Estes speaks to **Chamber members** about local hospital

Steve Estes, president and CEO of Rockcastle Hospital and Respiratory Care Center, told members of Rockcastle Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday that over \$25 million had been spent by the hospital in the past three years as part of their continuing efforts to provide the best health care possible to their patients.

Estes spoke for about 30 minutes at the Chamber's regular monthly meeting and said the local hospital employs over 600 people with an annual pay-

"The only bad thing about that is that so many of our employees are from other counties, with the majority coming from Pulaski, Laurel and Madison counties," he said.

Estes also said the local hospital was making a concerted effort to help with the education of local people.

The CEO said the hospital was providing scholarships for six nursing students and six respiratory therapists over the next

Mt. Vernon sewer plant nears capacity

City urged to upgrade plant

Rockcastle, led by Corey Craig, chairman of the Rockcastle County Industrial Development

Alumni of Leadership Board, met with the Mt. Vernon City Council Monday night to stress the urgency of the need for a new sewer plant.



Rockcastle County Middle School Principal Jason Coguer used a bullhorn to speak to students and staff from the roof of the middle school on Thursday afternoon. The principal spent 24 hours on the roof, as he promised, after students did well on their yearly CATS test.

The plant, which was last upgraded in 1994, is presently running at 80% capacity and, Craig pointed out, one new employer with 100 jobs would max out the capacity within one year, or less, or even slower growth would max out the capacity of the plant within five years.

The city is getting ready to install sewer lines around Lake Linville and on Rose Hill Road which will put the plant over 80% capacity, especially in the summer, and Mayor Clarice Kirby pointed out that the city is trying to obtain money to install sewer lines in the Burr area which will also add to the plant's usage.

Kirby said that a new plant would cost about \$5.5 million and pointed out that it was "hard to get funding" when the system was actually not at or over capacity. She also told the group that the present plant was already "out-of-date" and said that parts could not be obtained except from other plants that have upgraded to newer systems.

Kirby said the very best scenario would be a large direct appropriation from the state, which would not have to be repaid, along with at least two

Rockcastle Memories

When my sons Andy and Todd were young, we spent lots of quality time with them in the woods. They especially enjoyed going camping or fishing with us. We usually took a separate tent for them to use so that they could have some privacy on our excursions.

After Andy left for college, Todd often brought a friend along to camp with us at various state parks. He was the fisherman of my brood, and we chose campgrounds that allowed him to spend time walking through the woods to a lake or stream. He and his friends fished for hours - whether or not they were having any success. When Todd did catch a fish, he would bring it back to the campsite with his eyes shining with pride.

One Saturday, about a dozen members of my family decided to spend the day exploring Big Fill cave in Rockcastle County. The cave is only about two miles from where I grew up as a boy. We hiked through the caves for several hours and then walked in the woods for the rest of the afternoon. For years after that exciting day, my boys often commented on how much fun it was to be in the woods where Daddy played as a child.

For about 15 years, my wife and I have had our eye on a piece of wooded property which sits next to our home on Furnace Mountain. I have prayed perpetually for all that time that the Lord would eventually yield that land to us. Last week it finally became ours officially.

When we first moved into our house, my son Todd had a fascination with the area and spent lots of time strolling through the trees watching birds and other forms of wildlife. He often took Dusty, our cocker spaniel, on his walks with him day or night. Occasionally, either I or my wife might accompany Todd, especially in the spring or fall when we might gaze at interesting moss forma-

tions or the variety of mushrooms that often grow there.

After Todd died in an automobile accident in 1992, it became important to us to actually own that land that Todd had walked so frequently. It officially belonged to our neighbor, who had kindly agreed to share its use. But once we were without him, we really ached to own the property so that we could always remember how he looked in the woods.

We developed the path that reflected his walks and hung a sign at the entrance of it declaring it as Todd's Walk. It was a small way for us to honor him and to commemorate the good times that we had shared with him in this little slice of natural

The trail follows the edge of the cliff that defines the back of our property. From that path, you can look toward Lexington and Winchester. At night on a clear evening, the lights of those cities can be seen in the distance. Also the lights of Clay City and Stanton are very vis-

We have used this path so often that beautiful green moss covers the ground where we walk. A couple of dead trees are dedicated to the woodpeckers who frequent the site. Todd enjoyed observing the wide variety of birds that live or visit among those trees.

