## Three plead guilty Friday

Three Mt. Vernon residents pled guilty on Friday in Rockcastle Circuit Court to various drug charges.

Jackie McCormick, 44, also known as, Jackie Rayburn, pled guilty and was sentenced to ten years in the state penitentiary for multiple drug charges, according to Rockcastle Commonwealth's Attorney Eddy Montgomery.

According to a news release from Montgomery's office, McCormick's convictions were the result of investigations by both Operation UNITE and the Rockcastle County Sheriff's office during the summer of last year.

In June, an investigation by the Sheriff's office found McCormick in possession of Oxycontin and Alprazolam, both narcotics. In July and August of

tempt to force Kirby to remove a gate from across the road, which the county says is a county road and Kirby claims is a private driveway belonging to him.

At their regular meeting in August, County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis swore out a warrant for Kirby's arrest for "obstructing a highway or other public passage," a Class B Misdemeanor. County Attorney Billy Reynolds, at that time, made a condition of Mr. Kirby's bond that he remove the gate.

However, it took over two

weeks for the warrant to be served and, when Kirby appeared before Circuit Judge David Tapp, Tapp set Kirby's bond at \$200 and removed the provision of removing the gate as a bond condition.

Reynolds said Monday that Tapp's reasoning for removing the provision was he felt the case should be decided in civil court rather than criminal court.

However, Reynolds said he would be filing a motion for an emergency temporary injunction

## Police arrest two in marijuana case

The Kentucky State Police's Marijuana Eradication Team was in Rockcastle County Tuesday afternoon.

Rockcastle County Attorney William D. Reynolds said Wednesday that state police made two arrests in the county, after spotting marijuana growing on a farm owned by Charles Marlow, Sr., 72, of Tanglewood Drive, just off old Hwy. 461.

Reynolds said police used a helicopter to locate the plants and that Charles Marlow, Sr. was in one of the patches found on the property. Reynolds said that police found 161 plants in

that patch.

Marlow was charged with cultivation of marijuana over five plants. His son, Charles Marlow, Jr., 36, also of Tanglewood Drive, was charged with possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia.

Both men were scheduled to be arraigned in district court on Wednesday. No bond was set for them when they were arrested on Tuesday evening.

## Fiscal Court votes to absorb latest health insurance cost

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met in special session Monday morning and one of the main items of business was the renewal of the health insurance plan for county employees.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis told the court that if the court chose to remain with their current plan with CHA, the additional cost would be about \$30,000 for the same plan, if the county absorbed all of the increase.

However, the Judge presented the Magistrates with several other plans, including two plans with lesser benefits from CHA and two from Anthem Blue Cross-Blue Shield.

After much discussion of the merits of each plan, the court decided to go with a plan from Anthem Blue Cross-Blue Shield which provides better benefits in some areas and will cost an additional \$26.42 per employee. The biggest benefit to employees will be the maximum out-of-pocket expenses for employees which will go from \$3,000 single to \$6,000 family under the old plan to

## Court approves payment for new ambulance

The Rockcastle County Ambulance Service took delivery of a new ambulance Wednesday.

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court met in special session Wednesday morning and, on a motion by Magistrate William Denny, approved \$30,000 interim financing for the vehicle. The total cost of the ambulance, according to Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis, is \$100,000 but the ambulance service has a

\$2,000/\$4,000 family under the new plan. However, the deductible rises under the new plan for families to \$3,000 from \$2,000 under the old plan.

But, according to County Treasurer Joe Clontz, this is not really applicable since none of the county employees are insured under the family plan. 30 are insured under the single plan and seven under the couple plan.

Under the new plan, which will take effect October 1st of this year, the single coverage cost will be \$284.93, as opposed to \$258.51 under the present CHA plan and the couples plan premium will increase to \$598.36 from \$513.00. The county's cost will increase from the present \$182 to about \$209 per month per employee.

