A Rockcastle County man, who had already been indicted on a charge of first degree assault, was indicted on Friday for cultivating marijuana, second offense and possession of drug paraphernalia for a February 23rd incident. Josh Morgan, 34, of Dusty Trail Subdivision, Hwy. 461, turned himself in Tuesday at the Rockcastle Detention Center and will be arraigned on the indictment on July 27th. He is being held on a \$50,000 cash or property bond. On July 6th, Morgan filled a \$100,000 property bond on the assault indictment and was

told the council. "We actually need to replace three cruisers but two will get us by until next year. All our cruisers have over 140,000 miles and one of them blew an engine last week." the chief added.

Jackson said he had located a fully-equipped rebuilt 2007 Crown Vic with only 3,000 miles for \$15,000 at a dealer in Salyersville and that a 2006 model, which had been rearended, for \$10,5000 and a 2007 model, with 13,000 miles, for \$19,000 were also available at the same dealer. The council okayed the purchase of two vehicles for the department. Mayor Clarice Kirby brought the council up-to-date on the new emergency vehicle building for the city and CSEPP. The mayor said that the lowest bid for the building came from Walters Buildings for \$228,000 but she had managed to negotiate the price down to \$210,000. Since the bid was considerably higher than expected, Kirby said that Hal Holbrook, CSEPP director, had said he might be able to

acquire more money from his department to help make up the difference.

The 72x104 building will be all metal, including the roof, and will have six bays.

Kirby also told the council that three of the city's projects had been ranked first in the county by other governments in the county and the two wa-



When I first started selling GRIT "newspaper" back in the 50's, Dad was employed by a mining company operating in the head of Blair Branch that used ponies to pull coal out of the mines.

We had the last barn in the head of the holler and it had 6 big stalls on the ground level that would comfortably house 2 ponies each. In addition to working underground, Dad was also paid a feed to house and board the ponies. I can't remember the barn being full, but for several years we kept 6 or 8 ponies at the same time and finally got down to the last two that were used for mining in Letcher County when the practice was outlawed in the early 60's.

Notice I said that "Dad was paid."

Yours truly and brother Keeter did all the feeding, watering, and washing down the ponies on week ends as well as cleaning manure out of the stalls on a regular basis. We actually thought this was great fun and couldn't imagine why anybody would be paid to do it.

On weekends boys on Blair Branch and even neighboring hollows would come around to ride the ponies, most of which were none to keen about having anybody on their backs and

did more kicking, bucking and biting than actually transporting riders from one point to another. But the deal was that the rider had to bathe his pony in the branch and then curry him down before being allowed to ride. Tom Sawyer would have been envious of this trick.

However, a couple of ponies that we kept for several years were extremely gentle and loved having all the attention Keeter and I could lavish on them. My favorite was Old Red, a wonderful Shetland that was big for his breed who actually thought he was a dog.

For a couple of years, especially in warm weather, when I was in 6th and 7th grades or thereabouts, I would ride him about three miles from our house to the Jeremiah Post Office and deliver GRITs on the way home over a meandering route that covered about 6 miles or so up Spring Branch, Doty Creek, Adams Branch, Black Bottom and finally to the head of Blair Branch.

No saddle mind you. This was strictly bareback but I'd figured out a way to make my paper bag rest on Old Red's haunches as I rode along. I had about 35 five regular customers but during the summer I'd

Dear Journal:

As I had noted several weeks ago, I had made an endeavor to compile a written oral history of my family. Other than history, it would contain short stories and little tidbits of knowledge future generations might find interesting. It would be so enlightening to future generations provided I ever get anything down on paper. However, as usual, I've let it fall by the wayside due to the rush and hurry we call daily living.

I'm thinking of calling it "Twice-told Tales of an American Family" which sums it up pretty well. They are stories and tidbits of information I've been told as a child maybe dozens of times, or maybe only once many years ago, but they have stuck in my mind. I guess it would be rather interesting, as it will cover a great range of personal experiences, most of which took place in an era when daily living wasn't so rushed and hurried.

