#### Last leg of Lambert Road bid let; first reading of '12-'13 county budget held

B&M Pipeline, Inc. was the successful bidder for widening of the last mile of Lambert Road in northern Rockcastle. Two bids were submitted, and opened at a special meeting of the fiscal court Tuesday, one by Carpenter Custom Bulldozing for \$73,500 and B&M's of \$46,000. Carpenter did the first two segments of the three mile project.

County Judge/Executive Buzz Carloftis commended Carpenter for the "really good job" Carpenter did on the first two segments but noted that the court had to be fiscally responsible and take the low bid for the third

The court also held the first reading of the 2012-13 fiscal court budget.

The budget, according to County Treasurer Joe Clontz, will have to be amended before the second reading primarily to include the \$3 million expected for construction and equipping of the new emergency management center.

#### School board's working budget is \$21 million

Rockcastle Board of Education members were presented with the 2012-13 tentative working budget at a special meeting last Thursday.

Superintendent Larry Hammond commented to the board that the district is in "pretty good shape although it is a flat budget.' The budget shows total revenues of \$21,387,165, the

bulk of which will come from SEEK funding (the amount the state pays the system for each child) currently figured at \$14,450,665. Other revenue expected includes \$2,714,000 from general property tax, utility tax, motor vehicle tax, etc.

Finance officer Melanie Lyons told the board that the board's contingency fund is expected to be down to \$1.7 million, 8% of the budget which is higher than the 5% recommended by the state and the 2% mandated.

Lyons also pointed out that several expenses have risen dramatically, including the student insurance on which the premium has risen from \$44,000 to \$195,000. "This is an across the state raise," Lyons said. She said that she was in the process of contacting other companies in an effort to get the premium reduced.

The board will be presented with another working budget in September when the numbers are expected to be more

"I received a good education from Purdue and Chicago." Hopkins said. "They taught me how to constantly deal with new equipment and learn new technology all the time."



World of Plants

When I was young and living with my mother and grandparents, I had no idea how their influences in my childhood life would affect me when I became an adult. As an example, let me relate a story of how my grandmother, Mommie Katie, taught me a valuable lesson that became part of my teaching profession for more than thirty years.

One day when I was about eight years old, Mommie Katie was busy in her kitchen watering her house plants. I pulled her kitchen stool up to the sink so I that could watch her manipulate her tiny pots of African Violets. As she worked, she began to explain the steps involved in replanting her violets and how to determine when they needed watering. I can still see her wrinkled hands working with the dark soil that she had personally dug up in the woods behind our house. The dirt was mixed with tiny gravel to allow the roots to have room to spread through the pots.

Everyone in our neighborhood thought Mommie Katie's violets were exceptional. They were strategically placed in widow sills throughout her house in order to provide the correct amount of sunlight to make them flourish. She was a remarkable woman in many ways, and she truly was blessed with a "green thumb"

When I was in the fifth grade, my teacher asked each of us to come up with an idea for a science project. I had previously read in a magazine about how simple it was to grow plants in a closed container, called a terrarium. I had never actually seen one of these, but the article showed a photograph of tiny plants in a Mason jar. I decided to ask Mommie Katie's help with my project. I remember how pleased she was that I had selected to work with plants under her tutelage.

The next Saturday morning, Mommie gathered her small tools, a little bucket, and a basket and led me into the woods to collect the necessary ingredients to begin construction of my homemade terrarium. She was aware that I was going to show my project to my class at school, so she suggested that we use a large – gallon size - pickle jar with a screw-on lid for the container. In the woods we collected several small plants that she could name and some tiny ferns, tiny round stones, some moss, a couple of decayed pieces of wood, and enough of the black soil to complete my project.

We carried these components back to her kitchen, and she began the task of showing me how to combine them in order for the plants to thrive. I was surprised to see Mommie first spread the dark, rich soil in the bottom of a pan and place it in her oven. When I asked why, she explained, "We have to heat the soil so

that all seeds and bacteria will be neutralized – otherwise, they will sprout in your terrarium." I was thoroughly impressed with her knowledge of how to only allow the plants we had chosen to actually grow and survive.