Every time I look into the woods, I can visualize Todd walking through them looking over the mountain toward the Red River valley below. Sometimes after one of his walks, he would bring a leaf, a rock, or some other fascinating memento to show to us. I think he really loved spending time there. Now we will always be able to keep the area just like it was when he was with us.

A spot near the entrance to the walk has been cleared, and we plan to put some benches and a fire ring so we can sit near Todd's woods. If you come to our house on a cool evening, look for us sitting around a small fire thinking about our Todd and how much he loved this wonderful piece of nature.

After the signing of the deed, I breathed a sigh of relief and thanked the good Lord once again for his kindness and faithfulness

I let the big pot of pinto beans simmer along with half a country-cured ham hock for most of the day last Friday. Lots of people use beano or baking soda in their beans to reduce the gastric effects of eating them but I am not such a person.

I believe with all my heart that a good way to measure the quality of pinto beans has to do with the loudness and duration of the sound effects shortly after eating them.

We had them for supper that evening but they were too watery to suit me as soup beans are prone to be on the first cooking. I had made cornbread but someone had talked me into switching from Martha White Buttermilk Cornmeal mix to Three Rivers and that turned out to be a fiasco.

Even with an extra teaspoon full of baking powder, my cornbread had approximately the same consistency as that particle board used for sub-flooring in home construction. However, it would have been easier to drive a nail into the flooring than into my corn pone.

We had to run into Berea on some other errands so I had Loretta stop at the Dinner Bell where I purchased a dozen cornbread muffins. I'm not sure what kind of meal they use but someone who cooks there has the cornbread recipe nailed to perfection. And if you have good cornbread to pour it over, it doesn't matter too much if your bean soup is on the thin side.

Anyway, I left the soup beans sitting on the stove top overnight and brought them back to a boil late Saturday afternoon. This time they were much improved and even as I polished off the last of the Dinner Bell muffins and the last of the last sweet onion, I was already looking forward to Sunday supper.

Normally I would have stuck the pot in the refrigerator over

night, but since the temperature in our storage room has been cooler than the fridge for the last several days, that's where the beans had been for the last 24 hours before I warmed them up again tonight.

We have been buying sweet onions grown in Peru over the last several months and they are better and sweeter than Vidalias. Unfortunately, the grocer, where I went to fetch a sack of Martha White meal was sold out of Peruvians but they had Mexican sweet onions that looked to be the same variety and were even advertised to be "the sweetest onion you will ever taste."

I realize that Mexicans don't use a lot of sugar in their diets, but there is no place on the planet where the term "sweet" could be honestly used to describe these onions. I felt the knife cringe when I sliced one up and I believe that if I looked closely, the saucer where I put the slices is probably wrinkled.

While I am convinced that Three Rivers corn meal would serve a better purpose as a base for ethanol fuel production than for bread making, I am also pretty sure that these Mexican sweet onions could be used as an agricultural alternative to battery acid or in the production of chemical weapons.

Still, any onion is better than no onion at all when it comes time to eat soup beans and corn bread. And tonight my beans had reached a state of absolute perfection with soup as thick as sau-

I will finish them off tomorrow at lunch time and by Tuesday morning, it should again be safe to light a match in the house or in my truck cab without fear of an explosion.

In the meantime, that low rumbling sound you may hear coming from the direction of Paint Lick is not thunder at all.

Every Day is Tax Day: Kentucky's Dope Tax

Ahh . . . the sweet aroma of spring! Freshly cut grass. Blossoming flowers. Charcoal grills wafting sweet smoke in neighbors' yards. And what about those welcome sights--redbuds

and pink dogwoods, kids flying kites, manicured red and green baseball fields, new foals and David Tapp calves dot-

ting shorn fields. Surely there can be no place in heaven as pure and pleasant as a Kentucky spring. Especially after tax day. Every day thereafter is a little brighter; every meal a little more satisfying, every bird's song a little more melodious.

