freshman Cody Kirby had outstanding performances in both the shot put and discus competitions. Cody threw an impressive 29'0.5" and placed 17th in shot put. In discus, Cody placed 18th overall with a great effort of 55'3".

grader Sara Seventh Hammond performed well in the high jump competition. Sara finished an impressive 6th overall with a great effort of 4'6". In the 400-meter dash, Sara and junior Morgan Kincer easily won their heats and qualified for the regional championships on

The last event for the girls was the 1600-meter relay preliminary race. No other sprint relays were contested due to the number of teams competing. In the 1600 relay, the team of Jessi Asher, Jessica Albright, Morgan Kincer, and Sara Hammond dominated their heat and easily qualified for the finals.

After the day's competition

ended, RCHS found itself down 27 points to West Jessamine, a team very strong in field event competition, and 15 to host Madison Southern.

As Saturday's competition began, RCHS had a goal of catching West Jessamine's point total within the first five events. Having experience and a talented group of athletes, RCHS had no trouble achieving what they had set out to do.

Sarah McKinney got the onslaught underway with a totally dominating performance in the 100-meter hurdle finals. Sarah ran an extremely fast 16.47 to easily win the regional title in the event and qualify for the state championships. This also shattered her own RCHS record in the event set earlier this season. Jessica Albright also ran a tremendous race and finished in eighth place overall with an exceptional effort of 18.96 sec-

Next came the 100-meter dash finals. Morgan Thacker ran a very strong race and finished as regional runner-up in the event with an awesome time of 12.96 seconds. Teammate Katy Mattingly ran an unbelievable race as well finishing an impressive fourth overall in 13.24 seconds, only five hundredths of a second away from third Both Morgan and Katy qualified for the state championships this

Morgan also competed in the finals of the triple jump competition along with teammate Samantha Smith. Both girls had several outstanding jumps and had no trouble qualifying for the finals in the event. Morgan leaped an amazing 33'11" to easily capture her second regional title of the meet. Samantha, who recently won the middle school state championship in triple jump, equaled that career best performance, leaping an incredible 31'8" and placing fourth overall. Both Morgan and Samantha qualified for the state championships in the event.

Next came the 800-meter relay finals. The team of Samantha Smith, Morgan (Cont. to A9)





Phase I Cost-Share begins

State legislatures are making \$160,000 available to invest in local agriculture through the 2006 Phase I Cost-Share programs. Rockcastle Cattlemens Association is partnering with Rockcastle Conservation District to offer four model programs.

The Extension Service will continue to provide assistance through applications, reimbursement requests and record keeping. Applications will be available June 1 - June 30 at the Extension Office on West Main Street.

The Cattle Handling Facility program will be offered to producers wishing to develop a herd health program. Head gates, alley ways and holding pens are essential for safe cattle handling. Cost share is 50/50 for eligible material not to exceed \$1250.

The Genetic Improvement program is to help farmers purchase superior EPD bulls. Bulls must meet state EPD guidelines plus pass a breeding soundness evaluation. Cost share is 50/50, not to exceed \$1250.

The Hay Storage Facility program helps farmers protect large round bales of hay from weather damage. Storing hay indoors saves 25 to 33%. Cost share is 50/50, not to exceed

The Commodity Storage program is to assist livestock producers in purchasing bulk feed. Bins or storage sheds allowing bulk feed purchases can lower winter feeding costs. Cost share is 50/50, not to exceed \$2,500.

because County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis had told Dowell that he didn't foresee any problem with the idea and told him to go ahead with the purchase.

However, a couple of the magistrates did object and, Carloftis got a motion from Magistrate Ralph Allen who prefaced the motion with, "since you've already told him (Dowell) it was okay...?

On Tuesday, the Signal received a Letter to the Editor from Judge Carloftis apologizing for the manner in which the matter was presented to the court and we are printing his letter on the front page.

"I apologize to each of the magistrates, the coroner and Hamm Auto Sales for any embarrassment that might have been brought upon them because of last week's fiscal court action regarding the purchase of a coroner's vehicle by the county. The Signal correctly reported the discussion by and action of the fiscal court regarding the purchase of a van for the transportation of bodies by the coroner's office, and all magistrates voted in favor of the pur-

I, however, owe all parties involved a public apology. While the magistrates did not question the legality of the expenditure (funds are available and the price did not require public bids), I owed them the simple courtesy of putting them on notice that this expenditure would be brought before them.

As I recall, the coroner came to my office only the day before the special called meeting, asking that the county purchase the vehicle. I considered it to be a priority, gave my approval to the coroner and asked that it be placed on the agenda for the magistrates' review. All expenditures of public funds require magistrates' approval. By state law, the county judge/executive cannot make a single purchase (even a postage stamp) without approval of the fiscal court. In short, the magistrates - especially Squire Bill McKinney and Squire Ralph Allen - merely

exercised, not only their responsibility to the people of the county, but also their obligation to the public's budget, to question the purchase.

In short, they acted in exactly the way the state requires of magistrates. While I think, in all honesty, that the magistrates really understood the reasoning and need for the purchase, they felt it unreasonable that I failed to notify them prior to the meeting. I most heartily agree with them and thank them for doing their job."


