# Student has "Hit List" at high school

Rockcastle County School Superintendent Larry Hammond said the school system would pursue criminal proceedings against a Rockcastle County High School student, caught with a "hit list" the last week of April.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds confirmed Wednesday that a hit list was found with 32 names on it and that he would seek criminal prosecution. "School system administrators are meeting with the juvenile case designated worker today, (Wednesday)," Reynolds said.

Hammond said school administrators sent a letter to all parents and guardians at the high school about the situation and that all of the parents whose children's names were on the (Cont. to A13)

# Middle school students held after hearing

After another hearing on Tuesday in Rockcastle Juvenile Court, District Judge Katie Wood once again held three middle school students charged with burglary and arson of the Rockcastle Middle School on April 27th.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said the three juveniles, all males, 12, 13 and 14 years old, will be held until another court appearance.

Mt. Vernon police charged the three with the crimes after surveillance cameras caught them setting the fire around 1:30 in the morning on the 27th.

The fire will cost the local school system's insurance carrier well in excess of \$2 million.

# Court okays \$50,000 payment for Rockcastle Detention Center

In a mainly ho-hum regular monthly Fiscal Court meeting Tuesday, there were two main items on the agenda.

The most important item, financially, for the court was their vote to give the jail fund up to \$50,000 from the general fund to help pay on their note due May 20th.

The note is for renovation of the jail some years ago. "If House Bill 187 had passed we would have enough to pay this," Jailer James Miller said. "In fact, we would have had a positive cash flow," he added.

HB 187 dealt with the state paying more money for state prisoners or, at least, paying sooner. Presently those charged with a felony are kept at county jails across the state at each county's expense until they are formally sentenced -- sometimes for over a year. The bill did not get out of committee during the last legislative ses-

The payment is for over

\$78,000 and the jail showed a positive balance of \$46,878.20 at the end of April. However, from this amount will have to be taken two more payrolls in May and three in June, according to County Treasurer Joe Clontz. Clontz told the court that he was not sure right now how much of the \$50,000 would be needed by the jail. "It will depend on how much we get from the state and if we get the check for June in a timely fashion," Clontz said. Last year, the state held the June check to jails in order to help show a surplus balance in their overall budget at the end of the fiscal year.

County Attorney Billy Reynolds pointed out to the court that they were actually getting by cheap since, for example, in Laurel County 40% of their general fund goes to support their jail.

In other business, County

Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis gave the court a heads up on the matter of the Soil Conservation Service.

Carloftis said the office would be moved to London, about the first of October, unless the court was able to provide office space for the four employees in the county.

Carloftis said he had been told by a board member of the organization that the federal government's philosophy was that, since the office is not selfsupporting with their tax base, "if local people are not willing to pay for their presence then they must not want it (the office here).'

"We need to make an effort to save these four jobs to this county and help our farmers by keeping them from having to drive out of town to use the office's services," Carloftis

# No graduation ceremonies at middle school

Board requests disaster days from state

Because of a fire at the Rockcastle County Middle School on April 30th, there will be no graduation ceremonies at the school this year, according to principal Jason Coguer.

Coguer made the announcement last week, after school officials shut down the middle school building for the remainder of the school because of the damage to the structure.

The principal said Tuesday that even if the building could have been used, caps and gowns to be worn at graduation were smoke damaged by the fire.

"Getting ready for graduation is a several day process and it is unfortunate that it is not possible for us to hold graduation exercises at the school this year," he said.

School superintendent Larry Hammond told the Rockcastle County Board of Education on Tuesday night that school officials certainly felt for the par-

ents who had prepared for graduation by buying a new dress or suit, but the circumstances simply would not allow for graduation.

Hammond also noted that local educators expect all students to attain a higher level of education than just the eighth grade, "but we do regret it for the students and parents," he said.

Coguer also pointed out Tuesday that the Site Based Council at RCMS had already voted not to hold graduation ceremonies at the middle school next year.

Eighth grade students, who are now attending school at RCHS, will receive their diplomas during school.

