# Fiscal Court/RFA named in lawsuit

A verified complaint has been filed in Rockcastle Circuit Court by Michael Kentucky Employee Retire-Sheliga of Mt. Vernon ments System standards, against the Rockcastle County Fiscal Court and Rockcastle County Recreation and Wellness Task

The suit contends that there were "willful violations of open records and open meetings, violations of closure of public roads," by the court and task force.

In the suit, Sheliga alleges that the court ignored his requests for records concerning the purchase of the Jones Building and the

Northside Inn (lot on Richmond Street) by the Rockcastle County Industrial Development Authority. It also alleges that open records and open meeting requests to the task force have been denied by Hopkins who claims that the task force is "not affiliated with a public entity and

therefore does not fall nder the open records law."

The suit also charges that open records requests to Carloftis concerning the full time status of magistrates under the Kentucky Retirement System have not been forthcoming and that the county/judge executive

# **CRRC** decision was disappointing

County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis voiced his disappointment last Tuesday when the proposal to buy Cedar Rapids Recreation Center went down to defeat.

We, too, were disappointed. Although, we conservatives, always insist (usually with little results) on good stewardship of our tax money, there was no excuse to pass up the purchase of an asset such as the recreation center at the bargain price at which it was avail-

As one participant in the meeting pointed out, the infrastructure on the site alone is worth more than the purchase price, not counting the 128 acres of prime land.

Granted, there is not sufficient land for the ballfields, soccer fields, football fields so desperately needed. But, as one magistrate succintly put it, "We can always plow up the golf course and have plenty of

room (for ballfields, etc).'

That is true. However, with the placing of strategic roads, there is land available, leaving the golf course intact, to build some ball fields and the health/ wellness complex.


"Penny-Wise and Pound Foolish" is the phrase that comes to mind over the court's action. We understand that there is an unfavorable connotation by some in the county as to the "country club." However, this attitude should not keep the court from making a decision that would add greatly to the recreation facilities available to the citi-


But, the issue is apparently moot and we will just have to wait and see what happens to the property and hope for the best since there is certainly no planning in place that would help control to what use the property

Cats in the Woods

Last Saturday my wife and I decided to spend the afternoon in our woods so we could build a campfire and enjoy the sights, sounds, and smell of a glorious autumn day. We filled a small cooler and headed up the six miles from our home to our campground, located in a patch of woods that we have borrowed from the Lord for the past twenty years. Three couples who are close friends decided to join us, and we had an afternoon that was amazing. Each couple brought their own food, so we just piled everything on a picnic table and made a smorgasbord of delights for the afternoon and evening.

Every time I spend time in my woods. I am reminded of the years and years that I played, walked, and picnicked in the woods near my grandparents' home in Rockcastle County. Because both of the areas are located in mountain-top environments, I often recall things that happened when I was just a boy which relate those memories to my experiences today. The basic difference between then and now is the people we share our time

When I was a small child, my mother (Bee), and my grandparents (Pop and Mommie Katie), and I spent many hours sitting on our front porch during the summer and autumn months gazing at the changing leaves and listening to the animals that lived in that area. We especially did this during the evening.

On many occasions, we could hear wild cats screaming from the forest below our house. Pop used to say, "David Joe, do you hear that cat screaming?" I would reply that I did; he then would add, "Those are black painters (panthers), and you will never see one in the daylight." When I got older I was taught that there are no panthers in the state of Kentucky, so I began to doubt heard.

A few weeks ago, while we were vacationing on the Blue Ridge Parkway, Kathy purchased a book which is entitled, Black Panthers in the Appalachian Mountains. It tells of countless numbers of panther sightings in Virginia, West Virginia, Tennessee, and Kentucky. Kathy actually saw a relatively large black cat with a long tail sail across the road on Furnace Mountain one evening just a little past dusk. That was several years ago. She now maintains that such cats do exist in the area where we live, although she had not really believed it until then—in spite of local stories to that effect. I am not one to doubt her word, so I am convinced that she did

actually see such a feline. Now back to last Satur-

day. Late in the afternoon, all of the guys, along with a couple of teenagers, decided to take a hike along the limestone cliff that forms the back boundary of our property. As we casually strolled near the 100-foot cliff, one of the men asked if I had actually heard or seen any wild cats in these woods. I told the following story. Several years ago, Kathy

and I were sitting around a fire very late one February evening when we heard something walking, slowing crunching the leaves on the forest floor. I carefully placed my hand on my Smith and Wesson revolver and picked up my flashlight in order to get a glimpse of what was there. About 50-75 feet away stood a Kentucky bobcat. He paused to gaze at us for a long moment and then ever so casually walked back into the woods. Later that evening, we could hear him screaming near the back left area of our property. So my answer to the gentleman was, yes, I have seen and heard cats in these woods.

