City faces second lawsuit this month

For the second time this month, a lawsuit has been filed against the City of Mount Vernon, Mayor Mike Bryant individually and in his official capacity and council members Clifford Mullins, Wayne Bullock, Jamie Anderkin Bryant, Sharon Saylor, Shelly Raines Lewis, and Jackie Weaver each in their official capacity only.

The suit was filed Monday by the Eastern Rockcastle Water Association, Inc. by their attorney Jerry J. Cox.

The lawsuit is asking for \$35,000 in overpayment for water supplied to the water association by the City of Mount Vernon, along with punitive damages of up to \$25,000.

The lawsuit claims a dispute has risen over whether the plaintiff owes the defendant for water allegedly sold to the plaintiff. It also claims the city failed to test the master meters delivering water to the plaintiff.

The suit continued that the city failed to maintain existing meters and did not install new meters correctly. It also says the city failed to provide water to the plaintiff on several dates.

The lawsuit further states "The City of Mount Vernon, has received numerous citations from the Division of Water, some of which affect the quality of water sold to plaintiff by defendant and the defendant failed to notify plaintiff so that it could notify its customers to boil water."

The lawsuit stems from the time between January of 2014 and October of 2015 when the water company claims it overpaid the city for water due to alleged faulty meters.

City lowers property tax rate once again

The Mount Vernon City Council held their regular rate at 16.1 cents per \$100 monthly meeting Monday evening at City Hall.

After members of the council approved the monthly budget report, the first reading of two ordinances were held

Ordinance 2016-3 set the annual ad valorem tax on motor vehicles and motorboats at 16.7 cents per \$100 of value. According to Mayor Mike Bryant "nothing changed in the motor vehicle tax rate this year."

Ordinance 2016-4 set the real and personal property of value. This is a drop from last year's 16.4.

However, according to Mayor Bryant, the tax rate drop will still yield more income for the city due to the increase in property values since last year. "We are once again able

to lower everyone's tax rate while still providing for the city and the people of





Their heads and backs were various shades of brown but white was the dominate color. If they were not snow buntings they were mighty good imposters.

I recently found myself reading an article that tried to define or to explain the meaning of the 1950's term cruisin'; of course, I don't need it explained at all, because I lived it. However, I noted that their own definitions was as follows:

To drive around (sometimes in a set pattern) to see who is in town and what's goin' down in the streets.

Another explanation

To parade one's vehicle on city streets with or without a destination, sometimes accompanied with excessively loud music.

My experiences with cruisin' made up a considerable amount of my teenage years. When I got my first car, I was a sophomore at Mt. Vernon High School (MVHS). It was a black 1958 Chevrolet that I received from my grandfather. I had already learned about cruisin' from the teenagers who were juniors and seniors at MVHS. I had watched many of them as they filled their "rides" and drove around Mt. Vernon to see who was out.

Our route passed by

most special places where our friends generally gathered. Included in some of the "hot spots" were Maggard's Drug Store and Kelsey's Restaurant, both of which were located on Mair Street; The Dinner Bell Restaurant, Mt. Vernon High School, and occasionally Renfro Valley or Hamm's Drive In on the road to Brodhead rounded out mos of the rest. Our route begar at the Courthouse and allowed us to slowly drive up Main, past Maggard's and Kelsey's, turn the corner onto US 25 to see who was at The Dinner Bell, ther travel out to MVHS in order to make the return trip.

If we saw a friend, sometimes we would stop and chat, or maybe just simply blow and wave. Most of us did have our AM radios; blaring, and we were loudly singing along with the rock and roll artists on the radio I remember some of the loudest performers in my car, including: Marty Dorcas, Nancy, Patsy Carol, Carla, Jewell, Mary Charlotte, Joyce, and many others. You could hear us

I'm sure the younger generation doesn't even know what it is, but a generation or so ago, it was rather popular. It is a unique flavor that you either like or hate. There isn't much middle ground. He was excited to have found these delicious morsels and soon began to eat some of them. I like licorice, too, so I helped him out. This licorice was really strong and I like

mine a little milder. As we sat there eating, I told Stanley a little story about my Uncle Frank. He and Aunt Dorothy lived in a suburb of Cincinnati and Mom and I would go for a little visit from time to time and stay about a week in the summer. Uncle Frank was rather short and pudgy with a quick wit and a big sense of humor. Aunt Dorothy was a very nice lady, but she was more serious, prim, and proper.