But for some Kentuckians, tax day is every day. That's because a little known provision of our revenue laws require the purchase of tax stamps for illegal drugs. The extra boost that comes from settling our annual accounts with the Internal Revenue Service doesn't count if you neglect to pay your dope

Kentucky's drug tax provides for an anonymous tax payment due immediately 'upon the occurrence of taxable activity" and precludes the use of that information for criminal prosecutions. Taxable activity includes producing, cultivating, manufacturing, transporting, distributing, storing, selling, possessing, or using certain quantities of illegal drugs--

marijuana, cocaine, methamphetamine, or even prescription pills when possessed, transported or distributed contrary to

The tax rates are set forth in our statutes: \$1,000 for each marijuana plant or \$3.50 per gram of processed marijuana, \$200 dollars for each gram of controlled substances such as cocaine, and \$2,000 dollars for each 50 dosage units of controlled substances which are not sold by weight.

The procedure for procuring the tax stamp is theoretically simple. The taxpayer remits the appropriate sum to the Revenue Cabinet who issues a tax stamp. This procedure is confidential. The tax stamp, which is good for one year, must then be affixed to the illegal drugs. I f law enforcement seizes drugs, and no tax stamp is affixed, the offender can be charged with a Class C felony for the tax violation in addition to the substance drug crime. Moreover, the offender must also pay a tax penalty with interest on the seized drugs.

Believe it or not, some Kentuckians actually pay their dope taxes. In 2005, the Revenue Cabinet issued 37 tax stamps. In 2006, the Cabinet issued an astonishing 68 tax stamps, and thus far in 2007, 35 tax stamps.

Thus far, the only significant legal challenge to Kentucky's dope tax scheme failed, thereby making future prosecutions more likely. In 1998, the Kentucky Supreme Court reviewed

Avoid Side Effects of Blood Pressure Medicines

There has been a great increase in the number and types of blood pressure medicines available in recent years. While the great number adds to the confusion of which medicine is best, it also allows your doctor to choose one that will be particularly appropriate for you.

Often a person starts out with the least expensive medicines-



-ones that have been proven to be useful over many decades. These may include water pills or a category called beta blockers, such as atenolol or metoprolol. But coexisting medical conditions may make other choices better.

For example, if a person has a high cholesterol, he would benefit most by choosing a medicine that does not elevate the cholesterol.

Persons with diabetes are likely to benefit most from some of the newer medicines. Older water pills can raise the blood sugar, and beta blockers can hide the symptoms of a low blood sugar. Whenever possible, these drugs should be replaced with a better choice.

Often two problems can be treated with one medicine. For instance, if you have angina, or heart pain, a calcium channel blocker is useful in treating both angina and hypertension.

If a person has some degree of heart failure, a different category called the ACE inhibitors is extremely useful in treating both the hypertension and the heart failure. Water pills may also be very useful in this situation.

A person's sex, age, and race can also make a difference. Certain types of blood pressure medicines tend to work better for certain of these groups. If you have been on blood pressure pills for some time, discuss the newer options with your doctor.





a decision of the Fayette Circuit Court dismissing trafficking charges against Robert Bird and Joseph Nicholson on double jeopardy grounds. Three years earlier, in 1995, Lexington police arrested Bird and Nicholson for trafficking after seizing a quantity of powder cocaine.

Since the cocaine had no tax stamp, police notified the Revenue Cabinet as required by statute. The Revenue Cabinet then assessed Bird and Nicholson taxes of approximately \$6,000 and \$4,000 respectively, which they paid.

Police then obtained an indictment charging both with trafficking. Bird and Nicholson moved to dismissed based on Fifth Amendment double jeopardy grounds and a U.S. Supreme Court decision which had declared a Montana dope tax scheme unconstitutional. Bird and Nicholson were not as

Our Supreme Court found that Kentucky's dope tax was sufficiently distinguishable from the flawed Montana plan because it doesn't constitute a "punishment" but rather a genuine and legitimate tax. Therefore, payment of the required tax on illegal drugs did not bar Bird and Nicholson's prosecution for drug trafficking, much like a late payment of federal income taxes might not preclude a charge of failing to file a tax return.

For the vast majority of all Kentuckians, the passing of the springtime income tax filing deadline brings a welcome respite from nagging fears and uncertainties. But for a few, every day is tax day. Did you remember to pay your dope tax?



