On Tuesday April 3rd, Rockcastle County citizens will head to the polls to vote on whether or not to become a "wet" county.

The wet/dry vote has caused a division among many Rockcastle Countians as those who are for and against the sale of alcohol have been aggressively campaigning by advertising, writing letters to the editor, putting up signs and holding planning meetings.

Many who are against alcohol sales in the county have been attending a prayer meeting every Thursday that has been hosted by different churches in the county since February 16th.

David Sargent, Pastor at Freedom Baptist Church in Mt. Vernon, is among many that attended the prayer meetings and is also against alcohol being sold in Rockcastle County.

"If the wet/dry vote were to pass, it would have a negative impact on our

The Brodhead Alliance Committee held their monthly meeting on March 23rd. Concerning the increased attendance at the meetings, Danny McKinney, BAC Chairman, commented, "I am impressed and encouraged by the amount of enthusiasm that I have seen in the community for this committee. I feel there are many things that we can accomplish tocounty." Sargent said. "It is not a political or economic issue but it's instead an issue for our community's safety."

Sargent also said that alcohol sales alone would not give us more dining choices or be profitable to our community.

"Restaurants like Applebee's and Red Lobster aren't even in some of the smaller counties that are wet." Sargent said.

However some people disagree and believe that alcohol will be beneficial to Rockcastle's economy and will also bring more restaurant choices to our county.

Steve Taylor, owner of EST Tool and Machine Incorporated, said that growing up in Dayton, Ohio that he never knew of a place that was actually considered to be "dry" growing up.

With this being the last issue of the *Signal* before the big wet/dry vote on Tuesday, people have been asking me all week if I was going to write my column about the vote. I have replied to everyone with a quick "NO! I wouldn't touch the wet/dry vote issue with a ten-foot pole."

But after pondering the issue for a while, I couldn't resist writing about it. After all, this will probably be one of the biggest issues our county will face in 2012.

However, I am not writing in favor of or against the issue. It's not my place to try and persuade anybody one way or the other. "But always promise me to never make it your life and never let it define who you are as a person!"

Even though I was only nine, I understood exactly what my dad was trying to teach me and I can honestly say I have never broken that promise I made to him on that day.

The moment alcohol becomes a bad thing in someone's life is when it is the only thing people can identify themselves by. That's when they begin to allow it to control them by using it as a replacement for other things in life or a solution to problems they are facing in their life.

This same message is also conveyed in one of my favorite Country music singers Kenny Chesney's song "The Good Stuff."

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


Remembering Lye Soap An article from an old magazine recently caught my eye and took me back in time. It was a discussion about the pros and cons of lye soap. Immediately, the image of my mother stirring a pot came to mind. The pot was huge because she produced enough soap to last us for most of the year. I was only six-years-old and the year was 1950. Soap-making with her special formula was held in conjunction with the timing of Pop's hog-killing in late fall. That soap was used for a diversity of household uses.

In anticipation of the fall and the incumbent proceedings for creating soap, my grandfather saved the ashes from both our wood and coal stoves, which heated our house. Each day when Pop took the ash pan from under the stoves, he poured the ashes into a large barrel in order to provide Bee with the necessary ingredients.

A few days before Bee was to begin, Pop would sift through the ashes from the stoves in order to separate the white ash material from the black, hard pieces of charcoal. The white ashes were placed into a large bucket which had a small hole in the side of the bottom. Next, he poured a couple of gallons of hot rain water into the bucket of ashes to allow the water to leach out the lye water. Pop always warned Bee and Mommie Katie about the caustic nature of the lye solution. If the soap was going to be used for laundry detergent or as a cleaning agent, the water was poured again through the ash container.

One way to test the water was to dip a chicken feather into the liquid. If the feather began to dissolve, then the lye was strong enough. (From an old chemistry teacher's viewpoint, the solution was basically an alkali solution or sodium hydroxide.)

The next step was to boil

Lo spread a small packet of Russian dressing over the lettuce and sliced the mystery meat into half a dozen bite-size pieces. Dinner was served and I devoured every tiny morsel. Loretta would not let me lick a tiny dab on two of dressing still left on the salad saucer.

After I had finished eating Lo went downstairs to eat in the cafeteria. She reported back that the food was excellent down there. She also had a bag of vending machine pretzels that she intended to snack on She turned her back and I noticed that they were open. Suffice to say her pretzels disappeared.

