## CAP closing two facilities in Rockcastle County

The Christian Appalachian Project plans on closing two of their facilities in Rockcastle County by August 31, as a result of a new restructuring plan.

The two Mt. Vernon facilities marked for closure are Healing Rain and Rainbow Respite.

Healing Rain is a twelve bed residential drug recovery program for women. It was opened six years ago when CAP volunteers saw

a need for a drug rehabilitation program for women in the area. Women who participated were required to stay a minimum of six months to complete the pro-

Rainbow Respite is an eight bed residential respite program for people with disabilities. It opened 24 years ago to give people with disabilities a chance to socialize through activities and trips.

CAP President and CEO

Guy Adams said the closings are a result of the new strategic planning effort for CAP. Adams said they assessed all of their programs and determined to refocus CAP's efforts on the basic human needs of food, shelter and clothing.

Adams said each site is being closed so they can reassess and maximize their resources to serve more people in need, without du-

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"I got the extension for another year but told them it should be used way before that." Taylor said.

Brodhead Mayor Walter Cash said he is ready to see the property cleared off so they can start the building process.

"I would like to get the dead trees and underbrush cleaned off so we can see what land we've got to work with." Cash said.

Taylor said he had contacted Frankie Woodall about cutting the dead trees off the property and hauling them off. Taylor said Woodall is interested in cutting the trees up into wood chips for his own personal

Taylor said the problem the city will have is determining which trees are dead but he said a decision will have to be made by the

There was a bill on this month's agenda for the survey work on the property in the amount of \$787.50. During the meeting, County Attorney Billy Reynolds

asked the court if they wanted to join a class-action lawsuit against Merscorp, Inc. and several others. The defendants are accused of acting as a private mortgage recording system, thereby assisting mortgage lenders in avoiding the need to record multiple mortgage assignments with county clerks when a mortgage is securitized.

According to Reynolds, this practice, which began in the 1990s, has cost Rockcastle County alone \$126,360 in

recording fees for 3,240 mortgages. Reynolds said in his opinion this practice was illegal



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## Of Special Note Inside

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How long has it been since cereal companies stopped hiding small toys inside their most popular brands? As far as I can determine, that practice was discontinued over a half century ago. It became evident that companies were trying to influence children into asking for the toys rather than the specific

brands of breakfast foods.

TV ads were a powerful way to market toys as an alternative to having adults choose one brand over another based on nutritional value. This was the first generation to be raised in front of the television set. We now realize that the media pumped our heads full of tons of ideas. Cereal toys are a good example of how this new medium used children to avail itself of the strong impact that a child can have on his parents and their choices.

As a child, I was not the least involved in the selection of brands of food for our family. That decision was left to my mother and grandmother. I did, however, tell them which cereal I wanted for breakfast - and my choices were basically due to the ads for toys hidden inside. I can still remember many of the toys I collected including: cars and trucks, plastic train cars, animals, decoder rings, badges, and tiny books. I had a small box in which I stored my treasures that I kept the box in my chest of drawers in my bedroom.

I specifically remember one of my favorite cereal toys that was a tiny submarine that could be placed in water. On the bottom was a small container into which a tiny amount of baking powder was placed. The reaction between the water and the baking powder made the submarine dive under the surface of the water and then resurface again and again. I loved that toy and spent a great deal of time watching it in our kitchen sink. Even Pop thought this was a unique cereal toy. I kept that one prize for years and years. I recently saw one of these original cereal toys on eBay for approximately \$10. In 1954, when I was

around ten years old, Mommie Katie brought home a box of Wheaties cereal and inside was a small (five inch) metal license plate. It was just the right size to put on my bicycle, where it found a new home. I was somewhat disappointed because the toy was a replica of an original plate not from Kentucky but from

I quickly devoured the cereal so that we could purchase another box of Wheaties and I could get another license plate. Again, it was not from Kentucky. I wondered how many boxes of cereal I would have to eat to get a plate from my own home state! But then my mother noticed that there was a card inside the toy package. It explained that if you sent in the card with \$2,

you could receive plates from all 48 states and some foreign countries. I saved my allowance for a few weeks so I could order the set of plates. It took several weeks un-

til my package of miniature license plates arrived from General Mills. When I opened the package, the Kentucky plate was on top of the stack of US plates. I quickly removed the Texas plate from my bicycle and installed the correct KY plate. I rode all over the neighborhood showing my friends that I had a license plate for my bicycle. They, of course, wanted one of their own. I kept those small plates for a long time. They seem to have disappeared while I was in college at UK.

