



School Board discusses plans for building renovations

By: Doug Ponder The school board discussed a proposed list of facility renovations at the monthly meeting Tuesday night.

Superintendent David Pensol said he had met with district staff to prioritize which facility renovations need to be first on the list. He said the first three projects on the proposed list were: Mt. Vernon Elementary School, Rockcastle Adult Education Center and the athletic fieldhouse and restroom facilities at the football field at Rockcastle County Middle School.

"We created this list based on things like timing, limiting the amount of disruption for students and which projects were the most urgent," Pensol told board members. "We will have more specific details at the next meeting when we will have a presentation of the architectural drawings."

According to the facilities plan list, improvements at Mt. Vernon Elementary School include upgrading the parent pick-up loop at a cost of \$187,310, a new roof, \$505,262, HVAC renovation, \$2,378,276, ceiling replacement, \$300,939 and lighting replacement, \$465,948.

Renovations at the Rockcastle County Academy and Adult Education Center include an entrance canopy, \$8,250, ramp access with steps, \$13,750, new

entrance to the parking lot \$82,379 and repaying the middle school driveways and parking lot, \$205,016.

Improvements at the RCMS football fieldhouse and restroom facilities include home fieldhouse renovation, \$161,875, home fieldhouse' addition \$296,400, visitor locker room renovation, \$84,263 and visitor locker room addition, \$91,260.

'We all realized that the first thing desperately needed was a roof at Mt Vernon Elementary School," Pensol said. "It's also not a PR (public relations) issue that we are proposing renovations of the football field instead of school buildings. Those fieldhouses are in desperate need of repair. If we don't have fieldhouses we won't have football programs."

Pensol recommended the board approve the N3D Group of Lexington as the architectural firm to desigr. the projects. He said the company's owner Scott Noel has been involved in other past facility projects for the district and knows the facilities well.

Pensol went on to say that if the board approved. the N3D Group, there will be a special meeting next week to discuss and approve the architectural drawings.

Mayor Medley reports on sewer plant; water leaks

Livingston Mayor Jason Medley and commissioners had two meetings with the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) last week and said, at Monday night's regular meeting, that the city had managed to get to first on the list for financial help from KIA for the city's sewer system.

Medley said it wasn't clear at this time whether the city would go for funding for a new plant or funding for improvements to get the present plant "up and running."

No new business at monthly Brodhead **Council meeting**

By: Doug Ponder The agenda for the monthly Brodhead Council meeting Monday night was blank.

With the exception of paying the monthly bills, there was no old business or new business on the agenda.

However, Clerk Becky Bussell had information for council members concerning the city being approved for a grant/loan from the Kentucky Infrastructure Authority (KIA) to repair the city's sewer system. The city will receive \$1.2 million with \$600,000 of the funding as a grant and the other \$600,000 of the funding as a loan with a three quarter percent interest rate.

The city filed a project profile with the Cumberland Valley Area Development District in October 2010 in order to be able to seek loan

Renfro Rock N Run is Saturday morning


Rockcastle Regional Hospital will hold their second annual Renfro Rock N Run Half Marathon and 5K this Saturday.


and grant funding for repairing their sewer system.

The city's project profiles addresses their sewer and wastewater systems by completing sewer line and manhole repairs/replacements, wastewater pumping station replacement, construction of wet water flow equalization at the treatment plant, city hall lift station maintenance and a new state mandated influent meter that has to be installed at the city's sewer plant.

The second and last phase of the project profile includes doubling the city's 150,000 gallons a day sewer plant processing capacity to 300,000 gallons a day.

Bussell went on to say. that construction and repairs on the city's sewer system are expected to begin in the spring of 2015.

The ideal death Many people across the country have been broadcasting their opinions on social media about whether or not assisted suicide should be legally allowed as a choice for terminally ill people.

In a more blunt and less politically correct form, the question is should people with untreatable life-ending. illnesses have the choice to legally kill themselves?

There are two terminally ill people who are being used as examples in this debate. Both people were diagnosed with terminal illnesses that doctors said couldn't be treated and both of them were only given a few months to live after being diagnosed.

Both of these people have now died but the main difference between the two was one committed suicide and the other one didn't.

The first person was a 29-year-old woman named Brittany Maynard who was diagnosed with stage 4 glioblastoma (brain tumor). She was only given six months to live after she was diagnosed with the terminal illness in the spring.

