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# Eight are indicted

The Rockcastle County Grand Jury named eight people in five indictments handed down on Friday but, for the first time in many months, none of the indictments involved illegal drugs.

John D. McClure, 23, of Haiti Road, Berea and Karey M. Dillon, 21, also of Haiti Road were indicted on 22 counts of possession of a forged instrument, which involved checks that had been stolen from Dillon's great-grandmother.

Kentucky State Police officer Scott Pennington said the stolen checks were used over a six day period in March and,

# Rockcastle **Memories**

I have been a "shutterbug" ever since my mother purchased a Brownie Hawkeye camera for my 8th birthday. I still consider photography as my number one hobby.

I remember taking a photo of Kenny Cornelius during the 1952 Sweet Sixteen basketball tournament at UK's Memorial Coliseum in Lexington. I was seated in the "rafters" and held the camera over my head to get the shot. When I had the film developed at Maggard's Drug Store, to my surprise, Kenny was in focus and his image was centered in the middle of the frame. Of course, the photo was black and white but to me it was a prize-winning photograph.

Because I loved photography, I continued to take photos of my friends throughout my high school days. I also considered it imperative to photograph every car that I have ever owned. I still have multiple photos of my first car, which was a black '58 Chevrolet. As soon as it was washed and polished, I pulled it into the front yard of my grandparent's house and experimented with every angle possible while photographing a car.

While in college, I took a photography class and my interest grew even stronger. An assignment that the professor gave was to go around the campus and take one photograph that we considered to be the best example of skills that he had taught us. This seemed like a fun assignment, so away I went.

I shortly discovered a lovely female student reading a book under a shade tree. I asked if I could take her photo; she agreed. After completing the assignment, we gave the professor our film so he could have it developed. The following week he had the three best photo-



my delight, he showed the class photo first and complimented me on the portrait of his daughter! I had no idea!

Over the years I owned several semi-professional 35 mm cameras and continued to take additional college classes in photography. In the late 60's I opened a photography studio in Mt. Sterling and concentrated on portrait and wedding photography. I used a new Mamiya RB67 for those photographs.



individuals from portraits. My favorite type of photogonce was shooting a baseball



# **Treating Menopause**

Presented by Dr. Karen Saylor

There are many problems for menopausal women. They get hot flashes, emotional changes such as depression, irregular bleeding, thin bones, and troublesome vaginal changes. Treating these symptoms is very important, but difficult because of the risks of using estrogen.

Estrogens help with the hot flashes and other symptoms, but the WHI study showed that there is an increased risk of blood clots traveling to the lungs, heart attacks, and possibly breast cancer.

Estrogens can still be used, but the risks must be carefully discussed with your doctor and appropriate tests done first and then regularly while using estrogens.

There are a few choices besides estrogen. One of the first steps is using soy

protein. Soy contains a type of plant estrogen. Studies have not clearly shown that this type of estrogen is a safe alternative, and it is not as effective in controlling symptoms as estrogen but many women are using it without known problems. The recommended dose is about 2 glasses of soy milk per day.

Other medicines that have been used include low doses of certain antidepressants and a blood pressure medicine called clonidine.

Regular aerobic exercise is extremely important. It will help with hot flashes, it lowers the cholesterol, strengthens the bones, and helps lose weight. In short it has only good effects during menopause.

A calcium supplement is very helpful in keeping the bones from thinning. At least 1000 mg. per day is the recommended dose. This can come from the diet, in the form of calcium tablets, or as calcium-containing antacids.




# **Brodhead Homecoming** is Memorial Day weekend





Students in Mrs. Carla Parsons RCHS Practical Living Classes participated in two Food Safety and Beef Preparation Classes recently. Extension Service staff Brenda Saylor and Tom Mills assisted Mrs. Parsons in 3 hours of hands on classes. Classes started with Ms. Saylor teaching how food borne illness can be prevented by proper food safety techniques. Proper handling, as well as cooking temperatures are key factors in food safety.

Highlighting beef allowed students to see how past concepts on Beef's Nutritional Status has been misleading. Ground Beef actually has less total fat than Ground Turkey.