On question by Magistrate Ralph Allen to Judge Carloftis as to whether the county could afford to absorb the increase, Carloftis answered in the affirmative and noted that if the county did not pick up the increase in premium, the county might be in danger of losing the plan altogether if four of the 37 employees participating dropped out.

The court also discussed resolutions in support of applications, for funding from coal severance monies, for three projects for Eastern Rockcastle Water Assn. and one for the Kentucky Music. The court approved a resolution for two projects for ERWA, 20,000 gallon storage tanks on Sand Springs Road and a like size tank on Red Hill Road for a total cost of almost \$300,000.

However, court passed on a resolution in support of a telemetry control to gauge water levels in a storage tank on Hwy. 1912 in the amount of \$174,000

until more information can be obtained about the project.

The court also tabled a resolution in support of an application by Kentucky Music Hall of Fame for coal severance monies for almost \$300,000. The KMHF's application consisted of \$90,000 for new display cases; \$80,000 to update the heating and cooling system; \$40,000 for an outdoor classroom; \$35,000 for interactive displays; \$20,000 to update their web site and \$15,000 for a blacktop drive and sidewalk.

The county had already made application for all these projects, along with an application for \$60,000 for Quail Community Park, \$41,785 for a sidewalk in Mt. Vernon on Lovell Lane, \$15,000 for each of the

A Rockcastle County cave preserve will now be owned by a Kentucky non-profit organization composed of members who have managed it for the past 17 years.



eral area caving organizations who first dedicated themselves to maintaining the historic cave



# Rockcastle Memories

Most of the boys I knew in elementary school played marbles on a daily basis. We could hardly wait until recess to rush out to the play-ground and "knuckle-down." Many of us carried our prize marbles in a cigar box which we kept in our possession at all times. We were always ready for a game! A boy in my neighborhood gauged his success as a shooter by the number of marbles in his collection. It was a real rush to win several marbles in a day's playing. After coming home in the evening you would count how many marbles you had gained that day.

The marbles were the brightly-colored cat-eyes, steelies (steel ball bearings), and the clay colored taws. Usually,

a tauw was larger than a regular marble and was used as the "shooter." To begin a game, we drew a circle (about 6 feet in diameter) and placed five of our marbles in the center of the ring. Each player had to ante the same number of marbles before the game started. We stood on one side of the ring and "lagged" our shooters to the other side of the ring to see who would be the closest to the line. That person was first to "knuckle down" - which meant placing a shooter between your thumb and fore finger to begin playing.

We played-for-keeps - meaning that if you hit another's marble and knocked it out of the circle, then you put it in your

I am not necessarily scared of snakes or other crawly critters as long as I glimpse them from at least a short distance.

Just this morning, I slammed on my brakes to let a sleek black racer, at least six feet long, finish crossing old railroad grade as I meandered from Lowell toward downtown Paint Lick. I could easily have run over it with at least two wheels and left it there for buzzard bait but black snakes feed mostly on mice and other vermin and they are actually very pretty.

Why kill something that is essentially harmless and playing a major role in the balance of nature?

On the other hand, I have no respect at all for rattlesnakes and copperheads. I've been bitten by copperheads on three separate occasions and I was not in a snake-handling church for either incident. Nor was I out in the woods deliberately looking to pick a fight with a poi-

sonous snake.

I must admit that I've done that, (gone snake hunting) with the express purpose of capturing them for churches that we can't name in the paper. And perhaps the bites I suffered were pay-back.

Suffice to say that, by far, the most horrible pain I've ever suffered was the result of copperhead bites. I almost died the first time and the latter two were painful beyond description with my limited vocabulary.

People who have been bitten by both rattlers and copperheads insist that a rattlesnake bite is twice as painful as a copperhead's. I'm absolutely sure I could not survive a rattlesnake bite if that is true. I just ain't that tough.

Bottom line: When I see a copperhead or a rattler we are talking dead snake if I can find something to kill it with. They may, in fact, kill vermin but,

## Chewing Tobacco Can Cause Cancer

Tobacco companies are targeting teenage males. Chewing tobacco has become more popular among school aged athletes in recent years. Its use has increased considerably in young males as well as adult men. Professional athletes are often seen with a big chew in their cheek, free samples are giving away, and advertisements promoting its use are seen in sports magazines and in stadiums.

