

KKK flyer frightens Mt. Vernon residents

By: Doug Ponder Several Mt, Vernon residents woke up to a bizarre occurrence last Friday morning as they found Klu

According to Rockcastle County Sheriff Mike Peters, the KKK flyers were from an organization called the "Traditionalist American Klux Klan recruitment fly- Knights of the Klu Klux ers in their front yards. Klan." He said they believe those responsible for the recruitment flyers, placed them in homeowners' yards.

that they received the flyers. As far as we know, the flyers were only placed in the yards of several streets in the Mt. Vernon city limits." The KKK organization's flyer contains information that is allegedly written to warn people about Muslims, pedophiles, drug dealers, thieves and other criminals. The flyers were distributed in plastic bags with two marbles. The flyers contained a phone number and website for the organization. The flyer also contained a physical address to Park Hills. Missouri and the organization is listed as an actual organization.

Peters said he doesn't believe the flyers were meant as a threat to the homeowners who received them. He said this is the same KKK organization that has placed flyers in other cities and communities across the state. This is just part of the craziness in our country. I don't think it was meant as a threat to any of the homeowners. It's freedom of speech that gives people the right to express their opinion but putting unwanted items in peoples' yards could be littering," . (Cont. to A5)

Prep started for bridge replacement on Mullins **Station Road**

By: Doug Ponder The Kentucky Transportation Cabinet recently started preparations to replace a bridge on Mullins Station Road in Mt. Vernon, According to KTC Infor-

mation Officer Amber Hale, the bridge on Mullins Station Road, across Mullins, Station Creek, will be replaced and construction crews will build a temporary bridge for motorists to use while the main bridge is under construction. She said crews started mobilizing their equipment this week and have started building the temporary bridge.

The temporary bridge is scheduled to be completed and open to traffic on Friday, June 10th. Hale said the main bridge will be closed for construction work once the temporary bridge is constructed.

The Mullins Station bridge replacement is scheduled to be completed by Saturday, August 1st.

The turnout on election day was better than I estimated last week -- still part thetic, but better, a little over . 15% of both dems and repubs went to the polls.


Statewide the percentage was 12%. What were you

radio from Louisville, I kept hearing rock-and-roll music from a place in Memphis called Sun Records. That peaked my interest because many of my favorite artists were recording on the Sun label, including Johnny Cash, Jerry Lee Lewis, Carl Perkins, Elvis Presley, Roy Orbison; Conway Twitty,

and eventually, B. B. King. Rock music was still in its infancy. Needless to say, I was purchasing 45 rpm recordings and turning up the radio when these artists were on the air. All of which led to my first attempt to understand the music referred to as the "blues."


In 1956 B. B. King released a song called, "Three O' Clock Blues," and it climbed into the number one spot on the Billboard charts.


King began his career of 77 years by singing in a gospel choir at the Elkhorn Baptist Church in Kilimichael, Mississippi. He purchased his first guitar at the age of 12, taught himself to play, and play he did! There he began stints on the local radio station, WGRM.

In 1948 he began performing on Sonny Boy Williamson's radio program on KWEM in West Memphis, where he began to develop a fan base. It was there that he picked up the name by which he would always be known. Working as both a singer and a disk jockey, he acquired the name "Beale Street Blues Boy," which later became "Blues Boy." That nickname was eventu-

"B.B." King was a prolific concert performer throughout his life. As a young man in 1956, he hit the stage 342 times! He lived to perform. In the mid-80s he appeared in Lexington at a small bar in the downtown area, near Rupp Arena. Kathy and I, along with our good friends Jimi and Shelly Castle, sat at a table next to the stage. B.B. was probably no farther from us than 10 or 15 feet. It was a mesmerizing experience.

That performance will' always rank as one of the finest that I ever witnessed in person. King sang for a full three hours, and his band "chatted" with the patrons during breaks. He sang every hit he ever had and never seemed to tire. The audience was overwhelmed and still begged for more at the end of his show. The lights went down and I ex-

Keith?" That's how we know the car is a "she" because its voice is most definitely of the female persuasion


Keeter tells her, "Call Ike.







King was also closely connected to other artists that I loved, such as Ray Charles, Bobby "Blue" Bland, and Eric Clapton. Eric's CD called "Riding with the King" hit the charts with rave reviews. I almost wore out that CD in my automobile, hitting repeat over and over again.

