

Several cases resolved in circuit court

Eddy F. Montgomery, Commonwealth Attorney for Rockcastle, Lincoln and Pulaski Counties, announced today that numerous cases were resolved during the month of September.

According to Jeremy A. Bartley, Assistant Commonwealth Attorney who handled the cases in court, the following were resolved in Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette's Division 2 on September 9th.

William Brandon Cromer, 22, Berea, had his probation revoked on underlying charges Burglary. A ten year sentence was imposed by the court.

Larry Woodall, 38, Brodhead, was on probation for trafficking in controlled substances, his probation was revoked and a 15 year

A Mt. Vernon man has been charged with assault and robbery of another Mt. Vernon man in an incident that occurred Sunday evening.

Rockcastle 911 received a call Sunday night that a man had been beaten in his home. According to police, Lewis Calvin Denny had been assaulted at his property on Cox Lane in Mt. Vernon. Denny was injured to the point of being taken to Rockcastle Regional and then later being transferred to the University of Kentucky hospital. Denny identified his assailant as Carl Eugene Ruppe, Jr., 32, of Mt. Vernon.

Rupp was arrested later Sunday evening after a complaint that a man was passed out on the lawn at Valley View Apartments. When Mt. Vernon Police Officer Adam Stallsworth arrived at the apartments, he found Ruppe and arrested him and charged him with alcohol intoxication, resisting arrest, menacing, and possession of drug paraphenalia and marijuana.

the trail has been open and it is an unusual take on conventional Halloween spooks.


You will see scary Bible stories depicted throughout the trail, with a grand finale worthy of Heaven (without giving too much away).

Sound familiar? How long has it been? My guess is "a long, long time."

Recently while cleaning out a storage building, I came across several children's books that took me back to a very comfy place. Many were stories that my mother (Bee) read to me when I was a very small child. At that time, she and I were living in a small house on my grandfather's mountain-top farm in Rockcastle County. Some of the books were from the Childcraft series that was originally published in 1931.

I have such fond memories of Bee building a warm fire in the big old Warm Morning stove in our living room, pulling her blue, double seat, rocking chair up close to the stove, and letting me sit by her side as she read my favorite stories.

While listening to her read to me, I took turns looking at the illustrations on the pages of the books and watching the flames flicker in the door of the big stove. There was a tremendous feeling of comfort as I sat very still listening with rapt attention to the poems, stories, and fairy tales found in those well-worn books. Her inflections painted mental images of the characters and locations that the books described - an often illustrated. I firmly believe that her dedication to reading to me provided the foundation of my storytelling abilities today. Depending upon Bee's mood, it was she who usually chose the reading material on any given night. Before we began, she made sure that I had my bath and was ready for bed because she knew very well that after reading a few of the stories, I would gently fall asleep.

Over the river and through the wood


Oh, how the wind does blow!







Rockcastle youth deserve a new sports complex...

Dear Editor,

I don't play baseball, football, soccer, golf, or many other sports. I do, however, enjoy canoeing. And, by one of my brother's standards, I am also a very poor fisherman. Never mind, I still I enjoy it. Last week's Signal's letters were chock full of reasons given by some citizens who don't believe Rockcastle County's youth deserve a new sports and wellness complex, and that the county government has no right to use public funds for such purpose. I disagree with them completely.

First, if we, as a fiscal court, fail to act when we have funds available for such purposes, future generations will go without these facilities, and those families will be traveling to other communities outside Rockcastle County to take their children to enjoy another community's sports fields, swim, spend money at another community's restaurants, and fill up their tanks while there. All this to the detriment of Rockcastle's local economy. Now, back to the things I

don't do. Whenever I travel to other counties – especially in the mountain counties – I notice what fiscal courts have done and are doing: constructing access points to their rivers for canoeists and boaters; constructing sports fields; building centers for cultural activities. And just because I don't personally play soccer, football, golf, or other sports doesn't mean that I should be fighting these things that will benefit our county's future families. Not everyone does everything. I do, however, like to have a choice and the choice should be mine to make. I don't begrudge the golfers, baseball players, or soccer players and I certainly don't begrudge my taxes doing their work by supporting these activities; and I don't think those who play these sports have a deep resentment for my canoeing and hiking ac-

tivities. There is no right and no wrong here – just results. While one action builds, a failure to act gives us nothing more than that which we now have – and some are satisfied with that. I'm not. Respectfully, Buzz Carloftis County Judge-Executive

At the presentation country club member Richard Bray pushed buying it, claiming "The Cedar Rapids Recreation Center and select neighboring properties [\$1,300,275 for 325 acres] is the only property being reviewed that will pay for itself" and calling it a "most precious property."

