Board of Education gets thumbs up from auditors

In their regular monthly meeting Tuesday night, the Rockcastle County Board of Education received an "unqualified opinion" from their auditing firm Cloyd & Associates.

The "unqualified opinion" means there weren't any findings in the district's financial sector according to Auditor MattShackleford.

Shackleford told the board that the district was very well run and in great shape considering that

many districts are having a hard time financially.

Despite the reduction in revenue and decrease in state funding, the district has \$3.8 million in their general fund, which is above the state mandated 2% required for districts to keep.

The auditor also reported that the food services program had a net increase of \$49,000 last year. Shackleford stated that food services were in the red in many districts and so any net increase is

The audit also reviewed each of the schools, where Shackleford stated were usually the most risky areas of control because of so much cash flow and so many people being involved, including teachers, sponsors and principals.

The schools had seven minor findings, down from twelve last year, and were given an overall

good rating from the auditor. The auditor told the board that the findings that the schools had were very common, and could be taken care of with a little more oversight and understanding of procedures. The board approved the findings from the audit.

The board also approved all school activity

County employees get 50¢ raise during fiscal court meeting

Come January, 2012, all county employees (road, 911, detention center and general fund employees) will have a little more in their pay check.

At Tuesday's regular meeting of the fiscal court, magistrates voted to give employees a 50c hour raise. This follows a 50c raise given beginning in mid-June of this year. County employees (about 50) who participate in the county's health insurance program, also received a \$500 supplemental insurance card. The total cost to the county for the raise and the insurance cards comes to \$169,000 but about \$60,000 of this amount was saved on the county's health insurance premium this year.

During the discussion, Magistrate Ralph Allen told the court that he felt that "we give money to everything else (we) ought to take care of our people." Allen made the motion for the increase and it was seconded by Magistrate Lee Earl Adams.

As the first item of business, the court approved a Memorandum of Understanding with the Commonwealth Attorney's office to continue the Rocket Docket

The program essentially shortens the time that a prisoner spends in the county jail, without any reimbursement to the county, because, under the Rocket Docket a plea is entered disposing of the case.

Jeremy Bartley, assistant Commonwealth Attorney, told the court that the program had saved the county over \$100,000 in costs during the last year.



A Day at Mt. Vernon High Living on the other side of the L&N Railroad from Mt. Vernon High School (MVHS) could be a stressful situation. This morning in December of 1961 was just an example of that condition. I woke up at daybreak, grabbed a bite of breakfast, and rushed out the door to get into my '58 Chevy in order to make my way to school. To my dismay, the front tire of my vehicle was flat, and I had to put on my spare. This distraction caused me to be late driving down US 150 toward MVHS. Just as I rounded the corner of Main Street and Richmond Avenue, I noticed a train on the tracks in my path.

As I sat in my car waiting for the train to pass, I was thinking of how embarrassing it was going to be walking into home room tardy. Mrs. Lela Saylor was my homeroom teacher, and she did not allow any foolishness or tardiness. Sure enough, as I walked through the door, she asked, "Just where have you been, David Joe?" I told her my story, but as I explained each part (flat tire and a train delay) she seemed to question my truthfulness, and so did my fellow classmates. She said, "Go to the office and get a tardy note."

After getting my tardy note, I was also late to my first period geometry class, which was taught by Assistant Principal Bill Landrum. He, too, questioned my timing. Would this day ever get back to normalcy? Several of my friends were in that class, so naturally they teased me for having such reasons for being late. Charles Shivel wanted to know if I had been out too late with one of my girl-

friends the night before and asked, "Did you have a hard time getting home last Marion Whitehouse, Lee Childress, Wayne Ballinger, and Dwight McNew joined in with Charles and poked fun at me for the rest of the class. Finally, the bell rang and into the hall we poured.

I needed to visit my locker, and as I walked down the hall, I noticed Joe Lambert with another huge load of books under his arm. Upon looking back, he must have already been preparing to become the Chief Justice of the Kentucky Supreme Court. While standing at my locker, Marty Sowder came up and asked, "Are you going skating in Berea on Friday night?" I responded by saying yes, and she reminded me that she would love to ride with me if that was alright. I was glad she asked because she was always fun to be with on the weekends. Even though she was a senior, we spent a lot of time together as friends and good buddies.