I remember that Cheerios also had plastic airplane models enclosed inside their boxes. The tiny planes were designed after WW II bombers, propeller fighters, and a few jet fighters. I collected several of these airplanes and played with them often. They came in an assortment of bright colors. They, too, can be purchased today on eBay.

Kellogg's cereal hit the jackpot when they introduced Matchbox Cereal Trucks inside their boxes. It was always better if the toy was actually in the box, instead of having to order them from box tops. The tiny trucks had Kellogg imprinted on the side – another way to advertise their cere-

Finally, I can remember collecting police or sheriff badges. I had two that I can distinctly recall. The first was from Post cereals and was simply called a Special Deputy Badge. I proudly wore it all over the neighborhood, arresting bad men at will. The other was called a "Jingles" Deputy Badge. It was worn by Jingles, who was Wild Bill Hickcock's sidekick on the TV series. I recall opening that box of cereal at Mommie Katie's kitchen and seeing the badge right on top of the cereal. I loved it!

In the 50's, television became more and more a part of everyday life, and AM radio was listened to by almost every family on a daily basis. Cereal companies thought that if they could influence children to encourage their parents to purchase certain brands, then the company would be assured success. Toys in cereal boxes helped to bring most cereal companies tons of new customers. Today, those same toys are collectors' items and may bring some high prices on a variety of web sites.

Life in the 1950's was so simple that it must be impossible to imagine to those who did not live through it. Some say that it was the best time in America. If you were not there but could go back, my bet is that you would

Last week I was taking the scenic route home from Berea up White Lick Road and one a four mile stretch of road I saw three copperheads at three different locations. I found this strange because I'd never seen a poison snake on that road.

I wasn't able to kill either of them only because they got across the road and into the underbrush before I had a chance to run over them.

And yes, incidentally, I do know a copperhead when I see one and I have three scars on my left leg to prove that they can inflict some hurt on you. The bites I received in my youth did not happen because I was deliberately trying to harass or bother the perpetrators. In all three cases the snakes were well concealed and I had been struck before I realized there was a snake within a mile.

Suffice to say that I am not a believer in the notion that copperheads are basically harmless. I know five other people, including my brother, Keeter, who have been copperhead bitten and in those five cases, nobody was trying to pick a fight the snakes. I am sure, though, that they would all agree with me that the only good copperhead is a dead one.

I've also known a couple of people who were bitten while they were handling live snakes in church. As far as I'm concerned, anybody that stupid got a good dose of reality.

I figure my attitude will generate some hate mail, but what else is new?

When I was growing up it was not unusual to hear of somebody getting snake bitten. It was a common occurrence to kill them in the garden, in a tool shed, on the road or even under the

If someone had come along and told you to "leave

that snake alone" while you were in the process of killing one, they would have been considered fit material for the nearest insane asy-We had a little rat terrier

dog named Luly who would hunt them down and kill them. She stayed swollen during warm weather from copperhead bites but she had been bitten so many times she seemed nearly immune to any serious effects of the bites. We never thought about going to the blackberry patches without taking Luly along for protection. Uncle Stevie also had a

snake dog named Butch. He was so fast that he could kill one without being bitten most of the time. One day Uncle Stevie was standing the yard with

Butch when Duck Campbell, the mailman, came by. Duck was chewing the fat with Uncle Stevie and

wanted to know what kind

of dog he had there. Uncle Stevie told him that he didn't know for sure what breed but that Butch was the best Snake dog on Blair Branch. Duck's eyes lit up and he asked how Uncle Stevie would take for

Uncle Stevie told him he'd have to have fifty

Of course that was an unheard of price for a dog in those days. You could have bought the best coon hound on the holler for half that price. Duck was highly insulted. His face got red, he threw his truck in gear and drove on up the road.