When question, Mr. Bray denied that the Signal previously discussed it going broke.

The record shows otherwise.

The country club took out a mortgage for just over \$300,000 about 4 years ago. More recently, it has needed multiple additional loans totaling over \$30,000. And a Signal ad (11.18.10, p.A4, also 9.16.10) discussed "the potential of foreclosure" and "sale of the property to the members and possibly any others."

Numerous people on the task force also appear to be country club members with a direct financial interest (so far the task force has refused requests for a list of its members).

More egregiously the task force is suggesting taxpayers buy property from a task force member, Doug Hamm (\$100,000 for 20 acres).

Compare this \$5000/acre to the \$1558/acre obtained at an auction last week..

At the task force presentation Mr. Hamm stated that "1000" people were on 1 acre of land for local soccer games.

I will leave the reader to judge this statement's accuracy.

The conflict of interest in all this seems apparent to everyone but the task force.

The county ethics policy forbids a person "serving the county government" from acting in matters in which he "has a direct or indirect financial or personal involvement."

(Good luck getting this enforced!)

The task force repeatedly claimed that the rec center would have something for everyone.

They are right.

They'll be a big bailout for the country club elite. And a big bill and the <u>USDA NRCS in KY announces</u> 2012 Farm Bill Program

Fiscal Year 2012 is underway and conservation Farm Bill programs are in effect.

The USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) in Kentucky is encouraging landowners, farmers and producers to visit their local NRCS office now to receive more information and apply for conservation technical assistance and possible financial funding opportunities. The application process for 2008 Farm Bill conservation programs is continuous, but funding selections are made at specific times throughout the year. The Kentucky NRCS application ranking cutoff date for consideration for 2012 funds in this sign up period is November 15, 2011.

Financial assistance is available to eligible applicants for the following Farm Bill programs:

The Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) is a conservation program that provides financial and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers who face threats to soil, water, air, and related natural resources on their land. Through EQIP, NRCS develops contracts with agricultural producers to voluntarily implement conservation practices. Persons engaged in livestock or agricultural production and owners of non-industrial private forestland are eligible for this program. Eligible land includes cropland, rangeland, pastureland, private non-industrial forestland, and other farm or ranch lands.

The Mississippi River Basin Watershed Initiative (MRBI) was developed in 2009 with a goal of reducing, mitigating and controlling nutrient levels in surface waters and reducing the severity of the gulf hypoxia crisis. In conjunction with multiple partners, including state agencies, conservation districts, environmental groups, and farming interests, NRCS Kentucky proposed three focus watersheds with boundaries entirely in Kentucky: Licking River, Lower Green River and the Bayou de Chien-Mayfield Creek. Eligible land within specific subwatersheds of the focus areas can take advantage of financial and technical assistance to develop contracts, which address resource concerns within the focus areas. Please contact your local field office to determine land eligibility.

The Wildlife Habitat Incentive Program (WHIP) is a voluntary program for developing or improving high quality habitat that supports fish and wildlife populations of National, State, Tribal, and local significance. Through WHIP, the NRCS provides technical and financial assistance to eligible private and Tribal landowners for the development of upland, wetland, aquatic, and other types of wildlife habitat.

"We're urging producers to get their applications in as soon as possible to be considered for this year's funding" said Karen Woodrich Kentucky NRCS State Conservationist.

All recipients of assistance are required to develop a Conservation Plan. Conservation planning is an integral part of the conservation process. Landowners should work with a conservation planner to develop the plan based on the landowner's operational goals to improve the productivity, sustainability and profitability of their opera-

tion. The Conservation Plan will serve as a roadmap to a variety of technical assistance and financial assistance through EQIP and WHIP, as well as other options available to the landowner. "We're getting back to our roots with conservation planning," says Woodrich. "Conservation planning is the vital first step in understanding natural resources on your land, and also understanding how technical and financial conservation assistance can be incorporated into your operation to help you help the land." She said "Now is the time to contact your local NRCS Field Office to develop a conservation plan"

If you are interested in participating Farm Bill conservation programs, you should sign-up as soon as possible and request a conservation plan. For more information, contact Randall Templeman, NRCS district conservationist at (606)256-2525 Ext.3.