When the dirt was sufficiently sterilized, we began the process of placing each component into the large jar so that it would grow and be pleasing to the eye. Over and over, she carefully introduced each element into the container. I cannot explain how pleased I was as the class project began to take shape. The last item to go into the jar was a beautiful layer of green moss on the surface of the soil. I knew that my terrarium would be a hit with my teacher and that my classmates would be surprised at my idea.

Mommie Katie explained how we must select the right spot in our house so that the terrarium could receive the correct amount of sunlight for the plants to thrive. She also knew precisely how much water to put into the jar before we sealed the big, white lid on top. In the moist environment, moisture from the soil and leaves would condense on the glass jar and run back into the soil. Day after day, I watched the terrarium as it began to recycle the water in the jar; the plants were settling in to their new

When it was time to bring our projects to class, I was thrilled with how mine looked. I think Mommie Katie was also pleased with what she had taught me. I will never forget my teacher's reaction when I entered the classroom with my terrarium under my arm. She had me explain to the class how each part of the enclosed environment was selected, and how I had used scientific knowledge [that was stored in Mommie's head] to make the entire project become self-sustain-

When I became a teacher of biology, I made it a yearly event for my students to produce a science project for demonstration to the class. Some of their projects included: insect collections, wood sample collections, leaf collections and (my favorite) simple terrariums. Each year, I explained to my students how I had first learned about these homemade, closed environments that become self-sufficient. Many of my students produced outstanding terrariums of their own. Some of them told me later that they had kept theirs for years and

Mommie Katie had a small legacy that she never even knew about, and it lasted for over thirty years in my classroom – and far beyond, I imagine. Mommie would have been so pleased and so very proud!



tion in Clinton, Oklahoma where he would become a member of the newly organized Special Task Air Group One.

Hopkins would serve with STAG-1 in the South Pacific and Solomon Islands during WWII.

Their operations were considered top secret missions by the Department of Defense and everyone who was a part of the unit was not allowed to share their location with anyone or tell them any information about the program.

"They kept us informed constantly and we were told to keep our mouths shut." Hopkins said.

Hopkins said his officers would always look at what they wrote in their letters they sent home to make sure they weren't giving out any information.

When Hopkins was stationed on the Russell Islands, in the central provence of the Solomon Islands, he said his mom wrote him a letter wanting to know where he was and that he had to come up with clever way of letting her know where he was stationed and that he was safe.

Hopkins said he used Russell Childress, a childhood friend's name, to try and secretively write to his mom about where he was stationed on the Russell Islands.

"I told her I was sorry to hear about Russell and his leg." Hopkins said. "And in her next letter she wrote me saying there was nothing

wrong with Russell's leg." Hopkins said he then tried to write to his mom in code a second time before he finally had to give up on the idea.

"In my next letter I told her I was sorry to hear about

Russell breaking his arm." Hopkins said. "She then wrote back saying I don't know where you are getting your information from but Russell is doing fine."

Hopkins said his mom never figured out where he was during the time he served until he came home after the war.

The primary reason why members of STAG-1 had to be confidential was because of the work they were doing on the design and assembly of the first unmanned missile airplane, the TDR-1 Assault Drone.

The TDR-1 was an unmanned remote control air plane that was equipped with a camera in the nose of the plane which allowed pilots to aim the weapon directly at the target. The TDR-1 was armed with a 2000 pound bomb and was driven by a control plane that could follow the plane from eight miles away.

A controller from the ground would take the TDR-1 off from the runway and once it was in the air it was then controlled by the control plane following behind it. The control plane included a crew of four pilots who controlled the flight of the TDR-1 by transmitting radio signals and using radar to guide it to the area of the target.

Hopkins said his job was to maintain the TDR-1 Drones and control planes and make sure they were ready to fly.