It was the first new judgeship to be created in Kentucky since 1980 and was based strictly on need. District Judge William Cain was appointed to the new judgeship.

The board bought 67 acres from Clarance Carter, Sam Ford and Danny Ford for \$600,000, where the high school was built at a cost of \$9.5 million.

McClure bested 170 other competitiors with his four bass weighing eight pounds and seven ounces.

For his efforts McClure collected a first place check for \$2,700 out of a purse of \$9,800.







Reporting losses due to freezing temperatures

Rockcastle County farmers and ranchers have 15 days after the disaster occurrence to file a Notice of Loss under the current Noninsured Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) provisions. Producers who did not purchase NAP coverage should still file a Notice of Loss with the local County Office, announced Warden Alexander, County Executive Director of the USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Rockcastle County.

'We are doing everything we can at FSA to help farmers recover from the losses brought by freezing temperatures," said Mr. Alexander "I'm encouraging all producers to contact their local FSA office as soon as possible so they can report their loss."

NAP was designed to reduce financial losses that occur when natural disasters cause a catastrophic loss of production or prevented planting of an eligible crop by providing coverage equivalent to CAT insurance. Statue limits NAP to each commercial crop of agricultural commodity, except livestock, for which CAT insurance is not available and is produced for food or fiber.

Contact your local FSA Office or Service Center to file a loss due to the freezing temperatures.

Toll-free number for borrowers

Farm Service Agency's Direct Loan borrowers can now check the status of their accounts around the clock using a new toll-free telephone number.

The toll-free number, 1-888-518-4983, is available in both English and Spanish. The system delivers information on active FSA loans 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

During the first call to the new system, borrowers will enter their tax identification number or Social Security Number associated with the loan. They also will need to enter the ZIP Code. Borrowers will create a personal identification number for security. Customers must enter their PIN every time they use the system and may change their PIN at any time.

Is your address correct on FSA records? With Rockcastle County addresses having been updated according to 911; it's possible we do not have your current address on file.

Bank account changes

If your bank account number changes or there is a change in your banks name notify FSA immediately to ensure payments reach your account timely.

This is very important to those receiving FSA payments as payments can be delayed if we are not aware of changes to your account or routing num-

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

Mrs. Tankersly called 911 and Peters notified the Jackson County Sheriff's department that the three men were probably headed in their direction.

Mrs. Tankersly identified the vehicle the men were driving and gave a good description of the three. She later positively identified them, after they were stopped by Jackson County Sheriff Tim Fee.

The three are scheduled to be arraigned May 11th.

Rockcastle Circuit Judge Jeffery T. Burdette set both men's bonds at \$75,000. Neither man has been arrested.

Mark Spoonamore, 37, of Poplar Grove Road, Mt. Vernon was indicted for a February 5th incident in which he is accused of taking property belonging to William Grimes, also of Poplar Grove Road.

According to Trooper Pennington, Spoonamore is accused of breaking into Grimes' home by breaking out a back window.

Pennington said that after Spoonamore broke into the Grimes' residence, he walked through the snow and tried to get a ride from off-duty deputy Sheriff Stanley Payne, who had also responded to the call concerning the break-in.

Pennington said Spoonamore's boots matched the boot prints in the snow and that, at the time of his arrest, Spoonamore was very intoxi-

A former employee of Burr Shell was indicted on a charge of Unlawful Access to a Computer owned by the Kentucky Lottery.

Sherry Lynn Derr, 51, of Davis Street, Mt. Vernon is accused of scanning the bar codes on lottery tickets that had not been purchased at the Shell Mart to see if they were winners, while working there.

Rockcastle Sheriff Mike Peters, who served the arrest warrant, said it was his understanding that officials with the lottery association detected the high number of tickets being scanned at the same time and notified store owners that something was wrong.

"I think they said she got two \$5 tickets from those she is accused of scanning," Peters said.

She has been released on bond and will be arraigned on May 25th.

State Trooper Tommy Cromer said Peevler entered a dwelling, owned by Jerry Owens on Sweetwater Road on February 28th, and took several items of jewelry.

Judge Burdette set his bond at \$50,000 cash or bond. Peevler has not been arrested.