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
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
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The Marching Rockets are rolling

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



Rockets win in OT; beat Russell Co. 29-27

It was a Class 4A top ten match-up between #4 Rockcastle County and #6 Russell County on homecoming night at Mt. Vernon and the game lived up to the hype. Both teams were 6-0 but it would be the Rockets who would have to survive six turnovers and a failed two point conversion in overtime to hang on for a 29-27 district win.

Things got rolling for the Rockets as they took advantage of a Laker fumble and put together a 5 play 38 yard drive that ended with a Chris Luna 14 yard touchdown. It was 7-0 with 8:14 left in the first. Luna would lead the Rockets in rushing on the night with 117 yards 23 carries.

After the teams traded possessions, Rockcastle's Corey McPhetridge, who was 9 of 14 for 134 yards, hit Zach Reams on a 58 yard pass play that set up a 6 yard touchdown run by BB Bradley and the Rock was in control at 14-0 with 10:18 left in the second. Reams would have 5 receptions in the game for 128 yards.

Russell County responded on their next possession as Barton Mann found Blake Ellis for a 76 yard touchdown pass, and the Lakers closed the gap to 14-7 going into the break. But for the most part, the Rock D held the high powered Russell County offense, which had been chewing up over 350 yards per game, to only 144 yards of total offense.

"Our defense took them completely out of their running game and then put enough pressure on the quarterback to force bad decisions. Big hits in the secondary made them leery about catching the ball. When we come out aggressive and excited like we did it makes it tough on offenses," Parkey said.

Things started out badly for the Rock in the third as the Laker's Lucas Witten snatched a Rockcastle fumble out of the air and returned it 18 yards to tie the

game at 14. The Rockets reclaimed the lead with an impressive 9 play 85 yard drive that was capped off by a 5 yard naked bootleg by McPhetridge that gave the Rockets a 21-14 lead with 3:02 left in the third.

But the Lakers would not go away and, taking advantage of another Rockcastle turnover, and Nick Britt ,mwho was held to a meager 22 yards rushing, scored from two yards out to again tie the game at 21 with 5:58 left in regulation. Britt had been one of the leading rushers in the state. The Lakers had a chance to win the game with 8 seconds left but their 53 yard field goal was blocked.

The turnovers were definitely a concern for Parkey. "Turnovers keep us from scoring and when they lead to points for the opponent then it is a recipe for disaster. Fortunately, our defense was able to stop them from turning each of our turnovers into points."


The Rockets got the ball first in overtime and wasted no time scoring as BB Bradley scored from the 10 and then in a gutsy call by Coach Scott Parkey the Rockets went for two and Bradley got the call and the conversion. Bradley would have 14 carries for 64 yards. Parkey gave a lot of credit to his line, "The line did a great job of again moving the line of scrimmage and creating holes for our backs.


Parkey did not waiver on his decision to go for two although conventional wisdom says you play for the tie at home and go for the win on the road. "I felt confident our offense would score. They had rarely stopped us for under three yards all night, I saw the look in our guys' eyes, they just refused to lose."

Russell County would respond in their half of the overtime period and scored on third down but their two point conversion pass failed and the Rockets improved to 7-0 overall and 1-0 in the district. Russell County dropped to 6-1 and 0-1 in the district.

The Rockets will be idle this week and will use the extra time to prepare for their next opponent, Knox Central on the road. The game could decide the district title and home field for at least the first two play-off games.

Clark Rowe, who has been out of the lineup for the last two weeks, because of an injury, could make his reappearance against the Panthers but as of press time was still questionable.






Freshman Sam Pensol shot an 83 during regional play at Crooked Creek Golf Club.

First in a series of articles Task Force make-up was varied, diverse, committed

The proposal of a new Recreation and Wellness Complex has created quite a stir in Rockcastle County over the last couple of weeks. Many comments have been by concerned citizens in this county. Some were for the proposed complex and some were opposed. The one thing that was common among most everyone was that they did not always have all of the facts to help them decide one way or the other. Over the next 5-6 weeks I will try to lay the facts out about the proposed Complex to the best of my ability and allow you to make your decision of whether to support this effort or oppose it. This process is what makes our country the greatest country in the world.