The nicotine in chewing tobacco is absorbed quickly and the amount a person gets is equal to smoking cigarettes. Although this nicotine may have a stimulant effect, it has not been shown to improve the skills of athletes.

Another reason for its popularity is that it has not acquired the stigma of causing cancer that cigarettes have. Yet it is known to be associated with a number of different forms of cancer, including cancer of the mouth, throat, larynx and esophagus. The chances of developing oral cancer are many times higher in men who chew compared to men who don't. There are also reports that it is associated with cancer of the colon and bladder.

The risk of cancer is a big concern with so many people using it at younger ages - half of the users are under 19 - and it is usually harder to kick the habit of chewing than to quit smoking.

Using alcohol along with the tobacco will further increase the chance of developing cancers in the mouth and esophagus. For cancer of the esophagus the combined use of alcohol and tobacco increases the risk many-fold. Chewing tobacco does cause cancer and even great athletes are not immune. Babe Ruth died of oral cancer.



## VIEW FROM THE BENCH

### Bad Housekeeping Not Necessarily a Crime

Amidst much publicity, the Connecticut Supreme Court reversed the conviction of Judith Scruggs earlier this week for putting her 12 year old son at

risk by maintaining a cluttered and dirty home. Daniel Scruggs tragically committed suicide by hanging

himself in his bedroom closet.

While publicly billed as a conviction for conduct which contributed to Daniel's death, the evidence indicated that household conditions were probably unrelated to Daniel's suicide. In fact, the trial court described the situation far differently than most national media accounts.

"The defendant did not physically abuse her child. She was a single parent raising two children and working two jobs, sixty hours a week, to support her family. . . . Many people knew that the defendant's twelve-year old son, Daniel, was in great distress," wrote Judge Stephen Frazzini. Daniel was being constantly bullied at school, occasionally defecated in his pants at school, was frequently absent or tardy, and the state's protective service workers had visited the home shortly before his suicide, yet closed their investigation. According to the judge, "whatever the fault of the school or [the social workers], the state prosecuted and the jury convicted the defendant of risk of injury to Daniel's health because of the living conditions in the home."

Scruggs was prosecuted under a statute which prohibited conduct placing a child in a situation likely to injure a child's





## Stacey Bryan Wilson Kirby



physical or mental health. The trial court found that despite evidence of poor housekeeping, there "was no evidence . . . that anything in the home environment was likely to injure a child's physical health." Nevertheless, the jury convicted Scruggs under the theory that Daniel's home environment was likely to injure his mental health.

In overturning the conviction, the Connecticut Supreme Court determined that the state's "at risk" statute was unconstitutionally vague. A penal statute is unconstitutionally vague when an offense is not defined with sufficient clarity that an ordinary person can understand what type of conduct is prohibited.

In the unanimous decision, Senior Justice William Sullivan described the problem: "We recognize that there may be generally accepted housekeeping norms and that it may be common knowledge that, all things being equal, a clean and orderly

home is preferable to a dirty and cluttered home." Infinite gradations of conduct, however, make it difficult, if not impossible, for ordinary people to discern the line between "potentially harmful but lawful conduct, and unlawful conduct."

Kentucky has several statutes directed at preventing the endangerment of minors. Thus far, none have been declared void, though Kentucky courts have struck down unrelated statutes. Laws which attempt to penalize normally lawful conduct, but are directed at a specific societal issue, may be susceptible to a void-for-vagueness challenge. This is best illustrated by a 1999 U.S. Supreme Court decision in which the nation's high court struck down a Chicago ordinance requiring that persons who sit or stand in the company of a gang member disperse unless their "purpose was apparent." It's fairly easy to understand how such statutes do not fairly appraise ordinary people about what conduct may, or may not be, lawful.

