Bill Riddle, 74 dies Thursday

Family members, friends, co-workers and former players are mourning the passing this week of a well-known Rockcastle County man.

Longtime basketball coach and educator William D. "Coach" Riddle died Thursday at his Brodhead home, after a long bout with cancer.

Best known, as Billy Riddle, Mr. Riddle, was head basketball coach at Brodhead High School from 1958 to 1972.

When Rockcastle County Schools consolidated in 1972, Mr. Riddle was the first boys' coach, coaching the Rockets until 1980 and he was the first coach of the girls' varsity in 1974.

The last year of Brodhead High School, Mr. Riddle guided his Tigers to the Sweet Sixteen. The first and obviously only time the Tigers ever went to the Sweet 16.

Times "falls" back Sunday

A 20-year-old Irvine woman was killed instantly Wednesday morning in a two vehicle collision on I-75. Kentucky State Trooper Coby Smith said that Kerri Neal apparently lost control of her Chrysler Sebring as she traveled north on the interstate, crossing the median and striking a pickup truck, which was traveling south. The two men in the pickup, who were reportedly from Richmond, were critically injured and both flown to the University of Kentucky Medical Center. One was air-lifted from the scene of the accident and the other was treated at the Rockcastle Hospital before being flown out. Members of the Mt. Vernon Fire and Rescue squad were called to the scene to help remove the victims from the wreckage. Chief Garry Hansel said both men were obviously in very critical condition. The wreck happened around 8 a.m. at the 64 mile marker. Groundbreaking held for new emergency vehicles building

The "gravel pit," located just below the courthouse and a long time meeting place for teenagers to sit and chat in their cars and for the Farmers Market, will soon have a new use -- a building to house the City of Mt. Vernon's fire trucks and emergency vehicles for Hal Holbrook, director of the Emergency Management Agency and of the Chemical Stockpile Emergency Preparedness Program (CSEPP).

Holbrook's programs will provide \$75,000 of the approximate \$150,000 cost of the 60x100 building and the additional funds will come from the City of Mt. Vernon and \$30,000,

from a pending grant from coal severance monies for the Mt. Vernon Fire Department and Mt. Vernon Rescue Squad (\$15,000 each). The Mt. Vernon City Council voted at their regular meeting in October to take their share of the funding from their Urban Development Action Grant (UDAG) account. Mayor Clarice Kirby told the council that this account had adequate funds for the project and the account could be repaid monthly by the city. "This will be better than borrowing our share and having to pay interest," Kirby said.

Kirby said there was some urgency to the matter since

Holbrook wanted to get his vehicles under roof as soon as possible.

The new building will have a 40x60 area, divided into two floors which, when funds become available, will be used as a kitchen area, meeting room, offices and male and female sleeping quarters -- looking ahead to the time when Mt. Vernon will have full-time firemen.

Mayor Kirby also brought the council up to date on the clean-up going on through noon Saturday, October 28th. On Thursday and Friday, October

Low bid just under \$7.5 million

Bids opened on Tuesday for new Area Tech Center

Construction bids on the new Rockcastle Area Technology Center were opened Tuesday at the Rockcastle County Board of Education.

Three bids, from companies who have done work for the local school system before, were received.

D.W. Wilburn, General Contractors of Lexington was the apparent low bidder at \$7,492,000.

McKnight and Associates of London was the second low bidder at \$7,834,000 and Alliance Corporation, a general construction management company, was high bidder at \$7,919,000.

"We are pleased with the low bid and we will, of course, recommend the low bid to the board for approval at the November board meeting," said the school system's finance officer and treasurer Richard Bray.

Bray said the low bid was actually about \$500,000 lower than had been estimated.

D.W. Wilburn built the new Brodhead School and McKnight and Associates is currently building the new gymnasium at Roundstone School which is scheduled for completion by the start of the 2007-08 school year. Wilburn also re-

cently completed a \$1 million renovation project on the heating and cooling system. Alliance Corporation was the construction manager on the new Rockcastle County High School.

Besides the bid being lower than expected, the local board of education is also reaping the benefits of good representation in Frankfort.

Bray praised the efforts of State Representative Danny Ford and State Senator Ed Worley for obtaining funding for the new school.

The entire \$9.5 million, which has been allocated to build and furnish the new

Rockcastle Memories

As I have said before in this column, I have been a basketball fan since I attended the 1952 state tournament when Mt. Vernon played in the Sweet Sixteen. My love for Kentucky basketball grew out of the excitement that I experienced then at Memorial Coliseum on the campus of the University of Kentucky. I was only eight at the time but became a "true-blue" fan partially because of that incident. I dreamed of the time when I could actually attend UK and that dream became a reality in the fall of 1962.

Each year I look forward with great anticipation to the season preview which has been given the name of Midnight Madness. According to the UK web-site, the first Madness at UK began with the 1982 introduction of the Cats, which included such greats as Dirk Minniefield, Dicky Beal, and Roger Harden. However, I remember attending the first practice with my friend Jake on a regular basis in the '70's. It was a tradition for me to be in the crowd to cheer on my Wildcats.

In those beginning days of the celebration, the format was to introduce the players to the crowd and then show their talents with an inter-squad scrimmage. This game was conducted as a regular game with officials and game-like situations. The blue and white teams were motivated to show their talents to the coaching staff and to the fans. Individual

competition among the players was very intense. But the event itself evolved into a sort of love affair between the players and the fans.

