



Thinking About Cleaning Your Carpet! Some things to think about...

What is the best way to clean my carpet, should I use the old technology of steam cleaning or the new technology of dry foam?

Test results from Consumer Report, 2008.

Option 1: Steam Cleaning-How does it work? A. Steam Cleaners saturate your carpet and floor pad with hot (150* degree) soapy water containing lye and beach to help dissolve stains.

B. After your carpet reaches its maximum saturation point the solution is then extracted by means of a commercial shop vacuum. Allergy season has arrived despite cool temperatures

The unseasonably cool weather Kentuckians have been experiencing lately doesn't mean we have escaped allergy season.

"Allergy season actually begins in late February when junipers, pines, cedars and oaks release pollen into the air," says allergist Dr. Iraklis Livas. "Fortunately for allergy suffers, snow and colder temperatures help keep the pollen count low."

Dr. Livas is a board-certified specialist with more than 17 years of clinical experience in allergies, asthma and immunology. He conducts specialty clinics throughout central and eastern Kentucky including Mt. Vernon.

Typical symptoms for people suffering from allergenic rhinitis, commonly known as hay fever or seasonal allergies include; coughing, sneezing, itchy eyes, runny nose and scratchy throat. In severe cases it can also result in rashes, hives, difficulty breathing, and asthma attacks.

According to the Asthma and Allergy Foundation of America, an estimated 50 million Americans suffer from all types of allergies (1 in 5 Americans) including; indoor/outdoor, food & drug, latex, insect, and skin and eye allergies.

Dr. Livas says that allergy prevalence overall has been increasing since the early 1980s across all age, sex and racial groups and there are varying opinions about why this is so. "Perhaps we are too clean now. With fewer infections, immune systems can turn on themselves. Other theories are that global warming is responsible for more pollen, also, toxins from pollution can contribute to problems," states Livas.

"Spring-time in Kentucky can be particularly hard for some. Barometric and temperature changes can worsen symptoms," says Livas. "So when you have 70 degrees one day and 40 degrees the next, you'll feel worse."

Dr. Livas shares some Do's and Don'ts that you may want to follow during the pollen and mold seasons to lessen your exposure to the pollens or molds that trigger your allergy symptoms:

- DO keep windows closed at night to prevent pollens or molds from drifting into your home. Instead, use air conditioning; which cleans, cools, and dries the air.

- DO minimize early morning activities when pollen usually peaks in the morning and early afternoon. when pollen counts or humidity is reported to be high, and on windy days when dust and pollen are blown around.

- DON'T take more medication than recommended in an attempt to lessen your symptoms.

- DON'T mow lawns or be around freshly cut grass; mowing stirs up pollens and molds.

- DON'T hang sheets or clothing out to dry. Pollens and molds may collect in them.

- DON'T grow too many, or overwater, indoor plants if you are allergic to mold. Wet soil encourages mold growth.

To help control your in-

door allergy symptoms: - DO dust regularly and use a vacuum with a HEPA filter to help eliminate stirring dust up into the air.

- DO encase mattresses, box springs and pillows in airtight zippered plastic or special allergen-proof fabric covers – available at many national stores.

- DO wash bedding weekly using hot water and dry in a hot dryer.

- DO remove the pets from inside the home and avoid contact. If avoidance is not possible, try to minimize contact. Bathing a pet weekly can help reduce the amount of allergens that are shed in the home.

- DON'T let pets sleep in the bedroom.

- DON'T leave food sitting out (including pet food dishes) that may attract cockroaches. Cockroaches produce a protein in their droppings that is a primary trigger of asthma symptoms.

- DO avoid airborne irritants such as; tobacco smoke, aerosols, paint, perfumes, cleaning products, and any other strong odors or fumes.

However, there are effective approaches to treating allergies, both prescription and non-prescription, including the use of antihistamines, decongestants, nasal sprays (either steroid or antihistamine) and immunotherapy (allergy shots).

If you or someone in your family is suffering from allergies or asthma, Dr. Livas and his staff can look at your health history and conduct a thorough evaluation as well as perform allergy testing, if needed, to determine which allergens provoke your symptoms. Yards to Paradise

By Max Phelps Soil Key to Gardening Success

Soil is key to success in growing things. Sure, water and some nutrients will be needed as well, but the soil is what most influences success in plantings for both food and landscaping. Good soil is a pretty generic term, and someone who has made a living off the land will probably take one look and tell you if you have good soil or not. Usually they will be right.