Beef actually has an advantage to poultry when looking at Zinc, Iron, Riboflavin and B12 Vitamins. Lean red meat can be utilized in many nutritious meals. Selecting appropriate cuts and proper cooking methods allow beef to be a part of healthy eating habits.

Helping young people see that beef is more than hamburgers is a challenge. Hands on preparation allowed groups to cook and sample: Beef Wraps, Corn Beef Rubins, Mexican Salsa, Stir Fry, as well as New Heat and Eat Beef Meals.

# **"Praying for Our** (President) Leaders"

Editors Note; At the request of many of those in attendance at the National Day of Prayer the following sermon, given by Eric Allen that day, is being printed in this week's Signal.

I Timothy 2:1-4

The National Day of Prayer tradition predates the founding of the United States of America when the Continental Congress issued a proclamation setting aside a day of prayer in 1775. In 1952, Congress established an annual day of prayer and, in 1988, that law was amended, designating the National Day of Prayer as the first Thursday in May.

Let us today, young and old join together, as did the First Continental Congress, praying a humble heartfelt prayer for God's guidance and goodness, for our nation and her leaders, for all mankind.

1. Imagine that you hold the most powerful position on earth:

- You are Commander in Chief of the greatest military force in the world.

- You are the head of a government that spends \$3.25 million every minute, \$195 million every hour, \$4.6 billion every day non stop.

- You are the leader of the entire free world.

- You are on the front page of every major newspaper almost every day. Your every sentence can be publicized and will be analyzed for years to come.

- You are one of only 43 people in history to be the President of the United States.

Sounds great doesn't it? 2. But also imagine that you preside over a country where:

Well, George Bush is that man. That may make you happy or sad. I don't know what you think of him personally. You may feel like Rev. Edward Hale, who while he was chaplain of the U.S. Senate, was asked if he prayed for the senators. He said, "No, I look at the senators and pray for the nation."

A personal friend of mine is the director of the secret service for the eastern portion of KY. Paul directed the security for Camp David and the Whitehouse during the Clinton administration. I asked Paul about the difficulty and willingness to protect... lay down your life for a man that you might night agree with politically, morally, or ethically. He told me that the Secret Service are NOT protecting Bill Clinton Or George Bush. They are protecting and willing to lay down their life for the position or for the "office" of the President of the United States.

And in much the same wayit shouldn't matter what you think about the President's party, his policies, his principles, or his person, his position deserves our prayers. Our predicament demands our prayers.

The most important ally this President or any president has, or ought to have, are Christian people. You and I can do something for him that Congress will not do, the Supreme Court dare not do, and the political party cannot do, and that is pray.

In these dark and dangerous

every school room that reads: "Because of the mess that we are in the ban on prayer is permanently lifted."

I want to share with you in the next few minutes why we should pray for our nations leaders - not just the President, but our congressmen, our governor and state representatives, the mayor and county judge - HOW we should pray and what will happen when we do.

We have a Personal Responsibility to Pray - Prayer is not an option, it is an obligation.

1 Timothy 2:1-4: Therefore I exhort first of all that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks be made for all men, 2 for kings and all who are in authority, that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and reverence. 3 For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior, 4 who desires all men to be saved and to come to the knowledge of the truth.

Prayer is NECESSARY

1 "Therefore I exhort first of all that supplications, prayers, intercessions, and giving of thanks be made for all men." (v.1) When Paul says "first of all" he is telling us to put first things first. Our first business is prayer. Prayer is primary, everything else is secondary. Prayer is not the only thing we should do, but it is the main thing.

Prayer Should Be OFTEN not just annually on National Day of Prayer.

We are specifically told to pray "for kings and all who are in authority." (v.2) That is, we are to pray for people in high places, people of position, prominence and power. Now today that means that we should pray for the President, our Senator, our Congressman, the Governor, the Mayor, all of our leaders. They may not always deserve our praise - but they do deserve our prayers.

Under the guise of fairness, a congressman may be pro-choice. Under the cover of education, the Governor may legalize gambling. A politician may be more liberal than a thief with someone else's money AND more cowardly than someone who writes an anonymous letter. But still we are to pray.

You see, NOT every ruler is anointed by God, but every ruler is appointed by God. We see this over and over in Scripture.

