

The Beatyville man arrested last week and charged with Sodomy was arraigned Wednesday at Rockcastle County District Court.

Geffory Dale Combs, Jr. 32, was arrested at his home in Beatyville after two Rockcastle County girls, 7 and 9 years old, told social workers Combs had performed sexual acts in front of them and involving the

Combs' bond was originally set at \$75,000 but during his arragnment the bond was lowered to \$50,000 cash or property.

The conditions of the bond included wearing an ankle monitor, no contact with the victims and work release was authorized.

Combs bonded out Thursday and was ordered; to attend his preliminary. Hearing at 9:30 on Wednesday, April 27.



Though it seems to me sort of like self promotion, many people have asked me to write about my experiences as the guitarist and harmony singer for country music artist Vern Gosdin. So, here goes.

I landed the job with Vern through a dear friend who was the guitar player with Keith Whitley.

I had been at Renfro Valley for many years as the opening and closing act and, luckily for me, I was a huge fan of Vern so I had been singing his songs on stage for quite some time and was very familiar with all the harmony parts.

When I was hired, I drove to Nashville and got on his bus. Vern was in the coach room and I never met him until about 30 minutes before the first show. He came out of the back of the bus and said "Are you the new guy?" I told him I was and he said, "See you on

My audition to be in the band was in front of 60,000 people. I've often wondered what he would have done if I had been horrible. He had never heard me play or sing and there I stood beside him in front of an ocean of people with a guitar and a

Luckily, the show went well. It was much bigger than anything I was used to and there was a lot I didn't know just being a country boy from Muddy Creek. I was suddenly thrust into one of the most popular country bands in the nation and I didn't know what to expect.

When Vern's "Chiseled in Stone" went gold, our crowds got even bigger and suddenly I didn't even carry my own guitar. He had "people"; who tuned my guitar, placed it on stage, set , my mic stand and after the show, they packed it all back into the bus while we signed autographs.

That always confused me. Why on earth would some stranger in Georgia want a country boy from Muddy Creek to sign their

I made several mistakes. Not really in the music but in how we were supposed to act. They called me "green" because I was new to the big business of music.

For example, I didn't know that all players in Nashville had guitar picks made with their autograph on it to hand out to people after a show. So when a girl asked me for my guitar pick, I said, "are you nuts? I wouldn't take \$50 for this pick. It took me a year of playing to get it shaped exactly like I wanted it."

I was laughed at a lot by the other band members for not knowing such things.

Eventually, things settled down and I started to pick up on the industry expectations and not embarrass myself every week.

We played the old television show called Hee Haw and they made me wear bib overalls but that was a fun experience.

I do not believe Trump can beat Clinton. But, what if he does? We'll only be swapping one New York liberal for the other.



In any event, it thundered several times in both months, here on Charlie Brown Road, half way between Lancaster and Richmond. Loretta says the


January thunder canceled out the ones we had in February and that it's probably safe to assume that frosty weather is over.






Red Bud Ride brings nearly 700 visitors to Livingston





General Assembly reaches budget agreement

After numerous long nights highlighted by plenty of healthy debate and number crunching, the Kentucky General Assembly finally reached an agreement on

the two-year state budget early Thursday morning, April 14, Be-2016. tween a newly elected gover-

nor and new political dynamics in the House, the process may have lasted a bit longer than usual, but we were happy with the bipartisan effort shown by all Senate members, House members, and respective staff. In the end, we are confident that the budget passed on Friday, April 15, 2016, is a structurally-balanced budget that addresses our most vital areas of government without jeopardizing the financial soundness of our children's future.

The Senate's main objective throughout budget negotiations was to confront Kentucky's \$38 billion unfunded pension liability, which has undoubtedly jeopardized the financial stability of our Commonwealth. According to Governing Magazine, Kentucky's pension systems were ranked at the top of the worst-funded of all 50 states. We originally proposed to give an additional \$322 million to fund pensions than our House col-

Thankfully, after nearly three weeks of negotiations, the Senate and the House reached a budget compromise that leaves our state with one of the most conservative and responsible budget documents we have seen in many years.

