The Rockcastle County Grand Jury handed down 15 indictments on Friday for alleged crimes ranging from murder to bail jumping.

Edward Montgomery Perciful, 57, of Laser Lane in the Scaffold Cane area, was indicted on a charge of mur-

He is accused of shooting Nicky Williams to death on January 3rd of this year. Perciful was arrested the day of the shooting and is being held in the Rockcastle Detention Center under \$250,000

Perciful will be arraigned on March 26th in Rockcastle Circuit Court.

Linda Bond, 35, of Lime Plant Hollow Road at Pine Hill, was indicted on three different counts involving trafficking in a controlled substance. Police alledge the crimes occurred in April and May of last year.

Her husband, Bobby Bond, was also indicted on drug charges and he will be arraigned on May 14th.



Dowell said the results of an autopsy revealed that Shivel died from blunt force trauma consistent with a fall. The cliff from which Shivel apparently fell was approximately 40 feet high.



## Rockcastle Memories

A lifetime of shoes

A few weeks ago my friend Lowell, who is a weekly reader of my column, suggested that I write about how shoes have changed since he and I were young boys. The topic struck a chord, and I began to consider how my tastes in shoes have evolved since I was a child living in Rockcastle County.

Even though we were not wealthy, it was the custom of my mother (Bee) (as it was in many families) to purchase a new pair of shoes each year just before the beginning of school. Of course, with a growing boy, I guess there wasn't much choice.

The first pair that I can remember were cowboy boots. I have a photo of me and Charles Shivel standing side by side at a very young age, and it clearly shows me wearing a scuffled pair of boots. That photo appeared in my senior yearbook for some unknown reason. We were probably seven or eight years old at the time the photo was made. From that time until I was in junior-high, I cannot remember any particular style for which I was fond with the exception of Converse All Stars, either low or high cuts. Most of my male friends wore the "Chuck Taylor" model. I think the girls were usually found in Saddle Oxfords.

When my brother Al turned 16 and started dating, he suggested that I purchase a shoe shine kit in order to keep his shoes shined. He agreed to pay me 50 cents each time I performed the task. (That wasn't bad money for the time period!) I immediately acquired a shoe shine box and started to work.

My grandfather (Pop) and my Dad both allowed me to keep their shoes in top shape also. I felt like the "Chattanooga Shoe Shine Boy." When all of their shoes were gleaming, I used my time to keep my own shoes cleaned and well polished. The experience paid off because when I eventually began dating, all of the girls commented on how nice my shoes always looked and that made me feel

As soon as I entered the eighth grade, my tastes in shoes changed drastically. I became aware of what the older guys were wearing, and I wanted to be just like them. I can remember going to a shoe store in Richmond with Bee where she purchased me a pair of "dirty bucks." For several months they were my favorites. At that time, my local hometown heroes were Charles Bennett Farris and Penny Nunnelley. Both were wearing their bucks to Mt. Vernon High School, and I thought I was just "too cool" wearing mine to junior high. (Of course, on the weekends I pulled my "Chuck Taylors" from under my bed to play basketball on the clay court at Jim Barton's house.)

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When I became highschool age, it became alarmingly evident that only one pair of shoes was not going to suffice. For one thing, EV-ERY boy I knew had a new pair of Converse each year, and I was not the exception. We wore them to class most of the time and kept our "Sunday Shoes" for special events or dates.

Then I discovered Bass Weejuns, and for the rest of my high school and college career, they were on my feet. No matter where you were going, it was appropriate to wear your Bass shoes. It was even cool to wear them with no socks. Of course, Bee always made me wear socks but as soon as I got to school, off came the socks and into my locker they went. It was hard to remember to put them back on before going home, but I usually managed.

Sometime during my junior or senior year in high school, someone introduced me to a pair of dress, lace-up, wing-tip shoes. I just could not get used to wearing them. Most of the time, they remained in their box underneath my bed. Occasionally, Bee would make me wear them, especially for a special occasion - like to church or to a wedding or funeral. Notice I said she MADE me wear them! As soon as I came back home the weejuns went back on my feet.

