Rockcastle Schools above state average

Although the Rockcastle County School District continues to rank above the state average in reading and math, test score averages for the district dipped slightly for the 2010-11 school year.

Reading scores in the district showed that 77.28 percent of students scored proficient or distinguised, which was a slight decrease from the 2010 percentage of 80.2. Math scores also showed a decrease in the percentage of students attaining a proficient or distinguished, with a score of

However, the district is

erage in both reading, at 71.99 and math at 65.99. The district continues to make adequate yearly progress, which is the measurement tool used by the federal government through the No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB).

The Rockcastle County High School increased both their reading and math

still well above the state av- scores. In reading, RCHS scored 65.55, increasing from 63.18 last year. This year's score in math is 43.75, which is an increase from the 2010 score of

Despite the fact of a lack of funding and budget cuts, courtesy of the state legislative body, Rockcastle County schools maintained a high level of achievement. But I have to question how long we can keep this pace up without the tools and resources needed to prepare students for the 21st century skills that they will need.

Our best resource is our teachers and they do an exceptional job day in and day out helping children succeed in the classroom. They do all of this without adequate funding from the state and the fact that they are asked to not just teach what children need to know but are asked to deal with additional, constantly, changing mandates.

Schools have not had new textbooks for several years. Money for cuttingedge technology, such as computers for students and teachers alike, has been nonexistent. Teachers' salaries have remained frozen, but the cost of health care has grown on average three percent annually. So in essence, teachers have had cuts to their salary.

The legislature passed Senate Bill 1 with the new mandates in accountability but has, to date, not come up with any ideas to fund the mandates. Teachers have been constantly asked to do more with less. When was the last time a member of the legislature was asked the same -- not when it comes to their state pensions. Many of our teachers provide supplies and items conducive to learning out of their own pocket.

Rockcastle County Schools has always been good stewards of money but it is disheartening when neighboring districts seem to have a better cash flow to spend on students. The playing field has to be leveled. When you can drive 14 miles north and see the growth of new schools and instructional resources, it can make one down right angry that we cannot afford the same opportunities for our students. I understand the local tax base is greater to draw from, but the state has to address this problem and make it priority one.

I am proud of the teachers and staff at my school at RCMS. They are proven educators who put kids first on a daily basis. But I also see and feel the stress and pressure of high stakes accountability without the high stakes funding. All that I ask is to give these professionals the resources and opportunities to prepare our students to chase their dreams. We have been the best value for taxpayers over the years providing results that are state renowned, but you can only get so much blood from a turnip.



In 1955 and 1956, my

brother Albert was hired to be the Band Director at Mt. Vernon High School (MVHS). In addition to the band, he was also given the responsibility for teaching public school music and conducting the Glee Club. The band was made up of a variety of students from both elementary and high

The band practiced a couple days each week after school and, in addition, one night was reserved for

practice. Martha Cox was in the band at that time, and she has fond memories of the band. "Al was so young at the time, and his class was so much fun. He even came to our houses to pick us up for night practice. He had so many students in his car that several of them had to ride in the trunk. If he did that today, he would be arrested! I just loved his classes." I was only eleven at the

time, but I distinctly remember his public school music class. He introduced us to many styles of music using his 33-rpm record player. On some days, he played songs by famous artists of the day, such as: Perry Como, Frank Sinatra, Tony Bennett, and Rosemary Clooney. Occasionally, he would choose one of these artists and play a particular song, and he then would have us sing along.

On some days after his class, we would repeatedly sing the song that he had taught us all day long. We really enjoyed his class and learned a lot about different forms of music. I remember him having us listen to Porgy and Bess on one occasion, and that was not my "cup of tea." I also recall listening to some of the big bands that were so popular at that time, such as Benny Goodman, Glenn Miller, Artie Shaw, and Tommy Dorsey.

Al was a clarinet player himself, and he loved to make us listen to Benny Goodman. He would come home at night, get out his clarinet, and play many of Goodman's hits that were currently popular on radio. I thought he was a really good clarinet player.

