The cruisers will be registered to the City of Livingston but ownership of the vehicles, when no longer in service, will revert to the

Changes to roads; heated discussion on renovations at council meeting

In a meeting that lasted over two hours, a heated discussion between Mayor Mike Bryant and long-time Councilman Clark "Joe" Mullins took place on the council approved expenditure for renovations to City Hall.

In the last two budgets the council has approved, \$210,000 has been included for renovations to City Hall. Mayor Mike Bryant has had plans drawn up twice for the renovations, the second time to accommodate concerns that Councilman Mullins had at the June meeting about space allotted to the police department/community meeting room.

The second plan, which was presented by Bryant at the meeting Monday night, was still a point of contention for Mullins. The councilman, who still felt too much space had

Sixteen indicted by grand jury

Sixteen people were indicted by the Rockcastle County Grand Jury on Friday, July 8th. Nineteen charges were for trafficking in a controlled substance, five for burglary and theft by unlawful taking, and one each for assault, persistent felony offender and flagrant non-support.

Delbert W. Leger, 37, of Brodhead, was charged with one count of persistent felony offender, first degree by being convicted of at least two prior felonies.

Glendle D. Hembree, 20, of Mt. Vernon, was charged with one count of burglary, first degree, by entering the home of Leshia Bell with the intent to commit a crime and one count of assault, second degree, by intentionally causing physical injury to Leshia Bell by means of a deadly weapon or dangerous instrument.


Anyway, our apologies for being what I lovingly called my students on many occasions, big dingleberries! The correct fiscal court story is on this week's front

One of the regular readers of this column recently suggested that I describe what a date night was like in the early 60's in Mt. Vernon. I liked this idea, and the following is how I remember being on a special date during the summer of

When I got off work, I quickly took my '58 Chevy to the Chevron station behind the courthouse in order to give my car a thorough wash job. I always thought that a clean automobile was a necessity when taking out one of my girlfriends. When my Chevy met my specifications, I hurried home to take a bath for the upcoming date. I dressed in my best Levi jeans, a clean button-down shirt, and my Bass Weejuns. By the time I had cleaned

my car and myself, it was time to cruise down Main Street to see who else was planning a date for the night. As I expected, several of my friends were also out cruising before picking up their dates. Oscar Fain, Jim Barton Nunnelley, and Bud Cox were sitting at the Dinner Bell Restaurant waiting for the 7 o'clock hour to pick up their dates. We exchanged plans for the evening. Then I noticed that it was already 6:45, so I cranked up my Chevy and headed for the home of Barbara Sue Mullins' grandmother. As was customary, I walked up the sidewalk and knocked on the door. Barbara Sue met me at the door and invited me to come inside. After exchanging small talk, we left and headed for my car.

Since it was still bright daylight, we decided to drive around to see which of our friends were out on the streets on this Saturday night before heading for the Valley Drive-in Theater. As we drove down Richmond Avenue, we met several of my friends: Paul Daily, Charles Hensley, Charles Bennett Farris, and Jim Cox; each of them blew his horn as we passed.

Just at that moment, Sam Cooke's You Send Me began to play, and Barbara Sue again turned up the volume on my radio - and a smile appeared on my face.

After downing our burgers and fries, we decided to cruise around a little longer before heading to the movie. Back in Mt. Vernon, we stopped to chat with Oscar Fain and Helen, who were also planning a night at the drive-in theater.

As the sun began to set on the horizon, Barbara Sue suggested, "We'd better go so we can get a good spot at the movie." I agreed, of course, and off we went toward Renfro Valley. On our way down US 25, we cranked up the volume on the radio and sang with all our hearts along with Roy Orbison, Elvis, The Platters, and Jerry Lee Lewis. 



SCHOOL BUS RULES AND REGULATIONS

The privilege of any pupil to ride a school bus is conditioned upon their good behavior and observance of the following rules and regulations. Pupils violating these rules and regulations shall be reported to the principal of the school which the pupil attends for necessary corrective action.