Lowell reminded me that during our high school days, it was popular for men to purchase a brand of shoes called Thom McAn. They were named after the designer Thomas McCann. He copied many of the popular brands and sold the shoes at a reduced price, making them extremely fashionable. However, I don't recall that I ever owned a pair of those shoes.

Pat Boone arrived on television when I was a senior. As a direct result, "white bucks" became wildly popular and so I had to have a pair. I loved how they felt on my feet but could not stand how dirty they looked most of the

Couple or three weeks ago I went in to the Paint Lick Clinic to get my annual "okay, you're fine to go but watch that blood pressure and lay off the pork fat", drill. I've been getting this report for years and expected it to be the same as usual. I usually only make this trip after Dr. John Belanger has called the pharmacist and refused to renew my blood pressure medicine until I come in and get a going over.

I run out and get a chest xray after Dr. John is finished probing around a bit and listening with his stethoscope, have a little blood drawn to send off to the pathologist, get a post card in the mail that tells me that there are any number of ways I could lower my cholesterol and that I should be doing just that.

I do worry about my blood pressure and cholesterol and most of the time I pretty much live off fresh fruit and vegetables unless E.W. James, there in Richmond, has a super sale on prime rib eye, corned beef brisket or boneless picnic shoulder pork roast for 99 cents a pound.

You probably have a grocer in or near your town that somehow manages to get the great deals on meat but ,for the price and quality equation, E.W James is the closest place for me to hit these deals even though I go into the store promising myself that all I'm looking for is a cart load of raw veggies and fruit from the produce section.

But it seems to me that you have to be a nut case to turn down prime rib eye, t-bone or New York strip when it's essentially in the same price range as lean ground chuck. So I wind up with wayyyy too much meat in the freezer and God knows that it would be a sin to let it get freezer burned and go to soup, so three or four times a week we find ourselves eating high off the hog (or steer, as may be the case) because we could not pass up the deal and we can't bear the thoughts of not eating great steak when the obvious alternative is to let it deteriorate.

Anyway, after my most recent annual check up, I got a call from the Clinic telling me to come back in and get some more blood drawn because my sugar was high. I avoided sugar at all costs for three days and drank plain water when I even thought about a soda or a beer. I fed most of a steak to my dog one evening and then I trotted back down to the Clinic and had another batch of blood drawn from that good vein atop my left elbow.

And I figured that would be the end of it. Then a day later I got the call. Diabetes.

Which came as no huge surprise because I know that I've been cheating the onset of this disease for decades even though it runs in my Dad's side of the family. On the other hand, our youngest son has dealt with it for well over twenty years and the repercussions have, on numerous occasions, had us in am-







Cynthiana is getting some

national attention.

No, we're not talking about the little county seat

town in Harrison County.

Cynthiana is the name of a Shelbyville-based rock group voted February Band of the Month by Music Go Round, an on-line mechanism in which thousands of listen-

ers rate bands

The group received a colorful three-page spread in the March edition of Shelby County Life, courtesy of publisher James Mulcahy.

Full of ironies, Cynthiana is made up of four young rockers who (irony #1) would rather crank out some "Sweet Home Alabama" or anything by Led Zeppelin than touch a Lady Gaga tune or see "How Low" Ludacris can go.

Cynthiana's credo, as listed on musicgoround.com:

"We are just four guys in or right out of high school in Kentucky that love old-fashioned rock 'n roll. Our main influences are Led Zeppelin, Tom Petty, Hendrix, CCR, Skynyrd, and many, many more. We feel our music reflects those bands and really gives a vintage sound to new American rock."

The community of Cynthiana, just north of Lexington, is the site of several Civil War battles, one of which was part of Morgan's Raid and lasted two days in June 1864, claiming some 2,000 lives.