Midnight Madness was originally scheduled on the first Friday night that the NCAA allowed practice for the coming season. From 1982 until 2005, it was held at Memorial Coliseum, which seats 11,500 fans. In 2006, the location was changed to Rupp Arena and – to no one's surprise – the fans filled the 23,000 seat facility. Fans either attended Madness or watched on delayed television to familiarize themselves with the new players on the roster for the coming season.

Cawood Ledford was once asked if he attended Midnight Madness and he replied, "I do not intend to sacrifice a good night's sleep to watch confetti fly and party favors pop in Memorial Coliseum." He never attended the event.

When the flamboyant Rick Pitino became the head coach of the Wildcats in 1989, he decided that the Midnight Madness celebration was too tame. He wanted it to be modeled after the NBA. From that point on, the lights, sounds, and player introductions remind me of being in an NBA arena. The extravaganza seems to be amplified each year in an attempt to be more dramatic than the previous year.

For most UK fans, Midnight

Heartburn and Asthma

In recent years, doctors have found an association between the two common symptoms of heartburn and asthma. Many people find that they have more attacks of asthma at night and for some of these people the cause is reflux of acid from the stomach.

The asthma is caused by small droplets of acid getting into the airways where they cause irritation and airway constriction. Other diseases, such as chronic bronchitis, chronic tonsillitis and hoarseness, can also be caused by acid reflux.

Some episodes of asthma from reflux come on very suddenly and wake a person from sleep with a choking spell and difficulty breathing.

This reflux is quite common adults, but it is also a problem for children. In children, apnea (a pause in breathing of 20-30 seconds) may occur when there is reflux of acid from the stomach.

Tests to confirm this as the cause of asthma are unreliable. It is often useful to simply treat for reflux to see if the asthma and other lung symptoms respond.

Reflux of acid from the stomach can be decreased by not eating or drinking for three hours before going to bed and elevating the head of the bed on 4-inch blocks. A person should also avoid overeating, alcohol and tobacco, all of which contribute to reflux.

A number of medicines are useful. Antacids neutralize the acid, and other medicines prevent acid production. It is good news that an illness as serious and common as asthma can be helped with something as easy as treating reflux.

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VIEW FROM THE BENCH

The Only Thing That Amounts to Anything

Gerald O'Hara, the father of fictional character Scarlett O'Hara in Margaret Mitchell's Civil War saga, summed up the value of real property like this:

"Land is the only thing in the world that amounts to anything, for 'tis the only thing in this world that lasts. . . . 'Tis the only thing worth working for, worth fighting for--worth dying for." For a few, the value of land lies not in its ownership or control, but in its use which can be taken without right or permission.

We have a long history of trespass in the Commonwealth. Farmers and landowners must frequently contend with those who disregard property bound-

aries and use others' lands for their own selfish purposes. Trespassers litter, break fences, destroy crops, poach fish and game, and destroy the illusion of "private" property. Only this past weekend, trespassers ruined a deer hunting trip I had scheduled with my daughter on private property which others had no permission to use.

After tearing up the fields by riding all terrain vehicles with what was apparently reckless abandon, one child--maybe eight or nine years of age and un-helmeted--rolled his ATV on its side on a sharp bluff. But for a few bushes which restrained the ATV, this child could have been easily killed or severely injured. Kentucky has the dubious distinction of leading the nation in ATV related deaths according to the Consumer

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


Chris Hurley

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

Dear Editor,

This is in response to an article printed in the Danville Advocate Messenger on September 27, 2006 for which Family Court Judge Debra Lambert refused to be interviewed but did make some remarks in a phone call she made to the reporter, cancelling the scheduled interview.

In the article, Judge Lambert told the reporter that "she considered suing some of her critics for slandering her but decided against it, suggesting that she had nothing to gain from them because they had little net worth. 'You should see the cars some of these people drive.'" This is a disgrace. I wonder what God thinks about this? This is talking about people who felt their rights were violated in Family Court.

Mine and my daughter's rights were violated and my two grandchildren were scarred for life, along with our whole family's. Maybe we don't drive \$30,000 vehicles and live in mansions but we are God's people also. An expensive vehicle, mansions and money won't take you to Heaven.

In our case, a lie was called in to Social Services on my daughter by the female who viciously broke up her marriage. The dad was behind in child support and a warrant had been issued for his arrest. The two thought that if they could call social services with the lie on my daughter, he would not have to pay the child support owed. This lie was planned by them on the week end of September 23-24, 2000 and they told the children what to say at school afterwards. They talked to my grandson first at school and "assisted" him with the lie because he was older and my granddaughter. They later said (in paperwork) that they confirmed it with my granddaughter but she says they did not ask her any-

thing about it. There was never an investigation of my daughter conducted and we were never talked to. How do you think my daughter and I and my son felt that day on Sept. 29, 2000 when they the same as kidnapped our babies? They never got off the bus and we were crazy with worry. We had to wait until Monday morning before we could find out anything.

That week, we went to court and the warrant was served on their father, right in the courthouse. His mom and dad had to go borrow the back child support before he could leave the courthouse. My daughter's lawyer, who is not from Rockcastle and does things fair, was threatened by the judge with jail when he tried to tell her that they had a motive for making up these lies.