A few weeks went by and Duck stopped by again. "I bought the best big mule I've ever owned at the stock sale the other day for fifty dollars", he told Uncle Stevie by way of letting him

The Rich History Along the Old Brodhead Road

There is a roadway here in the county going in a northwesterly direction known as the Old Brodhead Road. It connects the towns of Mount Vernon and Brodhead. The road has been in existence for many years, just how many is uncertain. It remained unpaved until the late 1950s or early 1960s. Upon it being paved, the residents along its path thought progress had really come to their corner of the According to my hus-

band, Stanley, who was raised along the road, there was yet another "older" Brodhead Road that ran along his family's farm. Along that road sat the Red Bud Schoolhouse. It was bought and reassembled, and now may be seen in the Renfro Valley Entertainment area.

Farther down the road was the Roupe Menifee gristmill across from where the Saddle Club now stands. The mill was located in an elevated area, so there must have been some kind of spring that powered the mill. The locals of the area hauled their corn and other grain from miles around to get it ground at the mill. Going farther down the

road stands the old Earl and Myrtle Adams place. It is rich in lore from the Civil War era. Today it is a white, two-story frame house, but back in the time of the Civil

War it was a log stagecoach stop. According to Mattie Lena Houston-Poynter, who was born in 1899 and told stories about the stop to her family, a carpetbagger or a solder had been shot and killed in its doorway. The exactness of the story has been lost to history. The floor was said to have a bloodstain in the spot to the present day. Of course, there is said to be "paranormal" activity there. About halfway between

Vernon and Mount Brodhead lies the huge limestone foundation blocks of the original Mount Vernon courthouse. The courthouse was torn down in the early 1960s, and Mason Poynter ("Junior") bought the stone and used them for a rock wall in front of his home. Isn't it amazing to drive

down the road and see history come to life right before your eyes? I'm sure there are other highways and byways here in the county with a rich and proud past seeped into the "roots" of Rockcastle. The information in this

The fear of being killed

During the month of March, I spent a considerable amount of time in Lawrenceburg, a small, peaceful community nestled between Lexington and Frankfort. My mother, my sister and her family have lived there for more than twenty years.

While there I took time to catch up on local happenings in the Anderson County News, a weekly newspaper. The headlines were frightening: "Murder Suspect Charged in the Death of His Wife." "Timothy Branson allegedly shot his wife, Modena Branson, 50, during a domestic dispute, according to police reports. She was pronounced dead at the scene. He has also allegedly pointed a loaded gun at his wife's daughter and grandson." Branson's photograph was on page one of the paper. "With what appeared to be a self-inflicted bullet hole just above his left temple and wearing a hospital gown and handcuffs, the man indicted for shooting his wife to death was charged with murder last Thursday night."

One would think that this sad incident would be a once in a lifetime occurrence for a small town like Lawrenceburg. Unfortunately, it was not, as the following week's paper carried the headline: "Man Charged with Pistol-whipping Girlfriend." The victim did not die but the perpetrator, Benjamin Mobley, was charged with attempted murder. Here is the (almost) unbelievable part: Mobley's daughter Rene was murdered in Anderson County in September, 2010 by her intimate partner. Rene's killer is now serving time in the Kentucky State Penitentiary. Will her father soon be joining him there?


While most abusers do not kill their victims, there are too many who do. Last year thirty-six women in Kentucky were killed by their husbands or boyfriends. For the past several years that number has ranged from 20-35.



and the county would stand a good chance of recouping the \$126,360, less attorney fees.

Judge Carloftis made the motion to join the other 14 counties in the suit, Magistrate Billy McKinney seconded the motion and it was passed unanimously.

Carloftis gave the court an update on the clean-up in progress at Anchor Packaging. The Judge/Executive said that Mark Hopkins, who is overseeing the project, has said that he expects the clean-up to be completed within 10 days. However, Carloftis said he thought it might be the end of the month.

He also pointed out that the 30 inmates, who have been working at the facility for over two months, have saved the county over \$140,000 in labor costs and they have "done a tremendous job." Work-release inmates are paid 63c a day by the state plus the county has furnished them with two meals a day.

The new roof for the building is 70% complete, Carloftis said.