My next class was Chemistry, taught by Mr. Charles "Tuck" Baker. He began the class by giving us a quiz on the symbols of the elements listed on the periodic table. On the wall, above his head, was a very large Periodic Chart, but I am sure he did not remember that it was in front of us. For that particular quiz, we all made a perfect score. When the bell rang for us to go to our ten-minute break, we filed out of the door laughing at his mistake. Carla Baker, Sandy Murrell, Sharon Owens, James Cope, Lee Price and I laughed all the way to the soft drink machines. In a



The Roots of Rockcastle by: Tonya J. Cook

Landmark Restaurant Has Become a Memory to Sarah Kirby-Harris

Quite unexpectedly I received a phone call the other day from Sarah Kirby-Harris concerning a column in the Roots series she had read. She now lives in Indianapolis, but remembers Rockcastle County with fondness and comes back to visit regularly.

She began talking about people, places, past events, and of course, old buildings. She had a good memory and recalled many things of the

Sarah was born April 13, 1937, to Ernest and Ethel Kirby in the northern part of the county, in Fairview. The area was called "Boone" according to the local post office. She had two brothers, Eric who died at about the age of thirty-two from influenza in Indianapolis, and G. E. who died at about age forty-nine in California.

The family lived in a house in Kirby Hollow, with her paternal grandparents living near. She even remembers her family living with the grandparents until she was about four years

Ernest and Ethel's church membership was at the Fairview Baptist Church, but in the 1950s, they began attending church Brodhead Baptist. The elementary school where the Kirby children attended was next to the Fairview Baptist Church. The school taught grades 1 through 8. Sarah attended high school at

Brodhead, where she graduated in 1954. The school at Fairview had two rooms. The Kirby children walked to school. In order to get to Brodhead, Sarah had to walk about a half mile to a mile to Highway 25 in order to catch the school bus. The community of

Fairview was just a small hamlet with a school, post office, church and a general store. The store was owned and operated by Delia Barnett, who Sarah said was still living. The store sold general merchandise and had what we would call a delicatessen today as sandwiches and the like were sold there, as well. The store was located near the school. At one time, Delia owned the noted landmark, the Belly Achers Restaurant in Renfro Valley. After owning the restaurant, she opened the store in the 1950s.

Sarah's first job was at the Belly Achers Restaurant after graduation in 1954, as a waitress. She also worked as a maid, cleaning the cabins located to the side of the restaurant. This was in the era when the Renfro Valley area was the destination spot to hundreds of country and bluegrass music fans. Renfro Valley brought a lot of tourism and business to the whole county. Sarah remembers these days, and we will visit there next week through the memories of Sarah Kirby-Harris.

EGGNOG POUND CAKE 1 box (18.25 ounce) yellow cake mix

1 cup eggnog

3 eggs

1/2 cup butter, softened 1/4 teaspoon fresh ground nutmeg

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease and flour a 12-cup tube pan. In a large bowl combine dry cake mix with rest of ingredients. Beat on low until all is moistened. Beat on medium for two minutes. Pour into prepared pan and bake 40 to 45 minutes. Cool in pan for 10 minutes; revert onto wire rack and remove from pan. Let cool.

BROWN SUGAR

POUND CAKE
1 cup butter
1/2 cup shortening
1 box (16 ounce) brown sugar

5 eggs 3 cups all-

3 cups all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon baking powder 1 cup milk

1 teaspoon vanilla Preheat oven to 300°.

Grease and flour a 10-inch tube pan. Cream together butter and shortening in a large bowl. Gradually add sugar, beating until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating after each addition. In another bowl, combine baking powder and flour. Add flour mixture to creamed mixture alternately with milk, beginning and ending with flour, and beating well after each addition. Stir in vanilla. Pour batter into prepared tube pan. Bake for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until toothpick inserted near center comes out clean. Cool in pan 10 minutes, then invert onto wire rack to cool completely.





Value Is Important By Howard Coop



Several years ago the picture on the front cover of TOGETHER, a family oriented magazine, caught, and held, my attention. It was a picture of a very small boy, red headed and freckled faced, who pressed his nose tightly against a windowpane. As he looked outward toward something, there was a look of excitement and eager anticipation on his face.