The children were allowed to come home on Saturday, Dec. 23, 2000 and stay overnight but had to be taken back to the Scott Building on Sunday evening, December 24, 2000. That next week, we told social services what the children had told us about how their dad and his girlfriend made up the lie with them and told them not to tell their mother and grandmother or they would not get to see their father again and he would have to go to jail.

They told them that their mother was having him put in jail and they thought this lie would keep him from having to pay child support if they got the children away from the mother. When we tried to tell social services what the children had told us, the judge said we helped them make up the story. This was the lie! Every time we had a visit with the children, we both cried when it was time to go. The supervisor at social services told us if we cried again, they would take our visits away. We were treated like criminals over this vicious lie and the children were treated bad at some foster homes. Their father wouldn't take them, a family member did and conditions

were very undesirable, even abusive and unsafe at times.

Can you believe social services believed the lies and took these children from people who loved them and cared for them and put them in homes where they were abused? None of us will ever forget this. This is not all. I could tell you more but it would take months to tell it all. I have it all written down.

In Judge Lambert's article, in the Signal where she is asking to be reelected on Nov. 7th, she says "there is no greater work than helping a child." Ours were helped all right. They, and our whole family, were scarred for life. My definition and her definition of "helping a child" are sure not alike. I pray everyday for God to take care of this. God knows everything and there will be a change someday.

Please vote for Judge Maguire on Nov. 7th. Judge Lambert's only supporter in the article in the Advocate-Messenger was the Lincoln County Circuit Court Clerk who would naturally support her because she is part of the court and cannot go against any judge. She doesn't know both sides of the horror stories in Rockcastle Family Court. There are two sides to every story and we never got a chance to tell ours. My daughter was also refused her court records.



Product Safety Commission.

Aside from the mere act of trespassing, these individuals violated Kentucky law regarding a minor's use of an ATV, thereby endangering a young boy's life, and exposed the landowners to civil liability, all without apparent concern. When it was “suggested” that they not ride ATVs on this property, one bold individual even asked if I meant only on the part that was marked “NO TRESPASSING”. Well, yeah! That's what those signs mean.

A British poet wrote: “What stranger's feet may find the

meadow/And trespass there and go/Nor ask amid the dews of morning/If they are mine or no.” Obviously, some people simply don't care about the concept of private land ownership. Sometimes, a friendly word from a landowner will suffice to deter future transgressions. In those instances, (when read literally) the New Testament teaches that “[i]f thy brother trespass against thee, rebuke him; and if he repented, forgive him.” Sometimes though, private landowners must seek a legal remedy.

In Kentucky, trespass can be both a criminal act which occurs by entering upon someone else's property without permission, or a civil tort which permits a land-

owner to recover monetary damages. The severity of the punishment for criminal trespass depends on the type of property trespassed upon. Entering or remaining unlawfully in a dwelling is punishable by up to twelve months in the county jail. Entering posted and fenced property can be punished by up to ninety days, and even the least serious criminal trespass can result in a fine of \$250.00.

I for one can't imagine a situation where I would knowingly enter upon another's land, turn doughnuts in their fields in my vehicle, and feel free to do whatever else I was inclined to do without permission. But many do. Maybe that's why landowners now feel compelled to post their property, install surveillance cameras, and resort to legal action to ensure that their own rights to property remain undisturbed by the unthinking and the uncaring.

Local students add to Transy's enrollment

Transylvania University's enrollment for the 2006-07 school year remains exceptionally strong with 293 first-year students, 808 returning students and 16 transfer students. The 1,117 students come from across Kentucky, 29 other states and three foreign countries.

Scaring away tooth decay

Halloween can be a fun and exciting time for children, however the main culprit that causes this fun and excitement are the nonstop treats and candy.  •consider giving out sugar free treats or even toothbrushes, toothpaste or floss to other trick-or-treaters
 •after eating candy, parents can give their child a piece of cheese, fruits, vegetables, water or milk to wash away sugar from teeth
 •make sure your child brushes and flosses at least twice a day and before bedtime.

Lastly, and most importantly, be sure and inspect a child's candy for loose or torn wrappers. If you suspect candy has been tampered with, discard immediately.

There is a myriad of candy types in a child's trick or treat bag. There are thousands of different types of candy on the market, which can vary in sugar content, size and substance. "There is no good Halloween candy," explained Maesake. "All candy can contribute to some type of tooth

decay because of the amount of sugar, however, there are some types that are more damaging than others, such as gummy, chewy or extremely hard candy."

It is almost impossible to restrict a child from eating candy during Halloween. Least harmful to the teeth are candies that can be chewed up, swallowed quickly or ones that melt in your mouth, such as chocolates.

Halloween does not have to be a scary time for children's teeth. Following the proper guidelines, while brushing and flossing at least twice a day, is sure to scare away tooth decay.



26th and 27th, the hours will be 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day.

City residents can bring old appliances, garbage, etc. to the “gravel pit” where a city employee is on hand and a Bee garbage dumpster is sitting for the garbage.

The city received a \$15,000 PRIDE grant to fund the clean-up. Mayor Kirby said this week that big loads of tires would not be accepted because of the expense involved for the city in their recycling. However, she pointed out that the state usually has a tire amnesty program each year when the tires can be brought to the state garage free of charge.

Kirby also told the council that the city’s garbage litter situation was improving. “We (volunteers) picked up garbage from the courthouse to McDonald’s and back last Saturday (October 14th) and only got seven bags. Four years ago it was probably 40 bags in the same area,” Kirby said.