In the final budget com-

promise, we are dedicating more than \$1.2 billion to the unfunded pension liabilities. This budget also exempts KET, K-12 education, and Learning and Results Services (LARS) from any funding reductions. Performance-based funding for universities was also included which provides incentives for postsecondary education institutions to raise their education standards in areas such as graduation rates and retention rates. Frankfort Update

The 2016 Session of the Kentucky General Assembly has concluded.

Many issues were studied and debated. Our state constitution requires:

that the legislature pass a budget every two years and, as you know, this year was a budget year.

Passing a budget and avoiding a costly special session was a priority for me. As I have noted before, while the budget was not perfect, it contained many positive aspects. Here's a breakdown of some of the most important budget provisions:

Pension Funding: Going into this budget year I promised to do everything possible to protect the pensions of our teachers and state workers. I'm pleased that this budget contained over \$1.28 billion to be put towards the unfunded liability and full ARC plus funding. It also contained \$125 for a Permanent Fund appropriation to help address the pension crisis in the years ahead.

K-12 Elementary and Secondary Education: Our community's success depends on a strong education system. The budget we passed contained no reductions in FY 17 or FY 18 for K-12 education.

Post-Secondary Education: The budget contained a 4.5% reduction in FY 17 and FY 18 post-secondary. Colleges and Universities play a vital role in our Commonwealth. However, it became apparent that these institutions had areas where they could tighten their belts.

The 4.5% reduction represents a compromise from the Governor's proposed 9% cuts. There was also language included in the budget to lay the groundwork for performance based funding for universities going forward. This means state funding would be given on the results our education institutions are getting. For example, performance based funding would look at how many degrees are awarded instead of just how many students are enrolled. The funding model for this would be 5% in 4th quarter of FY18, 15% in FY19 and 25% in FY20. A task force will help develop the criteria for this type of funding structure.

Scholarships: The legislature also created a Work Ready Scholarship program. This program will help Kentucky students trying to get their associates degree. There was \$9.4 million in FY17 and \$15.9 million in FY18 appropriated for this ini-

bond pool was another included item which will permit one new project in each congressional district to promote workforce development. Also included in the budget were much-needed pay raises for Kentucky State Police.

While the budget was being debated, several important bills were signed into law by Governor Bevin:

• Senate Bill (SB) 193 will provide insurance coverage for children with special nutrition needs.

• House Bill (HB) 40, which allows for the expungement of some Class D felonies from criminal records. The bill would expunge only 61 of Kentucky's nearly 400 Class D felonies, but that constitutes 70 percent of the state's Class D felon population.

• SB 56 increases the look-back window for DUI offenses from five years to 10 years.

• SB 11 will help the tourism industry, especially our booming bourbon industry, here in our state.

• SB 63 will expedite the testing of rape kits.

• SB 179, known as the "ABLE Act," will help establish education savings accounts for people with disabilities.

• SB 43, also known as the "John Mackey Memorial Act," provides death benefits to families of EMS workers killed in the line of

• SB 195 provides death benefits to families of firefighters who die from cancer caused by their lineof-duty work.

It has been an honor to be your voice in Frankfort during this 2016 Session. However, my work is not done as we continue to debate issues during the interim. Please do not hesitate to contact me or my office if there is anything we can do

Filing a Notice of Loss The CCC-576, Notice of Loss, is used to report failed acreage and prevented planting and may be completed by any producer with an interest in the crop. Timely filing a Notice of Loss is required for all crops including grasses. For losses on crops covered by the Non-Insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP), you must file a CCC-576, Notice of Loss, in the FSA County Office within 15 days of the occurrence of the disaster or when

losses become apparent. Producers of hand-harvested crops must notify FSA of damage or loss through the administrative County Office within 72 hours of the date of damage or loss first becomes apparent. This notification can be provided by filing a CCC-576, email, fax or phone. Producers who notify the County Office by any method other than by filing the CCC-576 are still required to file a CCC-576, Notice of Loss, within the required 15 calendar days.

If filing for prevented planting, an acreage report and CCC-576 must be filed within 15 calendar days of the final planting date for the crop.

Beginning Farmer Loans FSA assists beginning farmers to finance agricultural enterprises. Under these designated farm loan programs, FSA can provide financing to eligible applicants through either direct or guaranteed loans. FSA defines a beginning farmer as a person who:

Has operated a farm for

Will materially and substantially participate in the operation of the farm








At this time, campfires are permitted on the Daniel Boone National Forest, but a burning ban could be implemented under drought conditions. Instead of building a

campfire, visitors should consider using campstoves or grills when cooking food outdoors.