It's not so simple as letting a farmer look at a handful of your soil though. There needs to be some analysis of the nutrient content, the organic content, and the size of the soil particles. A friable soil with good tilth is one thing to a corn grower and quite another to the local greenhouse or nurseryman. What you plan to plant or grow has significant bearing on what constitutes "good soil".

Too often a discussion on soil takes place after the fact. Someone has a dead flower, tree or a sick shrub and wants help figuring out what went wrong. Of course, diseases or insects or drought or too much water can be the culprits when things go wrong. But quite often it's the soil that is the problem.

Since soil is a major factor in growing successfully, let's talk about it in a little more depth. (Speaking of depth, depending on the crop or plant, what's below the first two or three inches on down to two or three feet depth can be a lot more important than what's visible at a glance.) For growing grass, two or three inches of topsoil with a subsoil that perks or drains well may be all that's needed. To grow corn or potatoes in the garden, it may take 8 to 12 inches of good deep loamy soil to get really good re-

sults. And some additional fertilizer, either from a farm store or some manure from a stable or something. Growing trees, be it forestry or orchard or vineyard, a deep well drained soil will be needed. Subsoiling techniques with a bulldozer or a husky tool behind a big tractor may be required to break up the soil on down to where the roots can penetrate for satisfactory growth and production.

To grow mustard, lettuce or radishes, a couple inches of loose soil at the surface may be all that's necessary. It really matters which crop or plants you are growing.

More things to consider: 1) The pH is a factor of acidity or alkilinity. 7.0 is the reading for neutral soil, that is to say a soil neither sweet nor sour. 2) Drainage; does your soil dry out too rapidly to support plant life without daily irrigation (think strawberries grown in sand in Florida or California), or does your soil hold water and stay sticky wet for days after a rain? Both conditions will greatly impact gardening success. 3) Organic matter. Organic matter in soil is usually a very good thing. (But tilling in some recently produced sawdust or mulch may be a very bad thing if you don't know how to adjust your nitrogen fertilizer to compensate for what will be tied up in the decay process. Ditto for dredged soil from a river or creek or soil from bottomland that is more than a foot or so from the surface-there may be close to zero available nitrogen, and you won't have

ver or alfalfa, you want a sweet or high pH soil. If you want to grow azaleas or blueberries, you'll almost certainly kill them by planting them in the field that grew alfalfa so well! So, be sure to test your soil for pH, if you've not done so before. There are ways to change pH, but it is better to plan well ahead for the crop or shrubs you intend to plant, not try to "fix" a bunch of sickly or dead plants. Lime (crushed and burnt limestone, gypsum, bone meal, are sources) will raise the pH to a higher number over time. Sulfur, aluminum sulfate, pine or hardwood mulch and peat moss are some ways to lower pH. Even importing some soil that already has the correct pH for your project may make sense if you are wanting to plant things that don't like your existing soil.

Drainage is not just for septic fields; drainage is critical to growing many trees and flowers successfully. Too dry will kill many plants, but plants native to deserts may grow just fine in such a location. Too wet all the time is often harder on trees and plants than drought. Willows and sycamores and cypress may be happy as can be with wet conditions. So, soil drainage or the lack thereof is part of what is key to gardening and landscaping success.

Another part of this topic is soil nutrients. Everyone knows (well maybe not everyone) that 10-10-10 garden fertilizers contain N-P-K, which is nitrogen, phosphorous and potassium or potash. These nutrients are demanded by most plants. But some plants absolutely require additional minor nutrients, what we call "trace elements". Iron, magnesium, manganese are examples of minor nutrients that plants also need. Adding 10-10-10 garden fertilizer to play

sand may indeed be sufficient to grow a few flowers or vegetables, but you will have nutrient-deficient plants. This is where additional supplements such as composted leaves and grass and manure can come in so handy. Peat, egg shells, coffee grounds, cocoa and rice husks, shredded straw or peanut hulls-so many organic wastes can be added to soil to improve both it's nutrients and water holding or drainage capacities.

Heavy clay soils, rocky soils, or worse yet--those yards where the developer sold all the topsoil and you're trying to grow grass and shrubbery around your house in soil that is not fit for growing—knowing your problems before you begin to plant is critical.

