Mt. Vernon residences burglarized

In two separate incidents, homes in Mt. Vernon were burglarized last week, resulting in the arrest of five people.

According to Mt. Vernon Police, last Wednesday evening around 11:30, Mt. Vernon Police Sgt. Brian Carter, who was on patrol at the time, observed a vehicle with a male driver sitting at the intersection of Lovell Lane and Lovell Court and two other men running, carrying a television and other items across Lovell Lane toward the vehicle.

Upon investigation, Sgt. Carter arrested Thomas Jeffery Renner, 18, of Mt. Vernon, for burglary 2nd degree and Aaron Ray McGuire, 19, of Mt. Vernon, for burglary 2nd degree and possession of burglary tools after they admitted to burglarizing a home on Crawford Lane.

Carter also arrested the driver of the vehicle, Tyler B. Mobley, 18, of Mt. Vernon, for complicity to commit burglary, 2nd degree. All three men were lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center. Carter was assisted at the scene by Officer Jeff Harness.

Roberts receives 20 year sentence

In Rockcastle Circuit Court last week, a Pulaski man was sentenced to 20 years in prison for a home invasion in October.

According to Asst. Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy A. Bartley, who handled the prosecution,

Jesse Roberts, 24, Eubank, pled guilty to Burglary, Receiving Stolen Property, and Probation Violation before Judge Jeffrey T. Burdette's Division of Rocket Docket.

Roberts had been charged in connection with a burglary stemming from an incident in which he broke into Mike and Gail DeBorde's residence off Hwy. 70 at Level Green and was shot by DeBorde.

Roberts was flown to UK Hospital and treated for the gunshot wound to his shoulder. An investigation by Detective Doug Boyd, Kentucky State

Police, led to the arrest of Roberts, and his accomplice Katrina Price, 29, Eubank.

In Court last Wednesday, Bartley recommended a sentence totaling 20 years imprisonment. Formal sentencing procedures were waived and Burdette imposed the 20 years.

I am ashamed to say that this year's Veteran's Day ceremony at the middle school was my first.

My husband, Jason, who is also principal at the middle school, has always asked me to come out, and I always came up with some excuse. For years I was teaching, and last year Jason and I were on vacation.

I ran out of excuses this year, and boy am I glad. I was very moved during the whole experience, and getting to see real, live World War II veterans was an honor.

Sadly, those brave men and women are leaving us at an alarming rate, so if you know one still around, please get their story.

I had goose bumps when the veterans and their families walked into the gymnasium to a standing ovation from the students and staff at the middle school. It made me wish I were a veteran, so I can only image how it made the actual veterans feel.

I am thankful that war has become so high tech and fewer men and women are needed to fight for our freedom, and I am also thankful they have not had to enact the draft since the Vietnam War. But at the same time, I'm afraid we, as a generation, are forgetting, or don't know, what real sacrifice is.

I know there are families today that absolutely know what it is to sacrifice a loved one for our country, but they are few and far between, and I am afraid the masses, including myself, don't appreciate the true meaning of being a veteran.

I finally asked him where he learned to fix cars one day and he told me he worked on airplanes when he was in the Air Force. I don't think I even knew he was in the Air Force, but I do remember my chest swelling with pride thinking my dad was a veteran



Gary Puckett – Then and Now

After graduating from Mt. Vernon High School, I immediately left home to attend summer school at the University of Kentucky. It was my intention at the time to work toward a degree in chemistry and become a high school teacher. My dreams came true in 1965, when I was hired to teach chemistry at Campbellsville High School in Taylor County.

At the time I was only 20 years old and very interested in the music of the day. I had been a young man when rock and roll came on the scene and continued to be an extreme fan of the genre. My collection of rock and roll albums was substantial and growing at a tremendous rate. I admit I was becoming an aficionado of that style of music.

In 1967, a new rock group named Gary Puckett and the Union Gap released their first single called "Woman Woman." The song became the group's first hit, reaching the number four spot on the Billboard Hot 100. In hopes of keeping their new found notoriety, Puckett decided to design a gimmick to gain attention to the band. Since they lived in Yakima, Washington, which was close to Union Gap, Idaho, Puckett designed Union Army style Civil War uniforms as a visual reinforcement to the band's unusual name. His idea caught on and it became their trade mark.