That history prompted Reese Bors and Chad Meers to choose Cynthiana as the name of their studio project four years ago.

"In the beginning, when it was just me and him, ours was a kind of folksy, Southern, Bluegrass sound," Meers said. "We wanted something that represented Kentucky, and we thought Cynthiana was catchy."

Two years later, bassist Bors and guitarist/lead singer Meers added two younger members, Will Husband, then 15, and Alex Warford, 14, would play lead guitar and drums respectively.

Now, two years older and wiser, the four are making a name for themselves not only in their home community, but also Louisville, where their venues include (irony #2) bars in which most of t hem are too young to order adult beverages.

They even joke about playing one club, getting paid and then not being allowed back in to see the next band perform

Also (irony #3) none of the band members have even vis-

ited Cynthiana.

Audiences not familiar with Cynthiana tend to be taken aback at first by some of the group's cover choices.

"I think the older crowd is surprised that we're so young but we'll play a Joe Walsh tune or a Beatles tune," Husband said.

"They're not expecting that."

But they also perform a lot of original tunes.

"Once we added (Husband and Warford), I started writing music that would compliment what they do....more band oriented music; not so much acoustic projects," Meers said.

Still, they remain true to their musical influences, musicians like Tom Petty, Santana, the Allman Brothers, the Eagles.

"When somebody asks me what kind of music we play, I have a hard time telling them." Bors said. "Sixties and 70s rock, but we're Americana, but we're folky, but we're rock. We're Cynthiana; you just gotta hear us."

Meers said one can hear some bluegrass in their music.

"Just growing up here, I had a lot of bluegrass influence," he said. "A lot of lowtone songs...bluegrassy folk stuff....that's what I would classify my voice as. Will and Alex are more like classic rock style, so together it's kind of this folky, bluegrass, Southern rock band."

Husband registered Cynthiana at Louisville's Music Go Round to compete for Band of the Month, but he never really expected anything to come of it.

"I signed us up for it and forgot about it," he said. They had a thing on the wall to sign your band up. A month went by and I posted a picture and a link to our MySpace. Sure enough, come February we're the Band of the Month."

Some 200 bands compete monthly, Husband said.

"People just checked out our link and voted for us," he said. "We don't know how many, just enough to win."

The contest put them in a limited national spotlight, and prompted a big increase in hits on their MySpace Web site, www.myspace.com/cynthianamusic.

"It's great exposure," Bors said.

The band records in the studio at Shelby Christian Church, where Bors and Meers met eight years ago. And although not a Christian band, Cynthiana keeps its roots close to the church.

"The songs aren't like 'We love Jesus,' but they're encouraging," Meers said. "We want to be a good example, but we don't want to be classified as just a Christian band. We want to go out into bars and stuff and reach people.

"We all have kind of the same background," he said. "We all have good family support, and we all grew up in the church."

Cynthiana is focusing on the near future, playing local gigs and improving their music and their presence.

But like most bands, mem-



Steve Wariner, c.g.p., My Tribute to Chet Atkins. This is the fourth Grammy Award Wariner has received, and his first as a solo performer and producer. He won in 1992 for Best Country Collaboration with Vocals, and in 2000 and 2009 for Best Country Instrumental Performance. In 1998 Wariner won the Country Music Association's Single and Song of the Year awards for his #1 hit, "Holes in the Floor of Heaven," which was also the Academy of Country Music's Song of the Year in 1999. He joined the Grand Ole Opry in 1996. As a songwriter he has earned 16 BMI Country Awards and 15 BMI Million-Air Awards (for songs receiving over one million on-air plays). He was inducted into the Music City Walk of Fame in 2008 and the National Thumbpickers Hall of Fame in 2009. He started his own label, SelecTone Records, in 2003.