That picture brought to mind a flood of pleasant memories from the days of my childhood when, in the late afternoon on winter days, I would go to the window, press my nose hard against the windowpane, and anxiously look for my father to come home from a hard day's work. Indeed, that time of day was very special for me, for it was a period of genuine excitement, real expectation, and high hope. I anticipated a pleasant evening around the fireside with my father, my mother, and other members of our

Once more, we have entered a very special season of the year. Many people call this season Advent, a word that means "coming or arrival." Beginning just after Thanksgiving, it is the period including the four Sundays just before Christmas. This special period is filled with genuine expectation, eager anticipation, thoughtful preparation, and high hope as we look forward to Christmas and the joyous celebration of the birthday of Jesus who was born just over two thousand years ago in a stable that belonged to an inn keeper in the little town of Bethlehem in Judea.

Together the preparations made and the hopes possessed always determine what the season of Christmas means to any individual. It can be just another holiday filled with frivolity, or if the right attitude is possessed and proper preparation is made, Christmas can be a high and holy day filled with genuine meaning and special significance. Advent is the time to adequately prepare the heart and mind for that coming so that Christmas may be experienced for what it really is.

Quail Homemakers Submitted

The Quail Homemakers Club began about 77 years ago and has developed over the years to it current approximately 30 members. We are a very active club in the commu-

In 1977, members Roy and Flora Mae Brown had a dream of a place for children to play and adults to visit and relax. They donated 3 plus acres of land to the club with the understanding that if the club ever disbanded, the land would revert to their heirs.

The homemakers and husbands, along with the Browns, began the task of developing the park. The club received a loan of \$500 in 1977 from Kentucky Highlands to begin the work and they also received a matching grant for construction at the park.

There were many volunteers from the Quail community and surrounding communities to construct a 30x60 shelter house and two restrooms and a storage room. Before the construction of these buildings, the mostly wooded land had to be cleared. Volunteers with bulldozers and backhoe came to help and club members and their husband, along with the Browns, spent many, many hours digging ditches and laying drain

Along with all the work constructing the park, the Quail homemakers worked on Saturdays selling concessions at auctions held by Ford Bros. Members followed the auctions from county to county, working out of the back of a truck selling hot dogs, etc.

Because a lot of the homemakers had public jobs outside of the home, this practice had to be discontinued but, for the last 35-40 years, club members have worked the Ford Bros. Farm Machinery Auction at Brodhead on the first Saturday in March. Proceeds from this sale goes toward upkeep of the park. The club alone is responsible for all park expenses. The site is usually in use every Saturday and Sunday from April through October and is now getting booked more all year

History of Quail Homemakers

The Browns had another dream also. They wanted an enclosed building in the park for use of the community and surrounding areas. In 2007, this dream became a reality. Unfortunately, Mr. Brown passed away in 2001 and didn't get to see this dream come to frui-

The club, with the help of Aaron Anderkin and Travis Burton, applied for a grant. The two worked with County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis and the fiscal court to write the grant and it was approved. Judge Carloftis over-

saw the construction of the building and new roofs on the existing shelter house and restrooms and put stone around the restrooms. New playground equipment was also purchased and street lights for the road and parking area were installed.

The club is very proud of the building which is heavily used, including more and more during the winter month. There is a charge for renting the building of \$25 per hour up to four hours and over that is \$150 per day. The shelter house is rented by donations only. Unfortunately, we have a limited amount of parking space so only one party can rent the park at one time. Most of the renters of the shelter house are very generous with donations and this helps to pay the water and electric bills and keep tissue paper, towels and trash bags for the bathroom and outside trash cans. The electric bills last year, during the winter months ran between \$500 and \$550 per month. The club also provides a dumpster for people who use the park to put their trash in at a cost of \$18 each time it is emptied -- usually twice a month during the sum-Three to four hours per

week is necessary to keep the grounds mowed and weed eating done. Paul Hansel (ad Bobby Cameron) take care of these chores for the club at no charge and, with the price of gas, it is expensive to keep the area looking nice.

Each time the shelter house is rented, it is swept out and all the tables washed off. There are around 15 picnic tables with formica tops in the shelter and grills scattered throughout the park. The inside building

has a kitchen with appli-

ances, two restrooms, 12

table with eight chairs

each and three tables for The Quail Homemakers have put a lot of work and still do to keep the park a nice clean place for people to use. As you have read, it takes a lot of money to keep it going. All donations are appreciated and also the people who use it, keeping it looking nice by picking up all trash and putting it in the dumpster.