The only certain thing to emerge at the conclusion of this entire ordeal is that undeniable conclusion that the system failed Daniel, and no court can remedy the loss of a little boy who's daily struggles made death an attractive option.

box to keep. It was common to win 30-40 marbles in a single day. I remember having several hundred in my collection at one time.

I often wondered why girls did not participate in our games. I guess it was not "lady-like" to get on your knees and play in the dirt with a group of boys. It seemed that most of the girls were jumping rope or playing with their dolls instead. If they ever played a game while sitting on the ground, it was usually jacks.

My friend Kenneth Hansel was the best shot that I ever knew. He had a knack for shooting marbles that was unmatched in the neighborhood. When he "knuckled-down," many of the boys would pick up their

marbles and wait for another player to come along. The risk of loss was just too great. Kenneth lived across the road from me, and we played together a lot. I learned many secrets from him about the art of marble shooting. For instance, you could wet the shooter before you squeezed it between your thumb and forefinger to make it shoot out quicker. This increased the velocity of the law and gave it more force.

As we got older, our marble games became more sophisticated. We started playing "drop-box." This was a game where a hole was burned into the top of a cigar box (just slightly larger than a marble). Players held a marble at their waist to see if they could hit the hole. If successful, you had to give them five of your marbles. All missed marbles became the property of the cigar box owner. It was nothing to witness several boys standing around in a circle to watch a drop-box game. Some of our friends became experts at dropping.

When boys gathered at one of our houses, we compared the

quantity of our marble collections and traded "taws" for regular marbles. A good taw could be traded for up to 10-12 regular marbles. Some of my friends were so proud of their "shooters" that they would carry them in their pockets to display to fellow marble players.

The following poem reminds me of my "marble-playing" days.



Unfortunately, Aunt Jean's health is deteriorating from a terrible thief of our loved ones, Alzheimer's Disease. It seems to inject itself into the lives of our loved ones, and slowly robs them of their memory, ability to express themselves, the ability to care for themselves, and proves to be almost as devastating for family and friends as it is the "victim."

Although we had a good visit and were sorry to see Edna leave for home, we were glad to get back safely, and fondly remember our visiting. The following day after returning home, I received a letter from my first cousin, Tina, in North Carolina who had never written or called me before. I thought that she had forgotten me all together. I was amazed and astonished, even to have received the letter. What could it possibly contain?

I hurriedly opened the letter to read the contents. The crux of the contents revealed that my Aunt Mae had been diagnosed with advanced Alzheimer's Disease, and would soon be going to a nursing home. She had some things that the family was sure I would want, and was writing to verify the address. I was hurt, but not all together surprised about Aunt Mae's condition. When Stanley and I were in the Carolinas for our anniversary trip in March, we had gone by to see her. I was pretty sure that she had Alzheimer's then. I thought what a coincidence, Stanley and I both are now dealing with aunts who have Alzheimer's.

Although Aunt Jean and Aunt Mae are still with us, it feels as though we've, in a sense, already lost them. I know how painful this must be for other people who have and are

dealing with family and friends with Alzheimer's Disease and coping with this "thief" who is robbing us of our dear loved ones.

given the choice, I've never been attacked by mice nor unable to control them with traps or a box of RD.

I'm sure my stance will get some letters to the editor from the fish and wildlife people, but I don't care. I'm not suggesting that you kill rattlesnakes and copperheads.

I'm just telling you that I do. And if both are exterminated, my frank opinion is that nature will not suffer. Bring on some black racers.

Speaking of which, I've lived on Lowell Branch for ten years now and never seen or heard of a poisonous snake in our little valley. Copper Creek and Harmons's Lick, just two ridges over, seem to covered up with them.

The late Junior Helton used to tell me that the reason we don't have "bad snakes" in our neck of the woods is because the black snakes and the "cow-suckers" (rat snakes) keep them run off.

In the early nineties, the so-called cow-suckers literally ran Loretta and me out of a huge old house where we were living and we killed something like 30 before we surrendered. We captured a couple of young ones, put them in a gallon-size pickled bologna jar, and Loretta (swearing they were copperheads, even though I knew better) took them to herpetologists at Eastern Kentucky University and Berea College.