Produced by Wariner and released on SelecTone Records label, Steve Wariner, c.g.p., My Tribute to Chet Atkins honors the legendary guitarist and producer who was also his friend, mentor, producer and former employer. The abbreviation "c.g.p." stands for "Certified Guitar Player," a title that Atkins himself bestowed on only four guitar pickers: Tommy Emmanuel, John Knowles, the late Jerry Reed, and Wariner.

#### **About Keith Whitley:**

Whitley's brief career in mainstream country music lasted from 1984 till his death in 1989, but he continues to influence an entire generation of singers and songwriters. He charted nineteen singles on the Billboard country charts, including five consecutive Number Ones: "Don't Close Your Eyes", "When You Say Nothing at All", "I'm No Stranger to the Rain", "I Wonder Do You Think of Me" and "It Ain't Nothin'" (the last two posthumously).

**About The Goin Brothers:** After the Lonesome Pine Fiddlers disbanded in 1963, Ray and Melvin performed together as The Goins Brothers until Ray's heart attack in 1994 slowed him down. Ray retired in 1997, while Melvin continued as Melvin Goins & Windy Mountain. Ray would share the stage with his brother on occasion, mostly close to home in eastern Kentucky Melvin Goins and Ray Goins, The Goins Brothers, have been playing mountain string music for 50 years. 







## **Childhood Obesity**

### Family and Consumer Sciences

Studies show that nationwide, 32 percent of children between the ages of 10 and 17 are overweight or obese. In Kentucky that number climbs to 37 percent giving us the second highest rate of childhood obesity in the United States.

A number of factors amplify the problem. Lack of physical activity and poor eating habits are two principal

Here are some guidelines to help your child achieve and maintain a healthy body

1. Offer fruits and vegetables every day. Prepare them so they are tender but still crisp or offer raw vegetables as an alternative. Ask children to help prepare vegetable recipes. They are more likely to try new foods when they are involved in cooking them.

2. Invest in family mealtimes. Regular mealtimes promote better nutrition. For families that sit down together to eat, this means more fruits and vegetables, fewer fried foods and fewer high-sugar soft drinks. When children get the nutrition they need, it helps cut down on the desire for "empty" calorie foods.

3. Physical Activity Sug-

a. Encourage noncompetitive family sports such as jumping rope, Frisbee disc, tag, or hide-and-seek.

b. After a family meal, take the family outside. Go for a 10-minute walk or bike ride. It will help keep the family from settling in front of a screen for the rest of the

c. Even if you cannot go outdoors, you can still do a little physical activity. Put on music and dance or check out an exercise video from your local library.

d. Perhaps most importantly, make sure that your children see you participate in some physical activity. If you do not take physical activity seriously, how can you expect them to?

Children with excessive body weight are more likely to be overweight as adults which can lead to higher risk for diabetes, high blood pressure, high cholesterol and other illnesses. One way to find out if your child is at risk for excessive weight is to determine his or her Body Mass Index (BMI). This formula is a measure of weight for height taking into account total body makeup. Ask your pediatrician to assess your child's BMI, discuss the results and any additional steps that need to be taken.

The Kentucky General Assembly created the Citizen Foster Care Review Board, or CFCRB, in 1982 as a way to decrease the time children spend in foster care. CFCRB

volunteers review Cabinet for Health and Family Services files on children placed in outof-home care and work with the cabinet and the courts on behalf of the state's foster children

All volunteers must complete a six-hour initial training session and consent to a criminal record and central registry check. A recommendation is then made to the chief judge of the District Court or Family Court for appointment.

## Senate Week in Review...

By Ed Worley State Senator

The most important bill that legislators consider during any session – the budget

bill - moved out of the House and into the Senate this week. In the coming days, we will consider the



House's \$17.5 billion spending plan. The Senate Appropriations and Revenue Committee in all probability will make some changes. The House plan has many encouraging components, particularly its emphasis on efficient State government. Government efficiency and transparency have been points of interest in the Senate lately, and House action on this front is an encouraging sign.