46 TDR-1 Drones were used in the South Pacific during WWII from August 1943 to October 1944. However, only 22 of them would successfully hit their targets due to frequency problems and the Japanese shooting them down.

Despite the success of the TDR-1 Drones, the STAG-1 unit was deactivated in October of 1944

and all development on TDR-1 Drones was terminated. Hopkins said the real reason why they were deactivated was because they lost control of one of the TDR-1 Drones and it hit an American building in the South Pacific.

Although no one was killed in the explosion of the building, the Defense Department didn't want to take any chances of another accident happening since it making national headlines in the news back home.

'Once something like that happens, they don't want it to get out." Hopkins said. "We were told that this is something of the future, but we can win this war without you."

After the war, Hopkins returned home where he would work for Southern Bell and BellSouth for 42 more years before retiring.

Hopkins retired as the Insulation and Maintenance Supervisor for the regional BellSouth branch in Danville. Hopkins said he moved back to Mt. Vernon after he retired because he wanted to live where he was born and grew up.

Hopkins has attended almost every reunion since the first STAG-1 reunion in 1981. He said only 19 were still living when he went to his last reunion in Novem-

Hopkins said the reason why the history of STAG-1 is not taught in schools is because of the secrecy and quick deactivation of the unit during WWII. However, Hopkins and his STAG-1 comrades still credit themselves with the creation of the first remote guided missile.

"We all feel like we are the true grandfathers of the missile program, regardless of what the history books say." Hopkins said.



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#### **Some Memorial Day History**

Traditional observance of Memorial Day has diminished over the years as many Americans have forgotten the meaning and traditions of Memorial Day.

At many cemeteries, the

graves of the fallen are increasingly ignored and neglected. Most people no longer remember the proper flag etiquette for the day. While there are towns and cities that still hold Memorial Day parades, many have not held a parade in decades. Some people also think the day is for honoring any and all dead, and not just those fallen in service to our country.

For many people here in County, Rockcastle Memorial Day brings to mind images of a trip to the family cemetery, picnics, barbecues and baseball games. What's sometimes forgotten are the true reasons for the holiday.

Memorial Day was created to honor the sacrifices made American soldiers and sailors in times of conflict. As the United States' death toll passes 2,000 in Afghanistan, Memorial Day takes on an especially poignant meaning this year.

Here's a brief look at how the holiday got its start and how people are searching for ways to honor the brave men and women who have lost their lives in the cause of freedom.

Originally the holiday was known as "Decoration Day." It was started by a Civil War general John Logan who was the Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic (GAR.)

The GAR post in Mt. Vernon was the M.M. Frazier Post 127 which was named in memory of Dr. Milton Frazier, who was a captain in the 4<sup>th</sup> Kentucky Infantry and lost his life in the Civil War.

General Logan sought a way to help the country come together after the horrors and division of the Civil War. The holiday was

first observed on May 30,

Logan chose the date for two very important reasons. First, the day did not mark the anniversary of a Civil War battle and second "flowers would likely be in bloom all over the United States." Indeed, many took flowers to Arlington National Cemetery, an activity that still occurs every year.

General Logan left a

tremendous legacy that goes well beyond his efforts to honor fallen soldiers. According to a museum dedicated to his memory, Logan led an inspired life and enjoyed a tremendous career. At different times in his life he was a United States congressman, senator and also a candidate for the vice presidency. He and his running mate, James G. Blane, lost their "Logan's but popularity with veterans contributed to narrowness of the defeat."

This may come as a bit of a surprise, but Memorial Day, despite having been around for over 100 years in one form or another, didn't become an official federal holiday until 1971 when Congress passed the National Holiday Act and asked all Americans to fly the National Colors at halfmast from dawn to 12 a.m.

This created a three-day weekend at the end of May. Prior to this, different states observed the holiday on

different days. Also worth noting is the "national moment of remembrance." This moment takes place at 3 p.m. local time or Memorial Day and lasts one minute. According to Remember.gov, Moment does not replace traditional Memorial Day events; rather it is an act of national unity in which all Americans, alone or with family and friends, honor those who died for our freedom. It will help to reclaim Memorial Day as the sacred and noble holiday it was meant to be shared this remembrance, we connect as Americans.'