"And He changes the times and the seasons: He removes kings and raises up kings" Daniel 2:21That means that every person

in authority has ultimately been placed there by God.

Whether our leaders are right or wrong, we ought to pray for them. In fact, the more wrong they are, the more we ought to pray for them. The church can influence this nation more through prayer and supplication than the Congress does by legislation.

sonal inadequacy for the task and therefore depend upon Almighty God for wisdom, knowledge, understanding, and courage to carry out the task.

2. REJECT - all counsel and advice that violates Biblical principles.

3. RELY - upon prayer and the Word of God as the source of their strength and key to their success.

4. RESTORE - dignity, honor, trustworthiness, and righteousness to the offices of our city, county, state, and nation.

5. REMEMBER - to be a good example in their conduct to the fathers and sons of the land.

6. RECALL - daily that they will be accountable to Almighty God for their attitudes, actions, and motives while serving in these leadership positions.

So WHAT happens then when we pray this way?

Prayer is so powerful that it can influence a nation publicly. Here's what prayer can bring:

When we pray for these men in authority, it is so "that WE may lead a quiet and peaceable life." Andrew Murray once said, "God rules the world by the prayers of his saints."

We all long for "peace and quiet"-inward and outward tranquility. Prayer can put a nation's heart at rest. When our nation truly lives up to its motto, "In God We Trust" Isaiah 26:3 will be true for all: "You will keep him in perfect peace, whose mind is stayed on You".

Our greatest civic duty is not to vote, it is to pray. We have more power to change things in the prayer closet than we will ever have at the ballot box. We can touch the White House, we can influence our Senator, we can exert power over our Congressman if we will just pray.

If you are still not motivated to pray, and to pray specifically for the President and all of our leaders, listen to verse 3: "For this is good and acceptable in the sight of God our Savior."

Now if you truly love the Lord and you are truly a Christian, then the only motive you need to pray is to know that your prayer is good and acceptable before God. Proverbs 15:8 tells us: When we pray it brings delight to the heart of God.

I have heard people say before "Well, the least I can do is pray for you." You are wrong. Friend, the most you can ever do for someone is to pray for them. I tell you, there is power, mountainmoving power, earth-shaking power, heart-changing power, sea-parting power, death-defying power in prayer.

We should be praying everyday - however today is a day of prayer with national emphasis. so would you join with me in praying?

# Davis to attend gifted program in Kansas

Hayley Davis, daughter of Stephen and Paula Davis, will be attending the University of Kansas Summer Studies Program for Gifted 7th Graders from June 10-30.

Davis scored in the top 25% of 75,000 academically talented 7th graders who took either the SAT Achievement Test or ACT Assessment through the Duke University Talent Identification Program (Duke TIP). "Such a score is an indication of an impressive academic talent that has been encouraged and nurtured," said Martha Putallaz, Ph.D., Duke's TIP Executive Director and Professor of Psychology.


This program identifies 7th graders in sixteen states in the southeast, midwest and southwest who have scored at the 95th percentile or above on a grade-level achievement test. These students are then invited to participate in the Duke TIP 7th Grade Talent Search and take either the SAT or the ACT. "The gifted student is arguably America's most precious natural resource," continued Putallaz. "It is essential that we identify such students early so they can be nurtured and developed."

# Tied for first in Class 2A **RCHS girls win AA Derby and RCHS Invitational**

The RCHS girls' track and field team has had several outstanding competitions recently. Currently, they are tied for 1st in the state with seven-time defending state champion Paducah Tilghman. RCHS has many top-ten ranked performers in Class 2A.

RCHS recently competed in the AA Derby, hosted by Boyle County and Casey County. The meet served as a possible preview of the regional championships, since most of Class 2A Region IV was represented. Besides Rockcastle's state ranking, Casey, West Jessamine, and Mercer are all ranked in the top ten in 2A. The RCHS girls' team totally dominated the meet, defeating runner-up West Jessamine 185-112. Several RCHS athletes finished in the top six in their events.

Morgan Thacker led the way for RCHS with an outstanding meet performance. In the 100, Morgan won easily in 13.2 seconds. She also captured 1st in the 200 with an awesome season's best time of 26.4 seconds. Teammate Chelsea Payne, only a 7th grader, ran a personal best 28.1 and finished 6th.