This week I want to ad-

dress some basic facts about the Recreation and Wellness Task Force and some basic information about our Proposal. Some citizens seem to think that the Task Force was made up of Judge Carloftis' troops or his "yes men." Judge Carloftis asked Aaron Anderkin, at the time the RCIDA Executive Director at the time, to create this task force in April of 2010. Many people were invited to the initial meeting. Some came and some chose not to serve on this task force. Over time the Task Force has stabilized to about 6-10 people. I was not one of the original people asked to attend the April meeting. I had been working on this same project with a few other individuals prior to this task force being created. I approached Buzz the day after the initial meeting with my ideas and he invited me to join the group. Buzz and I had never spoken prior to that day.

This Task Force is made up of individuals who represent a cross section of this county. It is made up of men, women, young and older. It is made up with people who have diverse family backgrounds, diverse educational backgrounds and people with a variety of interests. Each individual has brought a unique perspective to each and every meeting that they have attended.

The original charge of the Task Force was to determine the Recreation and Wellness needs of Rockcastle County for the next 20-30 years.

One person's idea was that we did not need a large complex but smaller parks throughout the county. Judge Carloftis proposed this in the very first meeting but the Task Force quickly and unanimously decided that the most urgent need in the county was for a comprehensive Recre-

the county. This does not mean that in the future our park system will not include more small parks throughout the county. You have to understand a concept called "economies of scale". It would be impossible to build an indoor wellness center in every community. It would not make sense to build baseball fields in each little community. The maintenance cost would not be feasible and the fields would be underutilized. It was also stated that we should build additional fields on land already donated. This would only complicate the current family situation worse. Parents that have three or more children are already being forced to choose which child is more important because they cannot be in three places at once. If we build fields in a fourth or fifth location then we will have gone from bad to worse. We want a parent to be able to watch all of their children play their games at the same location. No parent should have to choose between one child or the other.



It was stated, at the presentation in September, that we should spend our money on road signs and other things to make our roads safe instead of on the proposed Complex. Maybe if our children had something constructive to do they might stop stealing the road signs that have already been installed and the county would not have to pay to have over 300 signs replaced that have been stolen.

It was also stated that we should utilize the Daniel Boone National Forest for recreation and I fully agree. Many of the activities that this task force has addressed cannot be done in the Daniel Boone National Forest. They have no baseball or football facilities. A senior that has had knee replacement cannot go there in the winter to rehab their knee. Friday night movies could not be held there. Many of our citizens have health issues that will not allow them to spend time in the woods. Many people only look at their needs and desires and do not look at the needs of others.







Hispanic and Women Farmers Can Seek Compensation to Resolve Discrimination

If you are a female farmer or rancher or a Hispanic farmer or rancher and you believe that the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) improperly denied farm loan benefits to you for certain time periods between 1981 and 2000 because of your gender or race, you may be eligible to apply for compensation.

Potential claimants can register to receive a claims package by calling the Farmer and Rancher Call Center at 1-888-508-4429 or by visiting web address www.farmerclaims.gov.

Claimants have until August 25, 2011 to register to receive a claims package. FSA provides assistance for livestock losses deadline Livestock producers who incur eligible livestock

death losses due to the recent extreme temperatures and other adverse weather events may be eligible for the USDA Farm Service Agency's Livestock Indemnity Program (LIP). LIP provides assistance to livestock owners and contract growers for death losses in excess of normal mortality due to adverse weather, including losses due to hurricanes, floods, blizzards, disease, wildfires, extreme heat and extreme cold.

Producers who suffer livestock losses in 2011 have 30 days after the livestock loss become apparent to file a notice of loss to FSA or no later than December 29, 2011.

Producers must provide the following:

•Beginning inventory of livestock must be submitted when the first LIP application is filed

•Proof of death

•Rendering truck receipts or certificates •Veterinary records or a picture of the dead animal

•Including the date of death and documentation for cause of death

•Third party certification provided by a person who is not affiliated with the farming operations who can verify the beginning and ending inventory livestock records.

•Documentation must provide sufficient data that identifies: kind/type/weight range of livestock and number of livestock

Dead animal disposal cost sharing

In conjunction with the LIP program the Rockcastle County Conservation District is offering cost share for the proper burial of deceased livestock. The Rockcastle County Conservation District will pay 75% of the total cost of the burial not to exceed \$250.00 when the burial is performed according to all eligible requirements established by KRS.