This year as you go to cemeteries to decorate the graves of loved ones, take time to look around and note the veterans also buried there and maybe place a flower there to honor their service.

"We cherish too, the poppy red. That grows on fields where valor led. It seems to signal to the skies. That blood of heroes never

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

\$782,062 for transfers to the road fund (\$184,677); \$525,091 to the jail fund; \$38,244 to LGEA; \$185 to Forestry and \$33,865 to the fairgrounds fund.

The road fund shows expected expenses of \$1,616,492 and expenditures of \$1,370,281 in the jail fund.

The LGEA fund, with

expected revenues of \$133,600, is funded by coal impact funds (\$84,500) and mineral tax (\$48,500). This year's projected revenue is less than half of last year's total of \$281,000. The state also mandates that \$84,500 of the \$133,600 be used for road materials. The fund also covers expenses of the coroner's office, \$38,000 to fire departments for gas, parts and insurance and program support for the development board and CVADD. In order to meet all the expenses of the account, \$38,244 will have to be transferred in from the general fund.

Carloftis noted that the fire departments will not be receiving coal severance funds this year since the state has reallocated the funds to include \$4 million for scholarships to students from 9 eastern Kentucky counties which does not include Rockcastle. For the past two years, each department has received \$6,500.

ment has received \$6,300. The fire departments will also be seeing an adjustment in the supplement of 90% of their utility bills each department receives from the general fund. Carloftis said the supplement would probably be adjusted to a set amount before the second reading of the budget. Some departments reportedly have high speed internet which the court feels is not a necessity for the departments' operations.

In last year's budget, \$26,000 was appropriated from the general fund for the 90% utility payments besides the \$38,000 allocated from the LGEA fund. The court also recently paid off the balance owed on the Pongo Fire Department building and has agreed to finance new buildings for the Livingston department and the new department in the Climax area.

Steve Taylor, chairman of the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority and members of the committee were before the court for the first reading of their 2012-13 budget.

Their budget shows expected revenue of \$883,965, made up of \$418,140 still due from a Department of Transportation grant, \$159,992 from the occupational tax, \$304,750 SourceCorp rent and \$1,083 from interest earned, plus \$321,231 of carryover from the 2011-12 fiscal year for a total budget of \$1,205,196.

Expenses show \$97,902 for personnel, \$55,900 for operations, \$747,454 for administration and reserve and \$304,750 for debt service on

the SourceCorp building.

The \$747,454 appropriation includes transfer of the \$418,140 DOT grant to the fiscal court and \$322,314 for reserve.

During the meeting, the court asked that the \$35,000 RCIDA received for the lot in the industrial park, purchased by Welltrans be transferred to the court so that it could be applied to the \$2.5 million KACo loan used to develop the industrial park. The county currently pays over \$11,000 a month principal and interest on the loan and has also applied over \$700,000 against the principal in proceeds received from a grant to the RCIDA and an additional \$100,000 from occupational tax proceeds.

Taylor, and Corey Craig, RCIDA member, also gave the court an update on the repairs and renovations going on at the former Plasticware building. Craig said that work on the roof was expected to be completed within 3-4 weeks and that work inside the building was keeping pace and should be completed within the same time frame.

Craig also said that over 500 applications for employment with Anchor Packaging had been submitted through the Adult Education Center.

The court voted to extend the contract of Mark Hopkins, project manager, for up to 30 more days at a cost of \$12,500.

SourceCorp was also discussed at the meeting and Craig acknowledged that only a very few jobs remain at the facility mainly because of the lack of a federal budget which has kept NOAA (National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration) from being funded. Record-keeping for NOAA was the main source of jobs at the facility.

Craig reiterated to the court that the seven-year lease with SourceCorp will have to be honored by the corporation even if the facility is shut down completely.

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