Growing success can be had in most any soil. You just have to choose the crops or landscape plants that will like what you have. Or, you will have to add to or amend your soil, or change it out for some that is better suited to what you want to plant. With the right knowledge and necessary adjustments in either your plant choices or in changes to your soil you can garden successfully almost anywhere.

I think it probably is good to conclude by adding that raised beds are one solution you may wish to consider if you have less than desirable soil for growing the things you want to grow. (Personally, I believe raised bed gardening is successful more because of adding good planting mixes than the simple act of doing a 'raised bed'.)

A good gardener will grow things that will amaze you in some very marginal soils. And if a person has ideal soil already, then raised beds are not needed. School Board approves the elimination of thirteen positions

The Rockcastle County School Board officially approved the elimination of thirteen total positions during their monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Superintendent David Pensol proposed the finalized plan for district-wide cutbacks and eliminations to the board, which were based upon the enrollment figures at each school and the cutback of SEEK (Student Excellence in Education in Kentucky) funding by the state.

Pensol said that after crunching some numbers they were fortunate to discover that they would only have to cut eight positions

due to SEEK budget cuts instead of ten. He also said they were able to reduce the proposed 22:1 student/ teacher ratio to 21:1.

"We have worked individually with every principal at every school and discussed each situation to try and make the best decisions possible," Pensol said. "After working together with everyone we have come to the conclusion that this proposal would be best for our students and teachers."

The new proposal called for three positions at the high school, two positions at Mt. Vernon Elementary and one each at the middle



Fun with Slide Rules – as told by a former science nerd

When I was a student at Mt. Vernon High School (MVHS) - 1959 to 1962 my interests were centered toward the math and science classes that were available. Both of these fields of study were relatively easy for me to understand. I had developed an interest during my years in elementary school.

Some of my favorite teachers were found in the math and science departments of the school. I took every class that they taught during my four years at MVHS. Who could ever forget sitting in class under the direction of Dorothy and Bill Landrum, "Tuck" Baker, or Coach Berry?

When I entered the University of Kentucky (UK) in the summer of 1962, I declared that my major and minor would be Biology and Chemistry. To attain a degree in these subjects required that I also take several math classes including: College Algebra, Trigonometry, and Calculus. In all three of these math classes and in most of my chemistry classes, the professors demanded that each student purchase and become acquainted with operating a slide rule. Until that time, I had never seen nor used one so the idea was foreign to me. Throughout the 1950s and 1960s, the slide rule was the symbol of the math and science student in the same way that a stethoscope symbolized the medical profession.

In case you're not familiar with the item, allow me to introduce you to the use and functions of a slide rule. It is a mechanical analog device, used primarily for multiplication and division of very large numbers. It is also used for certain functions such as roots, logarithms and trigonometry. Before the advent of the pocket calculator, it was the most commonly used calcu-


grow and became extremely popular in the US during the 50's. It lasted until 1974, when the electronic scientific calculator made the slide rule obsolete.

I think it is interesting that Wernher von Braun brought two 1930's vintage Nestler slide rules with him when he moved to the US after World War II to work on the American space program. Throughout his life, he never used any other pocket calculating devices. Aluminum Pickett brand slide rules were carried on five Apollo space missions, including to the moon.

My chemistry professor at UK expressively instructed us to purchase a specific Pickett, ten-inch rule for his class. Almost every male student had a black leather holster fastened to his belt as he strolled across campus toward the Chemistry/Physics building. I remember walking into Kennedy Book Store at UK to purchase my own Picket rule. In those days, the cost was in the neighborhood of \$55, and the leather holster was an additional \$5 – an exorbitant price for the time. During the first week of my chemistry class, we spent most of the time learning how to use the mechanical calculator. A few of the students dropped the class because they could not master calculating very large numbers using the new rule.

When I began my own teaching career at Campbellsville High School in 1965, I purchased enough basic slide rules so that all of my students could master its use in my chemistry classes. I even had a threefoot, wall-mounted wooden slide rule hanging over my blackboard in order to be able to demonstrate its use to the entire class at one time. Little did I realize that its importance was going to end in a very few years.

By the mid-70s, my chemistry classes were us-

But I got through college and into the early part of my career with just those two falsies as I began accumulating a mouthful of amalgam. Over the years I've never once gone in for a routine cleaning that didn't result in one to three or more follow-up s for fillings.