Since Al was my older brother, I spent a lot of time in the band room of the high school. One afternoon when I walked into the room, Al was sitting in a chair with one of the band members sitting in front of him and a very bright light was shining on one side of the student's head. I asked, "What in the world are you doing?" He explained, "I have decided to make silhouette portraits of each band member and hang them on the walls of the band room."

He proceeded to cut out a silhouette of the student's head from a piece of white

I vividly recall the look of the room with the portraits displayed all around. The band students loved seeing their likenesses on the walls. The fact that our portraits were exhibited in such a manner gave us the feeling that we belonged there. Frankly, I thought it was a very classy idea. Looking back with the hindsight of a teacher, I understand what an excellent motivating tool it was for an

instructor. I can still envision those silhouettes hanging on the walls now. I have no idea who all the students were who played in the band during the time that Al was the director, but I do recall a few: Penny Nunnelley, Martha Cox, Howard Coffey, Jim Cox, Raymond Kirby, Nanette Milen, Charles Bennett Ferris, Helen Cummins, Jim Barton Nunnelley, Bud Cox, and Patsy Cummins.

Al was only 21 years old when he took up the position of Band Director at MVHS. I was only 11 and in the fifth grade. I thought it was cool having my brother as a teacher in the school where I attended. Even though elementary students were in a different section of the building, I did get to see Al on a regular basis. Occasionally, I hit my big brother up for some change to purchase a candy bar or something to drink during recess.

I did not stay with the band for very long because it became quite apparent that playing a musical instrument was not one of my talents. I imagine that I was not very willing to practice for the time necessary to even make a mediocre player. However, I do remember Al's public school music class and the enjoyment that

it brought to me. I am also glad that he ex-

posed us to such a wide variety of music and musicians. Having that experience probably made me much more aware of music in general. When rock and roll burst onto the scene and began its 50-plus year reign in 1956, I was certainly ready. But I guess I owe my big brother for more than that because I have been a lover of all kinds of music ever since. Little did I know that those days of band and silhouettes were affording me the educational foundation for a lifetime of music appreciation. Thanks big

Family members of Johnson say that Hazelwood had no business being at Johnson's home. According to a statement made to WKYT television, Johnson's brother George, stated, "Hazelwood and Byron didn't get along. He was asked before to stay away."

According to a statement to police during his arrest, Bobby Hazelwood said that Byron Johnson had been threatening him and was coming toward him when he shot him. Court records showed Hazelwood blamed Byron Johnson for stealing his

According to a statement to WLEX, Tiny Johnson, Byron Johnson's wife, said, "That man was told to leave three weeks earlier, not to show up. We've got signs posted, no trespassing.

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Detention Center under a \$75,000 cash/property bond, which he met and was released from jail on Tues-

dropped slightly from last year's of 83.6 in reading and 75.4 in math.

The three elementary schools in the district continue to rise above state averages, with Brodhead and Rounstone increasing their scores from last year in reading. All the elementary schools dropped slightly in math this year. Brodhead scored 89.58 in reading and 90.1 in math; Mt. Vernon scored 74.85 in reading and 70.18 in math; and Roundstone scored 89.66 in reading and 73.10 in math.

Although Rockcastle County Schools exceeded the goals for all students, in other data released on Tuesday, the district failed to make overall adequate yearly progress related to

individual subgroups of students. The District met 8 of 13 goals under the federal NCLB Act.

Only 22 of Kentucky's 174 school districts met 100 percent of their target goals. Of the 152 districts that did not meet all of their goals, 30 met 80 percent or more of their goals, including Rockcastle with 84.6 percent of goals met.

Rockcastle Superintendent Larry Hammond told the Signal Wednesday, "As the state continues to be in a time of transition, I believe we, as a district, are going in the right direction. I'm optimistic that as the state mandates the new "College and Career Readiness" standards, that we are as prepared as anyone to tackle what really counts, which is to prepare students for college or the workforce."