The council also approved a Memorandum of Agreement for the relocation of utility lines needed for the hospital expansion. Kirby said she expected that it would be early spring before the project actually got underway.

school, is in the state’s department of education budget, meaning the local school system will not have to service any debt

on the new technology center.

“Once the low bid is approved by the board and sent to the state department for approval, construction will begin,” Bray said.

“I would estimate that site preparation would begin in 30 to 60 days,” he said.

The 50,000 square foot building will be built next to the Rockcastle County High School on the Hwy. 461 by-pass.

The two schools will be connected by a corridor.

Currently approximately 417 students are enrolled in the Area Technology Center, which is located across from the Rockcastle Middle School.

The current facility was built in 1969 and operated as Harry Sparks Vocational Center until 1990 when the name was changed.

Rockcastle County Schools Superintendent Larry Hammond said Wednesday that plans were underway for the old vocational school facility.

“Right now we are looking at three primary options for the building, which include Early Childhood Development, (pre-school), the school system’s alternative school and maintenance.

“The building is large enough to use for more than one purpose. We are in the early stages of planning and no decisions have been made,” Hammond said.

Hammond did say that room for pre-school was probably a top priority because currently the three elementary schools in the county provide space for pre-school, which means kindergarten students only go a half day, because of space limitations.

“We are one of only about 40 school districts of the state’s 176 that do not offer all day kindergarten and it looks as if the state is preparing to require that all districts go to all day programs,” Hammond said.

“The state would pay us for the students to go all day, but we have to have somewhere to put them,” he said.

Currently the Alternative School is in a mobile home behind the Rockcastle Middle

School.

The new center will also be fully equipped with a state of the art machine and tool technology lab, which will enable students to complete their training and enter the work force, competing for jobs with starting pay on the average of \$15 to \$18 per hour.

The machine and tool lab alone will cost approximately \$500,000.

School officials expect the new technology center to be completed by the Spring of 2008.

Rockets are 8-1 after 48-8 win at Perry Central

The Rockcastle County Rockets led 48-0 at half-time on Friday night and went on to win 48-8.

It was the Rockets eighth win of the season against only one loss and came against the now 1-8 Perry Central Commodores in a district game played in Hazard.

Head coach Tom Larkey pulled his varsity players at half-time, turning things over to the junior varsity and then to the freshmen.

"We had told our players all week long in practice that we wanted to get up early and have a big lead by half-time," said head coach Tom Larkey.

"At this time of the year, you've got to think about keeping everybody healthy," Larkey said. "When the play-offs start, we will obviously need everyone," he said.

The Rockets scored three times in the first quarter and four times in the second quarter, starting with a 20 yard run by Dusty Miller.

The second score was a 38 yard pass from Izak McQueary to Shawn Childress and the third and final score of the first quarter was on a blocked punt.

After Tanner Perkins blocked the punt Miller picked it up and scampered 24 yards to pay dirt.

With 10:33 left in the half, the Rockets struck again, this time on a one yard run by McQueary.

Two minutes later, Miller scored again, this time on a 28 yard run and, with five minutes to play in the half, Miller scored his fourth touchdown of the game on a three yard run.

Josh Renner finished the

scoring for the Rockets on a three yard run.

Placekicker Brad Durham had his best game of the season with his foot, making six of seven extra point kick attempts.

"I was pleased with Brad's performance on Friday night. He showed he could get the job done, making his first six extra point kicks," the coach said.

"I am glad the junior varsity and freshman players got to see a lot of action in the second half, but I wasn't that pleased with their performance," Larkey said.

The JV and freshman combined for only 13 yards in the second half and one first down, which was on a penalty.

"The young guys did do a pretty good job of stopping Perry Central, giving up only 58 yards and 53 of those were on the last play of the game," Larkey said.

That last play of the game was also the only score for Central.

The Rockets had a total 314 yards of offense, 216 on the ground and 98 through the air.

McQueary completed three of five passes and rushed the ball twice for three yards.

Miller had 171 yards on 15 carries, Shawn McHone had 22 yards on two carries and 22 yards on one catch.

Childress caught two passes for 76 yards, Renner had 19 yards on six carries and Matthew Bullens had 18 yards on three carries.

Freshman Dalton Dillingham and Jamie Todd both had carries, but for no gain.

The Rocket defense was led by senior Scott Daugherty, who

"This team has accomplished so much this year. No one really gave them a chance of even having a winning season because of all of the players lost from last year's team and DeKauwe's injury," the coach said.


"All of the players knew they had to step up and they did," Lee said.

Seniors Jill Owens and Erica McKinney were named to the 13th region all tournament team Thursday night.





The RCCHS girls' cross-country team improved to 4th place in the latest Class 2A state rankings poll released recently. Sixth grader Michaela Hunter moved from 8th to 5th in the individual Class 2A rankings.

The RCCHS girls' had another impressive team performance at the 30th Annual Lexington Catholic Invitational held at the Kentucky Horse Park. Similar to the Franklin County Invitational, the meet was a preview of the state championships and was highlighted with some great individual performances. The competition featured the best the state has to offer in all three classes with over sixty schools competing and nearly a thousand athletes.