"Black rat snakes", she was told by both experts. "Perfectly harmless."

"Call Brent Moore, our landlord," Lo advised. "I'm moving out of that house because I know how to fight rats and mice without the use of snakes."

In his editorial he said that "citizens of the town are beginning to inquire why the board of trustees are not making some of the improvements on the streets. They have the money and the people want to see some results."

Jonas McKenzie was using the newspaper to push his Dry Goods Store, which also carried Notions. "We carry a full line of clothing that will suit all sizes and ages. Our goods are right and our prices are right." His phone number was 83.

J.W. Parsons of Mt. Vernon was trying to locate a pale red yearling heifer, which was dehorned and had a little brindle on side. The heifer weighed about 400 pounds when she "strayed" from the farm two months ago. A "Liberal" reward was being offered for her return.



So we will just use the final score of Friday night's game which was 74-6, and that is enough said. It was Bourbon County's 16th straight loss and it was the Rockets 15th win against only one loss in the Renfro Valley Jamboree Bowl -- in 1994 to Southwestern Pulaski County.

The Rockets scored ten times in the first half of Friday night's game to take a 62-6 lead into the locker room at half-time and capped off the scoring with one score in the third quarter and one in the fourth.

"It is hard to compare how much we improved over our performance in the Corbin game because of the difference in the caliber of the two teams, but I could tell that we executed much better in the backfield," head coach Tom Larkey said.

"Our players put much more effort into their downfield blocks and the offensive line sustained their blocks longer, than they did a week ago," he said.

"We still have to improve game by game offensively and we must continue to work on our kicking game," Larkey said.

Friday night, the Rockets broke the school record for pass interceptions in one game with six. Three of those interceptions were returned for touchdowns. Senior Dusty Miller picked off two passes and returned one for a touchdown, as did senior Shawn Childress, who also had two picks, one for a touchdown and sophomore Tanner Perkins had one interception. The previous Rocket interception record was four in the 2000 season.

The Rockcastle County offensive unit racked up 462 yards, 367 of them on the ground and 95 through the air.

Senior quarterback Izak McQueary had 17 yards rushing and 40 yards passing on two completions. McQueary scored one touchdown rushing and threw for another. McQueary was also picked off twice.

Senior Dusty Miller, who got the scoring started for the Rockets with 8:54 to go in the first

quarter with a 46 yard run from scrimmage, had 165 yards on just six carries. He caught one pass for 18 yards, scored two rushing touchdowns and scored on a 16 yard interception return.

Sophomore Cody Mize had 77 yards on six carries and he scored on a 35 yard run in the second quarter.

Childress had one catch, was good for 22 yards, and a touchdown to go along with his interception return of 41 yards for a touchdown in the first period.

Senior Josh Renner had 33 yards on three carries and scored on a two yard run to close out the first half.

Freshman Matthew Bullens had two rushes for 35 yards and a 27 yard touchdown run.

Freshman quarterback Dusty Bishop threw only one pass but it was good for a 55 yard reception and a touchdown by junior Abe Kirby. It was Bishop's first pass in a varsity game.

The only other score for the Rockets was Perkins' 70 yard interception return.

Senior place kicker Brad Durham had six extra point kicks.

Senior Adam Hensley had 19 yards on two carries and freshman Dakota McFerron had ten yards on two carries.

The Rocket defense held Bourbon County to just 108 yards, 51 on the ground and 57 through the air. The majority of Bourbon County's yardage came against the junior varsity and freshman players.


However, Bourbon's only score of the game came in the first quarter, when they returned a kick-off 80 yards for the score. The kick-off return made the score at the time 15-6.



Morgan Thacker led the team with 18 serve attempts and four aces both season highs for her. She also tied with teammate Jessica Witten in kills with each having season highs of nine.


Megan Mezurek had four kills, Meredith Robinson and Kayla Stewart led the team with seven digs apiece while Bethany French had three.