Safety is the primary concern in the transportation of pupils. In order to assure proper safety, it is vital that pupils and parents understand the rules and regulations of school bus riding. Following is a list of basic rules and regulations adopted by the Rockcastle County Board of Education and the Kentucky Department of Education:

- 1. Arrive at a bus stop on time. The bus has many scheduled stops and cannot be delayed. Never stand in the road while waiting for the bus. Parents should encourage safety
- measures for pupils as they wait for the bus and walk home from the bus.
- Cross a safe distance (10 feet) in front of the bus so the driver can see you. Take a seat upon boarding the bus and do not change seats while the bus is in motion.
- The driver is in charge of the bus and pupils and has the authority to assign seating
- arrangements. Keep noise to a minimum so that the driver's attention can be devoted to driving.
- Do not extend arms, legs or head out the bus windows.
- Obey the rules posted on each bus. Do not block aisles in any way.
- 10. Knives/other sharp instruments are not permitted on the bus. 11. Never run toward the bus. Always load and unload when the bus has come to a
- complete stop.
- 12. Apply the above rule (No. 11) when transferring buses. 13. Never use the rear exit unless an emergency exists.
- 14. Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the principal. Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.
- 15. Report any damages to the bus.
- 16. Do not occupy more space in a seat than required.
- 17. Open and close windows in compliance with the driver's instructions. 18. Pupils and parents are to accept the responsibility of listening for dismissal
- announcements on the radio on days when inclement weather disrupts the regular schedule. The following rules are of particular concern and the activities mentioned are prohibited
- at all times:
 - a. Use of profane/foul language. b. Smoking or other use of tobacco on the bus.
 - c. Fighting on the bus.
 - d. Destruction of bus property.
 - e. Defiance of driver's authority.
 - f. Throwing objects on or from the bus.
- 20. <u>Disciplinary Action:</u> Violations of the above stated rules and regulations shall be reported to the appropriate school principal. The principal shall record the incident and determine the appropriate disciplinary action. Should any pupil persist in violating any of these regulations, it shall be the duty of the driver to notify the principal and, after due warning has been given to the pupil and such violation persists, the principal and/or board of education shall then forbid such disobedient pupil the privilege of riding the bus. Written notice of the action of the principal shall be furnished to the parents and the superintendent.

Ride only your assigned bus unless you have a signed note from the Principal.

Parents must write or call the principal to obtain permission for pupil to ride another bus or to exit at a different stop.

Proposed Ordinance Of County of Rockcastle Reapportionment of Magisterial Districts

An Ordinance Proposing Changes and Modifications in Magisterial Districts as Ordered by State Law to Assure Proper, Numerical Accounting of Citizen Representation by Magistrates on the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County as Based Upon the 2010 Census of the United States

Having a duly appointed Commission for the Reapportionment of Rockcastle County's Magisterial Districts, and having heard the Report of the Commission at a meeting of the Fiscal Court of Rockcastle County, the Fiscal Court hereby Ordains the Following:

The Fiscal Court here with Ordains the new boundaries of magisterial districts within Rockcastle

County, and to be immediately effective upon the date read and adopted as follows by the Fiscal Court on Thursday, July 28th, 2011 at 1 p.m. at the Rockcastle Courthouse, 3rd floor:

(Note: The Fiscal Court retains the right to make amendments to the Proposed Ordinance following the general outlines of the Commission's Report when based upon the 2010 Census of the United States.)