Coguer also said Tuesday that eighth grade awards for this school year would be presented during a ceremony at 9 a.m. at the high school on Friday, May

Rose Brown, Director of Student Services for the school system, told the Board of Education on Tuesday night that middle school staff had distributed annuals to students on

# Western not testing water inside homes

Water manager Paula DeBorde said this week that Western is not affiliated with any company testing water inside customer's homes.

DeBorde said a Lexington company had been calling Western customers asking them if they could test the quality of water coming into their homes.

"We are required by the Division of Water to test our water at the point of distribution and we do that eleven times a month throughout the system," DeBorde said.

DeBorde said the samples are tested by a lab in Lexington and the results are sent to the division of water.

"If any of the samples are

Rockcastle County Western not good, the Division of Water would immediately require us to issue a boil water advisory, which has been done only a very few times in the past" DeBorde said.

> DeBorde said Western had received about 50 calls from customers wanting to know if they (Western) was requiring the test.

'We don't require the inside test and there is a fee," she said.

DeBorde said she called the lab in Lexington and told them to make sure they did not tell Western customer's they were affiliated with Western or that an inside test of the quality of water was required.

Western is Rockcastle's largest supplier of water in the county with 4,175 customers.

Center where he is being held on a \$250,000 cash bond, after he admitted to having counterfeit money in his possession in Rockcastle County in March. Tuesday's complaint warrant

accuses Miracle of conspiracy to distribute oxycontin and knowingly distributing oxycontin. Tuesday's warrant carried no bond.

Miracle, who is already on federal probation, was arrested in Rockcastle County on March 13th and charged with 56 counts of criminal possession of a forged instrument.

Federal agents picked Miracle up from the Rockcastle Detention on federal probation violations but he was released a few days later under house

arrest by a federal judge. After his release on March

27, charges against Miracle for counterfeiting were reinstated by County Attorney Billy Reynolds.

He has been held in the Rockcastle Detention Center ever since.

Reynolds said he appreciates the cooperation of federal agents in the case, including the Secret Service, and is requesting that they include the counterfeit charges in a federal indictment against Miracle.

# **Expect delays** on interstate

The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet announced Tuesday temporary lane closures on I-75 at Renfro Valley for Thursday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on the northbound and southbound sides of the 4-lane section of I-75 that has two bridges at milepoint 62.008 and 62.646.

The two bridges will have one lane closures at a time while making necessary repairs of milling and repaving to correct rough pavement.

# Kyle Mullins finds father's treasure while picking up trash

Kyle Mullins found a treasure of sorts in April while picking up trash alongside a mile-long stretch of US 25 in Rockcastle County.

The Eastern Kentucky University freshman was participating in Project PRIDE, a roadside cleanup by members of the Fairview Baptist Church in Rockcastle County, when something caught his

"I was looking at the ground to see if I could find any trash when I saw what I thought looked like a rock," the prephysical therapy major said. "I kind of tapped it with one of those things you pick up trash with and it rolled over. I could see inscriptions on it. I picked it up and I saw it was somebody's class ring."

Kyle alerted everyone around him, including his father, Luke Mullins, about the

Mt. Vernon High School Class of 1972 ring — the last year before the school was changed to Rockcastle County High

"When you're cleaning up like that, there is always someone saying, 'Hey, look what I found,' the elder Mullins said. "So, when Kyle said it, I didn't think too much of it. But, when I turned around to look at him holding a ring, I knew it was mine. I knew the location where it was lost, and I knew it was

"I went and took it off of Kyle's finger to look inside for the initials," he said. "My name is Luke Jessie Mullins, and sure enough, LJM was on the inside.'

Luke had not seen the ring since it was accidentally lost out of a car window in 1971.

Except for an insignia on top of the ruby on the ring being lost and a little mud, the ring was in good condition, he said.

"It's just amazing that we were able to find it after all these years and it was in that good of condition," the father said. "There's been snowstorms, ice

storms and tornados even. So many things have happened since I lost that ring, and it was just laying there on the side of the road that entire time.'