There was a little story that came to mind a couple of days ago that I wanted to get down on paper while I was thinking about it. It makes for a good example of when life was lived at a slower pace, and even a trip to town was an adventure. The chief character in this story is my great-grandmother on my mother's side, Ella Vestie Otey-

Price. Breakdown at Sweetgum Flats Clearfield, Tennessee was pretty much of a self-sustaining little town, or at least is was around 1930 when this story takes place. Clearfield lay just across the Tennessee line along Clearfork Creek after crossing the Middlesboro Mountain in Bell County, which is in southeastern Kentucky. Most of the population worked in the local coal mines. There were several local mines, all located about five to ten miles apart, and each mine had its own little town or community. All of them were connected by the railroad. They were: King Mountain, Standard, Black Diamond, Anthers, Valley Creek, Rogerston, and Big Nickel. The larger ones: Eagon, Pruden, and Fondee had their own post offices. Clearfield was centrally located to each. The remainder of the population worked in the handful of stores and businesses in the little town. This, of course, was only about half a dozen businesses with a church and school in the community. Other people worked on their small farms that produced fruits, vegetables, meats, and dairy products. Of course there was the logging business, as well.

This is not common, but starting the medicine requires the optimum conditions for improvement, minimum risks of complications, and a full understanding of the benefits compared to the risks.





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Rockcastle **Memories** By David J. Griffin


When I was a very young boy, the family physician in Rockcastle County was Dr. George Griffith. In those early days of the '50's, he did not have access to the scientific medical tests and high powered technical devices that doctors use today, but he was a fabulous diagnostician nevertheless. And anyone who remembers those times also recalls that our country doctors actually made house-calls!

If a member of the family was too sick to make the trip to Dr. Griffith's office, he drove to the house at the end of his regular office hours. The sight of him coming up the gravel road made you feel better even before he actually examined you.

I can see him now as he entered the house. He carefully removed his coat and overshoes and then seated himself on the side of the bed. He went through the process of taking our temperatures, listening to his stethoscope, and pushing here and there. Finally, he looked into your mouth, ears, and examined your eyes. He had a wonderful bedside manner.

My mother (Bee) was always surprised by how well Dr. Griffith remembered my medical history. He never had to ask if I previously had some childhood illness because he already knew the answer. He also was aware of any allergies that I had and would provide the proper medication for whatever ailed me

When Dr. Griffith opened his "little black bag," he measured out doses of medicine and placed them into small envelopes, writing the directions on the side. His medical bag contained several small bottles of medicines which he dispensed instead of writing prescriptions. So, in essence, Dr. Griffith provided us with his medical knowledge and also served as our pharmacist. Bee told me one time that Dr. Griffith charged a mere \$2 for ch house-call. I am almost sure that our "good doctor" told my mother in secret that children should have a daily dose of cod-liveroil because it was added to my orange juice before breakfast each day. When Dr. Griffith came to our house, she made a habit of quizzing him about preventative medicine as well. She believed that he had very good sense about such matters. My only fear of Dr. Griffith came when he reached into his bag and pulled out a hypodermic needle and filled it with some solution. His instructions were to "pull down your pants and stick your behind up in the air." Oh how I hated "shots" when I was a boy! I guess he was aware of my fear because he rarely administered medication to me in this manner. I remember one afternoon that the good doctor was called, and he came immediately. Bee and I were spending the day at



my grandparents' house when a bad storm approached. Lightening struck the kitchen-wall fuse box just behind the couch that we were sitting on. Pieces of the fuses flew all over the house. Both my mother and I could feel the "tingle" of electricity flowing over our bodies.

Dr. Griffith was called and responded promptly without any question. After a careful examination, he instructed Bee to give me a sponge bath with isopropyl alcohol. For some unknown reason, the solution did the trick and in a few hours I was feeling fine. I often wondered how he knew about this amazing medical treatment.

Gone are the days of doctors' house calls and the "little black bag" filled with his cures. The country doctor was endeared in the hearts of his patients. Dr. Griffith was one of these important physicians. He took a common-sense, compassionate approach to his practice of medicine.