Harvest a multitude of benefits from gardening

There is a reason why many cultures depict paradise as a garden. Both words bring to mind a sense of tranquility, peace and contentment. So those who insist there is no time for gardening in their hectic lives may want to re-evaluate that position.

The benefits reaped from planting a garden can be – providing fresh, wholesome food for your family or serving as a creative outlet. And it doesn't take a lot of space to derive benefits from gardening. A patio with a few pots of flowers or vegetables can be every bit as satisfying as gardening on a vast expanse of land.

Buying your produce from the supermarket can be expensive and, at times, unsatisfying. Picked before they are ripe and shipped over great distances, the taste and price often are not what you hoped they would be. It can be difficult under those circumstances to get the recommended 5-8 daily servings of fruits and vegetables. Buying locally grown produce can certainly help, but a fully ripened tomato eaten right off the vine now there's a flavor that makes the taste buds crave more. Or an eggplant with its glossy amethyst skin beckoning to you from behind lush green leaves - suddenly even noncooks may feel the urge to reach for the cookbook and create something special for din-

Then consider the food safety issue. If you grow your own food, you'll have no fears about contamination. Though regulations are in place to ensure that our food supply is safe, in this day of national food alerts, it is reassuring to know exactly where your food is coming from – namely your own backyard.

And then think about the cost savings. A single tomato plant that may cost you \$1.99 can yield 20-40 tomatoes in a season. A pack of lettuce seeds might cost \$1.50 and yield enough leaves to make salads for a month or more. It would be hard to find prices like that in a grocery.

Since we're on the subject of finances, studies have shown that improving your landscape can improve your property value by nearly 20 percent. A house set within a landscape of trees and shrubs has great curb appeal and often will sell faster than a house surrounded by unadorned lawn. There's also the energy savings derived from mature shade trees whose protective canopies make it easier to heat and cool buildings.

That's the practical benifet of gardening. But there's also a stress-reducing benefit as well. After a stressful day at work, step into the garden. In the lush green of a garden, cooled by a delicate breeze and lightened by birdsong, there is peace. Research has shown that people who have contact with nature bounce back more quickly from day-to-day stress. Simple repetitive acts such as pulling weeds or pruning shrubs can have a meditative quality. Many people find a connection to the spiritual world in a garden, where the cycle of life is played out before their eyes.

A connection to the natural world can be vital in a child's development, as well. Studies have shown that children who have access to green spaces learn self-discipline, impulse control and to delay gratification. A study at the University of Illinois even suggests that a child's connection to nature can lessen the symptoms of attention deficit and hyperactivity disorder.

Gardening is creative. The interaction of colors and textures say a lot about the gardener. Are the hues quiet and restful or exciting and vibrant? Is the garden a formal one, laid out symmetrically along straight lines or is it more casual, crossed by meandering paths that take the wanderer past curved beds crammed with a wild assortment of plants? People who garden "paint" with plants often discover that having that creative outlet rejuvenates the mind, leaving them energized for other activities.

Bored with a winter on the treadmill? Gardening is great exercise and works the entire body. You bend, you stretch, you walk, and you lift. It's good for your heart, your joints and your bones. An hour of moderate work in the garden can burn 300 to 400 calories. And when you're done, you can step back and revel in the sight of a freshly mown lawn or weed-free, neatly edged beds. Though much of gardening teaches us patience, as we wait for plants to mature and beds to fill in, there are instances like those at the end of a day spent working in the yard – when the gratification is immediate and the land shines as a result of your work.

Gardening brings people together. You'll find that neighbors will want to stop and talk when their eyes are caught by the site of a well-tended yard or blooms spilling over a porch railing. And gardeners love to share – whether it's advice, produce, plant cuttings or tales of that "summer three years ago when the drought hit." When neighbors share, pride in their homes and their neighborhood grows, and communities are

strengthened. Whether you have room for only a few container gardens or a large yard with room for a vegetable garden, the simple act of gardening can refresh and renew you and your community. Plant a daylily today and next year, share it with a friend.