District 1 Magisterial Boundary

Description A (District 1) POINT IN GARRARD COUNTY LINE TO COPPER CREEK ROAD

Beginning at a point in the Rockcastle / Garrard County line approximately one and one-quarter (1.25) miles west of the Copper Creek Road bridge into Garrard County, and following in a straight line in a southeasterly direction just to the west of the western intersection of Tulip Circle and Copper Creek Road at residential address 236 Tulip Circle Road and residential address 5436 Copper Creek Road, with no residential addresses on Tulip Circle Road being a part of District 1, and with all residential addresses less than 5436 Copper Creek Road being a part of <u>District 1.</u>

Vernon on North Wilderness Road.

been allotted to the police department, said the city did not have the funds to proceed with the renovations anyway and proceeded to make a motion to only replace the garage doors of the former fire department, to redo the front only and revisit the plan at a later date.

Mullins did not receive a second on the motion and Mayor Bryant took exception to Mullins' concerns, reminding him that the council had passed the renovation item in the last two budget cycles and that money was allotted for the renovations and revenues supported that budgeted

The Mayor also kept repeating that he and Dennis McClure, City Superintendent, believed they could do the renovation to the entire building, not just the old firehouse, for much less than the \$210,000 approved to renovate just the firehouse.

There was much discussion about where the money would come from, as well as a comment from Mullins that "the last guy was run out of office because he wanted to spend \$210,000 on this building." That comment preceded the motion that did not receive a sec-

Mayor Bryant reminded Mullins that the election was over and made the comment, "This is not about me. The mayor's office, if renovated, will be about a 1/3 of the size it is now. I am only trying to improve the building for the city to use."

Councilwoman Shelly Lewis asked the Mayor if he would get the council an estimate of what he and McClure thought the renovations would cost by the next meeting.

Another topic of discussion was whether or not the city wanted to address the problem of people having "continuous" yard sales on their property and whether there were enough complaints to warrant an ordi-

Michael Resident Sheliga commented to the council that they had already received a petition a couple of years ago with over 330 names on it to encourage a yard sale ordinance saying, "How much more does the council need

before taking action?" Councilwoman Lewis

told Sheliga that most of the names on that petition were of people who did not live in the city limits and the Mayor added that more upto-date information or complaints would be needed. After ascertaining that only one property owner had complained recently the council decided to not take action on the yard sale is-

The third major item on the council's agenda was a report from Kenvirons representatives about several water issues that the city is facing. Eddie Brown, of Kenvirons told the council that all they needed was their approval to send a notice of award to Grant Excavating on the Rose Hill Project so that they (Grant Excavating) could initiate the bonding process needed to begin the project. The project bid includes the original Rose Hill project and alternate one, which will include 4 -5 more houses in the project.

Water system improvements were also presented to the council, with upgrades to the water tank farms given as the most critical improvement needed. The current tanks are in very bad condition and the Kenvirons rep stated, "It is not a matter of if, more like when the tanks will need to be replaced, hopefully before something goes wrong with one of them."

A second improvement suggested was to replace the soft starts at the water plant with variable frequency drivers, which would keep the pressure at the water plant at a safe level consistently, instead of having large pressure surges when the motors are started and stopped.

The third water improvement suggested by the Kenvirons firm was to add mixers to Lake Linville to prevent blue green algae from forming in the lake. The algae has been identified as the source of the bad taste and smell of the water that has been filtered and is supplied to most of the county by the city. The representative stated that blue green algae needs stagnant water to thrive and the mixers would keep the water inside the reservoir moving enough to discourage the growth of algae.

Kenvirons told the council that other water systems that had experienced the same problems and had tried the mixers were seeing some improvement in the

quality of their drinking

In new business, a motion was made to establish a volunteer emergency management coordinator position for the city at the mayor's discretion. The coordinator would have to receive all of the training necessary to become an emergency management coordinator, and would work closely with Howell Holbrook, CSEPP Coordinator for Rockcastle County, the state and the mayor's office in case of an emergency in the city lim-

Holly Weaver of the Daniel Boone Community Action Agency asked the council that they make a one time waiver to the ordinance that states that no two dwellings can use the same water meter so that they can hook onto the Signal office's wa-

The Agency needs to do this because the Ashley House Homeless Shelter has not had water pressure for at least three weeks, and three families are living