By 9 p.m. I was exhausted so I went to sleep and dreamed of breakfast. The dream contained visions of huge biscuits covered with gravy, several eggs over light, pork chops a carafe of tomato juice and a pot of coffee.

I was awake by 6 a.m. and for the next hour I anxiously watched the door as I waited for the breakfast server to appear. I actually

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the fat from the hog-killing process in a large iron kettle over an open fire. Bee used a long, wooden ladle to remove any hard pieces from the mixture. Almost all day long she kept vigil over the rendering of the lard; she understood just how important that solution was going to be to our family over the next several months. Both she and my grandmother would use the lard to flavor most of our meals. The leftover concoction was to be used in the preparation of lve soap. Bee skimmed off the smoothest lard and placed it


Shirley Jean Caudill







unprotected sexual activity and even death from alcohol poisoning.

The family system is a vital part of the development of a child. As alcohol invades the family structure so many negative consequences come into play. It is estimated that 6.6 million children under age 18 are living in a home with at least one alcoholic parent. These children are at risk for a range of emotional, behavioral and cognitive problems. The feelings of insecurity and confusion overcome the child because communication is unclear.

So many youth today experience confusion because of the instability and chaos that happens day after day in their families. There is a higher prevalence of depression, low self-esteem, anxiety, suicide attempts, and eating disorders among children of alcoholics than with their peers. Furthermore, children of alcoholics are 3-4 times more likely than others to become addicted to alcohol themselves.

Working as a counselor, I often see the life-long emotional pain that children experience when their parents abuse alcohol/drugs. I myself have seen and know the devastating effects of alcohol and drug abuse and what it can do to a family. Remember alcohol is no respecter of persons; it can happen to every class of people. No one intends to be an alcoholic; no one wants to cause pain to their loved ones. It is never too late to get help and start rebuilding your life. If you are finding yourself in a situation where

I'd like to take a few minutes to express my sincere hopes that the majority of Rockcastle County's registered voters, who I believe to be well versed in the dif-

There are many false statements being tossed about during this controversy over whether or not the sale of alcoholic beverages should be made legal within the county. The few venues within the London city limits that are eligible to sell alcohol by the drink, in every case that I have investigated, were already in place before the town went "moist". How many more such restaurants have since located to, or added locations in, London? I won't ruin the surprise for you but if one does a even a little bit of investigative work for themselves, they will find another point on which they have been lied to by those promising that legalized alcohol sales will be the answers to all of the county's revenue problems.



Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program signup

The 2012 Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment Program (DCP) signup is now available and will continue until June 1, 2012.

Generally, no producer on a farm that has a total of 10 base acres or less shall be eligible to receive payments on that farm, as determined by the Secretary. However, such a prohibition does not apply to a farm that is wholly owned by a socially disadvantaged or limited resource farmer or rancher. If the farm is owned by a legal entity, such as a corporation, each member of the entity must be a socially disadvantaged or limited resource farmer or rancher. Socially disadvantaged farmers and rancher and limited resource farmers and ranch-

ers are defined as: (1) Socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher: a farmer or rancher who is a member of a group whose members have been subjected to racial, ethnic, or gender prejudice because of their identity as members of group without regard to their individual qualities.

(2) Limited resource farmer or rancher: a farmer or rancher meets both of the following:

(a) Directly or indirectly has gross farm sales not more than \$163,200 inboth of the previous 2 years;

Crop Acreage Reporting for NAP Producers

To remain eligible for disaster assistance; producers participating in the Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) are required to report acreage for which NAP assistance may be paid. The timeline for reporting such crops is as follows:

The established acreage reporting date which is July 15th for all crops except small grains and value loss crops 15 calendar days before the onset of harvest or grazing of the specific crop acreage being reported.





pervisors an investigation manager, assistant director and director. And, each liquor establishment in the state is visited at least once a year by an investigator, Dehner said.

The commissioner also said that his department takes the regulation of alcohol sales "very seriously" operating on a "Zero Tolerance" as to the sale of alcohol to minors, going so far as to place undecover investigators in the stores at times to monitor sales.