The following year, 1968, I was offered a position of biology/chemistry teacher and assistant football coach at Mt. Sterling High School. I was excited to accept the job because Trojan Football had a position of tradition and excellence in the state, and I wanted to become a part of that tradition. That summer Puckett and his band released their next three hits across America. "Young Girl" reached the number 2 spot on the hit parade; "Lady Willpower" also achieved number 2 status on Billboard; and "Over You" moved into the number 7 position. The group was on fire with young rock and roll fans. The band even headlined at a White House reception for Prince Charles that year. In addition, they were nominated for a Grammy Award for Best New Artist in 1969. They were also inducted into the Hit Parade Hall of Fame I loved their music, and especially the song "Over You." See if you remember the words to this rock and roll classic: Why am I losing sleep over you? Reliving precious moments we knew.

When I was just a strap of a lad, there in the head of Blair Branch, and before the first hard freezes came down in November, I knew one thing for sure. I knew that the scaly bark hickory trees would be dumping down the nuts that squirrels had overlooked and that the thick and bursting outer shells were gone and that the hearts were there to be broken.

Hickory nuts, from the shagbark trees that we called scaly barks, dotted the head of Blair Branch from here to there high on the mountains, and it was the first time in the fall when a squirrel hunter could legally sneak upon a wiley grey tail and take home supper. No way that a squirrel can be hulling out a hickory nut without being heard for half a mile.

Easy pickings. Squirrel gravy and baked sweet potatoes for supper and corn bread to sop it with.

The big hickory trees, both of them, stood right behind our house and they had been there since well before Columbus came along. Two big trees, with shaggy bark falling off the sides of their ancient trunks and with many scars left by my Grandpap when he needed to peel off narrow slices of bark to make sitting bottoms for chairs. When the sap was up in early spring and the bark was easy to slice and peel off the trunks of those old trees, Pap made the best of what they had to offer.

And still, despite Pap's raping and scraping of the hickories, they bore wonderful nuts and my brothers and I would gather them by the buckets full and crack them with a hammer on an old blacksmith anvil and we would take the kernels to mom and demand "hickory nut fudge" and she would say, "be patient" even though she often made the fudge if there was sugar and coca in the kitchen.

I am not a patient person. But my Mom would put the harvested hickory nuts, what we boys had not already eaten, in a pint jar and she would say, "Wait for Thanksgiving. I will make you a pie." And she did just that when the time rolled around. The best pecan pie I will ever eat was made with hickory nuts and my Mom just grinned because she had read the latest pecan pie recipe in a fancy cook book that she had borrowed from one of my nieces who would never learned to cook and thought you could learn it from a book.

My Mom kept up with the latest cooking trends and always, always had that twinkle and sparkle in her eyes when she knew she was pulling something over on you and she loved nothing better than outdoing Betty Crocker. In fact, she used to write letters to Betty.

"I just tried this and you used way too much salt or baking powder and a pinch of nutmeg would make this right", she would write, not that she ever changed Betty's mind about anything, but Mom loved to express her opinion from time to time when she had postage stamps, a sharp pencil, some writing paper and nothing else to do before she went to bed.

She even wrote to President Harry S. Truman several times and he wrote back to her in terse longhand. And that has to do with why I believe Truman to be the greatest President our country has ever known. Mom's and Truman's letters are buried somewhere in a library in Independence, Missouri.

How he had the time to jot notes to constituents in such turbulent times is be-



He is preceded in death by his grandparents, Vernon Cummins and Fannie Norton Cummins, and Fred Gentry and Susie Cottrell Gentry.





Fond Memories of Growing Up in Horseshoe

Bend, Part II Last week's Roots series featured Toni Mae Smith-Mink's recollections of growing up in Mount Vernon's Horseshoe Bend. She and her brother were orphaned at an early age in the early 1940s and raised by their maternal grandparents. She has seen Mount Vernon as a hub of commerce and activity, and the "golden age" of Renfro Valley.

Toni Mae attended school in Mount Vernon at the local elementary school, but also recalls a building that was used as a school on Richmond Street. It was in the area of the old Convenient Food Mart that became an auto parts store and is currently an Asian restaurant. When it was no longer used as a school, it was a private residence.

When she was old

employed by various families in town as a housekeeper and babysitter, and worked at the Dillingham Furniture Store.

As a young woman, she married Floyd Mink. He was the son of Ted and Laverne Kirby-Mink. His paternal grandparents were Wesley and Betty Barron-Mink. Floyd was a carpenter and was employed by Floyd Stokes. He was among the crew that built the Clarence Carter house (currently the Danny Ford home), the Sparks home on West Main Street, and the Convenient Food Mart building on Richmond Street where there was a school, as remembered by Toni Mae.