Senior Morgan Kincer dominated the 400-meter dash with an impressive performance. She won easily in 1:02.8. 8th grader Ella McQueary finished 6th overall in 1:06.4.

8th grader Sara Hammond finished 4th in the 800-meter run with a great effort of 2:38.8.

6th grader Michaela Hunter ran an awesome 1600-meter race, winning in 5:44.5. Freshman Deana Gabbard placed 3rd with an exceptional effort of 5:55.1. Michaela also won the 3200-meter run with a season's best time of 12:32.8. Deana placed 3rd in 13:13.8.

Sophomore Sarah Mc-Kinney won by an amazing two seconds in the 100-meter hurdles, winning in an impressive 16.3 seconds, breaking her own RCHS record by a tenth of a second. 8th grader Jessica Albright ran a season's best 18.5 seconds and finished 4th. In the 300-meter hurdles, the duo ran just as well. Sarah placed 1st with an incredible season's best time of 49.6 seconds. Jessica placed 2nd overall with a terrific effort of 52.4 seconds.

The 400-meter relay team of freshman Samantha Smith, Morgan Kincer, Jessica Albright, and junior Katie Burdette ran a great race and finished 1st in 53.8 seconds. The foursome also captured 1st in the 800-meter relay, finishing in 1:53.7.

The 1600-meter relay proved to be very exciting for RCHS since Casey County was ranked just ahead of them in Class 2A. The team of Ella McQueary, Katie Burdette, Sara Hammond, and Morgan Kincer was up to the challenge and won by nearly three seconds, finishing with an impressive time of 4:22.

The 3200-meter relay was equally impressive. The team of Deana Gabbard, Ella McQueary, Michaela Hunter, and Sara Hammond dominated the field winning by five seconds with a great effort of 10:39.6.

Sara Hammond performed very well in high jump, placing 1st overall with an exceptional jump of 4'10". Ella McQueary jumped an awesome new personal best 4'6" and placed 6th overall.

In the long jump competition, Morgan Thacker once again placed 1st with an incredible leap of 16'7". Samantha Smith finished 3rd with



an excellent effort of 14'11.5". Both girls also performed well in triple jump. Morgan once again took home 1st place with a great effort of 33'1.25". Samantha also had a great performance and finished 2nd with an effort of 32'3".

The RCHS boy's team had a great meet and finished 8th overall. Several outstanding performances highlighted the boys' competition with several placing in the top eight.


8th grader Justin Poynter had an awesome performance in the 800meter run. Justin ran a hard-fought race, finishing 4th overall in a great time of 2:15.

Despite the lack of rest and recovery time, RCHS performed brilliantly. The girls' team finished an amazing 2nd place overall, losing only to private school powerhouse St. Henry.

Morgan Thacker received the meet MVP award for her outstanding performance at the meet. She placed 2nd in the 100-meter dash with a season's best 13.11 seconds. In the 200, she won a close race with a time of 27.25 seconds. Her best performance came in the long jump competition. She leaped an unbelievable new personal best 17'7.25" to easily capture 1st. Her jump was the best in all state classes this season and just a half an inch off the RCHS school record. Morgan also placed 1st in triple jump with a great effort of 32'8.25".

Samantha Smith also performed well in the horizontal jumps. In triple jump, Samantha leaped an incredible 32'8.25" and tied for 1st with Morgan. The tie was broken by the second best jump for each athlete, which gave Morgan 1st and Samantha 2nd. In long jump, Samantha finished 4th with a great



leap of 14'0.25".

Morgan Kincer looked strong on the second of the back-to-back days in the 400-meter dash. She finished an impressive 3rd overall with an exceptional time of 1:03.86.

Sara Hammond performed extremely well in the high jump competition. Sara cleared 5'0", equaling her personal best, and finished 4th overall.

In girls' shot put, 8th grader Amber Hines scored with an 8th place finish and an exceptional throw of 24'5".

In the 100-meter hurdles, Sarah McKinney was nearly flawless. She finished an amazing race in 2nd place overall, shattering her own RCHS record for the second meet in a row with an unbelievable time of 16.11 seconds. Sarah also scored in the 300's with a 3rd place finish in 52.14 seconds. Teammate Jessica Albright finished a great race in 7th place overall in 54.35 seconds.