If a violation is found, the clerk making the sale is cited to criminal district court and the licensee has to appear before the ABC board, which Dehner heads, and can be fined \$1,250 to over \$10,000 and, in some cases, have his license revoked completely. The board issued fines of approximately \$436,000 in 2009 and \$589,000 in 2010.

Dehner said that the compliance rate, as to the non-sale to minors, has increased from 68% in 1997 to 94% in 2010.

The commissioner also told the group that only "technical" questions would be taken after the presentation.

Dehner then turned the meeting over to Humphress for the Power Point Presentation.

According to Humphress, state statue provides that the results of the election will become effective 60 days after the election is certified and, if the measure passes, the county will become "wet" after 60 days.

Rockcastle County's quota for retail package li-

population of between 16,500 and 17,000, will be seven. These package stores will be able to sell distilled spirits (hard liquor) and wine but cannot be located in a grocery or convenience store, unless a separate area is established adjacent to the store that is not accessible from inside the store. And, of course, drinking on the premises of a package liquor store is not permitted nor are Sunday sales, from midnight Saturday.

quor stores, because of its

Anyone wanting to open a package liquor store outside the city limits must prove that substantial aggregations of population would otherwise not have reasonable access to a licensed vendor and the premises are used exclusively for the sale of distilled spirits and wine by the package and malt beverages (beer). License fees run from \$800 to \$1000 for a package liquor store and this money goes to county government. Of course, there is also a state fee levied.

Because Mt. Vernon is a 5th class city, "hard liquor" cannot be sold in restaurants. Restaurant Wine by the Drink licenses will be available and permits wine by the drink sales only at restaurants with a minimum seating capacity of 50 and requires that the restaurant maintain food sales of 50% of its gross sales.

Retail Malt Beverage (beer) licenses will also be available and authorize the sale of beer by the package or by the drink. Beer licenses may be issued to stores that sell gas so long as the station maintains an inventory of \$5,000 in food, groceries and related products. There is no quota for retail beer licenses which are \$500 for the county besides the state fee.

Retail beer licenses also permit consumption of beer by the drink on the premises.

And, of course, because Mt. Vernon is only a 5th Class City, no bars will be permitted.

Humphress said that temporary licenses, for fairs, festivals, community events, etc., could also be issued for not more than 30 days for beer and wine sales only.

As to who may hold a liquor license, qualifications include: a citizen, over 21 years of age with no conflicting criminal background, corporate and limited liability entities and non-profit entities.

Licenses can be refused if the applicant has been convicted of a felony within five years, a controlled substance crime within two years, convicted of two alcoholic beverage-related misdemeanors within two years and of course the applicant must be 21 years of age.

Locations of licensed premises can also be restricted as to location -- too near schools, etc.

And, Humphress said, public sentiment can play a part in the refusal of a license, along with the number of licensed outlet in the area, potential for future growth, type of area involved, etc.

The applicant must advertise by publication of his intention to apply for the license in the *Signal* and the public has 30 days from that date to file a protest with the ABC.

The notice must include the name and address of the

applicant, specific location of the premise and type of license being requested.

Local Authority

The county judge/executive automatically becomes the county alcoholic beverage control administrator for the county. However, he may decline to accept the position, resign or appoint a qualified person.

Applications for a county license must first be approved by the county or city administrator before applying for a state license and the local ABC administrator must sign the application before forwarding it to the state.

A minimum of 30 days, due to the protest period, is required to secure a state liquor license. A state investigator will inspect the premises and complete a field report. Humphress said the process usually takes about 60 days.

Several questions were taken from the audience including the age required for selling alcoholic beverages. A person can be 18 and sell the alcoholic beverage if there is an adult supervisor present (21 years old). As to tax revenue, Humphress did not give an opinion instead saying that information would have to come from the Department of Revenue.

If the issue is voted down, Humphress said it is three years before it can be brought up again and the same procedure will apply.

As to an increase in DUIs, Dehner, who joined Humphress for the Q & A session said that information would have to come from the State Police.

Since Rockcastle has no zoning laws, the question was asked if this would have any effect on placement of

was no. However, Dehner said the state worked "very closely with the local administrator because they know the area, we don't." Dehner again reiterated that the placement of package liquor stores is up to the discretion of administrators and they would not be placed next to schools, churches, day care centers, etc. "We are one of the few state agencies who work anonymous complains," Dehner said.