Mayor Bryant told Weaver that as much as the city would like to help them, and McClure had been to their office several times trying to do so, it was a state law that no two dwellings can use the same water

Weaver told the council that their agency was unable to fund the approximate \$2,000 needed to repair or replace their regulator, which controls the water pressure, because of budget cuts to the agency. They have been providing bottled water to the three families for drinking, cooking and hand washing while the problem is trying to be

Another issue the council was asked to address was yield signs in the wrong places on Paul St./Terry St. and Ford Dr./Joyce St. Mayor Bryant asked the transportation department for a recommendation about where the yield signs needed to be on both intersections. Even though the roads are not state maintained, the state transportation department told the mayor that, in their opinion, the signs needed to be reversed, with the yield signs on Ford Drive and Terry Street instead of Joyce Street and Paul Street. The council approved the changes to the signage, which will be changed im-

mediately. Bryant and Po-

lice Chief Terry Jackson said they would publicize the changes in the locations of the yield signs to residents for a period of time to help with the adjustments.

Reports were given by Police Chief Terry Jackson and Fire Chief David Bales. Jackson reported that the police department had responded to 444 calls in June, which is an abnormally high number, Jackson

There were 62 citationsi issued: 31 arrests made: 7 DUIs apprehended; 19 citations for other traffic offenses; 8 citations for speeding; 10 arrests for other criminal charges; 16 wanted persons captured; 13 traffic accidents investigated with one injury reported and 15 investigations were opened with 11 being cleared or

Bales reported that the fire department had responded to 20 incidents and used 19,550 gallons of water in the month of June including three fire alarms, three structure fires, six motor vehicle accidents with

entrapment, one hazardous material incident, two vehicle fires, four smoke investigations / false alarms and one EMS assist.

Throughout the previews of coming attractions and the cartoons, we made small talk and caught up on what was happening in each others lives since we last saw each other. (At that time, she was living in Ohio, and we had limited time to be able to be together.)

Once the movie had started, we slid the seat back and got comfortable. Everything was going great until Janet Leigh registered at the Bates Motel. From that point on Barbara Sue, with fear on her face, gripped my hand like a vice. When Anthony Perkins ripped open the shower curtain, female screams from all around the drive-in joined with hers. But, being such a manly date, I held Barbara Sue with all my might, reassuring her, "Everything is alright!" This was a great movie to bring a girl to!

When the movie was over, Barbara Sue was positioned as closely to my side as possible. I slowly drove out of the theater entrance and turned right, heading toward Renfro Valley. 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These funds will be used to resurface the center's playground area with recycled, shredded tires known as "crumb rubber." The crumb rubber has been specially processed to remove all metal remnants. A recent study from the Environmental Protection Agency has endorsed the

use of recycled rubber to cushion the surfaces of playgrounds.

Research has shown that crumb rubber provides better impact protection for children in the event they fall and will last considerably longer than the standard wood mulch found on many playgrounds.

Kentucky's Environmental and Public Protection Cabinet has been working to find markets for the millions of waste tires this state generates each year. The last of six regional UNITE sponsored basket-

drug-free activity where children have an opportunity to interact with positive role models while learning fundamental basketball skills.

Jeff Sheppard, named the NCAA's Final Four Most Valuable Player in the Wildcats' 1997-98 National

Valuable Player in the Wildcats' 1997-98 National Championship season, spoke to parents and participants alike and emphasized the importance of teamwork and effort throughout the camp.

At the beginning of camp, parents and guardians of the youth participants were presented a program on the importance of keeping close tabs on their prescription and over-the-counter medications.

A highlight of the camp for participants was a visit by 2011 Miss Kentucky Basketball Sara Hammond. Sheppard spoke of Hammond and the Lady Rockets team, saying "Teamwork was one reason the Lady Rockets, under head coach Chrysti Noble, captured their first ever state title in March."