Sixth grader Michaela Hunter ran her best race of the season, defeating both the de-

fending state champions from Class A and AA for the second time this season. She finished an impressive 25th overall out of over three hundred runners with a personal best time of 20:16.33. Amazingly, Michaela was the top Class 2A finisher at the meet. Eighth grader Sara Hammond, running in only her second meet of the season, ran extremely well. She finished an impressive 138th place overall in a season's best time of 22:07.17, despite a nasty fall during the race. Michael Thomason led the RCCHS boys in the varsity race with another terrific performance. Michael finished 24th overall in 25:56.



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Watch out for deer crossing

Fall's shorter days and longer nights mean white-tailed deer will soon be on the move, searching for mates. The peak of the deer breeding season occurs in mid-November, and motorists should pay attention for deer crossing the roadways, especially in rural areas.

"Vehicle collisions with deer in Kentucky are highest in November," said Tina Brunjes,

big game coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Motorists should slow down and be alert when driving, particularly in areas where the woods come close to the road. Deer can quickly dart out from the wooded area and into the road."

The change of the seasons influences not only deer

behavior, but human behavior as well. "The time changes and people are driving home from work closer to dark," Brunjes said. "That is also the time when deer are traditionally active. That is a recipe for increased accidents."

Some people mistakenly blame hunting for November deer movement, but it occurs regardless of hunting. "Hunting is not causing the deer to move around - breeding is," Brunjes said. "Hunting reduces deer densities and areas with lower deer densities have fewer collisions."

Deer caught in the road by an approaching vehicle often will not move out of the way, even after drivers honk their horns. Nothing in their natural world is as bright as the headlights of a vehicle. These bright orbs transfix them. Motorists who encounter deer in the road should slow to a stop and allow the deer to cross to the other side. Motorists should keep their vehicle's headlights on so other motorists can see them. Deer usually travel in groups, so if you see one, you'll likely see more.

If you are traveling at night over the next month or so, be vigilant. Deer can dart out from anywhere and cause serious damage to your vehicle. Be careful on foggy nights.

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

Tips from KSP for staying safe on Halloween

Trick-or-treaters, parents, motorists and homeowners all play important roles in keeping Halloween safe, says Kentucky State Police Commissioner Jack Adams.

"Halloween is a cherished tradition for many, but the excitement of the night can cause children to forget to be careful," said Adams. "The major dangers are not from witches and goblins, but rather from falls and pedestrian/car crashes. These tips from the Kentucky State Police can help keep children safe when they are out trick-or-treating."

FOR MOTORISTS

•Stay alert for increased pedestrian and bicycle traffic on Halloween night.

•Be patient and SLOW DOWN! Give children lots of time to cross the street.

•Excited kids may forget to "stop, look and listen" before crossing the street.

•Drive defensively. Don't assume that a pedestrian will move in a predictable manner. Expect the unexpected.

•Be extra cautious in areas where vehicles are parked along the side of the street. Trick-or-treaters may dart into traffic from between parked cars.

•Watch for children walking in the street, especially if there are no sidewalks in the neighborhood. Also watch for children walking on medians and curbs.

•Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully.

FOR PARENTS & CAREGIVERS

•Trick-or-treaters should carry flashlights or "glow sticks."

•Dress children in costumes that are light-colored and clearly visible to motorists.

•Costumes should be no longer than ankle-length to prevent tripping, entanglement or contact with flame.

•Use face paints or make-up rather than masks that could impair vision.

•Wear light-colored clothing or add reflective tape to costumes and trick-or-treat bags.

•Children should wear comfortable, well-fitting, sturdy shoes.

•Children should wear flame-resistant costumes. Avoid paper costumes.

•Younger children should be accompanied by an adult.

•Older children should stay in a group.

•Avoid capes that could pose strangulation risks by getting caught on structures or yard decorations your child may encounter.

•Make sure props such as swords, scythes, pitchforks, spears, wands or knives are flexible (not rigid) with smooth or rounded tips to prevent eye or other injuries if fallen upon.

•If driving children to trick-or-treat, make sure they exit vehicle on the curb side and not the traffic side.

•Instruct your children not to eat any candy until they bring it home and you examine it thoroughly. Inspect commercially wrapped candy for tampering (unusual appearance, discoloration, tiny pinholes or tears in wrappers). Discard anything suspicious. Throw out homemade treats.

•Do not permit children to bicycle, roller-blade or skateboard while wearing a costume.

•Secure identification (name, address, phone number) on or within a child's costume.

•Teach children their home phone number and how to call 9-1-1 if they become lost or have an emergency. (9-1-1 service can be dialed free from any phone).

FOR TRICK-OR-TREATERS

•Don't assume the right of way when crossing a street. Motorists may have trouble seeing you. Just because one car stops, doesn't mean they all will.

•Be very cautious of strangers. A stranger is someone you don't know who behaves in an inappropriate way. Adults asking children for help can be potentially dangerous.

•Trick-or-treaters should only visit houses that have porch lights turned on.

•Never enter a stranger's house or vehicle. (Parents should stress "vehicle" because some children might think it is OK to approach a van or bus.)

•Stay on well-lit streets and

always use the sidewalk. If no sidewalk is available, walk at the farthest edge of the roadway facing traffic.

•Never cut across yards or use alleys. By crossing a lawn, you might be tripped by clotheslines or lawn furniture.

•Don't run! Always walk when crossing streets or going from house to house.

•Cross streets only at corners and crosswalks. Never cross the street from between parked cars.

•Remove mask or any item restricting eyesight before crossing streets.

•Don't take shortcuts through back alleys or parking lots.