Erica Mckinney had three aces and Loren Reynolds had two.


Jill Owens led the team with 61 sets and 20 set assists.

and its grounds when the Felburn Foundation purchased the property in 1989.

"Our ownership will not only preserve this unique habitat and geological area for generations, but also marks a bright future for what is considered the 'crown jewel' of caves in Rockcastle County," said Andy Niekamp, RKC chairman. "We thank the Felburn Foundation for their many years of preservation efforts and their generous donation."

First discovered in 1798 by John Baker, the cave has a long and colorful history. It was mined for saltpeter, a prime ingredient in gunpowder, during the War of 1812 when as many as 70 men worked inside it. After that need subsided and following the Civil War, it became the site of dances and picnics; and after 1939 was the site of the Renfro Valley Barn Dance's opening night broadcast on CBS radio.

At that time, Renfro Valley Barn Dance founder, John Lair and Rockcastle County health officer, Dr. Walker Owens owned the property.

But, later commercial tour ventures were never successful,

Since the Felburn Foundation's purchase of the cave 17 years ago, the Greater Cincinnati Grotto -- a chapter of the National Speleological Society -- had leased and operated it as a preserve. And through a GSP Committee of Greater Cincinnati Grotto, Dayton Underground Grotto, and Blue Grass Grotto members, many improvements to the quality of the cave and the grounds were achieved.

More recently, expressing a need for continued local stewardship and the long-term advantages a locally-held deed would bring to the preserve, the foundation entered talks with the grottos over the formation of a non-profit conservancy with the specific goal of transferring ownership.

This winter, the RKC achieved that non-profit 501(c)3 status with a goal to permanently protect caves and karst lands throughout the Rockcastle County area through education, land acquisition and resource management.

On Sunday, Aug. 20, the conservancy accepted its first deed, that of Great Saltpetre Cave Preserve from the Felburn Foundation. "The RKC will continue to manage the preserve as it has been," Niekamp said. "No major changes are planned." "The three grottos have done an outstanding job of land stewardship that we are extremely confident that the property is in excellent hands," said Ellie Schiller, Executive Director of the Felburn Foundation.

While the RKC will administer a management plan, the preserve itself will continue to be managed by the Greater Cincinnati Grotto with assistance from the Dayton and Blue Grass grottos.

one from the local hospital contacted the school system.

Hammond said that Brodhead principal Caroline Graves was notified of the student's condition by an aunt around 9 p.m. Thursday night and that she in turn notified him.

Hammond called in some staff members and tried to verify the hospital's findings, but was unable to do so at the time.

"We really needed to know what to do about school. We will not and do not put any child's health at risk," he said.

The superintendent said that he, Graves and members of his staff finally got word that a preliminary test revealed that the child was not suffering from bacterial meningitis, which kept the school system from having to dismiss school.

"The child had no symptoms of meningitis while at school and was not here after he was diagnosed," said Mrs. Graves.

"We locked the doors to his classrooms and transferred students to other areas of the building and completely sanitized the room," she said.

"The health and safety of our students is the number one priority of Brodhead Elementary," Graves added.

Before noon, school officials were notified that all the cultures taken on the child were negative and he was suffering from viral meningitis, which is not contagious. Bacterial meningitis can be very contagious.

Meningitis is inflammation of the membranes that protect the brain and spinal cord. Meningitis is caused by bacteria, viruses or fungi. Rarely, meningitis may be caused by trauma, some medications, cancers or other diseases.

Bacterial meningitis is far less common than viral meningitis, although it tends to be much more dangerous and can be fatal if not treated promptly.

Only one parent removed their child from school after learning of the meningitis case and Graves explained the situation to some other concerned parents.

Attendance at the school was not below average during the scare.

The two were at the airport when the crash happened waiting to board their flight, which did not take off until after 4 p.m. in the afternoon.

"They got to Mexico safely and will be home on Saturday," said Eric's mother, Judy Adams.