The extractions, always one at a time, began when I was about 35 and it's been downhill ever since. The upper partial grew from one to six teeth. A lower now has five. But, since last Christmas, two more uppers have broken off beyond repair and my dentist and I decided that it was time to start thinking about extracting the last of my upper teeth and going for a full plate of

Roman soldier, а "Longinus" by tradition, stabbed Christ in the side to make sure He was dead. This is noted in the apocryphal Gospel of Nicodemus. At some point he has gained sainthood and is now "Saint Longinus".

There are four relics that claim to be the Holy Lance or at least to be parts of it. Rome, Vienna, Armenia, and Antioch all claim the holy relic.

The Holy Lance in Rome is located beneath the dome of Saint Peter's Basilica, although the Catholic Church claims no authenticity to the relic. In the year 615, Jerusalem was captured by Persian forces and the point of the lance went through various hands before ending up in France, but disappeared during the French Revolution. The larger portion wasn't seen after 615 in Jerusalem, but some speculate it was relocated to Constantinople. It was reportedly seen there as late as 1430. IN the mid-18th century, Pope Benedict XIV stated that he had seen drawings and the larger piece and smaller piece formed one blade. The relic has been at St. Peter's Basilica since.



The Circuit Court Clerk's office plays a vital role in helping patients in need. With nearly 1000 Kentuckians on the waiting list for an organ transplant, the need is greater than ever. The driver's license clerks ask every person obtaining a license or ID to donate a \$1 to the Kentucky Organ Donor Program and, if they wish to be a registered organ donor.

"I am honored to announce that in 2012, 425 Rockcastle County residents gave hope to patients in need by becoming registered organ donors," York said.

Out of 3828 licenses issued last year, the Rockcastle County driver's license staff collected \$2257 to help the Circuit Clerk's organ donor awareness program. These dollar donations go to a separate nonprofit called the Trust For Life. With these funds, the Trust educates Kentucky about the life-saving mission of organ donation through community outreach programs, public speaking and advertising efforts.

Each day, 18 people die while awaiting a life-saving organ transplant. The Circuit Clerk's office, and the dedicated residents of Rockcastle County are working to end the wait and save more lives. As of January 2013, Kentuckians who renew their license can have a blue organ donor heart printed on their ID.

'Every heart we print gives hope to patients in need. We hope everyone will understand that you no longer have to sign the back of your license or use an orange dot. Simply say Yes when you renew your ID to add your name to the confidential Kentucky Organ Donor Registry," York explained.



school, Brodhead Elementary and Roundstone Elementary to be eliminated. The original plan called for four positions at the high school and two positions at the middle school to be eliminated.

Pensol also proposed cutting two more positions at RCHS that was already "over and above" the SBDM allotment. He noted the school district would not be receiving the federal funded "Teacher Quality Grant" next year. The grant was originally provided by the federal government for class size reduction but Pensol said it will be "completely depleted" next year and as a result three more positions, one each at the middle school, Brodhead Elementary and Roundstone Elementary,

will have to be cut. After thorough discussion, the board unanimously approved the proposed 2013-2014 SBDM allocations.

Pensol also presented the district's proposed 2013-2014 salary schedule with numerous changes from the 2012-2013 salary schedule.

Pesnol proposed to change the Mt. Vernon elementary school assistant principal position from 20 extended days to 30 extended days because additional duties have been assigned to the position that are special education district duties, in addition to the original assistant principal duties.

"These duties have been assigned to this position for years and has been paid through an hourly stipend," Pensol said. "It gets messy because that individual leaves during the school day to perform these duties and we are paying them a stipend for after school hours when they aren't really staying after school. The extended days proposal only clarifies everything." The alternative school principal position was also eliminated from the salary schedule. Pensol said they have successfully operated this year without a principal and believe it's in their best interest not to re-hire one.

Director of Student Services Becky Isaacs said that a principal is not needed at the alternative school as there are only 25 students currently enrolled with only 21 students in class as the others receive homebound services.

"Myself or other central office staff are just seconds or minutes away and can be there quickly to tend to any serious issues," Isaacs said. "There hasn't been a time this year where this process hasn't worked."

Pensol went on to say that they are currently meeting with the health department and trying to renegotiate an arrangement with school nurses.

The health department announced last month that they were having to cut back their funding for school nurses. Pensol said they went ahead and created a job classification that would allow LPNs or other certified nursing assistants to be able to use their degrees while being employed in the schools. The new school nurse position will have an hourly salary schedule.

Pensol said that if negotiations go well with the health department in the next few weeks, they will have a full time nursing unit at all schools in the future.