•Cover one side of the street at a time, no crisscrossing.

•Look "left, right, left again" for cars before stepping off the curb to cross a street.

•Don't play near jack-o-lanterns, the candle inside could start a fire.

•Stay with the adult who is leading the group.

•Keep away from open

flames or burning candles.

•Try on your costume before Halloween night to make sure it fits properly.

•Stay away from and don't pet animals you don't know.

•Don't eat any treats until you get home.

•Have an adult check all candy before eating it.

•Stay focused on your surroundings. If you feel threatened, go to the nearest store or restaurant and ask to use the phone.

FOR HOMEOWNERS

•Turn on your porch light. Provide ample outdoor lighting. Check outdoor lights and replace burned-out bulbs.

•Eliminate tripping hazards on your porch, yard and walkway (flowerpots, lawn furniture, lawn decorations, bicycles, children's toys, ladders, garden hoses, dog leashes, support wires, low tree limbs).

•Remove wet leaves from steps and sidewalk.

•Use battery-powered jack-o-lantern candles or light sticks. If candles are used, place pumpkin away from area where children will be walking or standing to prevent accidental fires.

•Keep dried leaves and cornstalks away from flames and heat sources.

•Never drape a fabric ghost or other decoration over a light bulb.

•Make sure that paper or cloth lawn decorations do not blow into a burning candle.

•Do not overload electrical outlets or extension cords with lighting or special effects.

•Avoid lighting sidewalks and driveways with luminaries (small candles inside decorative paper bags). Injuries might result when children are tempted to take a closer look.

•Pets can be frightened by Halloween activities. Restrain them or bring them indoors to protect them from cars or from accidentally hurting trick-or-treaters.


rocks on the river bank, which was a great location to rest and bask in the sun.

Hi Woody readers! No, Chloe and I are not in jail or in trouble. Remember when we were riding in the sidecars of Sam and Betty's motorcycle? We were entering the city limits of Madisonville when the police pulled us over. Although, I'd been a good boy, I was pretty frightened. My only fault that day was eating some morsels of Chloe's food, but even I knew that wouldn't warrant an arrest. The police officer put my mind at ease. He introduced himself as Trooper Deron of a Kentucky State Police. He said he'd seen us riding in the sidecar and wanted to make sure we were safe. He also said that we shouldn't be afraid of police officers. They were here to help, not to frighten.

We told Trooper Deron about our tour. He thought it was cool! He'd grown up in Kentucky and knew a great deal about the state. He wanted to take us farther south on Highway 41. We stopped at Ferrell's Hamburgers for a burger and a milkshake. I ordered my burger with extra pickles. DOGlicious! From there, we drove east on Highway 68 to Fairview. Mom and Dad pointed out a tall statue that looked something like the Washington Monument. Mom said it was the Jefferson Davis Monument. It's 351 feet tall and the largest concrete obelisk in the world and the fourth tallest monument in the United States. (I made a note to self to find out what the top three tallest monuments are.) The monument was completed in 1924 and celebrates the memory of Jefferson Davis who was born in a two-room log house in Fairview on June 3, 1808. He was the only president of the Confederacy. After the South was defeated in 1865, he was captured by Union troops, imprisoned for two years, but was never brought to trial. In 1886, three years before his death, Davis made his last visit to his birthplace.

After visiting the monument, we were sitting inside the police car asking Trooper Deron lots of questions about being with the state police. He said that during his term in 1947-50, Governor Earle Clements created the state police to replace the highway patrol. Trooper Deron repeated that the main goal of any police officer was to make sure everyone was safe.

Trooper Deron was showing us the lights and sirens of the cruiser. It was so exciting. I asked him if we could see his PAWCuffs. He laughed and said they were called handcuffs and he would be more than happy to show them to us. In fact, he said I could try them on. Since he will need my paws, I'll say goodbye for now. See you next time! Remember to follow the rules, thank your local law enforcers when you see them and work and dream like a Big Dog!





EKU's AmeriCorps program earns three year extension

The AmeriCorps program in Eastern Kentucky University's College of Education has earned its fifth three-year federal grant and will implement literacy and drug education programs throughout central and southeastern Kentucky.

Launched in 1994, EKU's SERV Corps program is one of the nation's original programs and has been led from its inception by Director Nancy Thames. EKU was the 11th America's Promise institution of higher education in the U.S. and the first in Kentucky.

Twenty AmeriCorps members serve in elementary schools in 14 school districts throughout central and southeastern Kentucky: Casey County, Clay County, Corbin Independent, Estill County, Garrard County, Harlan Independent, Madison County, McCreary County, Monticello Independent, Pineville Independent, Pulaski County, Rockcastle County, Wayne County and Whitley County.

During the past 12 years, EKU's AmeriCorps members have:

- Created and coordinated hundreds of service learning programs.
- Tutored thousands of at-risk students in reading.
- Recruited thousands of volunteers, serving thousands of hours in service projects.
- Implemented health, nutrition and exercise programs in schools to address childhood obesity.
- Established and coordinated school walking clubs to emphasize the importance of exercise.
- Led school-based food and clothing drives.
- Helped rebuild homes for hurricane victims.
- Implemented the "Go Glasses" program in which students were encouraged to wear their glasses at school.
- Coordinated school literacy and community service programs, such as Make A Difference Day, National Volunteer Week, National Youth Service Day, National Family Volunteer Day, Dr. Seuss's Birthday, Family Literacy Nights and many more.