When we reached the area of the back cliff that we have always called "Wildcat Point" (because we have seen evidence of cats there), he asked again, "Where do you think the cat's den is located?" I walked to a spot where I have seen bones, fur, and feathers over the past several years, pointed, and explained, "If you climb down on your hands and knees, you will see a small cave that I believe is a cat's

The young man decided to see for himself and began a careful crawl toward the small opening in the rock. It did not take long until he came scampering back to the top of the cliff line wideeyed and exclaiming, "I crawled back to the cave opening and saw a black cat with bright yellow eyes looking straight at me!" It was quite obvious from the look in his eyes that he was extremely nervous and excited; you could tell the adrenalin was really pump-

The men pondered the sighting and discussed the possibilities of what he had actually seen. Most thought it was a bobcat, but I am convinced that he witnessed a black panther like Pop had described over fifty years

#### Judge clarifies statements made...

Short and to the point: At no time did I ask the fiscal court to consider only the purchase of Cedar Rapids (128 acres) pool and golf course as a recreation center. This would be only one part of the recreational complex. Baseball fields, etc., would be incorporated into the complex on other property. I explained this to the magistrates prior to their vote, and the reason for the vote last week on Cedar Rapids was simple: a time frame working with the

Should there be a recreational complex built in Rockcastle County, state law permits the entire system to be managed by a completely new and separate Parks and Recreational Authority Board who would serve at the pleasure of the fiscal court and without receiving any pay for their

The Roots of Rockcastle by: Tonya J. Cook

A Little of Rockcastle Goes a Long Way

Much to my surprise, I've learned that Rockcastle County has been a major supplier of rock to the local road systems that have been built in the last thirty to forty years. It has also fulfilled the needs of power companies in states to the south, as well. At one time, in years past, the mining of rock was a major industry here in the county, and one quarry is

still in existence. A quarry within the city limits of Mount Vernon has been in existence since 1908, according to Mike Hansel of Hanson Aggregates, and the quarry site has been through several different owners. The quarry employs about twenty or more people at present, and is currently owned by Heidelberg Cement Company of Heidelberg, Germany. They bought it approximately five years ago, although the name has remained the "Beazer" was the name of a housebuilder in Bath, England, who owned the quarry for a time. In recent years, it has been known as the Kentucky Stone Company as well as the present, Hanson. Hanson also owns several quarries, as well as pipeline factories.

At one time, in the early 1900s and in the years to follow, stone was a major export of Rockastle County. Tons of stone were transported out of the county on the L&N Railroad. At that time, there was a large stone mining operation at Mullins Station. It closed at about

About halfway up Burr Hill is an old abandoned quarry. It is what was the Sparks operation. They supplied rock for the paving of several miles of I-75 in the area and for the Daniel Boone Parkway, beginning at London and proceeding

through Eastern Kentucky. These projects were in the late 1960s and the early 1970s. Mike Hansel remembers, in 1967, when I-75 had reached south to Wildie, there was an on and off ramp

Other than the road system, the Hanson quarry supplied rock for the needs of power plants as far away as Atlanta, Georgia, those in the state of North Carolina, and others. All of this rock was produced here in the

According to office manager, Peggy Robbins, who has been with the quarry for thirty-three years, the rock is transported by train to these destinations. About once or twice a week, approximately sixty-seven hundred tons of Rockcastle is hauled away by the railroad system, in as many as sixty railroad cars at a time. This has been the case for at least two years. These cars come through on the tracks located in downtown Mount Vernon, usually at night or on the weekend. Before that, the rock was primarily transported by truck. She as seen a lot of changes in those thirty-three years, especially in the weighing process. As most everything else, it has been given over to the technology of the computer. Things have gotten easier in the quarry industry, when you consider there are retired employees here in the county who can remember using wheelbarrows on the job.