The board approved the 2013-2014 annual salary schedule in preparation of the terms of agreement with the health department.

In the final item of business, Pensol told the board that the Mt. Vernon Elementary Site-Based Council is currently reviewing applications for the principal vacancy and have set up interviews for Thursday night and Monday night. He said there were 16 total applicants, six in-district and 10 outside the district.

House balked at the increase.

Monday, RCIDA Chairman Robert Lawson recounted a meeting with board member Corey Craig where they discussed the issue and Craig told board he felt that allowing White House to have the site for \$75,000 would not "set a predence" in the board's dealings with other potential buyers. "Approximately a half acre of the site is not usuable/of no value, and we need to put this issue to bed.'

On a motion by Craig, the board voted to sell the property to White House for the \$75,000 figure.

The next phase will involve White House submitting their plans for the planned 9,000 sq. ft. facility and signage.

During the meeting, CSEPP Director Hal Holbrook reported to the board that expectations were that the local emergency services building would be bid out the last of April or the first of May with the contract being awarded probably in June with construction taking 11-12 months.

Holbrook said the delay had been caused by a \$750,000 overage on the first bids submitted for the same facility in Powell County which caused Homeland Security to come up with much pared down specifications for the building. The bid for Powell County facility eventually came in at \$300,000 over estimate for a total of \$1.9 million.

The CSEPP director said bids for the local building were expected to come in in the \$1.5 million range.

Craig told the board that there was about \$214,000 remaining on a Dept. of Transportation \$1.3 million grant and these funds would be used to extend the road to the emergency facility, for signage, lighting and the parking lot. "Using these funds will make the federal grant go further and will improve and enhance the park which is the point of the grant," Craig said.

Final plans for the facility are expected to be submitted to the board April 16th.

RCIDA Executive Director Holly Hopkins told the board that there are presently 350 employees at SourceHOV, with that number expected to rise to 520 at capacity. However, she said that the Veterans Administration was interested in amending their contract with SourceHOV which could bring an additional 200 jobs to the county. Besides those jobs, SourceHOV has bid on another contract which would involve leasing the old sewing factory to accommodate those jobs, if acquired.

McKinney, the motion passed unanimously. The additional funding will go into effect immediately.

Reynolds' currently has seven employees, which includes Rowe.

Monday's action will bring the total supplement to Reynolds' office to \$40,700 a year.

The court also heard another request from Constable Richard Dean for funding for constables when they assist the sheriff's office by serving legal documents.

Dean's request, for \$400 a month, for gas expenses, was backed up by Carl Swanigan who told the court that the constables provided a needed service but that, to be fair, any money given to constables would also have to given to the sheriff's department for their expenses

in serving warrants, child support papers, summons, etc. However, Carloftis reminded the court that the sheriff's department was already supplemented by the fiscal court and anything given to the constables would not also have to be given to the sheriff's department.

Reynolds agreed that Dean was a "lifesaver" to his office since there was such a backlog of legal papers to be served in the county.

One suggestion was that the constables be treated as individual contractors and paid in that manner but Magistrate Bill McKinney quickly reminded everyone that elected officials cannot be contracted to the county. "I can't so I'm sure constables can't be,"McKinney said.

Another solution was that additional funds be provided the county attorney's office and funneled to constables for their service.

However, Wednesday, Reynolds told the *Signal* that extensive research had not shown any way that constables could be paid by the court without the court being liable for their actions i.e., breaking the county's solemn immunity.

Reynolds said the idea of additional program support for his office to be used for payments to the constables would no doubt be considered an "end-around" to the statutes. "As good as Richard has been to my office, I can't recommend to the court that the funding be made available," the county attorney said.

The court also approved \$6,500 for a trailer to transport urban search and rescue equipment for the Brodhead Fire Department. The equipment was obtained with a \$60,000 grant from Homeland Security and one of the requirements is that the equipment be mobile when needed. On the request of Katha Carpenter, Livingston City Commissioner, the court also approved a \$1,000 donation for expenses associated with the upcoming Founder's Day Celebration scheduled for May 10 and 11.

The court was also informed that needed repairs to the jail's shower section, and the replacement of all vents in the jail (46), will cost approximately \$20,000.

As a last item of business, the court approved the transfer of \$25,000 from the general fund to the jail fund and \$150,000 from the occupational tax fund to the general fund.