Their bedroom was next to the guest room

where Mom and I staved. We all usually turned in about the same time, which was usually early We sat in bed and read until we got sleepy.

Aunt and Uncle slept in twin beds with a night stand between them. It had a lamp, phone, and other items on it including Uncle Frank's little square candy jar. He was never far from a little candy, even carrying Lifesavers with him at all times. Aunt Dorothy would tease him, saying that there was no wonder he was fat, he ate candy in his sleep. One of his favorites was licorice.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statement Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement in accordance with accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the laws of Kentucky to demonstrate compliance with the Commonwealth of Kentucky's regulatory basis of accounting as described in Note 1, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the financial statement based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, and the Audit Guide for County Fee Officials issued by the Auditor of Public Accounts, Commonwealth of Kentucky. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to

obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statement is free from material misstatement. An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statement. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statement, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statement in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statement. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

The effects on the financial statement of the variances between the regulatory basis of accounting described in Note 1 and accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, although not reasonably determinable, are presumed to be material. Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles

In our opinion, because of the significance of the matter discussed in the Basis for Adverse Opinion on U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles paragraph, the financial statement referred to above does not present fairly, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, the financial position of each fund of the Rockcastle County Sheriff, as of December 31, 2015, or changes in financial position or cash flows thereof for the year then ended. Opinion on Regulatory Basis of Accounting

In our opinion, the financial statement referred to above presents fairly, in all material respects, the receipts, disbursements, and excess fees of the Rockcastle County Sheriff for the year ended December 31, 2015, in accordance with the basis of accounting practices prescribed or permitted by the Commonwealth of Kentucky as described in Note 1. Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards



pecially this time of the year. While they are known to winter in states along the Canadian border they breed and nest in the far northern Arctic. When I went out on Friday morning with my camera in hand, they were

Nor have I been able to photograph the elusive, camera-shy bluebirds. I have numerous shots of our resident easterners, one pair of which didn't even bother migrating last year and have shown no inclination to do so this year. Another pair seems to have already departed to wherever it is that bluebirds like to take the

For reasons too complicated to fully explain in this column, suffice to say it has to do with bothersome bridge construction, we have had to make the trek through White Lick Valley to get to Berea for the last three weeks. That adds. about 15 minutes to the trip

which normally takes about 15 minutes but it's not as much of a bother as it might be unless we're in a hurry.

It's not a bother to me because we usually sight several hawks along the way as well as a great blue heron Loretta is particularly fond of trying to photograph that frequents the shallow flow of White Lick Creek. We rarely go that way without seeing him/ her/it but my wife has far more photos of winged blurs gliding over hay fields than she does of the serenely posing heron.

The bird is extremely camera shy. It will snap to attention faster than an army private who has just spotted the general's jeep when Loretta slows down. As soon as it sees her window start to descend the bird is up, up and away. But every once in a long while the bird will be so captivated and intent on a crawdad or minnow it is stalking that it becomes oblivious to it's other

surroundings and Lo is able to get off a few camera shots before it realizes she is there. I enjoy watching my wife stalk the heron as much as I enjoy seeing it.

One day. 2 week back, I spotted a red shouldered hawk, two Cooper's and 3 kestrels before we got to what I have taken to calling the blue heron mile. We spotted the heron and simultaneously saw what appeared to be its solid white sibling no more than 20 feet downstream. Both took to wing before Loretta could get her camera up but I am as sure as I can be that we saw the first great egret, also called the great white heron, that we have ever seen in our neck of the woods.

My first lessons about cruisin' were from teenagers who were older than I, such as: Billy Swinney, Bennie Chaney, Oscar Fain, C.C. Ponder, Roy Mink, Charles Bennett Farris, Penny Nunnelley, Billy Fain, Jerry Hansel, Jim Cox, Tommy Parsons, and many others as they drove (over and over) the standard cruisin' route

The teenagers who would usually ride with me included a great many of my classmates, both guys and gals. We developed close friendships riding in that old '58 Chevy. We guys also had many friends who were one year ahead of us in school, including Bud Cox, Lloyd Fain, Jim Barton Nunnelley, and Howard Coffey, not to mention the girls. We were blessed with a substantial number of really good friends.