In the vicinity of Horseshoe Bend as Toni was growing up, there was a small black community. Some of its residents were Johnny Jarber, who worked





A special song of praise By Howard Coop

Sometimes during a ordinary trip an unexpected event of unusual magnitude occurs and becomes so significant that it forever overshadows the actual purpose of the trip. As a result, lesser things are pushed into the background or completely forgotten, and that one thing is remembered.

On September 13, 1814, Francis Scott Key, a thirty-five year old attorney from Washington, made an overnight trip to Chesapeake Bay near Fort McHenry to visit the British fleet. His purpose was to attempt to secure the release of Dr. William Beanes, a civilian prisoner of war held by the British.

During the night that Key expected to be peaceful, the British attacked Fort McHenry, and there was little rest for Key. As the night hours passed, "the rocket's red glare and the bombs bursting in air gave proof" to Key that "our flag was still there," and on September 14, 1814, "by the dawn's early light," he saw the flag of the United States waving in the early morning breeze and knew that Fort McHenry had withstood the British attack.

Key "was so moved" by that experience that "he vented" his feelings by writing a poem that he called "The Defense of Fort McHenry." That poem was published in a Baltimore newspaper on September 20, 1814.

Immediately, the poem became popular, and it was re-named "The Star Spangled Banner." Soon after it was published, the poem was set to music and adopted as a national anthem by the army and the navy of the United States. Then, 117 years later in 1931, by an Act of Congress, it became the national anthem of the United State of America.

An anthem is "any song of praise or joy," and a national anthem is "the official national song of a country." On September 14, 2011, citizens of the United States of America, "one nation under God, indivisible, with liberty, and justice for all," can stand erect with pride in their hearts as they celebrate the 197th anniversary of the writing of a special song of praise.

CRANBERRY SALAD I don't wait until Thanksgiving to make this salad. It is wonderful with any entrée. As soon as the fresh cranberries come into season, I buy several bags and freeze them to use anytime. It also freezes well once it has been made. This is probably the most asked for side dish at Thanksgiving that I fix for my family. 1 bag fresh or frozen cranberries

2 medium oranges

1/2 cup white sugar

Wash and sort cranberries. Using a food processer or chopper, chop cranberries. Peel one orange. Chop both oranges—one with the peeling and one without. Add sugar to taste and let sit for 10 to 15 minutes until sugar melts. This freezes very well.

SUCCOTASH Succotashis a Native American dish. The word itself comes from Narragansett msíckquatash, and means "boiled corn kernels." It consists primarily of corn and lima beans or other shell beans, but green squash (zucchini) can also be added or used instead of the lima beans. Succotash is a traditional dish of many Thanksgiving celebrations in many states.

1 vegetable oil or bacon grease

1 small onion, chopped

- 1 teaspoon butter 1 can (14 ounce) whole ker-
- nel corn

1 can (14 ounce) baby green lima beans

Salt and Pepper

Add oil or bacon grease to skillet. Heat over medium heat. Sauté onions until they are tender and slightly browned. Drain and discard juice from corn and lima beans. Place in same skillet with the onion Add butter, salt and pepper. Stir over medium heat until butter has melted and the beans are heated throughout.

CAROL ANN'S CORNBREAD SALAD

1 box Jiffy® cornbread mix, cooked and cooled 1 medium cucumber, diced 8 green onions, diced 1/2 bell pepper, diced (green, red, or yellow) 1 cup cherry tomatoes, cut in half

1 bottle ranch dressing 1 cup shredded cheese 1/2 cup bacon bits

Crumble cornbread; mix in cucumber, green onions, bell pepper, tomatoes, and ranch dressing. Chill for 1 hour. Before serving top with cheese and bacon bits.

The Rebels have never lost to the Rockets and that did not change as the visiting Rebels knocked off Rockcastle 23-0 in a game that was much closer than the score indicates.

The Rockets were able to move the ball on Boyle County in between the 20 yard lines only to see drives stall and no points put on the board for the Rockets. The Rebels gained 219 yards in total offense compared to the Rock's 187 yards which demonstrated the frustrating night for Coach Parkey's ball club.


An omen of how the game would play out for the Rockets came on a play early in the first quarter. Rockcastle's defense had forced Boyle County, on their opening drive, to a three and out and then methodically drove the ball inside the Rebel's 10 yard line. On a 4th and goal from the six, B.B. Bradley was breaking free for what looked like a sure touchdown only to slip and fall inside the one yard line.