Our local quarries have supplied the area with many jobs through the years, and boosted the local economy. They have also supplied quite a bit of the country

### **Burchett gets SMART DOD** scholarship

Yancee Burchett, WKU junior from Brodhead, has been awarded a 2011 Science, Mathematics & Research for Transformation (SMART) Scholarship from the Department of Defense.

The SMART Scholarship for Service program supports students who demonstrate outstanding ability and special aptitude in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). The program aims to increase the number of civilian scientists and engineers working in Department of Defense laboratories.

Burchett, the son of Benny and Sharon Burchett, will graduate in May 2012 with a mechanical engineering major and a minor in mathematics.

"Yancee possess the best attributes that we value in a mechanical engineer. He is an outstanding student academically, but equally important he has embraced the project-based curriculum that we believe truly makes an exceptional engineer," said Dr. Kevin Schmaltz of the Department of Engineering.

The award is one of the most prestigious and lucrative awards available for undergraduate students in the STEM disciplines. As SMART Scholar, Burchett will receive a scholarship from the Department of Defense that will cover his full tuition and education-related fees, an annual stipend of \$25,000, paid summer internship opportunities, a health insurance reimbursement, a book allowance of \$1,000 per aca-





demic year, professional mentoring and employment placement after graduation.

In exchange for the scholarship, Burchett is obligated to fulfill a service requirement for the Department of Defense after he graduates from WKU. For his service requirement, Burchett will spend at lease a year working at the Air Force Materiel Command, part of the Oklahoma City Air Logistics Center at Tinker Air Force Base.

"For years I've dreamed of working on airplanes and for this dream to actually come true is truly incredible," Burchett said. "Looking into the future, my main career objective is to become involved with the development of ultraefficient aircraft propulsion systems."

The SMART Program is administered by the American Society for Engineering Education, the Naval Postgraduate School and is part of the National Defense Education Network. The program primarily targets what it calls "handson-the-bench" researchers and engineers. The scholarship is extremely competitive; scholarship officials anticipated that this past fall 4,000 students from across the country applied for approximately 300 scholarships.





# **Bible Talk**

In our study this month we would like to reflect on the work of the church designated by God.

Evangelism - The word evangelism carries the idea of preaching the good news, spreading the gospel. In 1Thess.1:8, "For from you sounded out the word of the Lord not only in Macedonia and Achaia, but also in every place your faith to God-ward is spread abroad; so that we need not to speak any thing." The phrase "sounded out" conveys the idea of trumpeting forth the word of God. This is what evangelism is all about. Paul spoke about the Philippian church supporting him in the work of spreading the gospel,"Now ye Philippians know also, that in the beginning of the gospel, when I departed from Macedonia, no church communicated with me as concerning giving and receiving, but ye only. For even in Thessalonica ye sent once and again unto my necessity." 4:15-16. Each church is to spread the gospel according to its ability.

Edification - In Eph.4:16 we read, "From whom the whole body fitly joined together and compacted by that which every joint supplieth, according to the effectual working in the measure of every part, maketh increase of the body unto the edifying of itself in love." The word, edify, means to build up. Building up takes a lot of time, patience, skill and love to accomplish. Anybody can tear down a building. The church is to teach and instruct the saved in all the ways of the Lord. Matt.28:20, "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen." For example, when the saints assemble for worship, or when classes are provided to teach and instruct in apostolic doctrine, or when discipline is carried out upon a wayward saint, or when bulletins are passed out. All these things are part of the work of edification of the saints.

Benevolence to Needy Saints - This is the third work that the church is to be engaged in as prescribed of God. In Acts 11:28-30, "And there stood up one of them named Agabus, and signified by the Spirit that there should be great dearth throughout all the world: which came to pass in the days of Claudius Caesar. Then the disciples, every man according to his ability, determined to send relief unto the brethren which dwelt in Judaea: Which also they did, and sent it to the elders by the hands of Barnabas and Saul." # Rockets lose 28-12 to Montgomery Co.

Coach Scott Parkey emphasized limiting mistakes and playing fundamental football as the Rockets, who were missing six starters, traveled to Montgomery County for the season finale last Friday night. Besides the loss of six starters, lots of mental mistake penalties and losing the turnover battle translated into a 28-12 loss to the class 5A Montgomery County Indians

Rockcastle got on the board first with a three yard touchdown run by B.B. Bradley with 10:38 left in the second quarter that capped an 84 yard drive. The extra point was missed and the Rockets led 6-0. A Rockcastle fumble led to a Mongomery County touchdown and the Indians went ahead with the point after, 7-6 with 6:38 left in the second.