In retrospect, I now truly understand the importance that the act of cruisin' had on us as teenagers. We had just acquired a new found freedom - automobiles - and we were no longer willing to sit at home at night when we could be driving the streets making multiple contacts with a variety of friends.

In those days, all of our hang-outs closed by 8:00 or 9:00 pm on week days, and we had no place to gather with our "buds," except for Baker's Standard Oil - and the girls did not frequent that establishment. So if we wanted to spend time with all of our friends, we had to drive the route or go to someone's home.

Of course, during the week, our parents wanted us to stay home and study for our high school classes. I supposed that there were a few nights that we actually did. However, it was no longer likely to happen that way. After all, many of us had our own cars just sitting in the driveway, so even if you had to make some excuse to get out, cruisin' was going to happen. What good times those


Dollie ran a clothing store for many year in Mount Vernon and one of her favorite past times is to read her Bible. One of the biggest pieces


In fact, according to Bullock, during the induction into the Center's Hall of Fame last year, Dollie started remembering those days. "She started preaching right here," said Bullock.

The Rockcastle Rockets football team are now 3-1 after their first loss of the season, to the Pulaski County Maroons, last Friday night, 32-13.









Mother of overdosed son fighting to raise awareness in county

Jerry Wayne Price II (Jed), 34, of Bowling Ridge in Rockcastle County, died of a drug overdose on April 10, 2016, fifteen days before his birthday. But his mother Samantha is attempting to keep the same fate from happening to others.

"People need to know this (heroin and meth) is right here among us. It's not just big cities or on your television set. It's right here beside us and people are going to have to wake up and face it," said Samantha Price.

On the night of April 10th, Price had apparently taken heroin in a massive dose, along with two friends who are now in the Rockcastle County Detention Center, according to Samantha.

Price became unconscious almost immediately, but rather than call for help or take him to the hospital, the two friends drove around Rockcastle and neighboring counties for almost four hours with Price on the rear floor of a van.

"They passed by two or three hospitals but wouldn't drop him off or call for help because they had drugs on them and didn't want to get in trouble," Jed's mother

Eventually, the group stopped at a house on Bowling Ridge and neighbors called 911 because they heard

The friends left and EMS workers, called to the scene, attempted to revive Price, but it was too late.

"He was my only son and he didn't have to die. All they had to do was drop him off at a hospital," said Samantha.

There is a law in Kentucky, known as the Good Samaritan Law, that says anyone who reports an overdose cannot be arrested with small amounts of drugs on them. The law was established so that anyone who sees an overdose, may call for help without fear of being

arrested themselves.

However, Samantha believes the law is not working.



1 teaspoon vanilla 2 eggs, beaten

Heat oven to 375°. Butter a 9 x 13 casserole dish, and fill with alternating layers of sweet potatoes and apples. As you add layers, sprinkle the apples with sugar and the sweet potatoes with salt, a little sugar and liberal dots of butter. Sprinkle with cin-

namon (add more or omit according to your taste.). Pour the hot water over the potatoes and apples. Cover and bake for 30 minutes. Uncover and continue cooking for 15 minutes longer. until potatoes are browned and apples are soft.

CROCK POT APPLE BUTTER

I use a couple different types of apple to make this. I have also made it Splenda® and it turns out just as tasty. (If you use the Splenda® brown sugar or regular brown sugar reduce it to 3 cups)

5 and 1/2 pounds apples. peeled and finely chopped 4 cups sugar


2 to 3 teaspoons ground cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon salt


Place apples in bowl of crock pot. Combine sugar. cinnamon, and salt. Pour over apples and mix well. Cover crock pot and cook on high for 1 hour. Decrease heat to low; cover and cook on low for 9 to 11 hours or until thickened and dark brown. Stir occasionally. Uncover and cook on low for 1 hour longer. If desired, whisk until smooth.

Spoon into freezer containers, leaving 1/2-inch head space. Cover and freeze.