The court held off on approving a Resolution/Agreement with the State Highway Department for resurfacing of two miles of the Lambert Road. Bids will be taken for the project and financing will come from funds set aside by the state's Department of Rural and Municipal Aid. Construc-

tion, removal/replacement of water and utility lines, etc. have all been paid from county funds.

The project does not have to be bid. \$231,094 has been approved for the project. Carloftis said the last time these funds were used by the county was in 2008 and approximately \$500,000 has built up in the fund. Projects have to be submitted to and approved by the state.

The court held off on approval of the Resolution/ Agreement because of the absence of Magistrate Gary Burdette who represents the district encompassing Lambert Road.

The court also approved advertising for bids for the replacement of the Cass Road Bridge over Little Negro Creek. The bridge is one of the last two wooden bridges in the county and replacement costs will be an 80/20 split with the state with the county paying the 20%. The bridge is located directly across from EST Tool.

In their final item of business, the court had to transfer \$175,000 from the occupational tax fund to the general fund. From there, \$30,000 will be transferred to the jail and \$60,000 to the road fund with the remaining amount left in the general fund.

Barron was arrested and charged with burglary, second degree and remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$5,000 cash/property bond.

Two people were arrested Monday night for burglary after breaking the home of Brandon Cameron on 690 Richmond Street in Mt. Vernon.

Those arrested were Jacob Logan Bustle, 20, of Mt. Vernon and Michael Lee Price, 34, of Brodhead.

According to Mt. Vernon Police records, Cameron came home from work Monday to find the front door of his residence prised open and various items missing from his home, including a 42" LG flat screen TV, 30/30 caliber rifle, 9 mm handgun, .410 gauge shotgun, 12 gauge pump shotgun and a .22 caliber rifle.

Cameron told officers he believed Bustle broke into his home and Bustle was also suspected of being involved in a burglary earlier Monday morning at a residence on Chestnut Ridge Road in Mt. Vernon.

Mt. Vernon Police made a traffic stop on Sand Springs Road in Mt. Vernon after observing a Blue 2002 Buick occupied by both Bustle and Price.

Upon receiving consent to search the vehicle, officers found a screw driver in the middle console with white paint on the tip. The screw driver also appeared to match the prise marks on Cameron's front door.

After further question-

ing, Price told officers that he dropped off Bustle at Cameron's residence while he waited inside the vehicle at the intersection of Sally J Road and Richmond Street.

Once Bustle broke into the residence, Price told officers they loaded the TV and guns into the vehicle and took them to Bustle's residence at 310 Paul Street.

Upon searching Bustle's residence, officers found three guns hidden in a honeysuckle thicket behind Bustle's home. Officers also found the two other guns under a mattress in Bustle's bedroom. The TV still has still not been located.

Both men were charged with burglary, first degree and theft by unlawful taking of firearms. Bustle was also separately charged with possession of a firearm by a convicted felon.

Both men remain lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$30,000 cash/property bond.

Only 19 employees will be affected by the closings. Adams said fifteen employees have chosen to participate in a voluntary severance program and that four new positions will be created in Mt. Vernon as a result of their strategic planning program.

Adams said he is looking for a smooth transition as they reshift CAP's mission of meeting people's basic needs by using a self-help approach.

Michael Loiacono, As-

sistant Director of Human Services for the Cumberland Valley Region, said he is pleased to see their facilities help a higher percentage of people who are in need.

"We will be losing some

good programs, but we will also be opening up new facilities that will help a larger amount of people meet their basic needs," Loiacono said.



## Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Springtime: Planting Time

Spring is planting time. This is almost universally the case worldwide. Certainly in cold or moderate climes you want to plant and tender annuals plantings in the spring when freeze damage threats are past. But even in Lousiana for example more azaleas are planted in springtime than at any other (for such a warm place, November to February would be better). Tradition is a powerful thing, and generally spring is indeed a good time to plant.

Why spring planting? Well, for perennials (especially woody perennials which is to say trees and shrubs) planting time can be almost any time of the year for containerized and b&b planting material. But for bare-root plants, and for most all annual vegetable and flower plants, spring is the right time to plant.