Crab Orchard man arrested for meth possession Monday

A Crab Orchard man was arrested for meth possession Monday night after police raided a home on Old US 25 in Mt. Vernon.

Arrested at the scene was Jody Ray Cooper, 26, of Crab Orchard.

According to Mt. Vernon Police reports, Assistant Chief Barry Adams and Officer Jeff Harness responded to the residence after discovering the homeowners had purchased a large amount of pseudoephedrine earlier in the day.

Once officers arrived, they found Cooper sitting at the kitchen table inside the residence. Officers also discovered that Cooper had two bench warrants out for his arrest.

Found on Cooper at the time of his arrest was a hunting knife, syringe and a small plastic bag of suspected methamphetamine.

Cooper was charged with possession of a controlled substance, first degree. He remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$7,500/10% bond.

Brodhead man arrested for manufacturing meth

A Brodhead man was arrested for manufacturing meth last Tuesday,m after officers from the Mt. Vernon Police Department and Rockcastle County Sheriff's Department raided an apartment at Castle Village Apartments in Brodhead.

Arrested at the scene was Shannon Christopher Vaughn, 38, of Brodhead.

According to Mt. Vernon Police reports, Assistant Chief Barry Adams and Deputy Sheriff Matt Bryant received complaints of someone selling heroin in an apartment at the apartments.

Once officers arrived at the scene, the tenant gave them permission to search the apartment. Adams found Vaughn hiding in a bedroom closet with a plastic bag containing a box of pseudoephedrine tablets, a measuring cup, coffee filters, a spoon, a roll of black electrical tape and a bottle of Gumout engine starting fuel.

After searching the residence, officers also found a small baggie of suspected methamphetamine, exposed hypodermic needles, a box of Reynolds Wrap tinfoil, a bottle of engine starting fluid, four mixing cups bound together with electrical tape and a set of funnels that were also taped together with black electrical tape.

Officers also found a pack of batteries in Vaughn's coat pocket at the time of his arrest. Officers discovered through MethCheck that Vaughn had purchased a total of 13.2 grams of pseudoephedrine since January 7, 2013.

No heroin was found at the scene.

Vaughn was charged with manufacturing methamphetamine and possession of a controlled substance, first degree. He remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$25,000 cash/property bond.

backup is due to the low lying position of the property. Thus both parties agree that the only feasible way to correct the problem is to install a lift station.

Mr. King said that he couldn't believe the agreement said that the home was built on a property that was too low.

"The agreement says that the house was too low but when the city's sewer system works our sewer works," King said. "During heavy rains your sewer plant can't handle it and water is squirting up out of our manhole. Then our toilets in the bathrooms won't flush and it's hard to rent a house when the toilets won't flush."

King said that Mayor Walter Cash originally told him the city would install a lift station if the Kings would sign an agreement to furnish the electricity for the station.

However, Mr. King said they were shocked when they first received the agreement which said that once the city installs the lift station, the city would have no further duty to the upkeep, maintenance or operation and that the successful operation of the lift station would not be the responsibility of the city after it is installed.

"If the lift station doesn't take care of the problem, then the agreement says there is nothing else the city can do," Mr. King said. "If it doesn't work then I got a house sitting down there with no sewer and an obligation to a lift station that doesn't work."

Mayor Cash assured the King's the lift station will work and that the city currently has other homes within city limits operating on a lift station.

We have a lift station that is taking care of two houses in our city limits and we have never had any problems out of it." Mayor Cash said.

Councilman Ronnie Cash told the Kings that the council was advised to follow the advice of their attorney and that if they didn't feel comfortable signing the agreement then he didn't think they should sign it.

Mrs. King also said that she is shocked that the city doesn't seemed concerned that there is raw sewage floating around in open areas within city limits.

"Do you all not have a concern that there is raw sewage floating on the top of the ground that we are all breathing in," Mrs. King said. "After heavy rains we have found raw sewage, towels, syringes and baby wipes floating up out of the manhole. We even have pictures of it to prove it."

Councilman Larry Taylor said the Rockcastle Health and Rehabilitation Center is going to have to monitor their waste more closely. Taylor said that city officials had met with the previous owner before but that the nursing home has changed owners since the council last met with them. Councilman Mark Buras agreed and said that they need to have their lawyer to draft a letter to Signature Healthcare.

The council unanimously agreed to have their lawyer draft a letter identifying the problems and urging them to address the problems in a prompt manner.