Rockcastle also faired well in all four relay events, finishing 4th in the 400-meter relay, 4th in the 800meter relay. 2nd in the 1600-meter relay, and 6th in the 3200-meter relay.

Although the RCHS boys' team did not score at the meet, several had outstanding performances.

Josh Blair finished 16th overall in the 200-meter dash with an exceptional effort of 25.24 seconds. Josh also ran well in the 400, placing 21st overall with a great effort of 1:00.13. The RCHS girls' won the meet for the fourth straight season, defeating runner-up Casey County by 65.5 points.



Payne struck out five of the 11 batters he faced.


Childress and Perkins each had two doubles in the game and Perkins added a single.

revitalize a building that was once a prominent part of downtown Mt. Vernon. Instead of losing a historic part of downtown, we are gaining an attraction."

The \$125,000 grant comes from the Governor's Office for Local Development and was submitted to Frankfort on April 30th by Tatum.

Built in 1890, the Jones Building is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. It was scheduled to be demolished and turned into a parking lot before the community voiced its support for its renovation.

Once the renovations are complete, it will serve as the Rockcastle County Community/Cultural Arts and Tourism Center. The facility will house a tourist center, office space, a craft shop and will have space available for community events, according to Tatum.

"This very prominent building can be the centerpiece of a revitalization of downtown Mt. Vernon," said Worley "Tourism is an important part of the economic landscape of Rockcastle County. People enjoy spending time in quaint communities that have preserved their heritage," he added.

In addition to Renaissance On Main funding, the Jones Building renovation project will receive local funding and use of resources, including a \$25,000 cash payment from the Rockcastle Fiscal Court.

"Mt. Vernon is to the county, what a front door is to a home," Rockcastle County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis said.

"Any realtor will tell you that if you are trying to make your house look good when you are selling it, to fix a nice front door," he said.

"Mt. Vernon's Main Street is obviously the front door to Rockcastle County and we should do all we can to preserve it," he said. Once completed, the total project cost is estimated at \$500,000.

Tatum said she is in the process of preparing bid specifications for the project, which will be advertised at a later date.

"The Renaissance funding for this project is an important piece of the total package necessary to restore this building to its former prominence," said Representative Ford. "Restoring this landmark can only bention process. The Renaissance On Main program partners with the Kentucky Heritage Council/ Main Street Program, the Kentucky Department of Tourism, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet, the Kentucky League of Cities, the Kentucky Housing Corporation, the Federal Home Loan Bank of Cincinnati and the Governor's Office for Local Development (GOLD). GOLD is the agency responsible for administering the program.

looked over the city's finances which, Griffin said "are easing up a little bit every month."

City Clerk Tammy Martin told the commission that the city's general fund balance, which was 47,327.15, at the end of April, now had about \$14,000 in it. However, the city is waiting for a quote for the city's insurance. The Kentucky League of Cities gave the city a quote for over \$11,000 but Griffin told the commission that he had asked for a quote from the private insurance company which insures the City of Mt. Vernon. and he expected this quote to be considerably lower than the \$11,000.

With all the bills paid for April, the city's waterworks revenue fund showed a balance of \$6,713.33 and the road fund had a balance of \$3,294.14.

"We have had to spend a lot on the sewer plant but it's up to par and in the best shape it's ever been in," Griffin told the commission.

Griffin also told the commission that he intended to ask the military for a piece of equipment, probably a small tank, to set in the the city's park. Griffin said the city of Crab Orchard recently got a helicopter for their park. The city has to get in line with their request and Griffin was not sure how long it would take to get the tank.

### **Guidelines for Elmwood Cemetery**

(REVISED 2004) The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation is a non-profit organization formed several years ago by concerned citizens to provide perpetual care for loved ones who have deceased. The corporation is governed by a board of directors who care for the cemetery through funding received from private individuals and the interest received from the investment of these funds. Officer's and directors receive no salary or compensation for their participation on this board.

The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Corporation Board of Directors attempts to accommodate the wishes of each family which is buried in the Elmwood Cemetery. To do this there MUST be standards by which the grounds can be maintained and kept in a dignified manner. Some of these guidelines were utilized prior to the perpetual care formation, some stipulated in the deed conditions of private developers, and others by motion and vote of the board of directors.