The growing of crops by a farmer is an annual thing, usually. Gardeners follow a similar calendar. Plant in spring, harvest in warm season, save seeds for the following year. (Well, seed saving is what grandma did, but today we typically think of a trip to the garden center or hardware store for some tomato or marigold plants.)

From petunias to marigolds to coleus to zinnias, spring is planting time. Literally, you can plant these seeds and get growth to maturity with summer and fall blooming and fall harvest. Most gardeners choose to buy greenhousegrown plants, thereby getting a quick start on the growing season once threat of frost is past. Certainly that shortens the time between transplanting and harvest.

When children were raised on a farm, having to do garden and other chores, these things were known by almost all. Sadly, today so many think flowers come from a garden center or a florist, and food from the grocery or a restaurant.

Perennials, which come back to life each spring after a dormant period, can be planted any time the ground is not frozen. Still. spring is the favorite planting time. This is by habit or choice, not of necessity. Fall is as good a time as spring for tree planting

(transplanting, actually) wherever the ground does not freeze deeper than just on the surface.

This year spring plantings have been happening at a fast pace. Gardens have been growing in backyards ever since the recession kicked in, but this year it seems tree and shrub plantings are also on the rise again.

Just as the mule or ox is no longer used, often the tiller and the sack of 10-10-10 is no longer used either.

Plantings in flower beds potting mixes, with plantings in raised beds, plantings in large containers are some modern gardening practices. So are the weed kill/no till methods of

gardening.

Be it tomatoes or squash, nasturtums or potatoes, apple or cherry trees, springtime is once again planting time.

For some more adventurous folks, grapes, hops, kiwi, melons or popcorn may be worth a try. Perhaps a nut tree or some peanuts.

I might also suggest the Jerusalem artichoke, which has flowers like a sunflower and tubers in the ground like a potato. Kill two birds with one stone; have flowers and veggies on the same plant.

Spring is planting time, so what are you waiting for? The author is a landscaper.



A source water assessment has been performed to indenify land use which may impact the water supply. The primary sources of contamination are agriculture, onsite septic systems, and roadways. Activities and land uses upstream of Mt Vernon Water Work's source of water can pose potential risks to your drinking water. Under certain circumstances contaminants could be released that would pose challenges to water treatment, or even get into your drinking water. These activities, and how they are conducted, are of interest to the entire community because they potentially affect your health and cost of treating your water. If there was a danger, Mt Vernon Water would have notified the public when the violation occurred. This was an oversight, Mt Vernon has made adjustments sending reports into DOW, so this matter will not happen again.

Took a tour of the former Plasticware facility on Tuesday and came away totally impressed.

The place is huge and was in terrible shape when the

clean-up began but with 67 days and counting on the effort, the results are astounding. 30 work-release prisoners have provided the elbow

grease, under the capable leadership of Mark Hopkins, project manager, and they have done an excellent job. Anchor is reportedly very pleased with the county's efforts, as they should be, and their acquisition is a big plus

for the county. While taking the tour, which at my age, or because of my age I thought would never end, I was struck with how productive and industrious the work-release prisoners are and how much talent is being wasted sitting in jail because

of bad life choices.

If these people will work as hard as they do for 63c a day and two meals, why can't they see how much they could accomplish if they could get out in the "real world" and contribute to their own welfare and society as a whole?

I, personally, don't think the answer to a person's addic-

tion is to sit in jail but, at the same time, you cannot let them be abroad among the general populace doing whatever they deem necessary to acquire what they need to feed I live alone, with my two dogs, and I would hate to have

to hurt someone with my late husband's 16 gauge because someone with garbled thinking decides I am an easy mark for robbery. I also shouldn't have to worry for my safety on the highway because someone makes the bad choice to drive impaired. Of course, my children will tell you that I drive impaired and don't need any help from alcohol/drugs, but you must remember that these are children who all think they missed their calling for the Indy 500.

But, back to my original thoughts. The new roof and clean-up of the Anchor building is expensive but an excellent use of our occupational tax money. These funds must be used, primarily, to keep our county on a sound financial footing and to provide a future for our workforce.

We are not a Lexington, Richmond or even Berea with myriad positives for relocation here by industries. We don't have natural gas or top-of-the-line restaurants or many leisure activities for people. We do have beautiful country, friendly people, an excellent school system, great health facilities but we have to woo industries harder than most.