Maynard decided to move to Oregon where assisted suicide with lethal. medication prescribed by a doctor is legal under the states "Death With Dignity Law." She told reporters that she decided to take her own life after she discussed with' experts how her body would deteriorate and was told it would be a "terrible and painful way to die."

Hundreds of terminally ill people have chosen assisted suicide in Oregon and, other states where it's legal, but Maynard's case made headlines when she launched an online campaign in hopes of expanding the "Death With Dignity Law" nationwide. Maynard

said she launched the campaign to represent other terminally ill patients who "wish to die on their own terms."

Maynard's decision to take her own life has sparked a debate with some viewing it as suicide and others as "death with dignity."

The other side of the issue is 18-year-old Clayton McDonald who was diagnosed with leukemia when he was seven-years-old and was successfully treated with chemotherapy.


Unfortunately, the leukemia returned in 2008 and doctors told McDonald that the disease had become terminal, ultimately meaning there was no cure and that there was nothing they could do to save his life.

However, McDonald didn't choose to take his own life instead using his story to spread the Gospel of Jesus Christ to people by speaking at churches, schools, etc. His video testimony is on YouTube and should be a must watch for everyone.

Of course we all know how a lot of human beings handle such a debate as millions of people have judged other peoples' opinions on the issue and argued with those who don't agree with them.

Judgment has been handed down on both sides of the issue as Maynard's family members and McDonald's family members have received "hate mail" and emails condemning their decisions.

There have also been social media posts from thousands of people mocking Maynard and both McDonald for their respective decisions. I'm not going to get into the details of all this because it could be a separate column in and of (Cont. to A4)

The Fall Foods








Juanita Stanley





on the internet. Lovell's IP address was identified during the investigation.

Detectives obtained a search warrant last Wednesday for Lovell's residence on South Wilderness Road in Mt. Vernon. Once detectives arrived, they seized several pieces of electronic equipment and electronic' storage devices that are undergoing a full forensic evaluation.

Lovell's arrest is part of an ongoing task force program for the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC) and Internet Crimes Against Children.

Lovell is charged with possession of matter portraying sexual performance by a minor and distribution of matter portraying sexual performances by a minor. He remains lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center on a \$50,000 cash bond.









Kentucky Afield Outdoors Fishing remains productive during deer season

This is the fourth installment of a series of articles titled "Fall Fishing Festival" profiling the productive fishing on Kentucky's lakes, rivers and streams in fall.

FRANKFORT, Ky. -Kentucky offers some of the finest deer hunting found anywhere, and the modern gun deer season stands as one of the most anticipated opportunities each year.

Its allure draws many anglers away from the water in November.

"A lot of people start to put up their fishing gear this FINs lakes. time of year and head for the woods," said Dane Balsman, urban fisheries research biologist with the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "There are a lot of good fishing opportunities in the fall and a lot less pressure. You can have some of your best fishing this time of vear.'

Anglers don't have to travel far to find a productive spot.

Kentucky Fish and Wildlife started the Fishing In Neighborhoods (FINs) program in 2006 as a way to expand fishing opportunities for anglers living in the state's largest cities.

Initially limited to a handful of lakes in central and northern Kentucky, the program took off and now includes 40 lakes across the state.

In October and November, Kentucky Fish and Wildlife stocks a total of 57,000 rainbow trout in

These 9- to 11-inch trout, reared at the Wolf Creek National Fish Hatchery, are eager to bite and put up a fight that often belies their size. A small in-line spinner or a 1/8-ounce spoon in silver or gold are good bets. Brightly-colored dough baits formulated for trout and corn fished on the bot-* tom or suspended under a bobber also are consistent próducers.

"Pretty basic: small

hook, small bait," Balsman said. "It doesn't take much." The newest addition to the FINs lineup is the 11.6acre lake at Maysville-Mason County Recreation

Park. It joined the program this year and received its first stocking of catfish this past summer.

"It's a pretty lake with great access all the way around it," said Balsman, who added that the lake would receive its stocking of trout this month.

FINs lakes are stocked with channel catfish and hybrid sunfish in spring and summer. The bass and bluegill populations are monitored and supported with stockings as needed.

"Those other fish are still feeding pretty heavily in November trying to pack on some pounds for the cold winter months when they're not as active," Balsman said.

Daily limits for FINs lakes are five rainbow trout, four catfish, one largemouth bass over 15 inches and 15 bluegill or other sunfish.