Sheppard praised the University of Louisvillebound Hammond for her poise, attitude, ability and energy – all of which are important in deciding to stay away from the temptation of drugs.

Hammond, the first female McDonald's All-American from Kentucky, was also named the state's Miss Basketball and won the Gatorade Payer of the Year and Associated Press Player of the Year awards during her senior season. She was an active participant in her school's UNITE Club.

Prescription drug abuse is a growing epidemic across the nation, and studies have shown that most teens first experiment with drugs obtained from their family or a friend's family without their knowledge. During the session UNITE staff stressed the importance of keeping track and properly disposing of their prescription and over-the-counter medications, the focus an "Accidental Dealer" awareness campaign earlier this year.

Since 2006 there have been 39 Shoot Hoops Not Drugs camps with a total of 5,055 youth participants. These participants have come from 53 Kentucky counties and five other states.

Mountain Signal becomes Mount Vernon Signal in 1896

The publication of the Mountain Signal on November 3, 1887, brought the first newspaper to the small town of Mount Vernon in Rockcastle County at the junction of Kentucky's Bluegrass, Pennyrile, and Eastern Coal Field regions. A four-page Democratic weekly, the Signal was one of several accomplishments of its first editor and co-owner, "Colonel" James Maret (1855-1936).

Maret edited the Mountain Signal for three years before selling his stake to Edward Smith. Smith, renamed the newspaper the Mountain Eagle. In October 1896, however, Maret repurchased Smith's share, and became the paper's sole owner. The paper again became known as the *Mount Vernon Signal*.

Maret's second tenure as owner ended two years later when Edward S. Albright assumed ownership; however, Maret continued his "Notes & Clips" column until his death in 1936.

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, books & catalogs, office paper, junk mail, phone books, plastic bottles & jugs (#1-7) (any size soda and water bottles, laundry detergent jugs, bleach and fabric softener jugs, milk and water jugs, cooking oil bottles and jugs, shampoo bottles, dish liquid and alcohol bottles (please rinse out jugs), metal cans (rinsed), empty aerosol cans, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, sheet glass, ceramics, computers, radios, phones, vacuum cleaners, clocks, cameras, camcorders, vcr/dvd players and satellite boxes.

Rechargeable batteries such as those found in: cordless power tools, cellular phones (the whole phone can be recycled), cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders and remote control toys. If its says rechargeable on it, then it's recyclable! Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department during regular business hours.

Recycling trailers are also available at the following locations: City of Brodhead (gravel lot across from Citizens Bank), City of Livingston (gravel lot across from old Livingston Gymnasium), Brindle Ridge Volunteer Fire Department (at Conway) and at the Pongo Volunteer Fire Department. The trailers will only be pulled out to empty them and will then be taken back to the same location. Please help us make this a successful venture by being clean and/or neat with our recycling habits. Do not put anything in the individual bins except what is labeled on them. Do not leave recyclables on the ground! If you drop something on the ground, pick it up. Absolutely no trash is to be put into the bins! Remember, camera surveillance is utilized in Rockcastle County and it is illegal to improperly to dispose of trash.

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


JROTC attend Leadership Camp

On May 29th twelve cadets in the Rockcastle County High School JROTC program traveled to the Junior Cadet Leadership Camp held at the Bluegrass Army Depot in Richmond Kentucky. The following cadets participated: Aaron Bagget, Aaron Mcarter, Adam Ramey, Amethyst Chiantaretto, Austin Smith, Crystin (Shania) Lawson, Heather Holden, Jacob Houk, Justin Houk, Mark Hupp, Shawn Osborne, and Tiffany Howard. Upon arrival at the Depot cadets were instructed to stay hydrated and drink water at all times to prevent any heat injuries. The first event the cadets participated in was a physical test called the Ca-

The second day of camp, cadets went to the Fort Boonesborough to learn about the history of early settlements in Kentucky. 
modified pushup). The third day cadets were transported to EKU,