Bottom line is that the Fiscal Court and the Rockcastle County Industrial Authority are to be commended for their gargantuan efforts in getting Anchor and their continued efforts to lure other manufacturing facilities here.

Rockcastle is a wonderful place to live and raise a family but we just have to work a little harder than most to convince the right people of those facts.





30 work-release inmates have been busy for over two months cleaning and painting the former Plasticware facility in the industrial park in order to ready the building for occupation by Anchor Packaging. In addition to the inmate labor, which has saved the county approximately \$140,000 in labor costs, the county has also rented a number of cleaning machines and equipment, such as the scissor-lift shown in the top photo. Over 1500 lbs. of cleaning rags have been used in the effort. Completion of the cleanup is expected in the next 10 days to two weeks, County Judge Buzz Carloftis said. Carloftis also commented, "I am very pleased with our inmates, and their supervisors. Their very hard work and dediication have turned the facility completely around."

## Mt. Vernon native starts challenge in South Africa

Peace Corps volunteers Chris Ames of Chicago, Ill., and Genna Cummins of Mt. Vernon, have organized a math competition for students in six South African schools. Modeled after the American "Mathletes" competition, sixth grade students earn points for their school when they correctly solve problems in three different rounds of competition.

"One of the many reasons that math skills are so poor in rural South Africa is the amount of intimidation and anxiety it induces in learners," said Ames, who has been teaching Math in

South Africa since July 2011. "In order to make math fun and ease some of these anxieties, Genna and I have introduced Mathletes, which is a type of Math competition already well established in the United States."

Each school sends six sixth grade students to play in three distinct rounds. In the first round, all of the players attempt to answer a multiplication question. The first student to answer the question correctly gains the point. In round two, the students answer questions in five different categories

with varying difficulty and point values. In the third round, each team has five minutes to answer to one final problem.

Ames and Cummins have organized two rounds with six schools and hope that teachers will continue to contribute to the challenge. The volunteers have provided the schools with a template to create their own games and a list of topics they should expect to be addressed in each game. They will help teachers write their own math problems to keep the math challenge sustainable.

## **Local students learn PRIDE**

Nature came to life in classrooms in southern and eastern Kentucky - including Rockcastle County during the past school year, thanks to the PRIDE Environmental Education Outreach Program.

The program sent 15 environmental education liaisons into schools in 22 counties, reaching a total of 36,825 students between September 2011 and May

In Rockcastle County, liaison Wonda Hammons worked with 920 students during that time period.

"Her activities and lessons brought student awareness to solid waste and energy challenges and guided students to problem-solve in creative ways to address those areas in their homes and schools," said PRIDE's Tammie Wil-

all liaisons, Like Hammons' goal was to help students prepare for state science tests and develop life-long environmental stewardship skills.

Liaisons taught lessons and led hands-on activities that covered a span of environmental topics including energy, botany, ecosystems, wildlife concepts, solid waste and water quality. They partnered with teachers to complement their classroom instruction.

The liaisons focused on third, fourth and fifth-grade classes. They also worked with all grade levels involved in PRIDE Clubs, which explore environmental issues and perform community service.

"Students really turn on when PRIDE liaisons lead hands-on activities that bring to life lessons they've been learning in class," Wilson said. "Environmental education is a great tool for practicing a variety of skills, from math to problem-solving."

"Teacher evaluations of the liaisons were excellent and showed great interest in continuing the program," Wilson said. "I want to thank our liaisons, who are so creative and enthusiastic. They enjoy interacting with students and teaming with teachers.'

"We are grateful to the local governments, school boards, utility companies and others who partnered with us to bring the program to their counties, as well as the superintendents, principals and teachers who welcomed PRIDE into their schools this year," Wilson added. "You are to be commended for investing in your students and our environment."

The Rockcastle County Fiscal Court, Rockcastle County School System and Appalachia Science in the Public Interest were the local partners that enrolled the school system in the program for the 2011/2012 school year.

PRIDE offers the Environmental Education Outreach Program in 38 counties of southern and eastern Kentucky. In each county, local leaders pay a fee, based on student population, to enroll their schools.