For many years, he was one of my heroes. Even after I moved away from Mt. Vernon, I returned to his office whenever it was possible. I will never forget how much we loved our country doctor and his gentle touch.

tight-knit community with everyone knowing each other, and good a good portion of their business. The population was probably not over two or three hundred, counting livestock. One of the best-known characters who lived in Clearfield was "Old Doc Rogers," as he was known. He was the only doctor for miles around and treated all of the people not only in Clearfield, but the other little towns and communities in the area. I don't know why, but I've always pictured "Old Doc Adams" of Gunsmoke fame when I think of him. He must have been pretty good, as he rarely lost a patient. He had delivered my mom, and her brother, Junior. Doctor Hagar Rogers had a wife, Lessie, who was the postmistress of Clearfield. This is where my family comes into play. My grandpa, Roscoe Norton, was the mailman for Clearfield. He rode an old horse, Dandy, twenty-seven miles each day on his winding route through hill and hollow delivering folks' mail in all kinds of weather. He was well-acquainted with Lessie and Doc Rogers. Doc and my grandpa were good friends, and he made many visits to grandpa's house personally and professionally. Doc and my grandpa were among only a handful of people to own a car in that whole area. Most of the areas where my grandpa delivered mail weren't accessible by car, anyway. The roads, what few that they had,

were in poor condition by today's standards, and usually unpaved. Most travel was done by horse, or on the train, which came through each little mining town once or twice each day for passengers, freight, and coal transportation.

Although Clearfield was, for the most part, self-sustaining people did find it necessary to venture outside this hamlet from time to time either for business or pleasure. Such a day came along for Doc Rogers and his wife, Lessie. They had asked my great-grandma, Ella Vestie Otey-Price, Grandpa Norton's motherin-law, to accompany them to Middlesboro for the afternoon. Another lady who lived next door to my grandpa, Edna Thomas, was asked to go along as well. Both of these ladies were sixty-ish at the time. Edna was friend of my great-grandma.

Edna Thomas was the wife of J.L., a local magistrate who also worked for the American Association, owner of all of the land where all of the mines were located. My great-grandma Price had a husband, Henry Frank, who worked for the American Association, as well.

Doc drove his old Model A or T Ford across Middlesboro Mountain to the big city of Middlesboro. I can almost imagine this foursome chugging along, about twenty or thirty miles per hour top speed, through muddy ruts ankle deep passing horse-and-buggies along the way. I've been across Middlesboro Mountain not too many years ago, and it was narrow, curvy, steep, and winding but at least it was paved.

They had been gone most all afternoon, and night was approaching. Having been gone far longer than expected, their friends and family feared that something had happened to

cause such a delay. These worried individuals gathered down at Matt Hamblin's General Store to wait for any news or prepare for the worse. They gathered there, as Matt had what may have been the only phone in town. The whole town used it to make only the most important life-or-death calls, or to receive such a message. (My grandma, Evelyn Norton, daughter of Grandma Price went to the general store about 1939 to call my mom, Inez Norton-Hill, at Berea College to tell her that some of their friends, the Davis', were getting a divorce. Mrs. Davis had been caught by her husband in a rather adulterous situation in their barn with a hired hand. The scandal shocked the little town. At that time, divorce was extremely rare and practically unheard of. It affected the town

almost like a death.) Finally, Doc and his travelers arrived back in town to the relief of their friends and family. They were late, but uninjured. What had happened was the question on everyone's lips. Doc told them that about the time they reached Sweetgum Flats, a span of road that was without any hills or curves, Lessie told him that he was going a little too fast, and to slow down a bit. However, from the back seat he heard my greatgrandma say, "Go on, Doc, while the goin's good." He decided to take her advice. About that time, from out of nowhere, a cow wandered into the road, and Doc had to swerve to miss it, which caused the car to have to hit the ditch and get stuck. He couldn't get the car out until the farmer came in search of the cow, and pulled the car out with a team of mules.

That was when "back-seat driving" was in its infancy, and women hadn't perfected it yet.





order 45 papers which was the absolute maximum I could stuff in the bag.

I'd stop to rest in front of Adams Brothers General Store and Doc Lundy's office and sell the extra ten papers in a matter of minutes to store customers or patients who couldn't resist shelling out fifteen cents to a boy selling papers off a pony's back. Without Old Red, I couldn't have given them away.