Anglers ages 16 and older will need a statewide fishing license, unless exempt. Licensed anglers who intend to keep their trout also must purchase a trout permit. The permit is included in the Sportsman's license and Senior license.

"If you're going to catch and release trout, practice good techniques," Balsman said. "Don't use a dry towel or step on the fish to get the hook out. Try to keep it damp with your hands. If it swallows the hook, you're probably better off cutting the line.'

Feeling more adventurous?

The tailwater below Lake Cumberland's Wolf Creek Dam is a year-round fishery renowned for trout, striped bass and walleye.

"The tailwater is always good," said John Williams,... southeastern district fisheries biologist for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife. "The upper part of the tailwater from the dam to Helm's Landing or Winfrey's Ferry is better in terms of numbers of trout. As you go downstream from there you usually get some big fish. I always like fishing Helm's to Winfrey's. You have good numbers and some nice-sized fish, too." Kentucky Fish and Wildlife biologists sampled the area within the past week and found mostly rainbows around Helm's Landing and mostly brown trout down around the Burkesville area near the KY 61 bridge. Crankbaits that imitate crawfish and minnows are effective for trout. Work ei-

ther with a steady retrieve or quick jerks to entice strikes.

We also saw some nice stripers below Hatchery Creek," Williams said, "and several walleye pretty close to the dam.'

Anglers should consult the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers website at www.lrn.usace.army.mil for the water release and generation schedule.

"If you like a big fish, it's probably the best place to catch a huge striper because they've got plenty to eat and the water conditions are nice and cool," Williams



DEBBIE'S CHEESE SQUARES 2 boxes (8 ounces each) cream cheese, very soft 1 egg, separated 1 cup of sugar, divided 3/4

for cheese mix and 1/4 for topping 2 rolls of crescent dough

1/4 cup of cinnamon 1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 325° degrees. Mix together 1/4 cup of sugar and 1/4cup of cinnamon - set aside for topping. (I like a little less cinnamon because it can get too harsh) Microwave cream cheese for 1 minute, stir. Repeat to get soft enough. Mix together softened cream cheese, 3/4cup sugar, egg yolk, and vanilla until smooth. Grease a 9 x 13 pan (I prefet glass, I also use cooking spray to grease the pan because it's easy) Roll out 1 package of crescent dough smooth to the edges of the pan. Pour in cheese mixture and spread smoothly over dough. Roll out remaining package of crescent dough over top of the cheese mixture. It will be too small but only stretch it a little to almost fit to the edges of the pan without disturbing the cheese mixture. Take the separated egg white and beat it with a basting brush

cheese, softened ened condensed milk 1 cup smooth peanut butter 3 tablespoons lemon juice 1 teaspoon vanilla 1 tub (8 ounce) Cool Whip®, thawed In a large bowl, beat cream cheese until fluffy. In another bowl, mix Eagle Brand[®] milk with peanut butter. Gradually beat into the cream cheese until smooth. Add lemon juice and vanilla; mix well. Fold in Cool Whip®. who helped Robbins refine his skills and acquire the equipment needed to produce brooms.

Robbins makes all of his brooms totally by hand with the assistance of broom making equipment that is 100 or more years old. He uses a 100-year-old winder, constructed with wooden pegs, which is used to attach the broomcorn to the broom handle. His vise. which is used to hold the broom while it is stitched and tied, is dated Sept. 10, 1878

The broomcorn that Robbins uses to make his brooms is a member of the millet family. This tall plant has woody stalks and little foliage, but looks a bit like sweet corn. It produces bristles laden with seeds rather than an ear. These bristles are processed and dried in various ways, depending on whether they will be used to produce brooms, brushes or floral arrangements.

In 2002, Robbins was juried into the Kentucky Crafted Marketing Program - one of the youngest craftsmen ever to be awarded this honor. He is also a juried member of the Kentucky Guild of Artists and Craftsmen and the

arts education. Broomcraft has been a part of the Berea College Student Craft Program since 1920, when equipment from a broom factory was given to the college.

Brooms by Christopher Robbins are regularly available at the Kentucky Artisan Center, located at 200 Artisan Way, just off Interstate 75 at Berea Exit 77. The center's exhibits, shopping and travel information areas are open daily from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m., and the cafe is open from 9:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Admission is free.

The Kentucky Artisan Center at Berea currently features works by more than 700 artisans from more than 100 counties across the Commonwealth.