The Rocket defense, which played well, would again hold the Rebels and get the ball back to the offense which marched the ball thirty yards but the drive stalled at the Rebel 31. The Rebels picked up their first first down of the night with 8:48 left in the second quarter. It was on that drive that

Devon Cox broke loose for a 54 yard touchdown run to put the Rebels up 7-0 with 7:40 left in the second.

On the very next possession, the Rockets fumbled at their own 35, after running for an apparent first down. The Rebels wasted little time, scoring on four plays to put them up at the half 13-0. The Rebels added a 39 yard field goal to stretch the lead to 16-0 with11:49 left in the fourth. After a three and out by the Rockets the Rebels added another touchdown on their next possession to seal the road play-off win 23-0.

The Rockets finished the year at 9-3 and the Rebels improved to 9-3 and will face Lexington Catholic on the road this Friday night.



RCHS girls' cross-country team finishes 13th at Class 2A State; Patel named to All-Region

The RCHS girls' crosscountry team finished up a great season with the Class 2A State Cross-Country Championships this past Saturday. With a relatively young team including one junior, four freshman, and two 7th graders, the girls average just under 9th grade level. A great deal of hard work and determination this season saw the team finish as regional runner-up for the second straight season recently at Boyle County. A week before that, the freshman team finished as state runners-up at the Meet of Champions.

Entering state competition, RCHS was ranked 19th in Class 2A and hoped to improve upon that. It's also important to note that RCHS has the 3rd best 1-5 split times in Class 2A. Essentially, that means the time difference between their 1st and 5th girl is really close, approximately one minute and six seconds. All season long, the teams' ability to keep their top five in a pack close together has led to their success.

RCHS improved greatly upon their 19th place ranking with an impressive 13th place finish out of 31 complete teams and 55 schools that participated. They were only 26 points away from 10th place Boyle County. Boyle loses three seniors after this season, leaving RCHS in great position to take the regional title next year. Compared to last season at state, the RCHS girls improved their average time by 13 seconds and their total team score by an amazing 56 points.



Time to refocus on real issues

The Recreation and Wellness Task Force worked for over a year and a half researching and studying the health and recreation needs of our county.

Many good citizens have put in a lot of time in an effort to plan for the future of our great county. During that research the Task Force identified several requirements for a new Recreation and Wellness Complex. These items are basic requirements to ensure that we are planning for the future and not just putting a bandage on our current problems. The Complex must augment the existing facilities that are currently available in the county.

There must be a regional aspect to this project so that it attracts residents from other counties. It must help improve the quality of life of our residents and increase the economic development of Rockcastle County. There must be something for every citizen. Not all citizens are into sports or wellness. It must include playgrounds and places to hold family gatherings. It must address the health and athletic needs of our youth.

Any large project that will be implemented over a twenty year span must be carefully planned out and implemented. These projects take time and must be built in phases as funds become available. The initial phase of this project is land acquisition. This will be the most important phase and the most expensive phase of the project.

There are two key objectives that cannot be compromised in this phase of the project. The project must be built in the very best location that is available. Secondly, enough land must be secured in order to build the entire twenty year project. You cannot buy half the land required and expect to buy the rest later. This project has overwhelming support from our citizens but seems to be stalled at the moment. Why is that?

Over the last two months there has been lots of discussion and arguing over this project and many people pulling in a lot of different directions. People want to reelect some magistrates for voting for the Country Club property and others want to kick them out of office. The same goes for the ones that voted against it. People have called our magistrates stupid and cursed them. They have been threatened if they did not vote a certain way. Many people have been asking the question, "Why would the magistrates vote down the purchase of the Country Club?" They go on to ask, "Don't they see that

we need a Recreation and Wellness Complex?" Sometimes when you don't get the answer that you are expecting or needing it is because you are asking the wrong question.

It seems that we have put the cart before the horse over the last two months because of our desire to hurry up and do something. The old saying, "Haste makes waste" may apply here. This project is not about saving the "Country Club". If the county had decided to purchase the Country Club property it would have been open to the public and ran by a newly appointed Parks and recreation Board.

At the same time a vote by the magistrates to not purchase the Country Club is not a vote against the Recreation and Health Complex.

The first step in this project must be to adopt a proposal that includes a twenty year road map for the future of this county. This includes the basic requirements to fulfill our future needs and projections. We need to adopt this plan before we vote on land acquisition. The adopted plan must drive the property purchased, instead of the property determining what is built.

The proposal must have goals and deadlines such as timeframe for appointing a Parks and Recreation Board and purchasing the land. It should contain some basic requirements such as the amount of useable acres required.