Not everyone is as careful as they should be when renting the facilities. People have written and drawn on the formica table tops, walked on the tables with muddy feet and broken out all light bulbs in the shelter house. Basketballs disappear, horseshoes are usually left on the ground and the shuffleboard sticks are all broken.

The homemakers just ask that the park be taken care of because there has been a lot of hard work and money invested in it and their plan is to keep it nice and clean for everyone to use.



A new Christmas tradition begins at **Rockcastle Regional**

have a story about a person who has been a gift to our county, please share. This week's story is from Norma Ramsey

Eversole. Rockcastle County has had a diversity of gifted people from its inception in 1810, and although the term itself may imply a particular classification of intellect, a number of everyday characteristics could also accompany that designation.

The following is a number of people who were born or chose to live their lives along the Roundstone / Clear Creek valleys, and a factor of their individual personality that may have helped shape their own type of "giftedness."

Determination and faithfulness to a cause must have driven old soldier, Jess Williams, as he made his way across mountains and through can-breaks to claim his land bounty for service for his country during the Revolutionary War. Oral

tradition tells that he walked until his shoes wore out and continued barefoot to reach the land on which we find his gravesite in the Roundstone valley.

Perserverance was surely the trait of Matilda Coffey, whose lifetime spanned a hundred years, including the Civil War when she watched her sons divide and go their opposite ways. After the death of her husband, she moved to the Roundstone/Clear Creek area where her descendents multiplied, among which were John Lair and Janie Ramsey, both gifts in their own right.

Entrepreneurship, even before the term was widely used, spurred two young brothers, T.J. and Alfred Wood to leave their home at Wildie and attain executive positions with Cincinnati's Proctor & Gamble and the Texas oil fields. At their deaths, both men left the bulk of their estates to colleges in Kentucky.

Bravery must be the word to describe the young lawman that lost his life enforcing safety on Main Street in Mt. Vernon. Charlie Ramsey, "a man too brave for his own good", grew up overlooking the waters of Clear Creek.

Creativity both in music and visual arts shaped the lives of two Clear Creek men, "Monkey John" Gadd and Bert Mullins. They spent their lives plying their own talents and enriching the lives of others, "Monkey John" with his champion fiddle playing and Bert Mullins with the paintings and murals that still grace many of our public build-


This short list from such a small area of our county should only begin to make us remember and appreciate the years and years of individual lives that have made us who we are today.

This is the fourth year the county has participated in the program.

The court had the job of appointing two new members to Rockcastle County Extension District Board. The magistrates and judge voted and Norietta Thompson and Jeff Hayes were named to the board for 2012.

Water projects were also discussed by the court and approved an agreement with Western Water Assn. to provide 1800 feet of pipe for a water line on Houston Farm Road with Western doing the remainder of the work.

The court was also informed by County Judge/ Executive Buzz Carloftis that residents of Green Pond Ridge Road would soon be receiving water from Eastern Water Assn. and the county would be helping with the project. Also, Carloftis said that, in the Hummel area, the best route for a water line to a remote area was being discussed by Western Water. One route, the shortest would go across Roundstone Creek and under the railroad which could mean acquisition of an expensive permit from the railroad.

Carloftis said this area was one of the last in the county where water was not available but Gary Mason, a visitor at the meeting, reminded him that residents of Lower River Road still did not have water. Carloftis said this would have to be discussed with Eastern Rockcastle Water and the county would help with the project. "We are one of the heaviest 'watered' counties in Kentucky," Carloftis said, estimated that 98% of the county was covered for water service.

The court also voted to let bids for the one mile center section of Lambert Road. The first mile constructed, beginning from

the end of the road, has been completed, except for blacktopping, at a cost of \$96,910.18, not including a \$2,493 expense approved Tuesday for repairing or replacing fencing along the road.

Carloftis said Wednesday that construction on the second section would possibly begin in February of 2012. Magistrate Gary Burdette, in whose district the road is located, reminded the court that they "needed to get it (Lambert Road) done since Flat Gap Road is needing it too."

The court also approved paying a \$600 bill for surveying of site for the newly-formed Climax Volunteer Fire Dept. However, the site was deemed unsuitable for the fire department building and Virgil Mullins, a member of the board of the fire department, told the court that, at present, a new site had not been located.