The 2011-2012 school year begins the new accountability cycle. Reading and math scores will be based on the new state coalition standards that are currently being implemented in classrooms this fall. The new assessment in the spring will be a combination of a norm referenced and criterion referenced assess-

Schools will receive both individual student and school-based reports in grade 3-8 in math, reading,

writing, science and social studies. High schools will administer End of Course exams as well as the ACT Plan and the ACT that will be part of the accountability cycle.

ceive federal dollars through CSEPP, which is administered through Kentucky Emergency Management (KYEM). Besides Rockcastle, the counties include: Clark, Estill, Favette, Garrard, Jackson, Jessamine, Laurel, Madison and Powell.

"Communication and preparation are two critical cornerstones of emergency operations in these central Kentucky counties located near the Army depot," Gov. Beshear said. "This federal funding will improve how counties communicate and manage their emergency operation centers."

In one project, Kentucky received a \$2.1 million grant to bring its CSEPP counties into compliance with the United States Department of Homeland Security and the United States Department of Defense. The agencies require that all federally funded communications systems meet federal requirements which enable public safety responders to better community with each other.

The grant funding will help purchase mobile and portable radios, consoles, repeaters and other equipment in accordance with a plan developed cooperatively by FEMA, the Commonwealth and effected CSEPP jurisdictions.


The second grant, funded at \$2.5 million, will pay for all or portions of county emergency operation center projects identified by the Commonwealth in cooperation with FEMA. The funding will support creating or improving centers in the 10 CSEPP counties.







Kentucky's Energy Education efforts receive national recognition


Kentucky was recently recognized as the distinguished 2011 "state of the year" by the National Energy Education Development (NEED) Project for its state energy education program. The state's program partnered with the Kentucky Utilities Company and Louisville Gas and Company's Electric Children's Energy Education Program to help incorporate energy education into local schools.

Since 2009, the KU and LG&E Children's Energy Education Program has reached 1,900 teachers in more than 600 schools within 66 Kentucky counties and 80,000 students throughout the service ter-

Three schools in Rockcastle County are central figures in the state receiving the award. They are: Mt. Vernon Elementary, Brodhead Elementary, and Rockcastle County Middle School."Without schools' active participation, this program would not have impacted such a large number of students," said Kelly Couch, LG&E and KU Children's Energy Education Program Manager.

The program's versatility and various elements enable customization to meet each school's needs. NEED Regional coordinators, who partner with the KU and LG&E Children's Energy Education Program, support the schools to provide energy efficiency and conservation education that complements Kentucky's core curriculum. In addition, the program also facilitates professional development workshops for teachers, as well as hands-on kits, equipment and resources for teachers to use in the classrooms.

Money Tips for College Students

Repaying student loans

If you finished college in May and have student loans, it's almost time to begin repaying them. These tips from the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA) may help.

One of the smartest things you can do is pay more than your scheduled payment amount. The extra is applied to the principal, so you will pay less interest over the life of your loan.

As a student loan borrower, you should let your lender know if you change your name, address or phone number; if something changes your status, such as going back to school; or if you have problems making your payments.

You have several repayment plans from which to choose. The standard repayment plan calls for equal monthly payments over 10 years. The minimum monthly payment is usually \$50. Other options include:

•Graduated repayment, which starts with lower repayment amounts that get higher over the maximum 10-year period.

•Income-sensitive repayment, with monthly payments based on gross in-

•Income-based repaywith monthly amounts based on income and family size. The maximum period is 25 years, with any balance remaining at the end of 25 years for-

•Extended repayment, which lets you take up to 25 years to repay your student loans if you borrowed more than \$30,000 and none of your loans were made before October 7, 1998.

You will pay more interest over the life of the loan if you use any option other than standard repayment.

If you are having trouble making payments, contact your lender immediately. You may qualify for a deferment or forbearance, which can let you make lower payments or stop making payments tempo-