Our budget committee will be working with the House to achieve a final plan that will make government more efficient while providing the services our citizens rely on. With the veto period beginning in a few days (March 30), we will be busy. This may be the most challenging budget we have worked with, but I am confident we will be equal to the challenge.

Before considering the budget bill this week, we approved Senate Bill 175 that would improve the process by which State contracts are awarded each year. The Government Contract Review Committee reviews billions of dollars in State contracts, from engineering to health care to consulting. It is an effective control on State spending, because legislative oversight is crucial to our State government's system of

There are around \$250 million in State contracts each month that never receive scrutiny from elected lawmakers. SB 175 would eliminate many of the exemptions that allow this to happen as well as make sure that more personal service contracts, including expensive technology contracts, are reviewed by a panel of legislators. The effect will be a more efficient examination of the billions of dollars in State spending, from government agencies to our colleges and universities. In economic times like these, when taxpayers across the Commonwealth are tightening their belts, SB 175 will help the State reduce spending as well.

Another efficiency measure, House Bill 276, will help slim down the various boards and commissions that regulate industry groups from EMS providers to barbers. HB 276 will require these panels to justify their staffing levels, and if they do not regulate at least 100 professionals, they would use administrative services from the State's Division of Occupations and Professions, an umbrella body for all these groups. We have learned over the years that many government agencies grow as needs grow, but as those needs shrink, the agency may not necessarily follow. This bill, now headed to Governor Beshear, is a step toward getting maximum bang for our buck.

In 2008, we passed major legislation to protect Kentuckians from inappropriate relationships with people in positions of authority, from teachers to coaches to priests. This week, with SB 17, we added another group with sig-

 prison guards and other corrections employees. SB 17 makes it a Class D felony, punishable by up to five years in prison, for any prison or jail employee to have sexual contact with an inmate. Contract employees would also be covered by the legislation. Guards and other workers have tremendous power over inmates, and that position is one of trust. The Department of Corrections worked with the Senate to develop this leg-

islation, so we are proud to

help them keep the focus on

prisons as a place to rehabili-

tate inmates, not punish them

nificant authority over others

outside the bounds of the law. With our budget constraints, we have to be frugal with our spending. At the same time, we are always looking for ways to recognize our country's heroes and show them our gratitude. This week, we tried to share a small token of our appreciation by passing three bills aimed at our veterans and their families that will bear only minor expense. These veteran-related bills are:

• SB 96 would permit the surviving spouse of a Purple Heart recipient to retain the special plate assigned to the veteran.

•SB 179 creates the Kentucky General Assembly Veterans Hall of Fame to recognize the active military and post-military achievements of outstanding veterans and to

spotlight all veteran's contributions to the civilian workplace. The proposed legislation would require the induction of all veterans who have earned the Medal of Honor; Army Distinguished Service Cross; Navy or Air Force Cross; Defense, Army, Navy, Air Force, Homeland Security or Coast Guard Distinguished Service Medal, or Silver Star.

•HB 106, which has been sent to the Governor to be signed into law, allows certain individuals with proper identification to receive a copy of discharge papers filed with a county clerk, rather than inspect those papers. This legislation also requires the Kentucky Department of Veterans Affairs to send an annual reminder notice of the confidentiality provisions related to discharge papers.







#### Contraction of **LEGAL NOTICE** The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet

In accordance with KRS 176.051, Kentucky's noxious weed law, the Kentucky Transportation Cabinet will destroy noxious weeds on state-owned right of way at the request of the adjoining property owner. The noxious weeds named in this law are Johnson grass, giant foxtail, Canada thistle, nodding thistle, multi-

flora rose, black nightshade, wild cucumber and kudzu. Persons who own property adjacent to state right of way and who are involved in eradication efforts on their property can submit a written application to the highway district office in their area. Applications and addresses for each district office can be obtained from state highway garages.

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








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