The second event held at the pool would test their limits by jumping off of a diving board blind folded with a rifle in hand. This would let cadets experience what it would be like in a survival situation. After cadets ate lunch they headed to Lake Gem where they would conduct poncho rafting as well as pontoon rafting. In the poncho rafting event cadets made flotation devices out of two ponchos, 4 boot strings, and vegetation that surrounded the lake. In the pontoon rafting cadets learned how to raft using a pontoon and basic commands such as starboard and portside. After this cadets went back to the barracks and changed into ACU's (modern day combat uniform) and prepared for the silver musket ceremony. Fluids important in managing heat safely

In recent years, reusable water bottles have taken on stylish new looks, but making a fashion statement pales in comparison to the value of the life-saving role fluids play in reducing risks from too much summertime heat and humidity. Drinking eight to 12 cups of fluid a day is recommended under normal circumstances to replenish essential body fluids, and more is needed as summer temperatures and humidity rise.

We sometimes forget that 55 to 75 percent of the body's weight is water; the brain is 70 percent water; blood is 82 percent water, and the lungs are nearly 90 percent water. Water carries nutrients and oxygen to cells; cushions organs, tissue, bones and joints; removes waste; and regulates body temperature. In high heat, humidity, and times of high activity, such as working outdoors or participating in athletic activities, water is lost through perspiration, which helps cool the body through the evaporation of fluids on the skin.

Exposure to the sun or a sunburn will speed fluid loss, and so will drinking beverages containing caffeine or alcohol, which both act as diuretics. Excessive water loss or dehydration can impair body function and lead to heat exhaustion and/or heat stroke that can be life threatening. Fluid replacement is essential, but it's best to not wait until you're thirsty. Most people often become slightly dehydrated before they become

Checking to see if your body is well hydrated is easy. If urine is pale yellow in color, fluids intake are likely adequate. If urine is dark yellow or appears concentrated, more fluids are needed.

Water is recommended for the majority of the fluid replacement because it is readily absorbed; cool water is preferred because it is absorbed more readily than warm, hot or ice water. Other good sources of fluids include milk,100 percent fruit juice, low-sodium vegetable juices and foods that have a high water content, such as melons and other fruits, tomatoes and other vegetables, and soups, smoothies, puddings, gelatin salads and other foods made with milk, fruit juices

or broths. Beverages that contain caffeine, including coffee, tea and some soft drinks, or alcohol act as a diuretic that speeds fluid loss. So these are not recommended as essential fluid replacements. For drinks that contain caffeine, only half of the amounts of these beverages be counted towards total fluid replacement.

Sports beverages may be helpful for athletes who are exercising more than one hour and are in need of lost electrolytes and quick energy. Consider diluting sports drinks with an equal part of water to help replenish fluids and reduce calories. Low-fat chocolate milk also can be a good fluid replacement for athletes. Keep in mind that sugary sports drinks or carbonated beverages can add unnecessary calories.

Before working in the heat, exercising or participating in athletics, drink 14 to 22 ounces of cool water. Drink additional water, about 1-1 1/2 cups of water every 15-20 minutes during exertion. Parents need to make sure that children take frequent water breaks. Children should drink about one-half cup after each 15 minutes of activity.


Older adults need to drink fluids, even if they are not thirsty. The ability to sense thirst declines over the years, leaving older people unable to rely on their thirst to prompt them to drink enough fluids. The

ability to regulate body temperature easily also declines with age. So, if a caregiver is thirsty, a dependent older adult, infant or small child probably is, too.

In addition to replacing fluids, wear a hat with a brim and sunglasses; choose loose, comfortable clothes that breathe; use sun screen;

and taking occasional breaks. All of these can help

to help minimize the effects of heat and humidity.

A special thanks to Mrs. Holly Robinson for chaperoning the cadets attending this year's JCLC, her support of the program is greatly appreciated.






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