But the Rockets would respond on their next possession by converting on a fourth and nine from the Indian 30 yard line on a Corey McPhetridge pass to Boone Saylor that covered 23 yards. That play set up an-

other Bradley rushing touchdown from two yards out to give the Rockets a 12-7 advantage just before halftime

Another Rocket fumble late in the third set the stage for another Mongtomery score and the Indians took back the lead for good at 14-12 with 3:52 left in the third. The Indians would go to the air for two more touchdowns to seal the 28-12 victory. The Rockets dropped to 8-2 as the Indians finished 5-5 on the regular season.

Offensively for the Rockets, Bradley led the team in rushing with 143 yards on 23 carries and two touchdowns.

McPhetridgewas 7 of 22 for 96 yards and two interceptions. Chris Luna and Saylor led the receiving corp with three receptions each for 48 yards.

The Rockets were led defensively by Bradley who had seven solo tackles and 14 total and one quarterback sack. Tommy Shafer led the team in sacks with 1.5.

Next for the Rockets will be first round play-off opponent Marion County who will bring their 3-7 record to the Rock this Friday night. The Knights finished fourth in their district. Rockcastle finshed first in their district and has earned the home field advantage for at least the first two playoff games, providing of course that they advance past Marion County.



# RCHS freshman girls' cross country team finishes as runner-up at Meet of Champions

The KTCCCA Meet of Champions was held this past weekend at Masterson Station Park in Lexington. Thousands of athletes and spectators from across the state were on hand for the annual competition. The meet served as the state championships for several different age groups of runners including 4th grade and under, 6th grade and under, middle school, and high school which featured a state championship race for each grade level.

All of the high school 5,000-meter races were shortened somewhat due to a mistake in the course route resulting in each race being around 2.95 miles rather than the standard 3.1. As a result, all the times for the high school races were slightly faster than they should have been.

RCHS junior Bryonna Cromer participated in the junior state championship race and came through with a career best performance. Bryonna finished 7th overall with a great effort of 21:28.9.

The RCHS freshman girls' team had an awesome team performance and narrowly missed the state championship win. Lexington Sayre won the team title, defeating RCHS by only 3 points. Freshman from 29 different high school teams competed in the race. Since most teams don't have many freshman competitors, only the top three were counted towards team scores.

Rakhi Patel had a spectacular performance and led RCHS with a 8th place finish in a personal best time

of 20:32.37. Rachel Cain also came through with an amazing race, finishing 12th overall with a personal best time of 20:56.34. Alyssa Cox was very close behind with an awesome performance as well. She finished 14th overall in a personal best 21:12.18. 8th grader Amber Collins also ran the freshman race to get in her 4th meet of the season in order to qualify for regional competition. Amber continues to improve and finished an impressive 17th overall in a great time season's best time of 22:00. Samantha Bustle had a great race and finished 21st overall with a solid performance of 22:40.

In the middle school state championship race, 320 girls competed making it very difficult to move up in the race due to the narrow course and the vast amount of competitors trying to navigate it. RCMS 7th grader Sierra Mercer led the way for RCMS over the 2.4-mile course with a 129th place finish in an impressive

time of 18:09.1. 7th grader Lanna Prewitt finished 195th overall with a great time of 19:21.2. 8th grader Tori Phillips placed 280th overall with a great effort of 21:29.05.

The girls' 6th grade and under state championship race featured 360 competi-



Not to say this isn't an important election however, as voters will be choosing our state leaders for the next four years. Incumbent Democratic Governor Steve Beshear will be seeking reelection against two foes. Republican Senate President David Williams and Independent Lexington lawyer Gaitwood Galbraith.

Beshear has touted his fiscal responsibility, job creation and investment in Kentucky's education future as his main campaign stumps. While Williams states that he wants to improve the economy and create jobs, cut the size and cost of government and protect conservative family values. Galbraith's priority, should he be elected is "trust and integrity in the political process, leading to jobs, education and prosperity."