Judges participate in penal code reform program

In a joint meeting, Kentucky's justices, judges and circuit court clerks recently gathered for a full day of education on House Bill 463, which implemented sweeping penal code reform when it went into effect June 8, 2011. Chief Justice of Kentucky John D. Minton Jr. invited all of the elected officials in the Kentucky Court of Justice to the education program provided by the Administrative Office of the Courts.

Judges Jeffrey Burdette, Jeff Lawless and Katie Wood, who serves Lincoln, Pulaski and Rockcastle Counties, participated in the program Aug. 19 in Lexing-

HB 463 sets out the most concentrated overhaul of Kentucky's penal code in more than 30 years and was supported by all three branches of government. The legislation is designed to curb the cost of incarceration without compromising public safety.

"It can be challenging to overhaul processes that have been in place for years," Chief Justice Minton said. "The comprehensive education program offered justices, judges and circuit court clerks an important opportunity to learn more about the changes with House Bill 463 as well as ask questions and express

concerns, share their early experiences with the bill and seek clarity on various aspects of the new legislation.

"I believe we can all agree that the court system is crucial to the successful implementation of this bill. Just as the passage of this bill called for a multibranch, bipartisan effort, its implementation also calls for collaboration. We must work together within the court system and with the other branches of government to make the initial changes required by HB 463."

The education program included an overview of HB 463 presented by Chief Justice Minton, Sen. Tom Jensen, Rep. John Tilley and AOC personnel. Sen. Jensen and Rep. Tilley co-chair the Task Force on the Penal Code and Controlled Substances Act that recommended the changes in HB 463. Chief Justice Minton is a member of the task force.

Among the topics the program covered were HB 463 changes regarding bonds, fines, pretrial release and offenses involving controlled substances. The training also addressed risk and needs assessments for pretrial defendants and new procedures under the legislation.

The comprehensive education program was one of three trainings on HB 463.


tucky for the 2011-2012 school year. The contracts are worth up to \$1,500 each.

PRIDE was founded in 1997 by Congressman Hal Rogers and Kentucky Natural Resources Secretary James E. Bickford to promote "Personal Responsibility In a Desirable Environment" in 38 counties of southern and eastern Kentucky.



Yards to Paradise

Critters Thrive in Homemade Ecosystems

Songbirds have always been welcome in yards and gardens. People put out houses with hopes of getting some feathered tennants to move in. Now retailers carry more kinds of bird feed than dog food.

Some garden centers are stocking bee boxes, butterfly houses, even bat houses.

And why wouldn't we attract butterflies, bees, spiders, ladybugs, and so many other creatures? After all, as we plant more wildlife habitat and quit spraying weed

killer on the hedgerows, as we go for less grass to mow and more eco-friendly yards, critters of varying descriptions will like our yards and consider them super places to call home and raise their families.

You don't necessarily need to put out birdhouses or toad abodes, but as you grow a more divergent number of plants and shrubs, all sorts of wildlife will be attracted to your place.


We may love birds, frogs, and butterflies. Some love squirrels and chipmunks (but not the folks whose

pond liner got a hole in it burrowing thanks to chipmonks).

We may think we dislike spiders and snakes, mice and bats. But do you have any idea how many mice a snakes eats? Or how many flies a frog or spider catches? And bats have been known to eat 1,000 mosquitoes per hour while flittering around in the evening!

So if you like having some birds and other "good" critters in your yard, please understand they may need some other critters to prey on in order to have a balanced diet. (For instance, as mankind can't live by bread alone, so a bird needs a few bugs and worms, plus some drinking water, to have a healthy balanced diet to go with the "birdseed".) So be willing to accept a few less desirable critters if you want birds and other wildlife to call your yard home.

Those caterpillars on your willow, birch or spicebush-the ones you're buying spray for at Lowe's so vou can kill them this weekend-those are the babies of the beautiful butterflies you've attracted to your yard with the coneflowers and butterfly bushes. If this describes the duplicious treatment the butterfly family receives at your place, I hope you'll re-think your actions. Do you feed wildlife to help them, or to selfishly lure them close for your personal entertainment? Raccoons, opossums, deer, even bears, sometimes will visit a natural looking landscape. It's reassuring though to realize most wildlife is "wild" and not aggressive. Indeed they are afraid of the giant people who live in the big house in their vard.