When do you rest? It used to be that one day of the week was reserved for rest. The Sabbath was set aside as a time for no work. The only reason for working was if your "ox was in the ditch," meaning that you had an

Families stopped work in the fields for the Sabbath. They attended church in the morning, ate a large lunch (cooked by Mom who had to work on the Sabbath anyway) and rested during the afternoon. They might visit friends or family. The Sabbath provided a break from their regular routine of hard work. Even Mom had a break because the family probably ate leftovers Sunday evening.

emergency.

Some religious groups, Orthodox Jews for example, were very strict about what could and could not be done on the Sabbath. Cooking was not allowed, and Mom could rest, too.

Contrast that with the current situation. You or your spouse may be required to work on the Sabbath. Retail, food service, emergency services, law enforcement and health care are only a few of the occupations that require work on the traditional day of rest. On the Sabbath you may attend worship, then eat out (served by people who are working), then do some shopping (more people at work) and then go home and watch the evening news (broadcast by people who are working). The old "blue laws" that controlled what could be done on the day of rest have pretty much vanished.

Did you know that Americans are working more hours per week now than twenty years ago? What happened to all that extra time you were supposed to have because of the new labor-saving devices? Instead of having more leisure time, you may be required to work more hours. If you are self-employed and (theoretically) set your own hours, you are one of those most

likely to be working more hours now than in 1980.

Other countries have more liberal vacation policies than the United States. France and Germany both require workers to take four to six weeks off per year. How many jobs do you know of in Kentucky that require six weeks vacation? Even if you have accumulated the vacation time, you may be reluctant to take it. The boss may frown on you for taking it or you may feel guilty if you take all those days and leave your coworkers to do your job.

My father worked seven days a week. If you were a coal miner employed by Peabody Coal Company in those days, you had to work their schedule. They did not shut down those big machines for any reason, and certainly not so the workers could take a break every week. (They did shut down for two weeks every summer.) What has this lack of rest done to us? We have become a nation of overworked people who desperately need a break from our labors.

A couple of years ago I decided that I was one of these tired workers. I was physically, mentally and emotionally exhausted. How did I discover this? I learned it as I have learned many things since becoming a counselor: from one of my clients. As she described her symptoms of overwork and burnout, the light bulb finally came on for me and I realized that she was describing my situ-

I decided to take some time off. After listening to people talk about depression, anxiety, abuse and addiction for eighteen years, it was time for a break. I was most fortunate that I was able to do so.

Do you need a break? It may be for an afternoon or a weekend or a week or a month. If you need it, I encourage you to take

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


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

Math - the course that incites fear in more than half of all students in a typical classroom. Parents also admit to having trouble with numbers which enforces the idea in their children that Math is hard and intimidating. Yet, it's critical for students to master math.

"Most who hate math feel this way because it is hard for them, or so they think, because at some point they gave up on math," says Amy Sadler, Math teacher at Rockcastle County Middle School. "Or at some point someone who was teaching them math, gave up on them."

Studies show that a number of countries put more emphasis on math education than the United States. Students in the U.S. rank 24th in the world in basic math literacy. Other countries, especially in Asia, graduate more students who are prepared for math-oriented careers. Although eighth-grade students in the U.S. rank 15th in an international study of math achievement, by the time they graduate from high school they will be scoring near the bottom of all industrialized nations.

Sadler says, "Whether your job requires you to use math or not, if you want to be able to effectively manage your money you have to understand math. When a skill is not used, it is usually lost." It's important to keep in mind that everyone needs basic math skills in order to balance a checkbook or to get the best deal when buying a car or groceries.

At Rockcastle County Middle School, teachers try to find ways to interest students in math. "At times we use the laptops in the media center to teach students how to manipulate math using technology. Anything that involves technology will usually increase student interest. There are some wonderful video segments related to math on United Streaming that really spark student interest because these videos pull in real world examples of how math is used."

So get yourself a master plan for your landscape by getting pencil and drawing or graph paper--or get the help of a landscape architect or knowledgable landscaper.

Or just something different? Do you want formal or informal? Maybe you just want something low maintenance that you can create and pretty much forget about.

Take the time to think. I suggest you also try the internet for gathering ideas and researching plants and for locating places of business where you might obtain the things you will need to buy or contract for. Don't be hasty, take time to do your "homework".

A simple bubble drawing is quick and easy to do. Perhaps some computer software would help if you want a fancy plan.