I used to get jealous because store customers would run in and buy Red an apple or a carrot just to let him eat it out of their hands but I can't remember anybody ever offering me one.

Throughout my GRIT career I had one regular customer who was blind but she'd be out on the porch even in cold weather waiting for her paper. GRIT always had a serialized western novel going that was printed in weekly installments. Truth be known, that was the reason most people bought the paper.

Anyway, she'd buy the paper and then make me sit down and read aloud that week's installment to her. And anybody that came into her house had to do the same thing until she had it nearly memorized before I came back around.

I'd hand her the paper in July and August and she'd say "I can't wait for it to get cold so you can't ride that danged old nag."

"He's not a nag," I'd say. "He's the prettiest pony in Letcher County."

"I don't care what he looks like but you oughtn't to be delivering papers on him in hot weather and you ought to give me a nickel off," she'd grump. "Nobody wants to read a paper that makes the whole house smell like a sweaty old mule."

Loretta came in the other day with a GRIT delivery bag that looked nearly new.

"Antique," she said. "Collectors item.'

I took it off the hanger where she placed in on the kitchen wall and smelled of it.

"What on earth are you doing," she wanted to know?

"Just checking to see if the kid who used it rode a pony," I replied.

feited his bond for a new infraction. From this humble cobbler's effort to reform criminals the American model of probation developed.

Shock probation is simply a refinement of a traditional probation model. The theory underlying this alternative is that it allows a sentencing court to retain jurisdiction for a short period to grant probation following a defendant's exposure to the sometimes harsh reality of a state correctional institution. To be eligible for shock probation, a defendant must have been eligible for probation to begin with. Violent offenses and persistent felony offenders are generally ineligible for consideration.

The rules governing the grant

or denial of shock probation are strictly construed. A court has no jurisdiction to even consider a shock probation request which is filed outside the statutory allotted periods, nor for any offense which does not fit within those deemed eligible by the General Assembly. Since 1916, the United States Supreme Court has definitively held that courts lack inherent authority to suspend sentences absent express legislation.

And unlike most other court proceedings, defendants and prosecutors have no right to be present at a hearing on the issue of shock probation. Judges are free to grant or deny such motions without formal court proceedings, and the Kentucky rules do not permit appellate review of a trial court's ruling on a shock probation motion. Despite public perception that shock probation is routinely granted, the facts do not bear this out. Pulaski County probation officers only supervise 25 individuals who were granted shock probation, while Rockcastle County officers supervise ten and Lincoln County supervises eleven offenders. Even these numbers are deceptive because they may include defendants who were granted shock probation by other jurisdictions, but are being supervised within this judicial Circuit, and some who have been on shock probation for many years.

While the wisdom of granting or denying shock probation in any given case may be debatable, it is hard to attack the underlying principle that shock probation, like other carefully thought-out and crafted sentences, can be an effective individualized sanction.



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

The Brodhead Christian Church has been a part of the landscape that composes the Brodhead community for many years.

Its beginnings can be traced back to the days of Boone's Fork when the church was adjacent to Brodhead's first school.

Made of square logs the church house was located 100 yards or so down the creek from "the bridge".

Brodhead Christian Church found a new home on what is today Main Street Brodhead in 1890.

The land for the building was donated by James Tate and the construction was done by R.S. Martin and others.

Services have been held at the same location for 117 years. While the Independent Christian Church's building has seen many changes over the years, once having a tall bell tower, the location and teaching of God's word have remained the same.

It was in 1960 that several major changes were made to the building. New Sunday School rooms were added along with the construction of the baptistery, the basement with a new furnace, kitchen and a new fellowship hall. It was at this time that the porch was built with columns and

the sanctuary was bricked. Brodhead Christian holds

Sunday School every Sunday Morning at 10AM, followed by worship beginning at 11AM. Evening services are held Sunday nights at 6PM with Wednesday night Bible Study and Youth Classes starting at 7PM.