As to whether a city in the county could return to a "dry" status if the county goes "wet." The answer was that an election could be held to do this.

Whether there was any recourse to recoup the expenses involved for the county in holding the election was asked and the answer was no. Humphress said there was a bill in the state legislature to make an election like this one part of a primary election but "I don't know if it is going anywhere."

One participant commented that it didn't seem right that 18-19 and 20 year olds, who could not drink legally, could vote on the issue.

here." Taylor said. "It's not something that is illegal, so what's the big deal?"

Taylor has also just recently become the chairman of the RCIDA board and believes that becoming a wet county would reap a huge economic benefit to Rockcastle.

"A lot of the tourists who come here to go to shows at Renfro Valley leave the county to go eat somewhere else because of the lack of restaurant choices here." Taylor said. "Being able to sell alcohol will bring different eating establishments and also create more jobs as well."

Taylor also says that he can't understand why people would actually think that voting yes would cause more people to drink.

"We're not keeping it out of the county now, so what's the big difference if it were to pass?" Taylor said.

County Judge Executive Buzz Carloftis said he is glad Rockcastle Countians are at least given the option to vote as a county on the issue. "It's a good thing that Rockcastle County citizens get the right to vote on the wet/dry issue." Carloftis said. "I want to encourage everyone to come out and vote on Tuesday."

Why This CHRISTIAN Has Decided to Vote YES -

From a distance I've watched and listened to the two different views on the sale of alcohol in Rockcastle County. As a regularly attending church member for over 50 years, this wet / dry issue has made me draw new conclusions:

• While it's okay to not touch a drop of alcohol, it's not wrong unless you develop a problem with it. And minors should never drink. But by being legally dry, young people have had access to alcohol from bootleggers right here. In a wet county, bootleggers are out of business and the young people can't buy it in a store. And those with alcohol problems should simply never touch a drop.

- I'm afraid that many of our churches have sent the wrong message in a very loud voice to those not in church by working together so hard and spending so much money to be against something as they have against legal alcohol sales in Rockcastle. It's easy to see that people outside the church will get the impression that being against alcohol is the number one goal of our churches. That is not the major goal of Christ's teachings. Not by a long shot.
- I do not believe that having a bottle of beer with my pizza or enjoying a glass of wine places my soul in mortal danger. On the contrary, we are judged by what comes from our mouths (strife, envy, hatred, violence, lies) not by what we eat or drink. Remember what Jesus said of the Pharisees when they placed more emphasis upon small matters and forgot the weighty matters of the law (loving our neighbors, caring for the sick, and so forth).
- I grew up in 'dry' Rockcastle, and I've seen a lot of alcohol problems. Being 'dry' has not prevented those problems and probably made them worse by making a big deal out of something that is considered legal everywhere else but here.
- An act of Christianity is creating an environment in which families can find jobs and work.
- There will be no more drinking in a wet Rockcastle than is already here. People who drink, drink. Those who don't, do not.
- Rockcastle County has really never been dry. It's just been illegal to drink here for about 70 years.
- Only a very tiny fraction of drinkers ever develop problems with it. So not everyone who drinks becomes an alcoholic. Not everyone who owns a gun kills people. Not everyone who eats becomes morbidly fat. And each of those actions is spoken of in the Bible.
- Like it or not, alcohol sales provide a spark for economic activity, which creates jobs.
- Rockcastle County's commercial activity has been slowly dying since it went 'dry' around 70 years ago.
- Dry counties are usually the poorest counties because of the choking effect upon what other communities recognize as a legal commercial activity.
- <u>Wet counties</u> actually have <u>fewer</u> not more <u>alcohol problems</u> than dry counties.
- Kentucky State Police reports indicate there are <u>fewer DUIs in wet counties</u> than in dry counties. It makes sense. Our residents have been driving to Richmond for generations, often returning under the influence. If they could have bought it legally here, they probably would have gone home before taking a drink.
- So many of the letters in the Signal mentioned alcohol problems in their families while living in a 'dry' county. So being in a dry county did not protect them from that problem.
- We can't argue with facts: Dry counties are usually the poorest counties because of the choking effect upon what other communities recognize as a legal commercial activity.
- I don't buy Mountain Dew because of its fattening effects upon my body. If I don't want to buy alcoholic drinks, I simply pass them by, too, and we don't protect the lactose-intolerant by banning milk from the shelves.