King's CD with Eric Clapton from 2000, called Riding with the King, earned him another Grammy for Best Traditional Blues Album. From the 1980s until his death in 2015, he maintained a highly visible and active career, appearing on numerous television shows and performing 300 nights a year.

B.B. King's voice was one of those that you immediately recognize-like Elvis, Sinatra, or Roy Orbison. His voice was as distinctive as his guitar style. He named his guitar "Lucille" and spoke of her as his lady. He solidified his place in music history long before he passed on May 14 of this year at the ripe age of 89.

Fans of King, and they are countless, often feel as if they have a personal connection with him. I am one of them. The final line of his biography says, "He was a Christian." Therefore, I will be looking forward to hearing him again one day. However, he will no longer be playing and singing the blues-instead he will be singing God's praise. 



court last Friday morning from a \$25,000 cash bond to a \$25,000 10% bond, meaning Lawson only had to pay \$2,500 to be released from the Rockcastle County Detention Center.

During last Friday's hearing, Circuit Court Judge David Tapp expressed concern about being the presiding judge over Lawson's case because he had previously served as a member of the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame Board and said he had known Lawson for several years. Tapp said that he be-

lieves he resigned from the board in early 2013 and that Lawson's alleged crimes didn't start until around late 2013. He asked Assistant Commonwealth Attorney Jeremy Bartley if he wanted a special judge to preside over Lawson's case since he previously served on the board and Bartley said he had no problem with Tapp presiding over the case. Lawson's attorney Nathan Shirley, also had no objection.

Tapp didn't recuse himself from presiding over Lawson's trial but he said that he would ask the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame Board for a written docur ment of the timing of his resignation because he didn't want an appearance of wrongdoing with him being the presiding judge. Tapp said he didn't want people to think that he and Lawson "are in cahoots."

Tapp also brought up the issue of Lawson's bond during the arraignment. He said he didn't understand the type of bond Lawson had because he was a low flight risk, charged with nonviolent crimes and had no prior criminal record.

With Lawson's previous bond set at \$25,000 cash for a class D felony, Tapp said he had no problem with seting people to be cautious bring the bond at \$25,000, in 10%, because he said "this is the kind of case the legislature said should be an unsecured bond."

After there was no objection by Bartley or Shirley,

According to state police reports, Lawson is charged with theft by deception as a result of stealing more than \$28,000 since July 2013 from accounts belonging to the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame, the Rockcastle County Cystic Fibrosis Fund and the Rockcastle Tourism Taskforce. Lawson was indicted by

a Rockcastle County Grand Jury last month on three counts of theft by deception which charged him with writing three checks in his name from the Rockcastle County Cystic Fibrosis account without authority. The checks totaled \$3,150.

Rockcastle County Attorney Billy Reynolds said that an investigation of Lawson's alleged embezzlement cases from the Kentucky Music Hall of Fame and the Rockcastle Tourism Taskforce are still ongoing by the Kentucky State Police. He said the theft charges for those two accounts are expected to be presented to a Rockcastle County Grand Jury on Friday, June 12th.

to search the residence, Bryant found a pistol and several used drug paraphernalia items that are associated with smoking meth. He also found a small plastic baggie containing approximately 5.5 grams of suspected methamphetamine that had an estimated street value of approximately \$800-\$1,000.

Upon further investigation, Bryant also noticed a 2015 Harley Davidson motorcycle that was registered in Chattelle's name and noted that Chattelle was curunemployed. rently Chattelle told Bryant that none of the items found on the residence belonged to ' him and that he owns the motorcycle "free and clear," However, Bryant'seized the motorcycle according to state law KRS. 218A.410.

Chattelle was charged with trafficking in a controlled substance (methamphetamine) and possession of a firearm by a convicted felon. He was lodged in the Rockcastle County Detention Center where he has since been released on a \$25,000 cash/property bond.

However. Hale said the starting date and duration of the construction work might have to be adjusted for inclement weather or other unforeseeable delays.



"Nothing ever goes on at Popular Street. It's a quiet neighborhood," Hayes said. "I just hope and pray it doesn't go any further than the flyer."





Memorial Day weekend serves as the unofficial start to summer and draws boaters to Kentucky's lakes and rivers in droves.