In addition to these services, Brodhead Christian Church conducts an annual Vacation Bible School at the start of the summer along with other youth activities throughout the year. A group from the

church, the Seasoned Singers, worship in song every third Sunday of the month at the Rockcastle County Rehabilitation Center in Brodhead.

The Ladies Aide Missionary Society holds its meetings the first Tuesday of each month with the men of the church enjoying a monthly Prayer Breakfast every fourth Saturday.

Brodhead Christian Church is a proud supporter of the International Ministries of Andy Martin, P.V. Alexander, and Michael Diskin and also of the local Kentucky Christian Assembly church camp which is located only 2 miles down the road from the church.

Brother Tracy Valentine is the minister, and has been at the church for a total of five vears.

Valentine served as a parttime preacher before taking over as the full-time preacher about three years ago.

Valentine and his wife Sandy live in Somerset. Valentine met his wife while at-



Do You Know? Dog Days of Summer

Summertime can be brutal sometimes. Especially true for some of the residents of eastern Kentucky where air conditioning is not available, summertime can turn deadly. Summer heat combined with high humidity can feel utterly unbearable. It is the dog days of summer.

We all know that the "dog days of summer" as the hottest and muggiest part of the season. A quick look in Webster defines "dog days" as: 1) the period between early July and early September when the hot sultry weather of summer usually occurs in the northern hemisphere. 2) a period of

stagnation or inactivity.

But where does the term come from? Why do we call the hot, sultry days of summer "dog days?" The brightest of the stars in the constellation Canis Major (the big dog) is Sirius, which also happens to be the brightest star in the night sky of the summertime. In fact, it is so bright that the ancient Romans thought that the earth received heat from it. During late July Sirius is in conjunction with the sun, and the ancients believed that its heat added to the heat of the sun, creating a stretch of hot and sultry weather. They named this period of time, from 20 days before the conjunction to 20 days after, "dog days" after the Dog Star.

During an average year, 175 people succumb to the heat in the United States. In the disastrous heat wave of 1980, more than 1,250 people died. The heat wave of July 1995 caused 600 deaths in the Chicago inner city alone, which marked the greatest heat-related disaster in the United States. In Europe, the scorching summer of 2003 equates to devastation, as more than 50,000 people succumbed across the continent, with the majority, nearly 35,000 deaths in France. These are the direct casualties. No one can know how many more deaths are advanced by heat wave weather, as diseased or aging organs that surrender to the heat stress, but under better conditions would have continued to function.

Considering this tragic death toll, the National Weather Service (NWS) has stepped up its efforts to alert more effectively the general public and appropriate authorities to the hazards of heat waves - those prolonged excessive heat/humidity episodes. The NWS will issue Heat Advisories and Warnings to advise people that extreme heat is expected. Based on the latest research findings, the weather service has devised the "Heat Index". The Heat Index, given in degrees F, is an accurate measure of how hot it really feels when relative humidity is combined with the actual air temperature. For eastern Kentucky, a heat

advisory will be issued for a reading if 105 or higher for at least 3 hours or more, with a minimum Heat Index around 75 degrees during a 24-hour period. An Excessive Heat Warning will be issued for 110 or higher for 3 hours or longer, with a minimum Heat Index of 75 during a 24-hour period. ut it does not have to reach

ut it does not have to reach the warning or advisory stage for heat to take a toll on people outdoors, especially when working. Heat is a killer. Heat kills by taxing the human body beyond its abilities, where in a normal year, about 175 Ameri-

cans succumb to the demands of summer heat.

Know These Heat Disorder Symptoms SUNBURN: Redness and

pain. In severe cases swelling of skin, blisters, fever, and headaches. First Aid: Ointments for mild cases if blisters appear and do not break. If breaking occurs, apply dry sterile dressing. A physician should see serious, or extensive cases.

HEAT CRAMPS: Painful spasms usually in muscles of legs and abdomen possible. Heavy sweating. First Aid: Firm pressure on cramping muscles, or gentle massage to relieve spasm. Give sips of water. If nausea occurs, discontinue use.