"I've been involved with PRIDE now for six or seven years, and I've made that trip every year," he said. "I just can't believe it, especially the fact that my son found it. It was just meant to be. At first, Vaughn Rasor, pas-

tor of Fairview Baptist, thought he was having his leg pulled when the Mullins told him the "I walked up to their group

and said, 'Hey, we found a golf ball and a clock," he said. "Luke said that he could beat that because he found his class ring."
"Everybody was real

shocked," Rasor said. "I kept on thinking they were telling me a story. Then, he pulled out the ring. You would not believe the story unless somebody produced the ring."

Still shocked by his discovery, Kyle said he has told everyone at church and at EKU about his finding.

"They can't believe it either," he said. "A lot of them think I'm just kidding. I still can't get over it. You figure it would be gone because somebody picked it up or someone mowed over it or something."

With his class ring now in his possession after more than 35 years, Luke said he has made sure to keep it in a safe place.

"When I bought that ring, I was 5 feet, 6 inches and weighed 140 pounds," he said. "I've grown quite a bit. So, I can't wear it anymore."

"I might just leave it like it was found," the elder Mullins said about the possibility of replacing the ring with a new one. "It means just as much to me that way.'

A few days ago while drying off from a much-needed hot shower, I found myself feeling quite thankful that I had such a wonderful facility. Memory took me back to the days when I was a very young boy when the only bathroom we had was "the path" to the outhouse, which was located at the far corner of our small farm.

There was always a good reason for hating to use that outhouse – it was hot during the summer and freezing during the winter. Ours was a one-seater. My grandfather (Pop) had it built by the Works Progress Administration (WPA), which had been created to help provide jobs after the Great Depression. I asked him one day what WPA stood for, and he laughingly replied, "We piddle around."

Even though Pop and Mommie Katie made sure that the outhouse was as clean as possible and equipped with an ample supply of toilet paper, it was filled with bugs and wasps in the summer. In the corner there stood a bag of lime with a small cup inside. Pop instructed us to pour a cup full of the powder into the hole occasionally to help control the pungent smell, especially in the summer months. As many people did, Pop kept an old edition of the Sears catalog lying in the corner in case we ran out of toilet

My sister-in-law had a scary incident on one trip to the facility when she took a seat and then immediately spotted a snake lying above the door. The only way to escape was to run under the snake. I think my brother Al came to her rescue and killed the snake. After that, I was never able to visit that privy that I did not recall her experience.

# What is Parkinson's Disease?

Parkinson's is a disease of a very small area of the brain called the substantia nigra. When this area gradually loses its functioning cells, the typical symptoms of Parkinson's develop.

The main problem in Parkinson's is the lack of a chemical called dopamine, which is needed for the brain to function prop-

The two main symptoms of Parkinson's are tremors and muscle rigidity. The tremor is present even at rest, which separates it from the many

types of tremors which disappear at rest. The tremor in the hands is rhythmical and gives the appearance of rolling an object in the fingers as opposed to the shakiness caused by excessive caffeine or

anxiety. Nearly everyone with Parkinson's develops muscle rigidity. The muscles of the arms and legs are not supple and loose--they are tight and

resist movement. This rigidity makes one's movements less fluid and graceful. A person will appear to have trouble getting started walking as well as having trouble stopping. Also, making adjustments to one's actions, such as turning suddenly or grasping an object, are difficult to do. This lack of coordination is likely to

cause falls or other accidents. The muscle rigidity also affects many other muscle groups. The person will appear to lack facial expression, have difficulty in swallowing, may have drooling, and speech is often










Their numbers may have dwindled over the years but there spirit certainly hasn't.

Climax Christian Church has been in existence in Rockcastle County since the 1920s and the building where services are held each Sunday can be dated back to 1861.

Climax Christian Church has literally resurrected itself, because of the members' willingness to serve the Lord.

On September 16 of 1979, the powers that be at the church voted to close it and for 11 years it remained closed, until some current members decided to reopen it.

"We've had our ups and downs over the years, but that hasn't dampened our spirits," said elder Donald Hayes.