49 people died in the crash, including newlyweds from London.

**Sewer tests start Tuesday**

The City of Mt. Vernon will be conducting leak tests in the sanitary sewer system Tuesday and Wednesday, according to Mayor Clarice Kirby.

The tests will be conducted in all areas that have old clay pipes and any other areas that time permits, according to Water and Sewer Superintendent Dennis McClure.

McClure said the process uses smoke to reveal sources of sewer odors in neighborhoods as well as places where storm and other surface waters are entering the sewer system.

A special nontoxic smoke

will be used in the tests, according to McClure. The smoke is manufactured for this purpose and leaves no residue or stains and has no effect on plant or animal life.

McClure said the smoke does have a distinctive, but not unpleasant, odor. The visibility of the smoke and the odor lasts only a few minutes where there is adequate ventilation.

The superintendent said that some smoke may get inside homes which have poor plumbing, meaning that fumes from the sewer may also be getting inside the home, and that is unpleasant, dangerous and could cause health problems.

"While the city will render all possible cooperation, the correction of any defects in the pipes and sewer lines on private property, repairs are the responsibility of the owner and we advise the services of a professional plumber," Kirby said.

five fire department and one rescue squad in the county and \$9,480 to help the City of Mt. Vernon with restrooms at the city park.

However, the Governor's Office of Local Development (GOLD), to which the applications were submitted, originally kicked back all the applications, except those for Quail, the sidewalk, the fire departments and rescue squad and the restrooms, saying that the county didn't have sufficient coal severance monies available to fund the projects. Then, at a later date, GOLD decided that the county actually would have a little over \$500,000 available so the applications could be resubmitted.

Of course, Carloftis cautioned the magistrates once again Monday, there is no guarantee that the county will get any or all of the projects funded since coal severance monies are now put into a pool and dispersed wherever in the state GOLD deems them the most needed.

During the meeting, the judge/executive also informed the court that notification had been received of the governor's recommendation for a \$50,000 matching Land and Water grant for Quail Community Park. The county will match the \$50,000 in-kind with labor, equipment, materials, etc. Final determination of the grant's status will be made September 12th at a committee meeting of GOLD. This is the first part of the funding needed for the planned community center at the park, along with a septic system, ball field lighting and fencing for a girls softball field, bleachers, blacktop for drive and parking area, a new roof for the existing shelter, etc.

last year, informants with UNITE purchased Oxycontin on several occasions and, in August, UNITE officers executed a search warrant on McCormick's residence where they found Oxycontin.

The trial for McCormick's co-defendant in the case, Loretta Whitaker, 48, of Mt. Vernon, is scheduled for November 13th.

Michael Sutton, 27, pled guilty and was sentenced to five years in jail for two counts of trafficking in a controlled substance and one count of tampering with physical evidence.

According to UNITE prosecutor David Dalton, Sutton sold Oxycontin to UNITE agents and tried to destroy marijuana during the execution of a search warrant.

Amanda Collins, 28, also known as, Amanda Helton, pled guilty and was sentenced to three years in jail for second-degree trafficking in Hydrocodone. In January of this year, the 28-year-old sold \$16 worth of narcotics to a UNITE confidential informant.

Collins' co-defendant, David Madden, 50, is set for a pre-trial on September 22nd.

Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley is also involved in the prosecution of the drug cases.

## Brodhead VFD hosts vehicle extrication class

On Thursday, August the 24th the Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department hosted a vehicle extrication class.

The instructor for the class was Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department Assistant Chief and Training Officer John W. Dyehouse. In attendance were firefighters from Brodhead Volunteer Fire Department, Mt. Vernon Volunteer Fire and Rescue, Brindle Ridge Volunteer Fire Department, and students from the

Emergency Medical Technician class held here in Rockcastle.

The purpose of the class was to teach basic auto extrication techniques to first responders. Participants in the class learned how to remove car doors, car roofs, roll the dash off an injured patient, and many other techniques. All of these skills make it easier to access a trapped victim during a car accident. More classes are planned for the fall.