HEAT EXHAUSTION: Heavy sweating, weakness, skin cold, pale and clammy. Pulse thready. A normal body temperature is possible. Fainting and vomiting is likely. First Aid: Get victim out of sun. Lie down and loosen clothing. Apply cool, wet cloths. Fan or move victim to air-conditioned room. Sips of water should be given. If nausea occurs, discontinue use. If vomiting continues, seek immediate medical attention.

HEAT STROKE (or sunstroke): High body temperature (106° F. or higher). Hot dry skin. There will be a rapid and strong pulse. Possible unconsciousness. First Aid: HEAT STROKE IS A SEVERE MEDICAL EMERGENCY. SUMMON EMERGENCY MEDICAL ASSISTANCE OR GET THE VICTIM TO A HOSPITAL IMMEDIATELY. DELAY CAN BE FATAL. Move the victim to a cooler environment Reduce body temperature with cold bath or sponging. Use extreme caution. Remove clothing, use fans and air conditioners. If temperature rises again, repeat process. Do not give fluids.



Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps FENCING: More than just making good neighbors

Famous American poet Robert Frost said in Mending Fences that "good fences make good neighbors" and I would like to begin today's article from that starting perspective.

Now, I know not every reader is shopping for a fence, and fence contracting is not the usual chore of a landscaper, but it seems like a subject I have ignored in this column despite more than one reader comment over time. So, today, let's consider some information about fencing and about why and how.

Indeed, good fences seem to make good neighbors. I think, personally, that that is so because of the need for diffrentiation of what's mine is mine/what's yours is yours. Also, the practice of getting with a neighbor and walking the line fence (usually of stone in by-gone days of yore) was a springtime ritual, one could say even a sacred practice. (Roman pagan god Terminus was supposedly honored when neighbors walked the line fence in ancient times.)

There may be reasons for

fencing that are "neighborly", or reasons practical (such as keeping outsiders from entering a pool area), for fencing. Or, usually, both. Plus other reasons such as asthetics and privacy and contentment.

Gated communities are popular, especially with those who have made their livlihood and want to enjoy it without being bothered by those who are still trying to make a way for themselves. Fenced yards and barred windows keep those who might want what's yours outside of your space.

OK. Enough. Let's look at it from the perspective of a nice landscape tool to have privacy and beauty.

The reasons you feel you want a fence can be many and varied. Is it asthetics? Is it privacy? Is it protection, or to keep tresspassers out? Is it to screen out undesirable vistas? (You will be able to answer better than I can suggest on this one.) But, once you are thinking about fencing, there are quite a few things one ought to consider.

Probably you ought to talk with your neighbor. Maybe the two of you can come to agreement and split the cost of a fence? But, if not, you have the right to build a fence on your own property (in most cases) even if your neighbor is not happy about the idea. (Just make sure you know where the survey boundary is, or hire a surveyor, as you don't want to hear "you put that fence on my property and you're going to tear it down or I'm going to suit you"!) And, be sure all of the fence is inside your property line. Then, so long as it meets any local codes, there is not

In P.S. I Love You: The Story of the Singing Hilltoppers, Carlton Jackson examines the story of the Hilltoppers' near-overnight success in the music industry. In doing so he illuminates not only the music of the era, but also the social and political climate of the time. The days of the big band were coming to a close, and Elvis was still a year away from recording his first song. At the same time, the Korean War was escalating. It was a time of change, and the Hilltoppers' crisp harmonies and clean-cut image provided just the right kind of distraction to the American public.

The Hilltoppers also embodied the American Dream. They would go on tour during the weekends so that they could attend classes back home in Kentucky during the week. They would arrive to class on Monday, exhausted from the weekend jaunt to Akron, Philadelphia, Cleveland, or Boston, and then they would be off again on Friday to tour the country once more. Hits such as "Marianne" and "P.S. I Love You" kept the band in Billboard's Top 40. Their success, however, was short-lived. Three of the original band members were drafted into the military, and despite a set of temporary replacement members, the group eventually called it quits. The impact that the Hilltoppers had on popular music was acknowledged in 2005, when they were inducted into the National Vocal Group Hall of Fame. Their vocal harmonies made a lasting impression on the world, garnering Hilltopper fans from as far away as France, England and Germany, and as diverse as Pat Boone and renowned author Bobbie Anne Mason (who was one of the first presidents of their fan club). But nothing meant more to them than home: Western Kentucky State College in Bowling Green, Kentucky. P.S. I Love You chronicles the Hilltopper's meteoric rise to fame and provides a nostalgic snapshot of the era. Carlton Jackson is University Distinguished Professor at Western Kentucky University and the author of numerous books and articles. His book Hattie: The Life of Hattie McDaniel was listed by the New York Times as one of the fifty most notable books of 1989.

much the person "across the fence" can say about it.