The program has twice received the Governor's Citation for Outstanding Service and also has earned the Governor's Award for Innovative Service Programs. EKU has hosted the

America's Promise Summit, at which Gen. Colin Powell and Gov. Paul Patton spoke, as well as the Southeastern Kentucky Summit on Service and the Uniting Students to Serve Conference, with Fifth District Congressman Hal Rogers serving as keynote speaker at both conferences.

The partnership with Operation UNITE, a drug education program for the Fifth Congressional District, is a new venture for the program. Members have been trained to teach third- and fourth-graders in all the EKU AmeriCorps schools the "Too Good for Drugs" curriculum. Also, members are establishing and coordinating UNITE clubs in their elementary schools and will involve students in drug education service learning projects.

For their 1,700 hours of service, EKU AmeriCorps Members receive a living stipend of \$10,900, and an education award of \$4,725 that can be applied toward past or future college expenses, free health care, child care benefits if eligible, and forbearance on education loans during their service period, with AmeriCorps paying the interest on the loans that accrue during their AmeriCorps service. The biggest benefit, though, may be the extensive service and professional experience and contacts with schools, agencies and communities that prove helpful in starting a career.

"Almost invariably," said Director Nancy Thames, "our AmeriCorps members go on to good jobs after their AmeriCorps service because of the extensive training, experiences, and networking opportunities the program provides. It definitely opens doors."

Applicants must be at least 18 years old and be a high school or GED graduate with a commitment to serve their communities.

Important Information About Your Drinking Water

Tests showed Coliform Bacteria in Mt. Vernon Water Works

Our water system recently violated a drinking water standard. Although this incident was not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened and what we did to correct this situation.

We routinely monitor for the presence of drinking water contaminants. Standards require that no more than 1 sample per month may show the presence of coliform bacteria. During the month of October, we took 8 samples for coliform bacteria. 2 of our samples showed the presence of coliform bacteria.

What should I do?

You do not need to boil your water or take other corrective actions. However, if you have specific health concerns, consult your doctor.

People with severely compromised immune systems, infants and some elderly may be at increased risk. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. General guidelines on ways to lessen the risk of infection by microbes are available from EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at 1-800-426-4791.

What does this mean?

This is not an emergency. If it had been, you would have been notified immediately. Total coliform bacteria are generally not harmful themselves. *Coliforms are bacteria which are naturally present in the environment and are used as an indicator that other, potentially-harmful bacteria may be present. Coliforms were found in more samples than allowed and this was a warning of potential problems.*

Usually coliforms are a sign that there could be a problem with the treatment or distribution system (pipes). Whenever we detect coliform bacteria in any sample, we do follow-up testing to see if other bacteria of greater concern, such as fecal coliform or *E. coli*, are present. **We did not find any of these bacteria in our subsequent testing, and further testing shows that this problem has been resolved.**

What happened? What was done?

On 10-16-06, four routine samples were taken throughout the system, two out of four samples were positive for Total Coliform and one of the two positive samples were E-Coli positive. Mt. Vernon issued a boil water notice for the safety of our customers. On 10-17-06, we collected from the same sample site with additional samples and on 10-18-06, these samples were negative of Total Coliform and E-Coli.

Heart disease is the leading cause of death in the adult population and therefore it should be no surprise that many of us know someone who has suffered a heart attack or has required a heart bypass surgery.

Following a heart attack or heart surgery the patient is released from the hospital when they become stable, however many people find themselves weak with very little endurance to accomplish tasks that were once routine. These patients may be unable to shop at the grocery store or even walk to their mailbox.

A majority of people do not know how much activity they can safely perform. The Breath of Fresh Air Cardiac Rehabilitation program at Rockcastle Hospital addresses these issues and many more.

The patient who enters the cardiac rehabilitation program at Rockcastle Hospital will discover a caring, friendly and motivating staff dedicated to assisting the patient in achieving their goals. All patients are evaluated by a physical therapist and a highly trained cardiac nurse to determine their baseline cardiac function. An exercise program will be developed specifically for each patient based upon their needs and level of activity. The individualized programs will increase endurance and improve cardiopulmonary func-

tion by performing exercises on cardio equipment such as treadmills, bikes, and cross-trainers. Each session will also include strength training with weights to increase strength in the patient's arms and legs. Throughout the exercise session the physical therapist and cardiac nurse are constantly monitoring heart rhythms, blood pressure, heart rate, blood oxygen levels, and the patient's observable level of exertion in order to safely progress the patient through the program.

All patients will be counseled by a dietician to educate about healthy eating habits and a pharmacist to ensure that patients are taking their medications properly. Each patient will also have one session of stress management counseling.

Patients involved in the program tend to build friendships and encourage each other. The progress that these patients make in regards to their strength, endurance, and confidence by the time they have completed the program is amazing. They once again feel in control of their lives.







Yards to Paradise

Preserving Nature in the Landscape

It may be a tough sell to many builder developers, but there is a growing demand for 'green' construction practices, and for leaving as much of the native flora as possible when building or adding to a home. The indigenous landscape plants have been growing just fine for many centuries, so clearing them to plant a few cloned (and frequently non-native) plants, does not really make good sense. The following paragraphs will shed some light on preserving nature and on the challenges and latest trends in native landscaping.