The following are guidelines that the board has operated since the formation of the perpetual care:

- Mowing of the grass, tree trimming, and general maintenance repairs are done by private contractors.
- Mowing of the grass will be done, as needed, due to precipitation and financial funds available.
- Removal of flowers from new grave sites is done when approprite, during the grass mowing season, prior to mowing.
- The cemetery is "cleaned" of fresh and/or artificial arrangements, not attached to a monument, two (2) weeks after Memorial Day.
- Any arrangement off a grave stone due to wind is to be replaced. If the correct stone is unable to be ascertained then the nearest stone to the arrangement is to receive the replacement.
- Only arrangements deemed needing replacement are to be removed and under NO condition are these arrangements to be resold.
- At NO TIME has the cemetery board advocated the removal of an arrangement that is on or attached to any grave stone. Only those arrangements deemed needing replaced or which hinder the normal mowing or trimming are to be removed.
- Barriers, fences, cables, etc. surrounding a grave site are prohibited as these impede the use of lawn mowers necessary for the upkeep of the cemetery. *This regulation is stipulated in the deeds of many of the grave sites in portions of the Elmwood Cemetery.*
- The Elmwood Cemetery Perpetual Care Board will not be responsible for the correct opening and closing of grave sites.
- Graves are seeded at appropriate times throughout the year and graves which have sunk will be filled when necessary.
- The planting of flowers or shrubs around monuments or grave sites is discouraged as these impede the mowing and trimming around the stone markers and may be damaged during regular mowing and trimming.
- The raking of leaves, removal of debris and obstructions which impede the care/maintenance and flow of traffic will be done as necessary.
- The only flag pole permitted within the Elmwood Cemetery grounds will be on a site designated for all veterans.

# William Whitley returns home Bryant to portray William Whitley

After 194 years, William Whitley is coming home.

On May 19-20, Col. William Whitley will be at his home near Crab Orchard, recollecting tales of Indian fights, his building of the first brick house in Kentucky and the building of the first counter-clockwise racetrack in America, and discussing life on the early Kentucky frontier.

A mounted militia group based in Mt. Vernon, KY, "Whitley's Mounted Militia", will be present at the William Whitley House this upcoming weekend as well as several weekends throughout the year in militia "encampments". They will be on hand to demonstrate frontier life and the joys and hardships associated with it.

Local resident Matt Bryant, who portrays Whitley, says that there is still something of the frontier spirit in all Kentuckians – the spirit of forging ahead in the face of impossible odds, thriving amidst the dangers of a hostile society. Bryant emphasized that "The story of William Whitley is really about the story

He knew that to do that meant that he would have to make some sacrifices. He ended up making the ultimate sacrifice, and that continues to speak to the frontiersman in all of us."

Whitley, known for his fierceness in guarding settlers traveling along the then-hazardous Kentucky Road, or "Wilderness" Road as it came to be better known in the modern era, was finally struck down at the age of 64 in 1813 at the Battle of the Thames near Ontario, Canada. Whitley was killed in the charge of the "Forlorn Hope", made up of 20 volunteers, including future Vice-President Richard Johnson, which was basically a suicide mission to draw the fire of Indians who had been waiting in ambush for the whites. Whitley was found less than 20 paces from Tecumseh, the great Indian leader whose life was lost in the same battle, along with his dream of an unprecedented Native American confederacy in the Old Northwest. It has long been speculated that Whitley killed Tecumseh, but this has never been confirmed.

"Only Col. Whitley and his rifle know for sure," stated Bryant. Whitley was buried in Canada by his soldiers with full military honors. His gun, powder horn, and noble steed, Emperor, who lost an eye and a few teeth from gunfire in the "Forlorn Hope" charge, were returned to Sportsman's Hill, Whitley's estate near the Crab Orchard. The old brick house still stands today, a monument to the spirit of one of Kentucky's founding fathers. Famous for its hiding places and secret corridors in the event of Indian attack, the William Whitley House is a State Historic Site and is open year-round 9:30 - 4:00 P.M. 


Dear Class of 2007,