Once you have made a decision to build a fence....things like what materials, how will it look, how will it help me or my property, at what cost, for what functions, and for how many years will it last, should be considered.

Screening out noises, ugly views, bad critters or people, can all be legitimate concerns and desirable reasons for fencing. Boundary lines are another consideration. Putting certain parts of your

yard into another "room" can also be a purpose of a fence. (And, fencing can be a

growing hedge, not necessarily a fence of wood or steel or pvc.)

Check your deed restrictions and check your municipal codes if you live in a city. Then, get to the nuts and bolts of building a fence, or hiring one built if the chore seems rather daunting to you!

Selecting materials, colors, figuring how much of what to buy, these are considerations. (Rolling land may require more fencing than you think if stretch a straight line from one end to the other.)

And when push comes to shove, if you are restricted to, say, a 6 foot high fence, can you perhaps add a foot of dirt to the area before you install the fence? Would this hide the view you don't wish to look at?

Privacy fencing may need to screen out prying eyes. Security fencing may need to keep people or animals out. Some fences may just be for looks. And, sometimes the barrier is just for psychological reasons, and it might be served by a line of trees or an opaque fence you can see through, or maybe a 2rail fence which screens nothing but is a diffrentiation of space.


Whatever your reasons for marking your boundaries or fencing your yard, in the spirit of Robert Frost, build a good fence and make some good neighbors. Happy fencing! *The author specializes in building*

Domestic violence happens in many families, and not every victim is able to leave immediately. Because leaving is the most dangerous time in an abusive relationship and for other good reasons, some choose to stay. For these victims here are some suggestions on living with abuse and staying as safe and sane as possible.

[These ideas are from the book When Dad Hurts Mom: Helping Your Children Heal the Wounds of Witnessing Abuse by Lundy Bancroft. He also wrote Why Does He Do That? Inside the Minds of Angry and Controlling Men. I highly recommend both of these fine books to anyone who wants to understand domestic violence.]

1. Stop blaming yourself and your children for the high level of tension in your home. The abuser blames you, but you do not have to accept that blame. Do not argue with him, but be clear in your own mind that the abuse is his fault. Notice the many ways in which his abuse affects you and your children.

2. Work hard on your relationship with your children in order to develop closeness and trust. The abuser wants to undermine your relationship to others in your family. He wants everyone else to fight with each other; this allows him to remain in control. If you and your children fight, he knows that you will not be able to unite against him. Abusers thrive on mistrust and dissension.

3. Insist on respect from your children. Abusers often try to undermine your authority with the children. As much as you can and especially when he is not there, insist that your children respect your authority. As it is safe to do so, do not allow them to call you names or to hit you. Begin when they are young to teach them to respect you.

4. Do not hit your children. This is especially important in abusive households where there is already too much viogive them all the details. Children know that the violence is happening, even if you think they do not. To lie to them about it is to deny their perceptions. On the other hand, do not use the children as your counselor. They are confused enough without being placed in the role of being your main source of support.

6. Do not be hard on yourself for your failures as a parent. All parents fail at times, and parenting while living with an abuser is especially difficult. You will not be the perfect parent. Concentrate on what you can do rather than beating yourself up for past failures.

7. Encourage your children to speak up and express their feelings to you, especially about the abuse they witness. Do not speak badly of their father, but tell them that certain of his behaviors are not acceptable. Let them know that it is safe to disagree, if not with their father, then with you.

8. Insist on respect for females in general. Male abusers do not respect females, and their attitudes can easily be absorbed by their children. Speak to your children, both girls and boys, if you hear them talk negatively about females.