"We have a very dedicated group of Christian people in our little rural church who wanted it reopened," he added.

Since the church reopened on Father's Day of 1990, it has been completely remodeled and an addition added new bathrooms and a Sunday School room. Also part of the remodeling project was a new entry hall, new pews, new blacktop and a new heating and cooling system. "We basically redid everything and, thanks to the generous members here, everything is paid for and we have money in the building fund," Hayes

During the remodeling project, old rafters in the building were removed and one of them had a date on it of August, 1861, according to elder Sam Mullins.

No one is sure of what was in the building in 1861 but, in August of 1929, the building was purchased by members of the Christian Church of Climax from the Primitive Baptist Church of Christ for \$60. 'People referred to that church as Hardshell Baptist," Hayes


A 1937 photo of the congregation, taken in front of the church, shows about 75 people, who were attending at the time.







# Signal files

Submitted by Pat Allen from 1942 Signal files

'Sometimes prior to 1790, a man by the name of Bob Langford came from somewhere in Virginia and homesteaded what was to later become the old Duvall Place, just south of Mt. Vernon. He brought with him all his goods and chattels, including some former Negro slaves.

Some years later, a son of the family built what is now known as the McFerron house, the oldest building in Mt. Vernon and its builder was Stephen Langford. His tombstone can be seen in Elmwood Cemetery today.

The Revolutionary War was so fresh in the minds of patriots of the day - folks were liberty conscious when Stephen's first son was born so he named him Liberty. Liberty Langford grew up to become a businessman. He built a tavern over the present location at the Burr tunnel. He supplied food and lodging for passing stock traders and did some trading himself. He owned slaves and was considered a prosperous citizen of his day.

Liberty had a son named James. When James married, he moved across the hill a couple of miles and homesteaded what we know today as the John Grider place on Brush Creek

Road. It was December 27, 1879

and a snowstorm had been raging for several days. James Langford had been unable to do any traveling during that time and Santa Claus had not visited Langford's children on Christmas Day. To make the matter more tragic, this was James Stephen's birthday and James Stephen was his favorite son. James Langford just had to go somewhere and get some Christmas and birthday presents. He saddled his horse, told his family goodbye and rode off thru the deep snow toward a little store which was operated at Pine Hill. Late that night, searching neighbors found Langford's body not far from his home. He lay in the snow beside little luxuries which had cost him his life. He had been shot from ambush.

And, so, with a sorrowful heart, James Stephen, and a slightly older brother, Henry, shouldered the responsibility of caring for the family. Henry was later shot and killed. It was the same man who was said to have bushwhacked his father, according to rumors of that

to his friends as "Uncle Tip" passed away at his home Saturday morning, June 120th, at nine o'clock. His illness had extended over a period of more than five years. However, it had become more critical in the last two months and death was not unexpected. He was one of the older citizens of the county, having been born here December 27, 1865 and was the son of James and Mary Ann Langford.

Stephen Langford became active in Rockcastle politics. He served the county for one term as sheriff, one term as jailer and six years as commissioner. He was fourteen years old when his father was killed and 77 when he died in Mt. Vernon last Saturday.

It would take many columns to record all the facts and stories Tip Langford told me about his own family and about the earlier days of Rockcastle. With him to do the prompt-

ing, I wrote The Sand Hill Battle, which he wanted to see published. Thru my own neglect, it is still in my files.

There is nothing to regret in Uncle Tip's death, except the vacant place which is left in the hearts of his friends and family. He said he was prepared to go,

quoting the saying "As a man thinketh in his heart, so is he."

During the age of this man's youth, only the strong survived. Uncle Tip was a strong man. In his prime he nurtured strong likes and dislikes. Had he been challenged, he stood ready to die for his convictions, political or otherwise. His friends loved him, his enemies hated him, but there were more of the former than the latter.

He was strongly clannish in spirit and during his lifetime, he was head of the clan. He could have been the patriarch of a John Fox, Jr. novel or he could have posed for a Kentucky Colonel portrait. His home was always wide open to his family, to his friends and to any unfortunate.