The council also agreed to award the bid for building the city's shelter at the new park to Kenny Dyehouse for \$10,000. Construction on the shelter started Wednesday and it is scheduled to be completed by June 15th.





Scholarships help students take dual credit classes

Kentucky high school juniors and seniors may qualify for a scholarship to help pay for dual credit classes taken at a Kentucky college or university.

The Mary Jo Young Scholarship, named for a former member of the Board of Directors of the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA), provides up to \$420 per class toward tuition for up to two classes each semester and up to \$125 per class for textbooks. Scholarships can only be used in the fall and spring semesters. To be considered, stu-

dents must be in grades 11 or 12 during the 2013-2014 academic year. They must have at least an 18 ACT composite or achieve at least a 2.5 GPA during the 2012-2013 academic year. Priority will be given to students eligible for free and reduced-price lunch.

The application is available on www.kheaa.com. Students must apply through their www.kheaa.com account. The application period runs through May 15, 2013.

KHEAA is the agency that administers state grant, scholarship and savings programs and provides free college and financial aid planning publications to Kentuckians.



Firefighters complete rope rescue course

Over the past few months firefighters from Brodhead Fire Dept., Mt. Vernon Fire & Rescue, Livingston Fire & Rescue, Fogertown Fire Dept. (Clay County), London City Fire Dept., and Laurel County Rescue Squad completed a Rope Rescue Technician Coarse. The class is a 40 Hr. Technician Level certification that expands into several other rescue disciplines. The departments represented are all volunteer agencies requiring the class to be spread out over a month and a half during the evenings after work and on Saturdays.

Over the past few years Fire Departments in Rockcastle have noticed a strong need for expanded rescue training due to many factors. One area that was lacking was rope rescue. The recently completed class is the second technician level courseheld in Rockcastle in the past two years. "We now have over 30 rope rescue technicians

representing four of the seven fire departmentsas well as 4 current members of the Rockcastle Ambulance Service." According to Brodhead Asst. Chief John Dyehouse, Instructor

for the class. The training received has already been put to use. In the early morning hours of March 16ththe members of Mt. Vernon Fire & Rescue and Brodhead Fire Department rescued a man that fell into a vent opening at the rock quarry. Members had to lower a rescuer in to the opening down 30 plus feet, place the patient into a Stokes Basket, and haul the victim to safety. "Rope Rescue is a very technical skill that must be carried out with purpose and proficiency to ensure the safety of the rescuer on rope and the patient". Says Dyehouse.

During the class students had to complete the total required 40 hrs. of training as well as pass two skills based testsand a final written According to exam. Dyehouse this class is patterned after the Rope Rescue Technician Coarse that is used by the Lexington Fire Department to certify members of their rescue team. More classes like this one are planned for the future to expand the ability of First Responders to better serve the citizens of Rockcastle County.





Direct and Counter-Cyclical Payment Program (DCP) - 2013

The American Taxpayer Relief Act of 2012, enacted on Jan. 2, 2013, amends the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008 and provides for a one-year extension of the Direct and Counter-Cyclical (DCP) program. To be eligible for direct and counter-cyclical payments, producers must enroll their farms in DCP during the sign-up period which began on Feb. 19, 2013 and ends on Aug. 2, 2013.

Crop Acreage Reporting

Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds agricultural producers of the acreage reporting requirements that must be met prior to receiving program benefits. Filing an accurate acreage report for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage and prevented planting acreage, can prevent the loss of benefits for a variety of programs. July 15th is the final date to certify all crops, except small grains.

Producers must report acreages to maintain eligibility for Price Support Programs, Noninsured Crop Assistance Program (NAP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) and Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program (DCP). All cropland on farms must be certified to remain eligible for these programs

CRP Sign-up

Kentucky Farm Service agency (FSA) will conduct a four-week Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up beginning May 20, 2013 and ending on June 14, 2013. CRP addresses critical resource issues. In addition to erosion control, CRP provides significant water quality benefits including reduced nutrients and sediment load-

ings and adverse consequences associated with floods as well as expanded and enhanced wildlife habitat.

CRP is a voluntary program available to agricultural producers to help them safeguard environmentally sensitive land. Producers enrolled in CRP plant longterm, resource-conserving covers to improve the quality of water, control soil erosion and enhance wildlife habitat. Producers that are accepted in the sign-up can receive cost-share assistance for planting covers and receive an annual rental payment for the length of the contract (10-15 years).