As one of the final items of business, the court had to approve a \$150,000 transfer into the detention center account to meet current bills and a \$34, 748 insurance payment for workmen's compensation and general liability. Jailer James Miller told the court that he could transfer \$20-\$25,000 from his commissary account to help pay bills, specifically a \$23,367 bill Rockcastle Hospital which has been due for some time. The transfer was needed, in part, because the jail has not received their November check from the state for state prisoner care which totals about \$60,000. To date, the county has transferred \$75,000 to the jail during this fiscal year, beginning in July, 2011.

The money for the transfer will actually come from the occupational account, which is part of the general fund, which had a balance of \$676,000 at the end of

November. Carloftis also brought before the court the need for a Parks and Recreation Board which would coordinate all recreational activities and the different parks in the county.

scheduled. However, Hammond said he would go ahead and have the calendar committee meet to amend the dates to make Spring Break a full week, and then give the amended calendar to the board for approval.

Instructional Supervisor David Pensol asked the board for \$150,000 for technology upgrades for the district. The money, which would have to come out of the general fund, is needed, according to Pensol, so the district can keep up in the technology department.

The funds, according to Pensol, would be used to add a ceiling mounted projector in each classroom in the district, to be used in conjunction with the document cameras that are already in place. Monies would also be used to mount the projectors already in place at the high

school, middle school, and in some elementary classrooms, as well as upgrading some of the high school and middle school's existing technology.

The board approved the expenditure of \$150,000 and Pensol stated that the project should be done in time for the beginning of the 2012-13 school year.

The board also approved a draft of a new dress code for employees, which basically states that all faculty and staff will dress and act professionally and be an example for students. "In order to provide a learning environment consistent with the purpose of educating children, all employees shall dress professionally, and in an manner commensurate with their professional responsibilities," the code

Examples of appropriate dress, included in the code, include dress shirts. or knit shirt with collar, crew neck, or turtle neck, tee-shirts or sweatshirts with appropriate school related logos on approved days, dress slacks, khakis or Dockers style, business suit, sport coat or sweaters, blouses, tops and dresses with appropriate professional fit and length or women's business suits, business pant suits, dress slacks or capri length

The board also discussed a tobacco policy, with no action being taken. Hammond told the board he would take the drafts back to the drawing board, adding new language or adjusting the current language, and then visiting the tobacco policy again at the next board meeting.

The board reviewed Hammond's personnel action report which included the hiring of Dana Carrera, Loren Reynolds, and Blake McKinney as substitute teachers and in classified positions hiring Samantha Smith, Jennifer Owens, and Alivia Bullock as substitute instructional assistants, Kimberly Kerns as a substitute cook/baker and substitute bus monitor, and Barbara Hall as a substitute cook/baker.

Hammond told the board that Brodhead and Roundstone Elementary Schools have been recognized with an Energy Star label, for their work in making their schools more energy efficient.

Lady Rockets get district win; beats Estill Monday

The Rockcastle County Lady Rockets have won two of their last three games, including their first district win against Somerset last Friday night, 65-48.

The Lady Rockets and the Lady Briar Jumpers played head to head during the first half, with Somerset having the advantage at the end of the first quarter 15-



Middle school receives Operation Round-Up grant

The additional 38¢ would go directly into the Round-Up account. The average contribution over time is approximately 50¢ per month.


The donated funds go directly into a trust account that can only be used for grant funding. This account is administered by a seven-person Board of Trustees who meet quarterly to review grant applications. Any individual or community group with a worthwhile project can apply for funding.

Filing FAFSA early helps students for state grants

Kentucky students planning to attend an in-state college or university beginning in fall 2012 should file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) as soon as possible after January 1. Filing early increases a student's chance of receiving a state need-based grant administered by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). The FAFSA is available at www.fafsa.gov.

Students attending Kentucky colleges and universities may qualify for College Access Program (CAP) Grants. To qualify, a student must show financial need and be enrolled for at least half-time toward an associate's or bachelor's degree. The maximum CAP Grant award is currently \$1,900 per year.

Students attending most of Kentucky's private colleges and universities may qualify for a CAP Grant and a Kentucky Tuition Grant (KTG). KTG awards are based on the same criteria as CAP Grants. The maximum KTG award is currently \$2,964 per year. Funding for CAP and


Funding for CAP and KTG is limited, with awards made to qualifying students on a first-come, first-served basis. Award amounts may change based on available funding.