Nephews, nieces and grandchildren have made his home their own for months and years on end. He kept one impoverished friend for six years, even supplying the man's pocket money. Uncle Tip never knew how to say no. He wouldn't have said it had he known how. He gave away more than the average man makes in a lifetime and never regretted, even though he sometimes went short himself.

During the past five years, this man fought death to a standstill and won simply because the word "surrender" wasn't in his vocabulary. Had he not decided that he was ready and willing to go, he might have won again and again. But this five year fight

softened him. He lost most of the arrogance of his younger manhood. If he had harbored hates and grudges, he forgot

them.



see [his] vehicle racing down narrow, two-lane roads in the dead of night at speeds that are shockingly fast. We see it swerve around more than a dozen other cars, cross the double-yellow line and force cars traveling in both directions to their respective shoulders to avoid being hit. We see it run multiple red lights and travel for considerable periods of time in the occasional center left-turnonly lane, chased by numerous police cars forced to engage in the same hazardous maneuvers just to keep up." In sum, the chase resembled a "Hollywood style car chase of the most frightening sort."

Based largely on its review of the videotape, the Court determined that "it is quite clear that [the police] did not violate

the Fourth Amendment" by terminating the car chase. Noting that it was Harris who intentionally placed himself and the public at risk, the actions of the officers were "reasonable", which is all the Fourth Amendment re-

The Court also noted that voluntarily terminating the chase was not a viable option as many critics suggest that police do in similar situations. Simply turning off the lights and sirens and allowing Harris to speed away would probably not result in Harris suddenly slowing and driving in a more appropriate manner. Instead, most fleeing drivers would use that opportunity to place a greater distance between themselves and the police, and thereby endangering other people while doing so.

Moreover, requiring police to terminate such pursuits would encourage "impunityearned-by-recklessness". "Every fleeing motorist would know that escape is within his grasp, if only he accelerates to 90 miles per hour, crosses the double-yellow line a few times, and runs a few red lights. Thus, Harris's civil suit against the police will be dismissed. This decision is good news for all law enforcement agencies who have faced increasing litigation and expenses from motorists injured while fleeing. While some critics suggest that it will embolden police to pursue vehicles which are only involved in minor offenses and thereby unnecessarily create a substantial danger for other motorists and pedestrians, the decision represents sound public policy.

To call the Yoders friendly is an understatement.

The combination of personality and quality products has led to their reputation spreading until they built up a customer base in several surrounding counties. One lady told me the other day that she had driven over a hundred miles, one way, from Perry County specifically to shop at Yoders.

So imagine our dismay when we heard last week-end that Yoders was selling out and moving to Ohio. I couldn't believe it so we dashed over on Monday afternoon and learned the sad truth first hand.

"Yep. Just east of Chillicothe," said David. "It's been a painful but prayerful decision but that's the direction we've been led. This has been a very prosperous business but it's time to move on. We only have 19 acres here and we have 120 in Ohio. Room to grow and 19 year-old son LaVern wants tostart a cabinet shop."

After Memorial Day weekend, there will be no more Yoder's Greenhouses in Lincoln County. David says they are tearing them down and having them trucked to Ohio and he hopes to be back in business there next spring if not this fall.

But last Monday they were still full of plants. I found my giant oxheart and beefy boy tomatoes, two varieties I can never find elsewhere and Loretta bought two flats of pan-

Even without Liz and Phil, Stanley and I had an eventful Derby weekend. Our oldest, four-footed "son" Tubby, was sick and had to go to the vet. He seemed to have a lot of infection that apparently came from his teeth and gums. We were worrying about him, and got him to the vet where he had to stay all night. He seems to be doing better now, and is back home with us, but he sure gave us a scare and put a damper on most of the weekend.

I spent a lot of time sitting outside Sunday. The day was what you would call, "picture-perfect." The temperature was in the lower seventies, with scarcely any humidity, and with a slight breeze blowing. Everything was simply beautiful with all of the spring flowers and fo-

liage in abundance.