"If you have a campfire, keep it small," added Morgan. "Use sticks from the ground that can be broken by hand, and never leave your campfire unattended. The fire should be dead-out before you walk away.

"To help put a campfire out completely, you should use plenty of water and stir with a shovel to make sure all burning embers are cool to the touch."

Anyone caught leaving or abandoning a campfire is. subject to fines and court costs. In the event of an escaped campfire, the person responsible may be required to appear in court and held liable for suppression costs.

Local award-winning EKU senior once thought college wasn't for her

As she was growing up in Rockcastle County, school was Kara Canterbury's "kryptonite."

And that, she said, is putting it nicely.

Diagnosed with ADHD, she found even sitting at her desk a daunting task. She was constantly staying after school to keep up with assignments until, finally, her mother pulled her out of the local school system for a few years of homeschooling. Then, when she re-entered the public schools, she was held back a grade. She lived for the 3 o'clock bell, when she could race off to sports practice, a club meeting or just hang out with friends.

After graduation, she enrolled at Eastern Kentucky University, but only to prove to her family – several of whom are EKU grads – that college wasn't for her, that she needed to do something – anything – else.

"I knew I had interests, but nothing really grasped my attention."


Then, a perceptive professor mentioned the possibility of her working with the families of children who had developmental delays.

"I had no idea what was waiting for me in the ... child and family studies program. I simply thought I was going to prove to my family that I tried the first year of college but didn't need to and couldn't go

"Boy, was I wrong."

You could say that. Not only has Canterbury excelled academically, she has confirmed her life's calling to work with young children through a series of international experiences in such diverse settings as Zimbabwe, Botswana, South Africa, Haiti, Guatemala, Romania, Ukraine and Russia. The EKU senior who only wanted to prove she didn't belong in college recently earned one of two College of Health Sciences Dean's Awards for her high grade point average (3.43), demonstrated leadership qualities and service to the health sciences profession.

"There was never that one defining moment where I thought, 'College is for me.' It came very slowly, and it came through my different experiences volunteering. If I seriously wanted to make a difference, I had to find my passion and get a de-

gree so people would take me seriously."

All Canterbury knew when she entered the child and family studies program was that she loved children and wanted to "bridge the gap" between failure and success.

"The department wrapped me in its arms by connecting with me on a personal level," Canterbury said. "Every single professor in the program has gone out of their way, willingly, for me at some point. As I grew to know them better, their investment in me becamé deeper and deeper. They were constantly pushing me to think about how we can change the world for children and families, how we can make an impact on the lives around us.

"They took a girl who was out to prove she wasn't 'smart enough' for school and gave her a passion to work for. They gave me a purpose in striving to create a better future for children. They put me on a path in life I wouldn't have found on my own."

So she has spent much of the last five years circling the globe to help others less fortunate discover their own purpose.

For example, Canterbury took a break from college in Fall 2012 to visit rural villages in Zimbabwe, helping at a local home for sexually abused girls and abandoned babies. While there, she also traveled to Botswana and South Africa to work with other children in orphan care.

care.

"Most people think you go to another country expecting to 'do good' and 'change lives.' That is very well true but, in a much more real sense, you go and you volunteer because you want to walk along-side others on their journey in life. When I reflect back on different trips, different friends I have made,

I don't see 'look what I did' or even 'look what was done.' I see how my new friends changed me. My friends receiving the clothing, the meals, the medical care, they showed me what life is truly about."

More recently and closer to home, her work has encompassed the St. Baldrick's Foundation and The Center for Courageous Kids, a camp for terminally ill and medically fragile children. While with St. Baldrick's, Canterbury shaved her head and raised more than \$1,500 for life-saving childhood cancer research in less than 24 hours. At the Center for Courageous Kids, she volunteered for many weekend retreats for families and led workshops from crafts to cooking to playroom activities.

In addition to her "supportive" natural and church families, Canterbury explained that EKU's own "sense of community has helped shape me into someone who believes she can make a difference. Eastern has given me the knowledge and equipped me with the tools to go out into the world and not only 'work' but to change the world, even in the smallest ways."