9. Do not say that the abuser is Aa good father. @ A good father does not abuse the mother of his children.

10. If you see that your lives are in danger, leave as soon as possible.

A close relationship with you is your children=s best defense against the effects of abuse.



urban in nature or expected to be urban in the future. "Annexation laws change with every court case and every legislature just about," Galloway added.

Galloway told the council that the city would have to decide the areas to be annexed and then publish two ordinances, detailing the new boundaries. The annexation can proceed from this point unless landowners in the area organize a petition with enough signatures to force the issue onto the ballot. At that time, 50% of the landowners in the area effected would have to vote against annexation to stop the process.

The largest area being considered for annexation is probably the Burr area to the south of Mt. Vernon. One of the sewer projects, for which financing is being sought, is for new sewer lines in this area and, if these residents were in the city limits, their water/ sewer bills would be much lower not to mention the added protection from police and fire departments. "It would be a while before we would see **Bobby L. Brown,** 71, of Sand Gap, was indicted for failure of compliance with the sexual offender registry, first offense, by failing to comply with the Kentucky Sex Offender's Registration System.

On May 4th, State Trooper Tommy Cromer arrested Brown, after he learned Brown was registered as living on Conway Road when he actually had been living in a pullbehind trailer at the Spur Truck Stop.

Another arrest warrant for Brown, who was released on his own recognizance after his initial arrest, has been issued.

Ronnie Vanzant, 27, of Orlando and Clint W. Daugherty, 19, of Billy Rash Road, Mt. Vernon were indicted on two counts involving a March 22nd incident.

The two were indicted for theft by unlawful taking over \$300. The two are charged with stealing road signs from the Kentucky Department of Transportation and the Rockcastle County Road Department.

Vanzant filled a \$500 cash bond and will be arraigned on Tuesday. A warrant has been issued for Daugherty.

declined, but did allow them entry into her home under the pretense that they were going to get some water.

When the three left the residence Mrs. Tankersly told police she thought something was wrong and, when she checked her purse, she found that \$6,000 in cash had been taken.

The money had been set aside for funeral expenses for her recently deceased husband.

After the three were apprehended by Jackson County Sheriff Tim Fee, Mrs. Tankersly positively identified them. They were taken into custody and placed under a \$100,000 cash bond.

The two Boswells, who have been held in the Rockcastle Detention Center since their arrests, pled guilty to Theft By Unlawful Taking, over \$300, a Class D Felony which carries a sentence of up to five years.

"We must protect our elderly citizens from harm and the recommendation of four years reflects our intolerance of these type of crimes," Bartley said.

"Even though this is their first felony offense, I think the nature of the crime calls for a sentence near the maximum, I will strongly oppose any early release for the two," he added.

The two will be sentenced in September.

In other court action on Friday, **Frankie Carpenter**, 26, of Manchester was the last of three men to plead guilty to several thefts in the Freedom School Road area late in January.

Carpenter was sentenced to three years in prison by Circuit Judge Jeffery At. Burdette.

John McClure, 24, of Haiti Road, Berea pled guilty to criminal possession of a forged instrument, second degree.

McClure's co-defendant, **Karey Dillon**, 31, also of Berea, pled guilty to complicity to criminal possession of a forged instrument.

The guilty pleas stem from a six day period in March in which the two forged and used checks stolen from Dillon's great-grandmother.

Bartley recommended a sentence of three years for McClure and two years for Dillion. The two are scheduled to be sentenced next week.

Nicole Richmond, 26, of Scaffold Cane, who was indicted on February 9th for stealing a chainsaw and handgun from local logger Russell Cope in December of last year, was

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
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more revenue than expense from the annexation," Kirby told the council.

The two were arrested in April and have been held in the Rockcastle Detention Center on \$200,000 cash bonds, after they were charged with incest and sodomy after an alleged incident involving their 21-month-old daughter.

According to Bartley's motion, Kentucky law allows the Commonwealth to request a trial within ninety days when the victim is a minor and the charges are sexual offenses. The couple was indicted June 8th.





essay winners. The students will each receive a \$1,000 scholarship, and were recognized by Jackson Energy Board Chairman Fred Callahan and