One of the most famous building projects where nature was not disturbed was the project known as "falling waters" by famous architect Frank Lloyd Wright. But many other homes and cabins have been built with minimal disruption to the existing landscape. Demand for environmentally-friendly construction and landscaping is growing.

Like I have said before, when big chain nurseries and big box stores start carrying things, you can be sure it is because there is demand for the product. Be it plants for ponds, or native grasses and shrubs when the demand is big you find the big guys trying to get part of the "action". Currently, there is demand for classes on becoming Board Certified Sustainable Landscaper. This class is offered various places, and will be part of the LandsConference Expo in Louisville October 6-8.

I have had the pleasure of doing waterfalls, dry streams, etc, for at least one homeowner in Kentucky who has no yard to mow, and always has shade on one of his decks. While not everyone wants a home hidden in the woods, keeping at least a few native trees is very sensible in new construction. And though it may take 5% more money to construct a 'green' home with an undisturbed landscape, it may also save greater amounts on landscaping, and on heating and cooling. (Not to mention irrigation/watering of new plants and of lawns or the chore of mowing!)

Some cities and towns have mandates for new plantings with new construction, and some places such as the Gatlinburg/Townsend, Tennessee area, try to enforce leaving undisturbed as much green space as possible. Though it is agonizing to give up personal liberties to government, such measures are contributing to more beautiful

homes in many towns and developments. Aspen, Colorado is another area where zoning is used to keep native areas from being bulldozed during new construction.

The National Parks Service recently began working with builders near the Great Smokey Mountains National Park to preserve native plants and not introduce potentially 'weedy' plants into landscapes. (I would add, the Paulonia tomentosa 'Empress' trees in that area are invading the national forest areas rather badly.)

Upkeep of a native area in the yard is significantly less than the traditional well manicured yard. For folks who would like to take the native setting and "tame" it, clearing some of the trees, plantings of flowering shrubs and bulbs and dry shade loving perennials and adding some seating areas and perhaps wildlife feeders and waterfeatures are all super ideas to making the wild area part of the outdoor living areas, same as patios and gazebos are outdoor living areas.

Whether you want to sow wildflowers where grass exists now on your subdivision lot (a Milwaukee, WI resident successfully accomplished this without complaints to the zoning folks), or just to establish a small "natural" area just for the looks and for the wildlife it will attract, you will be bucking tradition but get in on a trend and have a more lovely yard to boot.

Of course, there is always the "keeping up with the Joneses", and if the Joneses have acres of green grass to mow, many neighbors will copy that. And it is even harder to get builders who put up "cookie-cutter" new homes within spitting distance of the one next door to leave the cheap (and supposedly more profitable) practices and go for larger lots with more attractive homes and a much more sustainable and "green" natural landscaping.

But when large builders such as BASF get into green construction, and when the American Nursery and Landscape Association endorse and certify such practices, it may be that you will want to consider getting ahead of the curve in the green construction of your next building project. Afterall, it would make little sense to tear up paradise just so you can re-plant "paradise" after the building project is completed.

Ordinance #1020

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax on motor vehicles for city purposes in the corporate limits of Livingston, Kentucky.

Whereas, KRS 83A, 130, 140 and 150 require that the legislative body, by ordinance, provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and;

Whereas, KRS 132.487 and 132.488 requires submission to the Kentucky Revenue Cabinet prior to October 1 of each year the annual tax rate to be levied on motor vehicles and motorboats.

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Livingston, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - Motor Vehicles and Motorboats
 A. An ad valorem tax rate of 25.00 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of motor vehicles and motorboats subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty
 A. All ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall be collected by the Rockcastle County Clerk in accordance with the provisions of KRS 134.800 and other applicable statutes.
 B. Ad valorem taxes on motor vehicles and motorboats shall become due and delinquent as set forth in KRS 134.810 and such taxes not paid when due shall be subject to the penalty and interest as specified therein.

Ordinance #1021

An Ordinance levying the annual ad valorem tax for city purposes in the corporate limits of Livingston, Kentucky

Whereas, Kentucky Revised Statute (KRS) 92.280 requires that the legislative body of each city annually levy an ad valorem tax for city purposes, and,

Whereas, KRS 92.330 requires that all taxes be levied by ordinance, and,

Whereas, KRS 83A.130 requires that the legislative body, by ordinance provide for sufficient revenue to operate city government, and,

Whereas, the city has calculated the tax rate(s) for real and personal property in accordance with KRS chapter 132.

Now Therefore Be It Ordained, by the City of Livingston, Kentucky as follows:

Section One: Tax Levy - Real estate and personal property
 A. An ad valorem tax rate of 25.00 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of real property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.
 B. An ad valorem tax rate of 25.00 cents on each \$100.00 (one hundred dollars) assessed value of personal property subject to taxation under the laws of the State of Kentucky is hereby levied for city purposes.

Section Two: Due Date, Payment, Discount and Penalty
 All said taxes shall be due and payable at the City Offices as set forth on the tax bill. Taxes paid prior to the due date shall receive a 0 percent (0%) discount. Taxes paid up to thirty (30) days after the due date shall be at the face amount. Taxes paid more than thirty (30) days after the due date shall be charged a ten percent (10%) penalty.

Section Three: Effective Date and Use Thereof
 This ordinance applies to the 2006 calendar year tax assessment and all receipts shall be used for city purposes and accounted in the 2007 fiscal year and subsequent fiscal years in reference to delinquent collections.

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
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CASA hires new director


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