After graduating May 13, Canterbury will begin her career as a preschool teacher, but plans also to pursue master's and doctoral degrees with the hopes of someday teaching at EKU, which she calls "absolutely the best university in the nation.

"I have never met so many loving and caring people as I have at Eastern," she said. "The passion of those who work on campus drives students to be the best and, when you have the best students and are sending them out after graduation, that is when you see positive change in the world."



INSPECTION PERIOD

FOR THE PROPERTY TAX ASSESSMENT ROLL

The Rockcastle County real property tax roll will be opened for inspection from May 2 through May 16, 2016. Under the supervision of the property valuation administrator (PVA) or one of the deputies, any person may inspect the tax roll.

This is the January 1, 2016 assessment on which state, county and school taxes for 2016 will be due about September 15, 2016.

The current tax roll is located in the office of the PVA and may be inspected between the hours of 8:30 am and 4:00 pm.

Any taxpayer desiring to appeal an assessment on real property made by the PVA must first request a conference with the PVA or a designated deputy. The conference may be held prior to or during the inspection period.

After the conference with the PVA or designated deputy, any taxpayer still aggrieved by an assessment on real property may appeal to the county board of assessment appeals.

The taxpayer can appeal his assessment by filing in person or sending a letter or other written petition stating the reasons for appeal, identifying the property and stating the taxpayer's opinion of the fair cash value of the property.

The appeal must be received in the county clerk's office no later than one work day following the conclusion of the inspection period.

A taxpayer failing to appeal to the county board of assessment appeals, or failing to appear before the board, either in person or by designated representative, will not be eligible to appeal directly to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Appeals of personal property assessments shall not be made to the county board of assessment appeals. Personal property taxpayers shall be served notice under the provisions of KRS 132.450(4) and shall have the protest and appeal rights granted under the provisions of KRS 131.110.

The following steps should be taken when a taxpayer does not agree with the assessed value of personal property as determined by the office of property valuation administrator.

- (1) He must list under protest (for certification) what he believes to be the fair cash value of his property.
- (2) He must file a written protest directly with the Department of Revenue, Office of Property Valuation within 30 days from the date of the notice of assessment.
- (3) This protest must be in accordance with KRS 131.110.
- (4) The final decision of the Department of Revenue may be appealed to the Kentucky Board of Tax Appeals.

Mamaw's Kitchen

CHICKEN IN A BASKET While at Berea, Will and I both worked at Boone Tavern in their dining room. The manager then was Richard T. Hougan, the author of three cookbooks. One of his most famous recipes is probably Chicken Flakes in a Bird's Nest. That dish is one of his creations still being served in today's Boone Tavern. This is my version of that famous dish.

4 and 1/2 cups frozen hash browns, thawed, drained 6 tablespoons butter, melted 1 to 2 teaspoons salt

1 can cream of chicken soup 1/4 cup milk 1/2 teaspoon sage 3 cups cooked chicken,

cubed or shredded 1 C frozen peas and carrots Preheat oven to 375°. In a bowl, combine the potatoes, butter and salt. Press into a greased 9-inch pie pan. Set aside. In a saucepan, combine the soup, milk and sage. Stir well and heat just until warm. Remove from heat and add chicken, peas and carrots. Mix well. Pour into prepared potato crust. Bake for 40 to 45 minutes or until

crust is golden brown. CREOLE CHICKEN **COMBO**

I found this recipe in a newspaper in Ann Arbor, Michiganwhen Will was getting his MA degree. Money was fairly tight then, as he was a full time student. This recipe fit right into our budget. The left-over chicken mixed with all the spices made a nutritious as well as tasty dish.

2 tablespoons oil 1 medium onion, chopped 1 or 2 cloves garlic, minced 1/2 green bell pepper, chopped 2 cups chicken stock

1 large tomato, peeled and chopped Dash hot pepper sauce

1 teaspoon salt 1 cup uncooked white rice 2 cups cooked chicken, bitesized pieces

1 medium green onion, chopped 1 tablespoon chopped pars-

Sauté onion, garlic and green pepper in oil in heavy saucepan until tender but not browned, stirring occasionally. Add stock, tomato and seasonings. Bring to boil and stir in rice. Cover and simmer until rice is almost tender and most of liquid is absorbed, about 18 minutes. Stir in chicken and heat thoroughly, about 5minutes. Sprinkle with chopped green onion and parsley.