Lincoln County for example needed at least 90 acres. Our plan must include a rough outline of the required phases of the project and what facilities would be included. The plan must include an operations plan and how do we pay for these facilities.

All of these items may be rough estimates and can be amended later, but good planning ensures that we do things right the first time and that we use our taxpayer dollars wisely. We do not want to make the same mistakes others have made and we can learn from them The question that needs to be answered is, "Do we need a Recreation and Wellness Complex in Rockcastle County?" There needs to be a proposal passed by the Fiscal Court to build this complex and develop a Parks System in this county. Once that proposal is passed then we can decide on where to build it. It is time we refocus our discussions on the real issue at hand and move this project forward. All citizens need to contact their magistrate and ask them to pass this proposal. Tell them that we need this project and that you are "asking" for their support.







On Friday, November 11th, RCMS celebrated Veterans Day by hosting a ceremony to honor all the veterans and active service men and women.





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<u>Kentucky Afield Outdoors</u> Kentucky Lake on verge of great crappie fishing

Poor spawns from 2005-2007 impacted the numbers of young white crappie in Kentucky Lake, resulting in spotty fishing for white crappie over the last several years.

The crappie population in the lake also morphed from mainly white crappie to predominately black crappie due to aging of the lake. The water flows clearer than it once did and more sunlight reaches the depths, generating more aquatic vegetation. Clearer water and more vegetation favor the black crappie and their numbers increased dramatically in the last decade in Kentucky Lake.

The poor white crappie spawns and population changes left some Kentucky Lake crappie anglers scratching their heads in frustration the past several years. If current trends are any guide, crappie anglers on the lake won't have time to scratch anything because they will be reeling in too many crappie.

"The 2009 white crappie spawn was exceptionally strong, the best in a long time," said Paul Rister, western fisheries district biologist for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "We bought a deep water trawl to assess the numbers of young crappie in the lake. We saw strong numbers of young white crappie. It looks promising for future white crappie fishing. The white crappie fishery is coming back."

What Rister and staff see in their sampling nets is also reflected in the crappie fishing on Kentucky Lake this fall. "My Dad and I fished last week and we caught a lot of fish," said Ryan Oster, federal aid coordinator of the fisheries division of Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "We came back with our limits every day. We averaged 100 fish a day. The fish are there, that's for sure. We caught mostly white crappie. It was awesome. I've never experienced crappie

fishing like that."

Their largest fish was a 16 1/2-inch white crappie. Oster threw 1/16-ounce Roadrunners at bridge pilings in Jonathan Creek and on the U.S. 68/80 Bridge on the main lake.

"We caught more black crappie on the rip rap around the bridge pilings," he explained. "They stacked up at the point where the rip rap hit the bottom of the lake in about 9 to 14 feet of water.

They caught many white crappie near the mouth of Jonathan Creek by probing brush near drop-offs. "There are so many manmade brush piles in Kentucky Lake now," Oster explained. "Even if you don't know where they are, get a good map and check areas near drop-offs with your electronics. Poke around little and you'll find them."

A Roadrunner is a small jig with a tiny spinner attached to a horseheadshaped leadhead dressed with marabou. They also come with curly-tailed plastic grubs or tubes as a trailer and Kentucky Lake crappie hit them with abandon. Oster used the model with a tube trailer. Purple, red, white and orange with chartreuse were the best colors.

"We caught 3-to-1 nonkeepers to keepers," Oster said. "Next year may be phenomenal on Kentucky Lake for crappie.'

Rister said they captured many two-year-old, 8- to 9inch white crappie in their population sampling along with healthy numbers of white crappie born in 2010 and earlier this year.

"The crappie population in Kentucky Lake is extremely cyclic," Rister said. "We are just riding the wave. In 4 or 5 years, it could be glory time for crappie fishing on the lake."

He also recommended anglers target Mississippi tributaries for good fall crappie fishing. "We went to Hickman Harbor on the Mississippi River at the mouth of Obion Creek and

the parking lot is usually empty," Rister said. "There were 8 to 10 trailers parked there. They are slaying the crappie in up Obion Creek and Bayou De Chien. We started sampling and we had to push back the black and white crappie just to find some shad. We would see 50 to 70 crappie, with many in the 8- to 12-inch range. It really surprised us."

Get out to the Kentucky Lake area this fall and enjoy some of Kentucky's best white crappie fishing witnessed in a long time.

"I've had several people tell me they've never had better crappie fishing on Kentucky Lake than here recently," Rister explained.