Your new projects should fit with your home and existing landscape. (Unless you also want to give your home a "facelift" at the same time.) If vours is a bare empty lot, your possibilities are almost unlimited. Same blank slate exists for you to work with if you completely rip out the landscape that wasn't planned and doesn't work. Let the lines and style of the house influence your landscape plans.

Plan the "hardscape" first. Plan for water drainage, driveways, walks, paths, porch, decks, patio. Gazebo, pool, watergarden.

Then plan beds, retaining walls, major shade trees. Be sure to keep in mind that the things you want to install need to be sized to fit the space not just when installed, but for years to come.

Then plan smaller details. Plan things like screening the AC unit or the neighbors dog lot. Plan a focal point, or a pair of them if you like symetry. Use shapes, colors, lighting to accomplish the job.

Color coordinate house, hardscape, flowers and greenery. Get a book on using a "color wheel" if you need to review of what color goes best with what (of you can just trust your instincts as you probably already know what's pleasing to your own eyes.)

Your plans may be fancy and detailed, or simple. Once you have a set of plans in place, pick out which parts you can afford to do at this time. (All at once would be impressive, but it could cost 10 to 20 percent of what the home cost...most people can't do that at one time...if you can, go for it!)

There's added value with landscaping. Not only do you get to enjoy it, most landscaping done properly will increase the curb appeal and the value of the home by an amount equal to or even exceeding the expen-

So what are you waiting for? Start with your plan and proceed at a pace that's right for

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



Estes also gave an overview of the new 19-bed Ventilator Unit and Outpatient Services Building, which also houses the new eight-bed emergency department. The new building is connected to the hospital and to the Medical Arts building.

The Rockcastle Hospital has 26 beds in the acute care part of the hospital, a total of 79 beds for ventilator patients and a 114 bed nursing facility at Brodhead.

The hospital's ventilator unit, which was one of the first in the nation, has patients from all over the commonwealth and 28 different states.

With the new addition, the hospital now encompasses over 200,000 square feet, not including the Medical Art's building.

Kentucky Governor Ernie Fletcher will be the keynote speaker at the Open House and Ribbon Cutting Ceremony on

grants, of which the city would have to match 20% of the grant, probably with a low interest Kentucky Infrastructure Assn. loan.

"I don't see any problem with repaying the 20% if we can get the grants," Kirby said.

The city is presently beginning the process of applying for funding for a new plant but the first hurdle that must be cleared is whether the state Division of Water will require a complete new facilities plan or will let the city amend the one formulated in 1994.

Kirby said the city's engineers were waiting for the decision in order to know how to proceed with the first step of the process.

Of course, Kirby told the group, the city would like to be able to amend the '94 plan since a complete new plan will cost about \$100,000.

Dennis McClure, City Superintendent, told Craig that the city was hoping to build the new plant on a site across the interstate, possibly near Buckeye Church. "We're looking at a system with lagoons," McClure said, "and need to get at least a 10 acre site." The present sewer plant is located on a one acre site off Newcomb Avenue in Mt. Vernon near the hospital and would be used as a pump station once a new plant is built. McClure also pointed out that, if the process for a new plant were to get underway right now, "it would still be two to three years to completion."

Craig offered the city his group's help in any way with any type of assistance needed to help with the project. "There are a large number of people in the community who are interested and willing to help," Craig told the council.

The council, of course, expressed their appreciation for the help offered and said that contacting Rep. Danny Ford and Sen. Ed Worley and making them aware of the need would be one of the first steps in obtaining funding for the project.

Earlier in the meeting, Craig also asked the council for help with funding a job position for someone who would promote the "recruitment and retention" of jobs for the county. Craig has already asked the Fiscal Court for assistance in funding this position, saying it would take a minimum of \$100,000 a year.

The council had another group of visitors, Boy Scout Troop 256, led by Donna Brewer and Shanna Lawson.

The troop was there as part of their requirement for their "Citizenship in the Community" badge which is a requirement for the scouts to get to Eagle rank, the highest rank in boy scouting.

During discussion with the council, Mrs. Brewer volunteered the boys to help with the city's clean-up now going which will help them obtain another badge.