With all of the housework that was waiting on the inside, guilt soon got the better of me, and I went inside to clean. Since we hadn't done any spring housecleaning, it was time to dig a little deeper. Stanley pitched in and helped me. We worked about three hours, and hadn't even gotten out of the first room. Boy, things were really dirty.

As we worked, we had talked about a picnic for supper.

On April 30, 2003, my home was burned and I lost everything I ever owned. I had no insurance no way to replace what I had lost. It has been four years and no response ever from the Kentucky State Police. They know who was responsible for burning my home. They were told about the threats made to me. They were told who did it. There were three involved in the arson -- two males and a female who helped them by being their

The two males have always been involved in drugs and in trouble with the law and still are in trouble with the law but, as of now, they are free from burning my home. Monday during their informational meeting at the high school and gave students time to get their annuals signed and talk to classmates.

Brown told the board it was her understanding that Coguer was considering an eighth grade night for students and an all day field trip for the entire school, sometime next week, was also under consideration.

As for the transfer of students to the other four county schools, "If it (the fire) had to happen it could not have happened in a better place," school superintendent Larry Hammond told board members Tuesday night.

"Everyone, including the students, parents and staff, have been very cooperative," he said.
"Yesterday was as quiet a

"Yesterday was as quiet a day as we've had all school year, even with the middle school students spread out in the county schools.

"The staffs at the four other middle school have done everything they could to make the middle school students and staff feel welcome," Hammond said.

"One school even prepared 'care packages' for the students," Hammond added

Hammond said he had received very few complaints about the situation.

"One bus driver complained about a longer bus route and a couple of our cooks weren't real happy, but their concerns have been addressed," he said.

Hammond said a few parents had complained, some about pre-school being cut short and a couple about graduation, but other than that "nothing major," he added.

"We had a few parents ask if they could come to the high school on Monday when we got all of the middle school students together. But, because of parking problems and a lack of space, we discouraged them," Brown told the board.

"We did not have any parents show up and look over us and I think that speaks very well of them trusting us to have a good plan in place." Brown said

plan in place," Brown said.
"The parents have certainly done their part in this matter and we do appreciate it," Hammond

Middle school students are spread out in the county schools with all the eighth graders using eight classrooms at RCHS.

Eight classrooms are also being used by the sixth and seventh grade middle school students at MVES, six are in use at BES and four at RES.

"What the staffs and students have done at the other schools to make us feel welcome and comfortable in our new surroundings is unbelievable. It has been very uplifting for us all," Coguer said.

"We can't thank them enough," he added.

When the fire broke out, the middle school was in the middle of testing, which will be completed this week and next.

"Our students take the results of these tests seriously and, although they have been put in a difficult situation, I think they have a positive attitude about everything and I think they will do well," Coguer said.

One indication of how well students have already adjusted and how good their attitude is, is the attendance on Monday.

"Our attendance was great. Of the 691 students, we had only five students from the entire middle school population absent," he said.

Coguer spends his days with the eighth grade students at the high school with the two assistant principals and guidance counselor at the elementary schools.

An office for the middle school has been set up at the Rockcastle Area Technology Center across the street from the middle school. Middle school secretary Becky Boreing is working in the makeshift office during school hours and parents can now call the middle school at their phone number (606) 256-5118, if they have any questions.

School officials hoping building will be ready

by opening day
Rockcastle County school
officials are optimistic that
when school is scheduled to
start for next school year on
August 7th, everything will be
ready at the middle school.

"The refurbishing and cleanup is a massive undertaking," Doug Mullins, School Facilities Manager for the Rockcastle School System told the board of education on Tuesday night. "The entire ceiling grid at the middle school, which includes the duct work for the heating and cooling system, will be replaced. The heating and cooling unit, which was above the classrooms where the fire was started, will be replaced and the other 15 units will be completely cleaned with some parts in them being replaced," Mullins said.

The building will also have new lighting, new ceiling tiles and new flashing, Mullins told the board.

All of the carpet and most of the flooring will also be replaced, with some of the carpet being replaced by vinyl flooring. Painting will be done where needed, Mullins added.