## “Child Find” system is for children that have disabilities whether in school system or not

Children eligible for Special Education include those children with disabilities who have autism, deaf-blindness, developmental delay, emotional-behavior disability, hearing impairment, mental disability, multiple disabilities, orthopedic impairment, other health impairment, specific learning disability, speech or language impairment, traumatic brain injury, or visual impairment and who because of such an impairment need Special Education services.

Children eligible for 504 services include those children who have a current physical or mental impairment that currently substantially limits some major life activity which causes the student's ability to access the school environment or school activities to be substantially limited.

The Rockcastle County School District has an ongoing “Child Find” system, which is designed to locate, identify and evaluate any child residing in a home, facility, or residence within its geographical boundaries, age three (3) to twenty-one (21) years, who may have a disability and be in need of Special Education or 504 services. This includes children who are not in school; those who are in public, private, or home school; those who are highly mobile such as children who are migrant or homeless; and those who are advancing from grade to grade, who may need but are not receiving Special Education or 504 services.

The district's “Child Find” system includes children with disabilities attending private or home schools within the school district boundaries who may need special education services.

The Rockcastle County School District will make sure any child enrolled in its district who qualifies for Special Education or 504 services, regardless of how severe the disability, is provided appropriate Special Education or 504 services at no cost to the parents of the

child.

Parents, relatives, public and private agency employees, and concerned citizens are urged to help the Rockcastle County School District find and child who may have a disability and need Special Education or 504 services. The District needs to know the name and age, or date of birth of the child; the name, address, and phone number(s) of the parents or guardian; the possible disability; and other information to determine if Special Education or 504 services are needed.

Letters and phone calls are some of the ways the Rockcastle County School District collects the information needed. The information the school District collects will be used to contact the parents of the child and find out if the child needs to be evaluated or referred for Special Education or 504 services.

trade-in and cash to make up the difference to the \$30,000.

The court has applied for a loan from the Kentucky Asso. of Counties (KACO) but documents sent to KACO, in support of the loan several weeks ago, were not received and had to be sent out again Tuesday.

The money was taken from the county's Local Government Economic Assistance (LGEA) fund which is money the county receives for being a coal-producing county.

When financing is completed through KACO, the county will get their \$30,000 back and the ambulance service will make monthly payments to retire the debt. They are presently making a payment of over \$600 a month to KACO on another ambulance.

The Rockcastle County Ambulance Service makes approximately 3,400 runs per year in the county, or an average of 9-10 per day.





**Gear Up****Parental involvement helps to strengthen students and schools**

## The Family Room

"How many counselors does it take to change a light bulb?" One, but the bulb has to want to change. This is only one of many light bulb changing jokes. What does this have to do with family life? Humor can make us smarter, help us relax and help us solve difficult problems. Humor affects the way we think.

Dan Ferber, in his article "The Funny Factor" in the September issue of Reader's Digest (pp.98 ff), puts it this way, "... a growing body of research suggests that humor can tune our minds, help us learn, and keep us mentally loose, limber and creative."

Scientists have discovered that the brain has to work through several steps in order for us to "get" the joke. Separate parts of the brain work together, each of them handling separate tasks, for us to make sense of humor. Researchers know this because of experiments in which subjects are told funny stories or watch funny movies while having an MRI scan. MRI's normally diagnose illness, but they can also tell which part of the brain is reacting to the joke.

Here is Ferber's description of what happens when we hear something funny: "... a language center on the left side of your brain makes sense of the words, then sends the message across to the right side of the brain. There, the right frontal cortex delves into regions including those that store emotions and social memories, then shuffles the information until it clicks and you get the joke. Next, a structure deep in the brain pumps out dopamine, a (reward system, chemical that makes you feel good, and a primitive region near the base of your skull that makes you laugh.)

Wow! Who would have thought that laughing at Saturday Night Live could be so complicated. Luckily for us, all this happens in a split second without any conscious thought on our part. "Getting the joke" exercises various parts of our brain and strengthens them for