The two candidates for Secretary of State are Democrat Allison Lundergan Grimes and Republican Bill Johnson. Current Secretary of State Elaine Walker lost the primary election to Grimes. There are also only two candidates for Attorney General, Republican Todd P'Pool and incumbent Democrat Jack Conway.

Candidates for Auditor are Republican John T. Kemper and Democrat Adam Edelen. Current Auditor Crit Luallen is not seeking re-election.

The State Treasurer position is also a three candidate race with Republican K.C. Crosbie, Democrat Todd Hollenbach and Libertarian candidate Kenneth Moellman, Jr. Hollenbach is the incumbent.

Current Commission of Agriculture Richie Farmer is the running mate of Republican gubernatorial candidate Williams, so his seat will be vacant and filled by either Republican James Comer or Democrat Bob Farmer.

"To combat recurring arson in the Green Pond Area, we will be working with local and state law enforcement officials, as well as officials from the Daniel Boone National Forest, to search for clues that could lead to suspected arsonists."

"Arson fires threaten the safety of our forest visitors and damage natural resources," said Forest Supervisor Frank Beum with the Daniel Boone National Forest. "We consider arson a serious problem, and we will work closely with our partners to fully investigate these fires.'

Over the past few years, nearly 50 arson fires have been set on private, state and federal lands in the Green Pond Ridge vicin-

Forestry officials agree that vigorous investigation is the key to catching arsonists, but community effort is needed if arson is to be eliminated.

"Everybody loses when wildland arsonists strike: families can lose their homes, firefighters are put at unnecessary risk, taxpayers foot the bill for suppressing the fires and jobs are often eliminated when the forest resource is reduced," said MacSwords.

"To bring arson to an end, we need the entire community to get in-

Kentucky, like many states, has an arson hotline so citizens can call to report forest arson. Suspected arsonists should be reported by calling the Target Arson Hotline at 1800-27-ARSON. Notifiers may remain anonymous and may be eligible for a cash reward of up to \$1,000 if the information provided leads to the arrest and indictment of an ar-

Suspected forest arson may also be reported to local law enforcement officials, the Kentucky State Police or the Kentucky Division of Forestry office in Pineville Kentucky at 606-337-3011. Helpful information in reporting suspected arson includes location of fire, descriptions of vehicles and license plate numbers, physical descriptions of individuals and any other information pertaining to illegal burning.

Forest arson, legally defined as intentionally setting fire to land owned by someone else, is a felony under state law (KRS 149.380) and is punishable by up to five years in prison and/or up to \$10,000 in fines.

For fires set on national forest lands, convicted arsonists may be fined up to \$250,000 and serve up to five years in prison (18 USC 1855). Prosecution would occur in federal court, and arsonists would likely be required to pay restitution for suppression costs and resource dam-

signed a survey response stating that all magistrates were full time employees working 100 hours per month (a necessary qualification to participate in the state retirement sys-

It also alleges that a request for the number of employees in the new industrial park was not ad-

Another part of the complaint is the closure of Lower Eagle Creek Road in the southeastern part of the county stating that an open records request for a viewers report for the closure of the upper and lower sections of the road was denied because "the county does not retain such records for that length of time."

In the suit's Cause for Action, Sheliga alleges that "the repeated, evasive misleading, misdirecting and false replies of defendants, as highlighted with the term "dang well" in the statements of fact section, are a pattern of willful violations of the open records law and plaintiff seeks costs and an amount not to exceed twenty-five dollars (\$25) per day..."

Included in the Request for Damages, is: judgment against defendants; an order releasing the open records and open meetings records, a finding that the CJE willfully violated OR and OM records; costs and up to \$25 per day, since 3 days after plaintiff's 10.7.11 OR re-request for Jones building records; costs and up to \$100 for plaintiffs OM request about RTF records; a permanent injunction ordering the CJE not to report non-full time employees to KERS; an order that the fiscal court remove the gate across lower Eagle Creek Road and an award of his (the plaintiff's) costs and expenses, including reasonable attorney's fees.

"With the newer types of metals being used in modern cars, there was a huge need for up-to-date tools to accommodate any type of rescue that may be encountered. This grant will allow the department to have those tools and will increase the safety of all residents of Rockcastle County as well as all motorists that travel through this county daily," Chief David Bales said in a news release.