We only had one car, and it was Daddy's job to go to a special pharmacy to fetch the tall, amber bottle containing that precious scent. I still have the last bottle that she left half-full when she died 31 years ago. Her soap was so soft and white that it looked like Ivory Soap – remember Ivory was 99.4% pure! It also floated," Sara laughingly recalled.

I often wondered what made lye soap so special. Actually, the real reason is because it was all natural. It simply was produced from water, lard, and lye. No other chemicals or products were needed. The aroma will always make me remember my grandmother's home – clean and fresh.

In the complicated society we live in today, we have specialized cleaning agents for every chore, such as bathing, dish washing, laundry, and scouring. There are more and more additives to most of the soap commercially produced. Maybe it is time to reconsider reverting back to some of the old ways, like using lye soap!



Enrollment deadline for DCP program is June 1st

U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director John W. McCauley today reminded producers that the 2012 deadline to enroll in the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment (DCP) program is June 1.

"I encourage all producers interested in DCP to visit the service center where their farm is administered and sign up before the busy planting season gets underway," said McCauley. "Enrollments cannot be accepted after the deadline, so enrolling early may help producers avoid missing the deadline during one of the most demanding times of the year."

DCP provides payments to eligible producers on farms enrolled for any of the 2008 through 2012 crop years. There are two types of DCP payments: direct payments and counter-cyclical payments. Both are calculated using the base acres and payment yields established for the farm. DCP is authorized by the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 (2008 Farm Bill).

In addition to DCP, other FSA programs also have enrollment deadlines approaching: Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program: Check with the FSA service center for dates; GRAZE-OUT March 31 for calendar year 2011 crops; Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) General Sign-up 43 – April 6; • Average Crop Revenue Election (ACRE) -June 1; • Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payment Program (SURE) – June 1, 2012 for crop year 2010; • 2011 ACRE Production Evidence – July 15; • Certification of Planted Acres – Various deadlines, but no later than July 15;


• Farm Reconstitutions (changes) – August 1, 2012 for the 2012 crop year;

• MILC – Sept. 30, 2012 • Crop Insurance – Contact a crop insurance agent or the regional RMA office







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Recycling Center Is Open!!!

Rockcastle County is offering a recycling drop-off program. Recyclables may be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Recycling Center on US 25 South (2528 South Wilderness Rd.) during the hours of 7 a.m. until 3 p.m. Monday thru Friday (closed major holidays).

The following items may be recycled:

Newspapers w/inserts, magazines, books & catalogs, office paper, junk mail, phone books, plastic bottles & jugs (#1-7) (any size soda and water bottles, laundry detergent jugs, bleach and fabric softener jugs, milk and water jugs, cooking oil bottles and jugs, shampoo bottles, dish liquid and alcohol bottles (please rinse out jugs), metal cans (rinsed), empty aerosol cans, aluminum cans, glass bottles and jars, sheet glass, ceramics, computers, radios, phones, vacuum cleaners, clocks, cameras, camcorders, vcr/dvd players and satellite boxes.

Rechargeable batteries such as those found in: cordless power tools, cellular phones (the whole phone can be recycled), cordless phones, laptop computers, digital cameras, two-way radios, camcorders and remote control toys. If its says rechargeable on it, then it's recyclable!

Clean used motor oil may also be dropped off at the Rockcastle County Road Department during regular business hours.

Recycling trailers are also available at the following locations: City of Brodhead (gravel lot across from Citizens Bank), City of Livingston (gravel lot across from old Livingston Gymnasium), Brindle Ridge Volunteer Fire Department (at Conway) and at the Pongo Volunteer Fire Department. The trailers will only be pulled out to empty them and will then be taken back to the same location. Please help us make this a successful venture by being clean and/or neat with our recycling habits. Do not put anything in the individual bins except what is labeled on them. <u>Do not leave recyclables on the ground!</u> If you drop something on the ground, pick it up. <u>Absolutely no trash</u> <u>is to be put into the bins!</u> Remember, camera surveillance is utilized in Rockcastle County and it is illegal to improperly to dispose of trash.

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Thinking About Cleaning Your Carpet! Some things to think about...