'There's nothing better than a weekend or a day on the water," said Zac Campbell, boating education coordinator for the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources. "Kentucky offers so many incredible lakes and rivers that boaters can enjoy. It's a great way to spend quality time with family and friends.'

There were more than : 170,000 motorized boats registered last year in Kentucky. A safe experience on the water should be a top priority because the boating season means more boat traffic and less room for error.

U.S. Coast Guard statistics from 2014 show May as the second deadliest month? behind July for boating-related deaths in the United States:

Make sure everyone is following the rules and the laws of the water. It's also your job to make sure you have all the necessary safety equipment and see to it that it's being used by the people on your boat.

"All of these things will help ensure that you have an enjoyable and safe trip on the water."

There were nine boatingrelated deaths on Kentucky waters all of last year, up from five in 2013, according to Coast Guard data. Four people have already lost their lives in boatingrelated accidents on Kentucky waters this year.

'That's high considering the boating season has not even begun yet," said Maj. Shane Carrier, boating law administrator with Kentucky Fish and Wildlife.

Department conservation officers will be out on the water this holiday weekend to help ensure everyone's safety.

Boaters should consider arranging for a free vessel

allows users to find the nearest marina and offer the ability to text your boating plans to family, friends and other contacts.

Boaters should follow the "Safety Equipment Checklist" prepared by the department's law enforcement division before taking to the water:

• Registration numbers and decals properly displayed

• Registration receipt on board

• Wearable life jackets for each person on board

• Throwable flotation device

- Fire extinguisher
- Horn or whistle

• Lights (red, green and 360-degree white lights)

Children ages 12-17 years old who operate a personal watercraft or boat with a 10-horsepower motor or greater must have a safe boating certificate card or certificate showing they've completed a National Association of State Boating Law Administrators (NASBLA)-approved boater education course. Boater education courses are offered in person around the state at no charge and online for a fee. All in-person courses require online pre-registration. For more information, including course schedules, visit Kentucky Fish and Wildlife's website at fw.ky.gov.

Rockcastle School District receives \$6,000 grant to support literacy



Mamaw's Kitchen

CHARRO BEANS

It is time for our Summer Block Party with our neighbors. Each family on the block brings a dish to share with everyone. We are having a Mexican Fiesta this year. This is two of the dishes I will be preparing for our get-together. 6 ounces bacon, chopped

8 ounces Mexican chorizo, chopped

1/2 cup chopped white onion

1 to 2 Serrano chilies, seeded, finely chopped 8 ounces cored and chopped ripe tomatoes.

5 cups cooked pinto beans or canned beans 1 cup water

Salt, to taste

Cook bacon in large skillet over medium-high heat until it is lightly browned and starting to crisp, 3 to 4 minutes. Add chorizo and cook, using a wooden spoon or spatula to break chorizo into smaller pieces; cook for 4 to 5 minutes until brown and crisp.

Add onion and chilies mix well, and cook until they soften, 2 to 3 minutes. Add tomatoes and continue cooking for 4 to 5 minutes more, stirring occasionally, until they are thoroughly softened.

Add beans and water, stir well, reduce heat to me-

dium. Cook until the beans are moist but not very soupy, 8 to 10 minutes. Add salt to taste. FAJITA CHICKEN CHILI 1 tablespoon canola oil 2 and 1/2 pounds boneless, skinless chicken breasts 2 large onions 2 large sweet red or green bell peppers, seeded 1 can (15 ounce) pinto beans, drained and rinsed 2 cans (14 ounces each) petite diced tomatoes

2 tablespoon chili powder 1 teaspoon ground cumin 1 teaspoon dried oregano 1 teaspoon salt

Shredded cheddar, sour cream, guacamole, and tortillas

Coat slow-cooker bowl with nonstick cooking spray. Thinly slice chicken breast

on the diagonal. In a large nonstick skillet, heat oil over medium-high heat. Add chicken and cook 6 minutes or until lightly browned. Don't crowd the skillet, cook in two batches if necessary.

Slice onions and bell peppers into 1/2-inch slices. In the slow-cooker bowl, layer onions, peppers, cooked chicken, and beans. Combine tomatoes, chili powder, cumin, oregano, and salt. Pour over beans. Cover and cook on LOW for 6 hours.



I've been there, and I know the feeling. I have experienced that bitter disappointment when something I desired with all my heart vanished. That experience isn't pleasant.