With this new addition of a full set of tools as well as a smaller set of tools, MVFD will now have three separate vehicles equipped for vehicle rescue. This will greatly enhance the level of protection provided by allowing the department to be able to respond to and execute multiple vehicle rescues at multiple locations simultaneously.

"This is just one more step in this department's on-going mission of providing the best level of protection available and we will continue to focus on progress and advancement in every way possible. We are honored to serve the citizens of the City of Mount Vernon as well as Rockcastle County," Bales said.




Webb's General Store on Main Street in Livingston for over 30 years. For many Webb's was the place to buy lunch on a school day or go shopping with the family on Saturday.

# Citizens should keep long-term goals in mind

I was originally going to address the health benefits of a Recreation and Wellness complex in this week's article, but I have decided to save that for next week's topic. As many of you may have heard by now the Fiscal Court held a special called meeting yesterday to discuss the acquisition of the Cedar Rapids Country Club property.

As you could imagine it was a quite interesting meeting to say the least. The results of the meeting have also been one of the hottest topics on Facebook among other places. Yesterday's meeting really brought to the surface the real issue fac-

ing our county. This meeting was doomed from the beginning because no matter how the vote turned out many people were going to be upset. The real issue is not whether we should purchase the Country Club. It is also not whether or not we should build a Recreation and Wellness Complex. The real issue is that as a county we are willing to give up our long range goals for short term gains. Any multi-million dollar project must be planned out and researched to make sure that it fulfills the needs and goals of the project. The Fiscal Court voted yesterday against a motion to purchase the Country Club from the current owners before the October 31 deadline. The Court was told that if they did not act by October 31 at midnight the chance to buy the Country Club would go away. In fact the only thing that will happen on November 1, 2011 is that the Coun-

should realize that no one won. The people who left the meeting cursing and calling the magistrates stupid must realize that the Fiscal Court is not responsible for the Country Club's current financial situation.

There were two issues with the purchase of the Country Club. First, some magistrates voiced the concern that the Country Club was not an asset that would be utilized by a majority of the citizens of this county. This is a very real issue because only a few citizens play golf and the pool will only hold 125 people based

on current health standards. The second issue was the financial viability of the Country Club. The magistrates questioned whether the Country Club could in fact pay for itself as some people stated in the meeting. It is a very valid issue especially considering the current economic situation. The golf course is a nine hole course and public pools very rarely operate in the black. The question is if we make this purchase to get a short term gain do we jeopardize our long range goals for a Recreation and Wellness Complex for all citizens of our county? This was the question that faced the Fiscal Court yesterday. As stated in a previous article, we have lost sight of our goals and allowed this to become a fight over a golf course and a pool.

The statement was made that this vote told the citizens if a magistrate was interested in the future of this county. Many people are upset with three magistrates for voting against the purchase of the Country Club. People must look at the positives that came from yesterday's meeting.

First positive was that we were actually having serious constructive dialog about the most important project this county has undertaken since the late 1960's. Second, three members of the Fiscal Court voted in favor of the pur-

But the most positive

istrates publicly stated that they were in favor of the Recreation and Wellness Complex. Let's be clear that a vote against the Country Club was not a vote against the Complex. The Task Force Members are aware that this project would take years to accomplish. It took the Boyle County Task Force over eight years just to agree to buy the original property for Millennium

The Task Force identified seven goals for the Recreation and Wellness Complex. The Complex must be located in a centralized location so that it is accessible for all citizens of the county. The facilities must meet certain specifications so that it will attract citizens from surrounding counties. The Complex must contain facilities to hold regionalized activities such as sports tournaments, concerts, car shows, and horse shows. It must offer a very diverse list of activities so that there is something for all citizens to enjoy. The facilities must augment existing facilities in the county such as current school facilities and hospital facilities. It must address the health issues in the county such as obesity and rehabilitation from injury or surgery. There must be adequate sports facilities including practice facilities for all sports. It must improve the quality of life in the county and help the economic development goals of the Industrial Authority.

The most important point is that the Recreation and Wellness Complex must address our county's long range health and recreation goals. The Task Force spent 18 months developing a comprehensive long range plan that addressed the county's health and recreation needs. Unfortunately it is easy to fall into the traps of old and revert back to shortsighted habits of the past. We have spent the last month or so fighting over a pool and a golf course. Yesterday the magistrates felt that the Country Club did not address our long range goals.





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