'It is certainly not the way we would have wanted it to have happen but the building will be in much better shape than it was before the fire," he said.

Besides all of the work on the structure, all the equipment, including computers and televisions, will have to be checked and then cleaned. "Some equipment will no doubt have to be disposed of," Mullins said.

Mullins also said that once the refurbishing project is completed, a cleaning crew will come back in and completely clean the building.

Superintendent Hammond told the board that Mullins and Finance Officer Richard Bray were helping the insurance carrier come up with prices for the project but that it already looked as if the project would cost well in excess of the \$2 million originally estimated.

The board has complete replacement costs and cleaning costs through their insurance carrier with a \$5,000 deductible.

Also during Tuesday night's meeting, board chairman Terry Burton and the other members of the board, Martin Vanzant, Tina Hasty, Angela Mink and Mike Burdette expressed their appreciation for how well things had worked in a difficult situation.

"We certainly appreciate the way the entire community, the parents and students have pulled together, to make the closing of school a smooth process, when it could have been very difficult for everyone," chairman Burton said.

"We simply want to thank everyone for their help," Bur"It has just been so positive,

you can't brag on everyone enough," Hammond said.

In other business Superintendent Hammond announced his latest round of personnel actions.

They included the hiring of Melissa Neeley as a teacher at Brodhead for the next school.

Krissy Richmond and Donna Wilson were hired as cooks at RCMS and Angy Walker was hired as a cook at RCHS.

Three teachers and an instructional assistant were not rehired for next school year.

They were teachers: Jaime Garner, RCHS, Deana Williams, RCMS, Kimberly Ritchie, RCMS and RCMS instructional assistant Ashlie Holt.

Hammond said the four were not rehired because of a drop in attendance.

RCHS assistant basketball coach Jessie Mahaffey resigned as did head cheerleading coach at RCHS, Susan Norton.

Five teachers and one instructional assistant are retiring.
They are teachers; Pat

They are teachers; Pat Midkiff, RES, Judy Maples, MVES, Janice Vanzant, MVES, Ryan Riddle, RCHS and Keith Taylor, RCHS. RCHS instructional assistant Jenny Taylor will also retire.

The court took the matter under advisement, with Carloftis saying he would look into what office space might be available for rent in the county or buying a building and renovating it for Soil Conservation's use.

The court also gave themselves a pat on the back for the county's financial condition. "We are doing much, much better than in years past," Carloftis commented. The judge pointed out that three years ago at this time, the balance in the general fund was about \$10,000 and the road fund had about \$12,000. This year, the general fund showed a positive balance of \$240,751 at the end of April and the road fund had \$205,138. "We are usually struggling bad at this time of year," Carloftis

In other action, the court:

•Approved two right-of-way

easements, one for the Brier Field Cemetery Road and one for the Baker Cemetery Road;

•Approved the purchase of a Dell computer, backup and printer at a cost of \$2,000 for the court's secretary's office;





# Agricultural News

#### Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act (AFIDA)

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) regulations specify that when a foreign person acquires or transfers an interest in U.S. agricultural land, such transactions shall be disclosed to the Secretary of Agriculture on AFIDA Report form ASCS-153 or FSA-153. The report must be filed with the County Farm Service Agency (FSA) Office within 90 calendar days of the date of the transaction

To assist you in determining whether your land is considered agricultural land, agricultural land is: All crop, ranch, and timberland more than 10 acres in size in the aggregate and forestland. Forestland is land that exceeds 10 acres in size and is at least 10 percent stocked by forest trees of any size, including land that formerly had such tree cover and will be naturally or artificially regenerated.

Ownership of tracts totaling 10 acres or less in the aggregate must produce annual gross receipts in excess \$1,000 for the sale of the farm, ranch, forestry or timber products to be reported.

Failure to return the completed AFIDA Report within 90 calendar days of the date of the transaction could result in a civil penalty of up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the interest held in the agricultural land. The AFIDA Report shall be considered to have been filed in a timely manner if it is received at this office within 90 calendar days of the date of




